TH U.S.PALESTINE POLICY ATTACKED IN CONCRESS; RECOGNITION OF JEWISH STATE URGED

WASHINGTON, March 22. (JTA) -- A sharp debate broke out in both houses of cogress today as a number of Sonators and Representatives attacked the American reersal on Palestine partition and espousal of a plan for a U.N. trustceship for the

The high points of the debate came when Rep. Leo Isaacson, American Labor erty of New York, demanded that the United States recognize the de facto Jewish tate in Palestine and Rep. Jacob K. Javits of New York introduced a bill to legalize the shipment of arms and munitions to Palestine despite the State Department embargo. seace on also urged that the Administration return to its former pro-partition stand.

In the Senate Irving M. Ives, Republican of New York, asserted that he knew that "this wobbly, catch-as-catch-can, will-o'-the-wisp policy does not represent the character of the American people." He asked why the United States should decide to abandon the plan for partition on the basis that it is "hazardous and dangerous." The trustoeship plan, he insisted, appears to be "just as hazardous." Sen. Homer Capehart, Republican of Indiana, consurred in Ives' statements.

Rep. Helen Gahagan Douglas, California Democrat, said that the Administration ad been "vacillating and dishenost" in handling the Palestine problem from the day the United Nations voted for partition." Chet Holifield, Republican Congressman from California, called the U.S. reversal "the last and culminating blunder of a weak and confused leadership." Rep. Emanuel Celler, of New York, also blasted the Administra- . tion.

Rep. Vito Marcantonio, American Labor of New York, charged that the State Department's present Palestine policy is an "integral part" of the European Recovery Program. He added that persons who supported E.R.P. and at the same time protested the latest American change regarding Palestine ware "talking out of both sides of their mouths."

Rankin Supports U.S.Reversal on Pelestine; Klein Demands Inquiry

In support of the Administration's trusteeship proposal was Rep. John Rankin of Mississippi, who said that the President "ought to be applauded" by members of both Parties for his latest stand. The U.H. had no more right to set up a Jewish state in Relesting than they would have to set up a "Negro state in Harlem or a Mexican state in Texas," he said. He was joined by Rep. Ed Gossett, of Texas, who said that 90 percent of the Congress would support Truman.

Rep. Lawrence Smith, Wisconsin Republican, said the decision to partition Palestine had been a "tragic mistake" which was now being corrected. Rep. Clare Hoffman of Michigan said the American people are "getting tired of going to war for minority groups."

Rep. Arthur G. Klein, Democrat of New York, announced today that he plans to introduce a bill tomorrow calling for an investigation of the State Lepartment's Offlos of Near Eastern and African Affairs, which handles the Palestine problem.

DEKIOND OF EXPLOSIVES BLASTS ARAS STREET IN HAIFA; AT LEAST 17 KILLED, 50 WOUNDED

JERUSALEM, March 22. (JTA) -- The explosion of a trucklead of dynamite today welled at least eight houses in one block in the Arab section of Eaifa. At least persons are known to be dead and 50 wounded, and the casualty figures are expected so much higher. Buildings were damaged for several blocks in all directions, and werel fires raged in the area tonight.

The blast is believed to be the work of Sternists in retaliation for yestery's bombing of the Solel Boneh building in Haifa. Eye-witnesses said that two a driving a three-ton military type truck abandoned the vehicle in crowded Iraq treet and sped off in a jeep which proceded it into the Arab neighborhood. All tur men involved were dressed in British uniforms.

After the bembing, Arab merters opened fire on the Jowish section, but the only now casualties were a British policeman killed and a second wounded when a shell all into the courtyard of the central police station. Repel Major Attacks on Two Jewish Colonies By 1,700 Arabs

Eaganah forces today drove off an Arab bard of 1,000 men which had entrenched teelf around Hartuv, in the Judaean hills between Jerusalem and Tel Aviv, after an II-night attack. At least 40 Arabs were reported slain.

The British commander of a 700-man Arab band and 20 Arabs were killed in another fierce, night-long battle which took place around the settlement of Nizanim, in the Negev, Ragamah reported this movning. The bend, led by a Briton allegadly of high military rank, approached the colony for an all-out attack, but was spotted in the by Hagamah guards. The raiders attacked the colony in several continuous waves, but fell back and field before the intense Jowish fire.

A large band of Arabs attacked a Jowish convoy near the Arab town of Iehdud, built on the site of the ancient Philistine city, Ashdod, and according to an official communique, 13 Jews were killed and 16 are missing. Haganah headquartors denied the report, declaring instead that Haganah men beat off an Arab attack on the convoy, killing six and wounding three attackers.

Haganah added that later a British police unit attacked the Arab band, killing three of the maraudors and wounding four. Another guerrilla band, rushed in to relieve the first group of attackers, met with heavy Eaganah resistance and was driven of after suffering several casualties.

