CH CRISIS LEADS U.N. PALESTINE COMMISSION HEAD TO SEEK CLARIFICATION OF HIS STATUS

LAKE SUCCESS, Mar. 10. (JTA) -- An attempt to clarify the position of Dr. rel Lisicky, chairman of the U.N. Pelestine Commission, in view of the new politil situation in Czechoslovakia which precipitated a crisis in the Czech delegation re, was made today at a conference between Lisicky and U.N. Secretary-General yye Lie.

Dr. Lisicky, who has been in the Czechoslovak diplomatic service for many are, was-like the other members of the Palestine Commission-appointed by his warment. However, he is paid by the United Nations out of its Palestine fund, us, it is believed that he is legally subject to recall from the Commission by the agus Government. It is felt here however, that Lisicky is anxious to continue the the Commission.

The Palestine Commission today received a memorandum from its Panamanian repsontative Eduardo Morgan, for the immediate formation of Provisional Councils of warment in Palestine. The Commission will debate the plan with a view to inproacting it in the next monthly progress report to the Security Council.

Formal approval of the draft statute for the City of Jerusalem and the apuntment of a governor for the city were deferred by the Trusteeship Council this termoon to its next meeting, which will be in April.

DION TO REJECT GOVT. BILL FOR TERMINATION OF PALESTINE MANDATE DEFEATED IN COMMONS

REMENT REACHED ON JEWISH CABINET; RATIFICATION OF HAGANAH-IRGUN PACT POSTPONED

JERUSALEM, Mar. 10. (JTA) -- Full agreement on the composition of the Provionel Jewish Government was reached here after midnight at a joint meeting of leadof the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Council which lasted several hours.

The agreement provides the formation of a 13-member Cabinst to include four mbers of the Jewish Labor Party (Mapai); two members of the United Labor Party, ich is comprised of Hashomer Hatzair and L'Achdut Avodah; two General Zionists; Mizrachi, one Agudist one Revisionist, one Mizrachi laborite and one repsentative of the Alivah Hadashah.

The meeting did not ratify the pact between the Haganah and the Irgun which s reached by representatives of both groups after prolonged negotiations. The tification was postponed for a day at the request of Isaac Gruenbaum, member of be Jewish Agency executive.

The Hashomer Hatzair and the L'Achdut Avodah today delivered an ultimatum dearing that they will not enter the Jewish Cabinet if the Haganah-Irgun pact is stified. Ratification is, nevertheless, expected within a day or two since the sjority of the Jewish Agency executive and of the Jewish National Council favor mity among the Jewish resistance forces.

An amouncement by the Palestine authorities that postal service will be susended for the Jewish areas in the country because of the "physical impossibility" omintain such a service, was severely criticized today by the Jewish Agency as a milateral and vindictive measure." The Agency will endeavor to establish its own estal service, it was indicated. The Palestine Postmaster General "explained" his mouncement, declaring that "Jews are stealing postal vans," making postal operations ifficult.

Dr. J.L. Magnes, head of the Ihud group which favors Arab-Jewish conciliation, day denied reports from Cairo that representatives of his group have approached be ex-Mufti of Palestine regarding the possibility of a compromise in Palestine.

"I am wholeheartedly for this, but neither I nor any member of the Ihud in erusalem or Cairo negotiated with the Arab executive," Dr. Magnes said. At the heir arms. "Only through a true understanding can we build up the whole Holy and," the declaration said.

The U.N. Palestine Commission's advance party received the press yesterday at the group's two-story headquarters near the King David Hotel here. Pablo Ascarate, end of the advance party, said the group's mission is designed to secure a continuity of services when the Mandate ends. He added that contact between the U.M. party and the Palestine Government and the Jewish Agency had already been made and that the U.S. representatives had begun to study various aspects of the Palestine problem.

CAMAH REPULSES SYRIAN-IRAQI ATTACK ON SEPTLEMENT NEAR JERUSALEM; 3 BRITONS CAPTURED

JERUSALEM, Mar. 10. (JTA) -- A figree battle between Haganah and Syrianact forces using machineguns and mortars and fortified by armored cars developed day four miles north of Jerusalem along the road to Nablus. The Arabs were disresed and three British police deserters who fought on their side from an armored ar were captured.

The battle broke out when the three deserters took up a position near Neve sook and opened fire on the settlement. Several minutes later they were joined by risms in three armored cars and by a large unit of infantry composed of Syrian in Iraci guerrillas. The Hagamah, using hand grenades, drove a wedge between the mored cars and the infantry.

Meanwhile, the settlers notified British Army headquarters in Jerusalem of the tack and a large body of troops was dispatched to the scene. The attackers fled, at the British deserters were apprehended and brought to Jerusalem.

At least four Iraqi raiders were killed and three seriously wounded in another lash in northern Palestine when a Haganah force engaged an Iraqi band preparing to ttack Yechiam. The Iraqi were attacked from three sides and were compelled to reject even after reinforcements were brought in by bus.

Haganah intelligence announced today that British policemen have abandoned ill police stations along the Palestine-Transfordan frontier, virtually exposing be entire area to unrestricted Arab infiltration.

