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PALESTINE HIGH COMMISSIONER ISSUES TRUCE CALL IN ACCORDANCE WITH U.N. RESOLUTION

JERUSALEM, April 18. (JTA) -- Acting in accordance with a resolution adopted by the U.N. Security Council in the early hours of Saturday morning urging the Jews and Arabs in Palestine to work out a truce and setting up Britain as the supervisor of the armistice, High Commissioner Sir Alan G. Cunningham today issued a new truce call.

He appealed to "all groups and individuals desirous of peace to use their influence to the utmost to secure acceptance of the resolution's provisions." Previously, the High Commissioner made one or two appeals for peace on his own authority, but made no attempt to support them by concrete action.

SECURITY COUNCIL TRUCE RESOLUTION ADOPTED; JEWS HIT BRITAIN AS SUPERVISOR OF TERMS

LAKE SUCCESS, April 18. (JTA) -- The General Assembly will resume its special session on Palestine tomorrow morning following adoption during the week-end of a Security Council resolution calling on both the Jews and Arabs in Palestine to accept a truce under supervision of the British until May 15.

The Council did not decide, as originally planned, to appoint a U.N. commission to supervise the carrying out of the truce. Moshe Shertok, speaking in behalf of the Jewish Agency, declared that if the British were left in charge of supervising the armistice it would be regarded by the Jews "as if no arrangement whatever had been made to insure the effective implementation and observance of the truce provisions."

The Agency, meanwhile, this week-end revealed charges it had submitted to the U.N. that "murderous attacks by heavily-armed military formations against Jewish villagers and Jewish transport must be placed at the door of the Arab Legion." The statement was contained in a letter to the U.N. Palestine Commission in reply to a British Government declaration that investigations of Legion-Jewish exchanges of fire established that in no instance did the Arabs fire first.

"The gravity of the situation with reference to the Arab Legion will be realized in the light of repeated statements in the Arab press that upon the termination of the British Mandate, the Legion will be available for action against the Jewish Community in Palestine," the Agency statement said. "The matter is greatly aggravated by the fact that, according to authentic information received from Palestine, the British authorities, in the process of evacuation, are turning over to the Arab Legion large quantities of military stores, ammunition and equipment for the latter's own use," the statement emphasized.

The Agency said the British had, within the past few weeks, turned over to the Arab Legion 60 armored cars, 8,000 mortar bombs, 100,000 rounds of ammunition and nearly 1,000,000 gallons of gasoline. "Stocks now held by the Arab Legion are abnormally high and there is also evidence that equipment of the disbanded Transjordan Frontier Force is being transferred to the Legion," the Agency declared.

HAGANAH REPULSES TWO ATTACKS IN JERUSALEM AREA; POALE MIZRACHI SETTLEMENT SAFE

JERUSALEM, April 18. (JTA) -- Jewish forces in the Jerusalem area today repulsed two major Arab attacks and in at least one instance sent the guerrilla forces reeling back.

The major Arab defeat came at the Poale Mizrachi settlement of Neve Yaacob, five miles north of Jerusalem. The raid, led by Emil Ghoury, member of the Palestine Arab Higher Committee, Mufti henchman and newly-appointed military commander of the Jerusalem Arab forces, resulted in a number of casualties for the Arab forces including the death of one Briton and several Arabs who led the attack in a captured Jewish armored car.

The armored car opened the attack on the settlement. With a few well-placed mortar shells the Jews blew up and burned the vehicle, killing four of its crew and wounding the others. Then for several hours the Arabs kept charging the defense perimeter of the colony. Finally, Ghoury ordered the Arabs to retreat from the field.

The second attack took place simultaneously on the approaches to Hadassah Hospital atop Mt. Scopus and the nearby Jewish quarters of Shimon Hazadik and Beth Israel. The Arabs used mortars and machine guns, but failed to penetrate Haganah defenses. Casualty figures for this action are not yet known. Last week the road to the hospital was the scene of a massacre of 64 Jews, mostly medical personnel, by Arabs who ambushed an eleven-car convoy.

(At Lake Success today the Jewish Agency released the text of a cable which was sent to Secretary General Trygve Lie and Karel Lisicky, chairman, of the U.N. Palestine Commission by Chaim Salomon, president of the Jewish Community Council in Jerusalem, charging that British military personnel failed to intervene when Arabs attacked Jewish doctors and nurses in a convoy to the Hadassah Hospital and that the British prevented Haganah forces from coming to their rescue. The protest was coupled with an appeal for action to prevent repetition of British sabotage of Jewish self-defense.)

The latest casualty lists released by the government revealed today that three British soldiers were killed and five wounded yesterday when the Irgun held up a British ammunition train near Hadera. The Irgun claimed that the munitions were destined for the Arabs. Three Jews were reported killed in the battle. Thirty tons of ammunition were carried off by the attackers, estimated to number over 150.

