#### POWER TALKS ON PALESTINE OPEN; U.S. DELEGATE URGES ARAB-JEWISF CONCILIATION

MEM YORK. Mar. 8. (JTA) -- A suggestion that all possible attempts should be to bring about Arab-Jewish conciliation in Falestine was made today by Warren tin, head of the U.S. delegation at the United Nations, at the opening meeting of Big Powers ten-day conference on Palestine. The American representative emphaed that it might be advisable to invite the Jewish Agency and the Palestine Arab her Committee to confer with the Big Powers.

The meeting agreed to give immediate consideration to the question of establisha militia in Palestine. It also decided to discuss establishment of a routine offering guidance to the U.N. Palestine Commission in relation to Provisional hells of Government which must be formed in Palestine by Jsws and Arabs separately er the provisions of the General Assembly partition decision.

The major subject on the agenda remains the question of deciding whether the sent state of affairs in Palestine presents a threat to peace. At today's seshit was decided to invite Britain to participate in the parley, despite the concement made by the British representative at the Security Council that his ernment will not take any part in the talks. It was also decided to invite U.N. retary-General Trygve Lie to attend the parley.

The meeting will be resumed tomorrow evening. Farticipating in today's talks e: Warren R. Austin for the United States; Andrei Gromyko for the USSR; Alexandre odi for France; and T.F. Tsiang for Chine. In a statement to the press which was med at the conclusion of today's discussions, it was emphasized that today's sion was of an exploratory nature and was devoted chiefly to mapping out an nda. All participants agreed on the need for speed in the deliberations, it revealed.

## Britain Is Invited to Appear at the Deliberations as Mandatory Power

LAKE SUCCESS, Mar. 8. (JTA) -- Sen. Warren R. Austin, head of the American egation at the United Mations, today extended an invitation to Britain on behalf the Big Powers, to attend tomorrow's meeting on Palestine.

The invitation was extended following today's first meeting on Palestine of representatives of the United States, USSR, France and China who met in accordance s with the decision of the U.N. Security Council last week. The British delegam is expected to accept the invitation.

Sen. Austin made it clear that the British Gövernment was invited not as a ther of the Big Five, but as the Mandatory Power. He refused to comment on the scibility of whether Britain would be asked to take a permanent seat in the future liberations.

#### ISH AGENCY NAMES 13-MENBER CABINET; FORMS PROVISIONAL COVER COUNCIL FOR JENISH STATE

JERUSALEM, Mar. 8. (JTA) -- A 31-member Provisional Council of Government and abinet of 13 for the new Jewish state was named hore late last night as a meeting the Jewish Agency following protracted negotiations enong the various parties and titled groupings in the Jewish community. The names of members of the Cabinet and the moil were immediately cabled to the U.N. Palestine Commission at Lake Success.

Heading the Cebinet as Premier is David Ben Gurion, chairman of the Agency sentive. Other members and their portfolios are: Moshe Shertok, Foreign Affairs; fezer Kaplan, Finance; David Remez, Interior; Itzhak Gruenbaum, Labor; Fritz mastein, Trade; Rabbi Judah L. Fishman, Education and Religion; Moshe Shapiro, aigration; and Itche Meir Levin, Health. The remaining four ministries were assign—one to the General Zionists, two to the United Labor Party, one to the Sephardic munity-but the names of the candidates was not made public pending final acceptes by the parties and individuals concerned.

Of the 31 seats on the Council, ten were assigned to the Palestine Labor Party, ree to the Mizrachi Organization, two to the Mizrachi laborites, four to the General enistsm two to the United Labor Party, two to the Revisionists, and one each to the tysh Badasha, the Yemenite community, the Sephardic community, the Agudas Israel, a Agudah laborites and the Communists. Rabbi Meir Berlin and Helena Kagan will present the Jevish National Council on the Provisional Council of Government.

The Revisionists, who originally refused to enter the provisional government, anged their position after it was learned that the Haganah had succeeded in reaching agreement with the dissident delements. The agreement is scheduled to be ratified a meeting of the Agency executive tomorrow, at which time the Revisionists will so press for greater representation for their party on both the Cabinet and the muncil.