An official British announcement revealed today that more than 300 military and police personnel have deserted the British Army and police force in Palestine wring the past two years, of whom only 77 have been apprehended.

The Palestine Government today issued a communique on its investigation of the aliestine Post bombing. The announcement said that the government failed "to establish the identity of the individuals responsible for the bombing." It added that after the classit examination," the authorities were incapable of supporting the musicion of the Jewish Agency that "British police personnel were concerned in the outrage."

PALESTINE ISSUE DEBATED IN HRITISH PARLIAMENT : MINISPER SATE U. L. CAN ENFORCE PARTITION

LGEDON, Mar. 10. (JTA) -- British Colonial Secretary Arthur Creech-Jones today tall the House of Commons that legally the United Nations had the authority to enforce the Palestine partition decision of the Ceneral Assembly and to send through to Palestine even if a threat to the peace had not been established.

He made this statement in opening the debate in Commons on the second reading of a government bill providing for the termination of the Palestine Mandate on May 15. Richard Butler, chief opposition speaker, announced that the opposition intends to wise for the bill. Sir Richard Acland, one of the 14 Labor members who signed a motion to reject the bill, said his group will vote against it because the bill "undermines the authority of the United Mations." Another Laborite group introduced a motion to reject the bill, on the ground that it fails to provide for the independence of Jewish and Arab states in Palestine.

Earlier today, a private meeting of the Labor Party approved the government's policy in Palestine by a large majority. It was, therefore, expected that the vote against the bill would be small, since the apposition also supports the government on this question. In defending the bill, the Colonial Securitary said that the British people will not tolerate any new commitment in Palestine after our bitter and tragic apprisons.

CISIVE ACTION TO PARTITION PALESTINE IS STILL POSSIBLE, U.N. SECRETARY-GENERAL SAYS

IAKE SUCCESS, Mar. 10. (JTA) -- Decisive action to partition Palestine into erish and Arab states is still possible at this late date, U.N. Secretary-General type Lie told a press conference here today.

Commenting on the legal opinion issued yesterday by his staff as a U.N. workgraper describing the Palestine Commission as having full power to implement artition without the authority of the Security Council, Lie said that this was rimarily a Commission document. He declined to state his own views on the report to the newsmen until he had an opportunity to do so at the Security Council, he said.

The Palestine Commission today began work on a plan for setting up Provisional omcils of Covernment in Palestine. The plan was submitted by Eduardo Morgan, assemanian member of the Commission.

The Commission questioned Sigfried Hoofien, who spoke on behalf of the Jewish gmoy, on matters relating to the Palestine Currency Board and sterling balances. onlies, who is a director of the Anglo-Palestine Bank in Jerusalem, reised the wation of what was to become of Palestine's share of the gold reserves of the terling area after the termination of the Palestine Mandate.

Heofien also said that the \$12,000,000 which is to be made available to the alestine Commission for current expenses on May 15, when the Mandate ends, plus an stimated \$16,000,000 which would come from exports, would not be enough to meet magetary expenses. He therefore suggested that the Commission should negotiate ith the Mandatory Power on defreezing further amounts of sterling.

ATTISH LABORITES AVOID PLACING RESOLUTION ON PALESTINE BEFORE THEIR ANNUAL CONVENTION

LONDON, Mar. 10. (JTA) -- For the first time in the recent history of the ritish Labor Farty not a single local branch of the party has introduced a Palestine resolution for consideration at the party's next annual conference, scheduled to be all at Scarborough beginning May 17, two days after Britain's Palestine Mandate aminates, it was revealed here today with the release of the conference's preliming agong.

Paole-Zion, the Jewish group affiliated with the Labor Party, however, has miroduced a resolution on Palestine which hails the U.N. General Assembly's particular decision and declares that all member states of the U.N. are obligated to commute in its implementation. Britain, which as the Mandatory Power has been aspossible for the administration of the country for nearly three decades and has moved the authority of the U.N. in this question, has an additional responsibility assure that the decision will be upheld. The resolution states.

Among 400 resolutions to be introduced at the conference, at least 12 propose sgillation to outlaw anti-Semitism in Britain. The resolutions, expressing alarm were the increase of "fascist activities in many guises in this country," urge that he knees ceretary be granted the power to disband any group advocating racial and alignous discrimination.

JERUSALEM, Mar. 10. (JTA) -- It was officially reported here today by Pritish utbrittes that Jewish detainess in Kenya will be returned to Palestine not later tan July. The exact date cannot be amnounced until shipping arrangements are made, it was emphasized.

TOP NAZI OFFICIALS FOUND GUILTY BY U.S. COURT IN MASS EXTERMINATION OF JEWS

NURPHERG, Mar. 10. (JTA) -- An American war crimes tribunal today acquitted of viermetz, the only woman among 14 high Nazi officials and former generals

The court brought in verdicts of guilty against eight defendants while five here were found guilty only of membership in the Gestapo, but not of participating the Nazi program of mass-extermination of Jews and other peoples in occupied ritories. The eight were sentenced to prison terms ranging from ten years to life.

