### B. DELEGATION AND STATE DEPARTMENT COMPLETE DETAILS OF PALESTINE TRUSTEESHIP PLAN

LAKE SUCCESS, April 4. (JTA) -- The United States delegation at the U.N. anmoced today that it has completed the details of a trusteeship plan for Palestine, th the cooperation of the State Department. The delegation also stated that it ld submit the plan to the special General Assembly session April 16. A U.S. Mesman said the delegation hoped the session would be brief.

Members of the Security Council will meet tomorrow in the offices of the Ameridelegation for informal talks on the U.S. proposals for international trusteep. It is still not known whether the Soviet and Unrainian delegates will attend view of their abstentions during the vote to call a special session to reconsider tition.

Meanwhile, the U.N. Palestine Commission and Britain are reported to have workout plans under which the British Government will permit the Palestine Administran's trading account to be used for the importation of food supplies, particularly at which is critically needed, after May 15. The agreement will also supply Paline with sugar, cereals and some fats and oil until June 30. However, the U.N. still faced with the problem of distributing the supplies after they reach Paline.

The British have thus far arranged for the importation of food supplies for y a short period beyond the termination of the Mandate. Until now, the world d allocation system of the International Emergency Food Council has allocated plies to Palestine under the British Middle East allotment. After June 30 new locations will be made and the U.N. Commission hopes to be able to disentangle estine's quotas from the British Empire at that time.

#### MIST ACTIONS COMMITTEE PARLEY POSTPONED; PALESTINE JEWS ABROAD TO REGISTER FOR SERVICE

JERUSALEM. April 4. (JTA) -- The Zionist Actions Committee's emergency session ich was slated to open in Tel Aviv today was postponed until Tuesday when it is exted that all the members of the body will have reached the city.

The session's agenda includes comprehensive reports on the political situation the United Nations, in the United States and Britain and the military and politipicture in Palestine. The Committee will also consider several major problems ing out of the formation of a Provisional Jewish Government. It will have to make final decision on the participation of the Revisionists and the Agudas Israel in Provisional Cabinet and Government Council. The session is expected to end ter April 16, the date on which the U.N. special session on reconsidering partition 11 pen at Lake Success.

The Jewish National Council today disclosed that it has ordered all Palestinian we of military age who are living abroad to register at local Jevish Agency offices r military service. It was estimated that there are some 6,000 men in this catery, most of whom are in the United States. It is not known when they will be called Palestine to take up arms.

The Jewish Agency met for six hours today, but issued no statement at the conusion of the meeting. It was expected in Jewish circles that the meeting would ply to High Commissioner Sir Alan G. Cunningham who last night appealed to both a Arab and Jewish peoples to declare a truce. Pointing out that the British were t due to remain in the country much longer, Cunningham said that nonetheless he shed to see peace for at least that short time, and offered his services to the vil and military leaders of both sides to negotiate an armistice.

#### Arabs Reject Truce Appeal; Jews Seen Cool to Proposal

While the Agency made no official reply, it is expected that the Jews will not gree to any truce unless the Arabs are prevented from continuing their mobilization mring the armistice period and providing that the existence of a Jewish state is not empromised. The Palestine Arab Righer Committee today announced that a turce is apossible unless the idea of a Jewish state in Palestine is given up, while reports rom Cairo state that Abdul Rahman Azzam Pasha, secretary-general of the Arab League, iso refused the U.N.'s appeal for a truce.

The Haganah was today still holding the Arab village of Castel, astride the el Aviv-Jorusalem main road, west of Jorusalem, which it seized yesterday in an peration aimed at reclaiming control of the highway from the Arabs. Four hundred rabs were said to be counterattacking the Jewish positions in Castel which were also with the loss of two Jowish lives.

Other engagements, aimed at breaking the Arab stranglehold on the road, are aking place in the vicinity of Huida where for four days a large convoy bringing tood supplies from Tel Aviv has been unsuccessfully attempting to break through a score of roadblocks and nine fields manned by some 3.000 Arabs.

The Jewish Agency denied reports that it was offered assistance by the British to bring supplies to Jeruselem, but had refused them in order to establish the Jews' ability to protect their own convoys. An Agency spokesman declared that only after repeated appeals for assistance were disregarded did the Jews throw all their forces into the road battles.

Arab guerrillas completely looted and destroyed instatllations at the Shimshon Company, near Hartuv. The damage is estimated at \$600,000.

# ur. Wisk re-klected erresident of american jewish concress; convention ends today

NEW YORK, April 4. (JTA) -- Dr. Stephen S. Wise was unanimously re-elected president of the American Jewish Congress at the biennial national convention at the Hotel New Yorker here today. Other officers include Rabbi Irving Miller, chairman of the executive committee; Rabbi Joachim Prinz, chairman of administrative committee; and Dr. Alfred Marrow, treasurer.