Jevish convoys travelling from Ataroth to Jorusalem and from Jerusalem to the bad Sea were also attacked, but there were no reports of casualties. Mekor Haim and Rehavia came under Arab aniper attack early this morning. Sporadic flighting in Jerusalem resulted in alight damage to the Belgian Conculate here, but no casualties.

Arab anipers opened fire in the center of Jorusalem, killing one Jew cutside a movie and losing two men whon Heganah mombers returned the fire. Smaller engagements between Heganah and Arab units flared up on the cutskirts of the city, the bigest of which occurred near Neve Jacob, where Jewish armored care blocked the road leading to the settlement to prevent Arab reinforcements from reaching an Arab band stacking the colony. Two Arabs and one Greek were killed by the Jews.

RICAN ZIONISTS MOBILIZE TO FIGHT U.S. GOVERNMENT'S "ACT OF BETRAYAL" ON PALESTINE

HEM YORK, March 22. (JTA) -- The American Zionist Emergency Counci, representall sections of the Zionist movement in the United States, today announced a namarker program of action to fight the Truman Administration's reversal of policy Palestine.

The Jewish War Vetorans, which is cooperating with the Emergency Council, I hold a protest parade and demonstration on Sunday, April 4, while combined the continuous and lay organizations here proclaimed a day of prayer Thursday, all 8, to be observed in approximately 6,000 synagogues throughout the country. A milar program for a day of divine intercession and prayer is being planned by the magogue Council of America and the Rabbinical Assembly of America.

"The U.S. Government's reversal of its position on Palestine is nothing less an an act of betrayal," said the statement issued by the Zioniet Emergency Council. tis a betrayal of all the solemn commitments and pledges of every American admintration since the time of Woodrow Wilson, and more especially, of the repeated emisss and declarations of the Truman Administration. It is also a betrayal of a high objectives to which our Government is committed in world affairs, and underness fa h in the noble utterances of our official spokemon with regard to the ghts or small nations and the sanctity of international covenants. In striking his cruei blow at a small and persecuted people, the Truman Administration has aken the very foundations of the United Nations and has seriously compromised the ture effectiveness of international organization to preserve and maintain world

"The citizens of this country will call the Administration to account for its tion. American public opinion must now demonstrate whether it is willing to have ur foreign policy dictated by oil imperialists and British agents, or whether it isses to maintain the moral integrity and national honor of this country. The citiens will surely make their feelings known to an Administration which employed the babby procedure of going through the rotions of consultation on the implumentation f partition, while vaiting for the opportune time to spring this shocking reversal of tolder."

OWERENCE OF JEWISH FEDERATIONS APPRALS TO TRUMAN TO RECONSIDER TRUSTEESHIP DECISION.

ATLANTA, March 22. (JTA) -- A resolution calling upon President Truman "to econsider and roverse" the United States decision to ask for an international trusteethip for Pelestine was adopted here at the closing session of the 13th annual unference of the Southeastern Region of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfers Funds.

"We are deeply shocked and disappointed that the State Department has seen fit to reverse its policy with regard to Palestine," the resolution declared. "It is the sense of the delegates to this conference that such action will not promote a Paceful solution of the Palestine problem and will likely cause even greater blood-shed,"

Pointing out that the decision on trusteeship was "not consistent with the established policy of the U.S. to serve justice and humanity and protect the downwiden without fear or favor," the resolution requested the President to abide by his earlier stand "supporting and implementing the partition of Palestino."

The resolution came as the climax to a two-day discussion dealing with all assects of Jewish community life and problems concerning the 1948 responsibilities of series Jewry in meeting oversees, national and local needs. Maxx J. Borod, president of the Memphis Federation of Jewish Charities, was elected regional president; as L. Permutt of Birminghem, and Fred Kullman of New Orleans, vice-presidents.

ISH JEWS IN AVSTRIA PISCUSS RETURN TO POLANT AS RESULT OF NEW U.S. STAND ON PALESTINE

Ruranien Jewish refugees are, on the other hand, flatly refusing even to coner the idee of returning to Rumania. They say that the latest information reach: them from home reveals that the economic situation of the Jews in Rumania. is wing worse from day to day. Letters from relatives in Rumania: speak of drawing attention of Jewish leaders abroad to the fact that the situation of the Jews in mnia is "alarming."

Neverthless, informed circles here expect a decrease in the influx of Rumanian is to Austria. They point out that now, when America has changed its stand on Paltime, it would be easier for Jews to find their way to Palestine from Rumania dirtly rather than through the American zones of Austria and Germany.

SCOW SAYS U.S. NEVER INTENDED TO CAPRY OUT THE U.N. DECISION ON PALESTINE PARTITION

LONDON, March 22. (JTA) -- The Moscow radio charged today that "neither Britain r America ever intended that the U.N. partition decision on Palestine should be carted out."

Referring to the new American proposal for international trusteeship, the madcast said: "The decision of the United States Government to withdraw support mm the U.N. partition resolution is the logical culmination of the State Departant's previous policy. To justify this decision, the U.S. representative at the ewrity Council claimed that it was impossible to carry out the program by peaceful was. The real reason is a lack of desire of certain powers to implement this design."