MISH CROUPS LAUD U.S. SUPREME COURT DECISION BARRING RELIGION FROM PUBLIC SCHOOLS

NEW YORK, Mar. 10. (JTA) -- Speaking in behalf of all major Jewish communal smizations and for a number of local Jewish Community Councils, the National Community Relations Advisory Council today halled the decision of the U.S. Supreme Court is wesk which declared as unconstitutional the teaching of sectarian religion in bits schools during school hours, or the use of public school buildings for this moses.

The N.C.R.A.C. and the Synagogue Council of America, coordinating bodies spectively for Jowieh secular and religious groups, had argued against the contitutionality of released time practices in a brief which they had filed as "friends the court." In a joint statement issued here they said that the U.S. Supreme wit decision was "so sweeping as to make it appear that released time, in and of self, is inconsistent with the Court's opinion." The statement was signed by Rabbi lime F. Rosenblum, president of the Synagogue Council, and Henry Epstein, chairman the N.C.R.A.C.

"All who cherish the American tradition of separation of church and state must al themselves upheld by the decision of the Supreme Court in the Champaign, Ill., leased time case," the statement said. "In that decision, the Court reiterated a earlier interpretation of the First and Fourteenth Amendments, as applied to the of tax-supported facilities for the furtherance of sectarian religious indoctrition. The First Amendment, it says, has erected a wall between Church and State ich must be kept high and impregnable.

"The Court now has characterized as unconstitutional all arrangements whereby pils compelled by law to go to school for secular education are released in part to their legal duty upon the condition that they attend the religious classes. The cision is so sweeping as to make it appear that released time, in and of itself, inconsistent with the Court's opinion."

The Anti-Defemation League of B'nai B'rith in a similar statement expressed to the that the decision "helps to preserve the intent of the First Amendment and deguards freedom of religion for all Americans," adding that the "integrity of free ligion and free public education has been strengthened."

RAB-JEWISH CONCILIATION NOT POSSIBLE AT PRESENT TIME, GOLDIE MEIRSON SAYS

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10. (JTA) - - Mrs. Goldie Meirson, head of the political spartment of the Jevish Agency in Jerusalem, ended her five-week American tour ere yesterday at a dinner meeting with a group of outstanding Washington newmen in radio correspondents. Before returning to New York the same evening she ungestedly appeared at an overflow meeting on Palestine, addressed by Dr. Stephen S. in which the auspices of the Washington Chapter of the American Jewish Congress, in was given a standing ovation.

She told her dinner audience that attempted conciliation with the Arabs at his time would result only in strengthening their resistance to the U.N. decision martition, since they regard the lack of firm action by the U.N. as encouragement to proceed with violence. "Conciliation is not possible," she said, "so long as any tab is allowed to believe that the U.N. has not made up its mind." She said that if the Mufti were removed from the scene, influential Arabs who are now terrorized by him, would come forward and that a basis of negotiation could be established.

She pointed to non-aggression pacts concluded even now between Jewish and Arab rillages in Palestine as a sign of the friendly relations between the two peoples. In the course of detailed questioning, including the reasons for the British attitue, krs. Meirson pointed out that the British, far from practising the impartiality hich they profess regarding implementation of partition, have helped to arm Arab how guards and replenish the Arab war budget by a long-deferred payment of \$1,200,000 to the Moslem Supreme Council.

The decisive factor, she told her listeners during several hours of discussion, is the spirit of the Jewish community and particularly of the young people. She stressed their determination to fight and their need for arms. Only a token international force is desired, she said, since the Jews wish no one else to do their fighting for them. The distinction between maintenance of peace in Palestine and enforcement of partition, raised by the United States at the Security Council, she termed "a logal outbile."

U.S. CONTRIBUTIONS COVER 60% OF HEBREW UNIVERSITY BUDGET, SIR LEON SIMON REPORTS

NEW YORK, Mar. 10. (JTA) -- More than 60 percent of the funds needed to support the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, whose present enrollment exceeds 1,100 students, comes from the United States, Sir Leon Simon, chairman of the University's executive council, declared today at a reception in his honor at University House, maintained by the American Friends of the Hebrew University. Sir Leon is visiting the United States at this time in commection with the current \$1,100,000 drive of the organization.

"The Hebrew University must rely on the Diaspora, particularly on the American am and women who see in it the expression of their highest hopes not only for the whollising of Palestine, but for conciliation between Arab and Jev," Sir Leon declared. The founding of the Hebrew University 30 years ago may well be the planting of another seed from which it is not too much to expect sustenance and nourishment for the culture of Jews everywhere, not only in these burdened days, but for all time," he stated.

SCHOLARY FORRESPAN, ASTROCKED BY BARTLEY CRUM FOR ROLE IN AMERICA'S PALESTIME POLICY

CLEVELAND, Mar. 10. (JTA) -- A severe attack on Secretary of Defense Jenses Forcestal for his anti-Zionist role in formulating America's present Palestine policy was made here today by Bartley C. Crum at a mass meeting sponsored by the Jesish Commity Council of Cleveland. More than 5,000 persons attended the attacking.