A special session will be held tomorrow in Washington where "The Palestine Crisis" will be discussed. Adjournment of the convention will follow the discussion. (The resolutions adopted by the Congress delegates were not available at the time the Bulletin went to press.)

Gen. Joseph T. McNerney, former commander of American occupation forces in Germany, told the Congress last night that "the only solution to the displaced persons problem lies in resettlement." Following his address, Gen. McNerney presented A.J.C. citations to Judge Simon H. Rifkind, Rabbi Philip S. Bernstein and Judge Louis E. Levinthal, all former advisers on Jewish affairs to the American Military Government in Germany.

## 0,000 veterans march in j.w.v. parade to protest u.s. Reversal of policy on palestine

NEW YORK, April 4. (JTA) -- More than 50,000 veterans of all faiths today arched in a huge parade to protest the American reversal of policy on Palestine and a demand that the U.N. partition decision be upheld. The demonstration and a rally inch was held at the end of the line of march were sponsored by the Jewish War eterans of the United States.

Veterans from posts in 14 states swang down Fifth Avenue in the early morning cours carrying beamers and placards and shouting slogans pledging support of the new evish state, saluting the Haganah and asseiling 'Arab appeasement' as "un-American." as the marchers, many in uniform and all wearing service caps passed they were heered by some 250,000 spectators. Among the demonstrators were men who had served in both World Wars and the Spanish-American War.

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, chairman of the American section of the Jewish Agency, ho was the chief spaker at the relly, asked President Truman and Secretary of tate George C. Marshall why they took the initiative in calling a special session of the U. N. General Assembly to revoke partition when they insist that they still elieve in it as a solution of the Palestine problem. He also asked them why they ere willing to join an international police force to enforce a trusteeship when they fefused to do the same for partition.

"It is not yet too late for our country to return from a lamentable detour to the highway of a clear purpose and a fine, consistent position at the United Nations," r. Silver insisted. "Our government should re-affirm the position which it wisely took last November in favor of solving the Palestine problem through partition, a cosition which the President of the United States and the Secretary of State endorsed and still endorse,"

Asserting that "Palestine and petroleum will not mix" and the United States is acrificing its honor in Palestine for the oil of Arabia, Sen. Owen Brewster of aine, another speaker, declared that America "stands stultified before world opinion" in seeking to support all at once a truce with the Grand Mufti, a trusteeship for Palestine under "some unknown trustees and supported presumably by American arms" and a artition plan "solemnly adopted after extensive study by more than two-thirds of the inted Nations."

Brig. Gen. Julius Klein said: "We have marched today for something more than ustice to the heroic people of Palestine. We have marched together as living evience that the American people are determined to retain their national honor and integrity." He added that "we ask no new or special privilege for the Jewish people if Palestine. We ask only in a time of international tension and unrest, our country tand fast by its traditional support for the just cause of a people who seek to sewer themselves in a way of life akin to our own."

# Majority of American Fress Scores Administration Switch, Poll Reveals

WASHINGTON, April 4. (JTA) -- The majority of American neverpapers have castigated the U.S. reversal on Palestine "in no uncertain terms," the Twohey Analysis of Tewspaper Opinion revealed over the week-end, according to an announcement by the Zionst Organization of America.

The report points out that the stress in most of the press comments on Palesine is not "on any presured injustice done the Eicnist groups or the Jews in generl, but rather one of dismay at a "hopelessly bungled policy." Most U.S. papers feel that the currently proposed trusteeship arrangement does not contribute in any way to even a temporary solution of the Palestine violence," the survey reports, adding that "the general military importance of the Middle East is brought into question."

## PIUS CONSIDERS PALESTINE ISSUE; RECEIVES JAMES G. MACDONALD AND PRO-ARAB ERITON

ROME, April 4. (JTA) -- Pope Pius XII spent considerable time on the Palese problem this wesk-end. Es discussed the current situation there with Maj. Gen. Edward Spears, former British Minister to the Levant who is known as a pro-Arab temman, and later received Junes G. MacDonald, former member of the Anglo-American uiry Committee on Palestine, who is pro-Zionist.

Earlier, MacDonald addressed an overflow meeting in the ancient synagogue on banks of the Tiber. He warned that Arab and Moelem fanaticism endanger istians in the Middle East. Jews, he said, will be the first victims and Christiwill be the next.

Apologizing for the U.S. reversal on Palestine, MacDonald declared that the rican people are not guilty of the policy shift. He also expressed confidence in eventual establishment of the Jewish state, although he predicted that there are two difficulties aheal.

#### CH RABBINICAL BOARD HAILS GOVERNMENT PLEDGE OF FREEDOM OF WORSHIP FOR ALL FAITHS

PRAGUE, April 4. (JTA) -- The Board of Rabbis of Moravia and Bohemia today iced its approval of last week's pledge by the Czech Central Actions Committee to arantee the right of religious worship for all groups.