Following announcement of the formation of the Provisional Jewish Government, gh Commissioner Sir Alan G. Cunningham today summoned Ben Gurion to confer with mat Government House. Although the exact nature of their conversation was not as public, it is reported that they discussed the present political and security tuation in the country.

#### ITY REPORTED ACHIEVED BETWEEN HAGANAH AND DISSIDENT GROUP IN PALESTINE

JERUSALEM, Mar. 8. (JTA) -- "Full agreement" on united action against the rabe by the Haganah and the Irgum was reported to have been reached here last night blowing prolonged negotiations. The long-sought Jevish united front was brought out as a result of the formation of the Jevish Provisional Council of Government which all groups in the Jevish community are represented.

The Haganah has begun a campaign of "sanctions" against all persons who did to register for military or industrial service in the "draft" carried out recently y Jevish national institutions. Haganah military police, vearing identifying mbands, entered all public places and asked to see registration cards. Persons to did hot have their cards were warned hot to appear in public. Even American titlens, with the exception of students, have not been exempted from the work-fight casoription.

(In Washington the State Department said that no report has been received from he U.S. Consul in Jerusalem that the Haganah is forcing American citizens in Palestine to register for conscription. Therefore, a spokesman said, the Department refers not to comment un'.il it receives official information from the Consulate.)

## LESTINE ARABS REFUSE U.S. COMSUL GENERAL'S REQUEST THEY COOPERATE WITH U.M. COMMISSION

JERUSALEM, Mar. 8. (JTA) -- American Consul General Robert Macatee today visitthe Jerusalem headquarters of the Palostine Arab Higher Committee to ask the Arab aders to cooperate with the U.N. Palestine Commission. The Arab answer was a curt, at "no."

A formal truce between the members of the Arab village of Biradas and the Jewh settlement of Magdiel, about 15 miles north of Tel Aviv, was signed today. The eb villagers this aftornoon drove out the remnants of a guerrilla band, 30 of whose mbers were killed when the Haganah blasted four houses in the village last week ter the band had attacked Magdiel daily for over a week. After the truce was signin "neutral territory" - Herzlia - agricultural workers left Magdiel to labor in e adjoining fields.

The six members of the United Nations Palestine Commission advance party which rived in Palestine a week ago are still "virtual prisoners" of the Palestine Covment which has quartered them in Security Zone B of this city. Thus far the group seen unable to establish contact with any Jewish, Arab or official agency.

The party, which is not permitted to leave the security enclosure, is housed the beamment of a two-story building, the top floor of which is occupied by itieh troops. The building is unheated, and the male members of the party have en wearing their bathrobes throughout the day to keep warm, while the two women bundled in sweaters and wear heavy slacks. The women busy themselves preparing als and cleaning house, assisted by the men, since the party is without servants. ets have refused to serve them while the Jews are forbidden to enter the zone.

The Haganah radio last night charged that some 200 British soldiers and police we deserted to the Arabs and are stationed near Remallah where they are instructing at recruits in the handling of weapons, including land mines, bombs and morters. her Britons are being held in readiness for use as shock troops, the announcer said. Falestine Government spokesman immediately denied the charges.

#### U.S. Asked to Protect Hadassah Hospital as American Institution

New attacks on traffic between the Hadassah Hospital on Mt. Scopus and the Jevaharess of Jerusalem occurred latellast night. One Jewish armored car was mined diburned out and the driver was killed, while nedical personnel stranded by the attack and the blowing up of a bridge from the heights to the city waited for another mored car to fight its way through to them and transport them to the city.

This morning leaders of the Hadassah organization in Jerusalem cabled to Hadassh in New York asking that it urge the State Department to take "real action" to totet the hospital, which they pointed cut is an American institution, and continue in service. The cable gave details of last night's battle and said that it was mring the hospital to suspend transfer of supplies as well as sick and wounded tients.