AMADIAN COVERNMENT FAVORS CONCILIATION IN PALESTINE, MINISTER TELLS PARLIAMENT

OTTAWA, March 22. (JTA) -- Louis St. Laurent, Minister for External Affairs, as clarified the Canadian Government's attitude toward the present Palestine situation s one of favoring conciliation. "Even at this late hour conciliation must be tried," s told Parliament, "for surely the realization must be growing upon both communities a Palestine that the present course of violence and inflexible resistance against one mother can only bring chaos and mutual destruction."

Canada's Socialist perty, the Cooperative Commonwealth Federation, has called a Britain to aid the U.N. implement the partition decision in Palestine, in a resolution made public here today. The C.C.F. also wread the Security Council to take speedy and vigorous action to carry out the General Assembly's decision.

REGNIZATION OF JEWISH COMMUNITIES IN RIMANIA EXPECTED UNDER HEW CONSPITUTION

BUHAREST, Merch 22. (JTA) -- A reorganization of the Jewish Councils in Runia will take place as a result of the new constitution, the drafting of which has been completed.

MGARIAN COVERNMENT LIQUIDATES OFFICE FOR TRACING HEIRLESS JEWISH PROPERTY

BUDAPEST, March 22. (JTA) -- The liquidation of the office established by the marken Government for the tracing of heirless Javish property was announced here way. Laszlo Nogoradi, Under-Secretary of State in the rrime Minister's office, was to charge of the liquidation program.

EMAN COVERNMENT IN BAVARIA CHARGED WITH "DISSIPATING" JEWISH PROPERTY

MUNICH, March 22. (JTA) -- The charge that property belonging to Jews and others who were persecuted in Germany during the Razi regime is now being "dissited" by the Bavarian Government was made today by Dr. Philip Auerbach, Commissioner or Racial and Political Persecutees in Bavaria.

In a protest submitted to the Bavarian Minister-President Hans Ehard, Dr. wrech pointed out that the Eugolfischer firm in Schweinfurt will receive 120 schines from the Bavarian Ministry of Economics, which, he said, came from the Dachau Eucontration camp and belong to former camp immates.

DIAN JEMISH CONGRESS DEMANDS PROVINCIAL MINISTER AFOLOGIZE FOR SLANDERING JEMS

MONTREAL, March 22. (JTA) -- The Canadian Jovish Congress has demanded a retion and apology from the Provincial agriculture minister, Laurent Barre, for alicious statement made in the Quebec Legislature against Jews and the Jewish leg! profession in particular.

Speaking on the question of exemptions from military service obtained for mere' sons during the war, Barre claimed that his son had been submitted to the lightly of a medical examination by a Jewish doctor and that as a consequence, that a had been a victim of a permanent illness. "Our children were thrown into the adds of infamous Jewish examiners who regaled themselves with naked Canadian flesh," resaded.

In protest telegrams sent to Premier Maurice Duplessis and the speaker of the gislature, the Canadian Jewish Congress has demanded that Barre be taken to account his anti-Semitic utterances.

DP'S ARRIVE IN U.S. TODAY FROM GERMANY122 SHANGHAI REFUJEES LAND AT SAN FRANCISCO

NEW YORK, March 22. (JTA) -- A total of 174 Jewish displaced persons are scheled to arrive here tomorrow from Germany aboard the S.S. Marine Jumper, it was anpused here today. The Joint Distribution Committee arranged for the transportaion of 102 of the refugees, who will be assisted by the USNA, while 72 of the lews are under the care of HIAS.

A group of 122 Jevish refugees who were stranded in Shanghai for the past ight years is scheduled to arrive temorrow at San Francisco aboard the S.S.General ordon. Their immigration was arranged by the J.D.C. Representatives of the USNA ill meet them and arrange for their resettlement.

W.B. DISTRIBUTING PASSOVER SUPPLIES FOR U.S.JEWISH SERVICEMEN THROUGHOUT THE WORLD

NEW YORK, March 22. (TA) -- Passover supplies for Jews serving in the U.S. and forces in every part of the world are being shipped by the Jewish Welfare beard, it was announced here today. The supplies are earmarked for outposts in the U.S. zones of Germany and Austria, Hawaii, Japan, Korea, Alaska, Iceland, Puerto Rico and the Yirgin Islands.

The J.W.B. has also arranged to hold Passover celebrations in the more than 300 Veterans Administration hospitals and installations in the U.S., with 124 part-time J.W.B. chaplains officiating. To date the J.W.B. as shipped 6,000 packages of ratzohs and 4,000 Hagadahs to the U.S. zones of Germany and Austria.

"CENTLEMAN'S ACREEMENT" CHOSEN BEST PICTURE OF 1947 BY ACADEMY OF MOTION PICTURE ARTS