The rabbinical body also called on the Czech Jews to support the new regime, aded by Premier Klement Gottwold. It stated that the aims of the new regime are the best interests of the country. It called on all Jews to pray for the success the government which is attempting to establish an order based on social justice in as that advocated by the Jewish religion.

## TCH PROSECUTOR DEMANDS DEATH OF GESTAPO CHIEF CHARGED WITH MURDERING JEWS, PARTISANS

THE HAGUE, April 4. (JTA) -- The death sentence was demanded this week-end "General Hans Albin Rauter, former German head of the Gestape in Holland, during a trial here for the murior of thousands of Dutch Jews and non-Jewish partisan ghters during the Nazi occupation of the country. The president of the court demands the "partial judgment" would be pronounced April 1).

Reuter's defense consisted of refusing to recognize the jurisdiction of the urt while at the same time declaring that he placed himself at the Netherlands vernment's disposal so that his death might wipe out the hate between the Duch and man people. The prosecutor charged him with attempting to make a martyr of himself d insisted on the death sentence as a matter of "justice to those who fell in the target for Dutch independence."

## MACH CABINET DECIDES TO INVESTIGATE SANCTIONING OF ARMS SHIPMENTS TO LEBANON

PARIS, April 4. (JTA) -- The French Cabinet has decided to investigate the is of arms to Lebenon after a stormy debate over the week-end in which several misters charged that Minister of the Armed Forces Pierre Henri Teitgen had authorsed the sale without prior consultation with the Cabinet.

It was pointed out here that the first delivery of the arms to Lebanon is cheduled to take place on May 15, the date of the Palestine Mandate's termination, thile another shipment is scheduled for May 25. Last week the J.T.A. learned that Esbanon had ordered \$20,000,000 worth of mortars, artillery and machineguns from a treach armaments firm.

### I-SEMITISM RELATIVELY UNIMPORTANT PROBLEM IN WETHERLANDS, HIAS OFFICIAL REPORTS

NEW YORK, April 4. (JTA) -- The condition of some 25,000 surviving Dutch s in Holland was described here today by Arthur U.J. Cohen, director of the Hebrew agrant Aid Society office in Rotterdam, who is now in the United States to arrange the settlement in the Netherlands of a number of Jewish youth presently living in camps in Germany.

Cohen, a former partisan leader during the occupation of his country and onesecretary of the Rotterdam Jevish Community, declared that the problem of antiitism is relatively unimportent in Holland despite the existence of some antiish sentiment as a result of the five-year occupation of the land by the Nezis. surviving Jevs are chiefly concentrated in the large cities, he said, adding that re are 10,000 Jevs in Amsterdam alone.

Most of the Jevs would like to remain in Holland, he asserted, but pointed out t some would like to leave because of the litter memories that they have of the ntry during the occupation. Others fear for the safety of Holland if a large-le war should break out in Europe, Cohen said, and they would prefer to leave too. while, he stressed, the government's whilede toward the Jews is "distinctly brable" and every effort is being made to assist in their economic and social shilltation.

#### MF AIDE LEAVES ON SIX-WEEK TOUR TO STUDY CONDITIONS OF JEWISH DP'S IN EUROPE

NEW YORK, April 4. (JTA) -- A first hand study of the problems of Jewish DP's Europe, including adjustment to the "rayidly changing political situation in West-Germany," will be conducted by Herold Chanser, director of the Commoil of Jewish crations and Welfare Funds' Institute on Overseas Studies, who departed this week a six-week tour of Europe, it was revealed today by the CJFWF.

Glasser, former Assistant Director of the U.S. Treasury Department's Office International Finance, will study vocational training programs for Jewish DP's and movements of Jews from one part of Europe to another. He will interview governt and agency officials in European countries in order to compile information for use of American Jewish communities in planning future aid, and will consult with William Haber, advisor on Jewish affairs to the U.S. Military Governor, Gen. itus D. Clay, on all aspects of the DP problem.

## THING INDUSTRY PREPARED TO GIVE 5,000 DP TAILORS JOBS IF U.S. PERMITS ENTRY

NEW YORK, April 4. (JTA) -- The clothing industry is prepared to offer 5,000 tailors jobs in this country if the U.S. Government permits them to enter as imminute, it was revealed over the week-end by Herry A. Cobrin, secretary of the Clothy Manufacturers Association, who said that the Association has that number of affirits guarantseing jobs. A nation-wide survey of the industry discloses that there an acute shortage of skilled tailors which can only be alleviated by immigrants cause few native born magnicans are interested in the field, Cobrin added.

#### MON CATASSO, ONLY JEW TO SERVE AS JUDGE IN EGYPTIAN COURTS, DIES IN CAIRO

CAIRO, April 4. (JTA) -- Simon Carasso, only Jew to have acted as a judge in a Egyptian mative court system, died in Cairo over the week-end. He was active in wish community affairs and was one of the leading members of the Ismailia Synagogue.