A strong Hagemah detachment made a sortie into the Arab stronghold of Bet Dajan d demolished several houses, killing a number of guerrillas, while an Irgun unit metrated the village of Qaqun and blev up four buildings. An official communique by that five Arabs were killed yesterday when a bus in which they were travelling Br Gaza was fired on by a passing Jewish convoy. Eight Jewish political prisoners scaped Friday from the Athlit detention camp where some 500 men are imprisoned, a werment announcement stated today.

Three British soldiers were today sentenced to four years imprisonment each fter a military court had convicted them of selling arms to the Arabs. British military authorities denied their own previous reports that a Jevish plane was fired on in by Jaffa area. They declared that no planes except a scout aircraft had operated that you and that it had not been fired one.

## ISH ACTIONS COMMITTEE LEADERS IN PRAGUE ATTACK ZIONISTS; QUESTION THEIR LOYALTY

PRACUE, Mar. 8. (JIA) -- Bitter attacks against Zicnist members of the Prague Meh Community were made by Jewich Communist speakers here at the first meeting field by the Actions Committee of the Council of Jewish Communities of Bohemia-avia and of the Prague Community. The Actions Committee was formed last week living the change in the Czochoslovak Government.

One of the Communist speakers objected to the fact that Vestnik, the official and the Council of the Jewish Communities, was being edited "in a Zionist rit." Another speaker-a Communist official in the social department of the gas Jewish Community--impugned the Loyalty of Zionists as civizeno.

Frantisek Fuchs, Social Democratic vice-chairman of the Council, who is a memof the Actions Committee, told the audience that it is necessary for Jews to n 'parties of progress,' emphasizing that reaction and anti-Semitism always go d-in-hand. The ouster of Kurt Premysl Heller, a former Communist, from the board the Pregus Jewish Community, was demanded by some of the speakers. Heller was ently expelled from the Communist Party.

A representative of the Trade Union Council urged the staff members of the mail and of the Jevich Community to join the ranks of organized labor. He warned to therwise they would be exposed to dismissel. Among those attending the meeting guests were Arnost Frischer, chairman of the Council of Jewish Communities, and el Stein, chairman of the Prague Jewish Community.

The Jevish Anti-Fascist Committee of Moscow has addressed a communication to the mull here asking for reports on Jewish community activities in Czechoslovakia and copies of Jewish periodicals published in tids country.

#### S IN BRITISH ZONE PERMITTED BY GERMANS TO DROP FIRST NAMES FORCED ON THEM BY NAZIS

MUNICH, Mar 8. (JTA) -- Jews resident in the Eritish zone of Germany have been med permission by the Zonal German Advisory Council to drop the Nazi-imposed st names of "Israel" and "Sarah," it was armounced here today. Jews in the U.S. were allowed to dispense with the names last year.

Nearly 4,000 posters reading "Anti-Semitism Means Ignorance and Barbarism" have a posted in towns and villages throughout the province of Hesse. The placards warn tessemination of Nazi-like or militaristic propaganda will hamper the creation of esceful German state and that offenders are liable to prosecution under existing islation.

More than 4,000,000 German marks worth of household goods have been distributed the approximately 10,000 viotins of Nazi persecution in the province of Wurtten-Seaden in the U.S. zone, an announcement by the provincial Ministry of Justice allot today. The amnouncement added that furnishings and alothing confiscated from is will be distributed to the refugees shortly.

## ATT DEPT. ADMITS "ADVISING" U.S. STEEL COMPANY NOT TO SEND STEEL PLATE TO PALESTINE

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8. (JTA) -- The State Department today admitted that it had sized the U.S. Steel Corporation against taking an order for 500 tons of steel late for shipment to Palestine. The order was placed by the Palestine Electric growtion which needed the plates for its trucks and field equipment.

A spokesman for the Department told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that U.S. tel informally inquired of the State Department whether the plate would be subject on export ban. The Department, he said, unofficially advised U.S. Steel that the attaplated plate shipmant came under the ban of December 5 on the shipment of arms mimittons to the Middle East, inasmuch as it is armor and not ordinary steel

## RTAIN REJECTS U.N. PROPOSAL FOR "PRELIMINARY STEPS" TO ORGANIZE MILITIA IN PALESTINE

LAKE SUCCESS, Mar. 8. (JTA) -- The U.N. Palestine Commission today received a lat refusal from the British Government that it permit "preliminary steps" for seting up an armed militia before the Mandate's termination. The British also rejected a request from the Commission for stockpiling of military arms and equipment under tel for use after the Mandate expires.

The British reply on militia came in response to a request from the Commission of mimidate allocation of cantonment eress, recruiting and training of militia and spaniation of cadres. The British suggested all this could be done in the two weeks for to May 15.

The Commission today sent a letter to the British Government requesting the Manstery to stockpile food up to July 31 from imports to be charged against the trading accent of the Palestine Government. The draft instructions were prepared by a comlitie composed of representatives of the United Kingdom and Belgium. They cover the allowing matters: Buties and power of the Governor; the Council of Administration; be legislative Council and legislation; public officers and initial organizational atters.

In the course of this morning's discussion, Roger Garreau of France insisted on a spointment of a Governor of Jerusalem as soon as possible to enable him to premen himself for the implementation of the draft statute. It was generally underted that the instructions to the Governor should come into force simultaneously

## S. SUPREME COURT RULES AGAINST USING PUBLIC SCHOOLS FOR RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8. (JTA) -- The Supreme Court today decided, eight to one, at use of public school time and public school property for religious instruction y an inter-faith religious council is unconstitutional, notwithstanding the fact hat acceptance of the instruction is voluntary.

The ruling, with Justice Stanley F. Reed dissenting, was made in the case of rs. Vashti McCollum, wife of a college professor in Champaign, Illinois, who said he was an atheist, and who contended that the system of rollgious teaching inefficet in Champaign schools, though voluntary, caused embarrassment to her 12-year-old son seams he alone in his school room did not take the instruction.

Religious instruction in this case is furnished by a Protestant-Catholic-Jewish council which provides the teachers and pays their salaries. The court ruled that his system violates the principle of separation of church and state. The representative of the Jewish faith dropped out of the council and classes in the Jewish relificm were stopped in the last few years because of the very small number of Jewish multis in Champaign.

Justice Hugo L. Black wrote the majority opinion, based on a case decided by the fourt last year, which upheld the grant of tax funds to buses for parochial shouls. In this decision it was declared that the state not only cannot aid any elicion but cannot aid all religions.

Justice Felix Frankfurter wrote a separate, but concurring opinion, somewhat more vigorous in its assertion of the principle of separation of church and state, and was joined by the three justices who, with him, dissented in the bus case. Bey argued that in the McCollum case a minority was subjected to indirect compulsion through the pressure of conformity.

"Separation means separation, not something else," said Justice Frankfurter. belaring it is the "Gourt's duty to enforce" the American principle of separation in its full integrity," the opinion stated that "the public school is at once the space four democracy end the most pervasive means for promoting our common destiny. In meativity of the state is it more vital to keep out divisive forces than in its schools, to avoid confusing, not to say fusing, what the constitution sought to keep strictly agent."

Justice Reed argued that the issue did not involve establishment of a religion, but was maxely another evidence of the presence of religion in many American institutions, such as chaplains in the Army. So long as no discrimination is practised, he said, the instruction is not unconsitutional.

## THE HEBREW UNIVERSITY PROFESSORS ARRIVE IN U.S. TO AID IN CAMPAIGN FOR \$1,000,000

NEW YORK, Mar. 8. (JTA) -- Drs. Leo A. Mayer and Michael Even-Ari, faculty ambre of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, arrived here today from Falsatine to aid in the current \$1,100,000 campaign now being conducted by the American Friends of the Bebrew University.

Dr. Even-Ari, head of the University's Botany Department, declared that the arise of the Jews in Palestine is "very high." He said that members of the Unimailty's faculty and student body alternate between their work and guard duty on