The largest food convoy--300 three and five-ton trucks--to reach Jerusalem from Tel Aviv since the recent Arab attempt to cut the vital supply highway entered this city yesterday. The government information office was evacuated following a telephone warning that the building was about to be blown up. However, no explosives were found.

In Haifa yesterday the Arabs set fire to the Palestine Economic Corporation's building in Haifa by exploding a grenade in front of it. In Safed Arabs attacked and occupied a Jewish technical school.

PROF. EINSTEIN AND RABBI BAER SUPPORT MAGNES STATEMENT ON PALESTINE TRUSTEESHIP

NEW YORK, April 18. (JTA) -- Professor Albert Einstein and Dr. Leo Baer, former Chief Rabbi of Berlin, today appealed to American and Palestinian Jewry not to "permit themselves to be driven into a mood of despair and false heroism which eventually results in suicidal measures" in a letter to the New York Times expressing support of a recent statement by Dr. Judah Magnes and other members of the Ichud group in Palestine. The Magnes statement urged acceptance of a temporary trusteeship for Palestine.

JEWISH REFUGEE CHILDREN BAPTIZED IN BRITAIN. BOARD OF DEPUTIES MEETING HEARS

LONDON, April 18. (JTA) -- Because British Jews did not respond fully to appeals for accepting Jewish refugee children into their homes at least 129 Jewish orphans of some 9,300 who found haven in England since 1933 have been baptized, it is reported here today at a meeting of the Board of Deputies of British Jews.

The children were placed in non-Jewish homes and were baptized by their foster parents. As of July of this year a new legal guardian, a rabbi, will be appointed for the Jewish refugee children.

The Board also adopted a resolution, recommended by the executive committee, denouncing the activities of the Hebrew Legion, a force being organized in Britain and the U.S. to fight for the Jews in Palestine. The resolution condemned these activities of the Legion which "give the false impression that the Jews of this country are anything but loyal citizens."

Another resolution expressed full support of the struggle of Palestine Jewry in behalf of a Jewish state and expressed "amazement" at the American reversal on Palestine partition to international trusteeship. The Palestine Government was urged to withdraw the Arab Legion and the Transjordan Frontier Force from Palestine and to open a port for Jewish immigration.

It was announced that Prof. Selig Brodetsky, president of the Board, has asked Prime Minister Clement R. Attlee to change his decision concerning a number of suggestions Brodetsky recently made toward the end that when the British administration ends in Palestine the Jews will be in a position to defend themselves.

Clergy and teachers of West Hampstead, a section of fashionable Northwest London, today formed a council to combat anti-Semitism and to "foster closer relationship between Jews and Christians." Anthony Greenwood, M.P., addressing the inaugural meeting, said "we have formed this committee to take action because the Mosley Union Movement has appeared in this borough."

JEWISH PARTISAN HEROES KILLED BY NAZIS IN POLAND REBURIED WITH RELIGIOUS SERVICES

WARSAW, April 18. (JTA) -- Eighteen Jews who took part in the Warsaw Ghetto revolt and managed to escape the fate of most of the Ghetto inhabitants by fleeing through underground sewers with the assistance of the Polish resistance movement were buried today in the Jewish cemetery here on the eve of the unveiling of the Ghetto memorial tomorrow, commemorating the fifth anniversary of the revolt.

The 18 Jews fought as partisans after their escape and were later killed by Nazis in a forest near Wyszki. Their bodies were exhumed from a mass grave and buried in the traditional Jewish manner today. Representatives of the Polish rabbinate, the Central Jewish Committee, partisan groups and delegations from foreign countries here to attend the unveiling ceremonies took part in the burial ritual.

Rumanian Jews to Hold Memorial Services in Honor of Ghetto Revolt

BUCHAREST, April 18. (JTA) -- Rumanian Jewry was preparing today to mark the fifth anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto revolt. Special memorial services will be held in synagogues throughout the country, meetings are scheduled in most Jewish centers and all Jewish schools have arranged programs dealing with the event. A delegation of the Jewish Democratic Committee has already left for Warsaw to participate in the unveiling ceremonies there of the Ghetto monument tomorrow.

1,000TH JEWISH REFUGEE ARRIVES TODAY FROM SHANGHAI FOR RESETTLEMENT IN U.S.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 18. (JTA) -- The 1,000th Jewish refugee to arrive from Shanghai in the United States for the resettlement in this country or for transit to Latin America will land tomorrow aboard the S.S. General Meigs, carrying 233 Shanghai Jews, it was reported today by the United Service for New Americans.

(A group of 113 Jewish refugees arrived from Bremerhaven in New York over the week-end. They were met by representatives of the United Service for New Americans. Immigration and travel arrangements were made for the refugees in Europe by the Joint Distribution Committee.)

THREE-POINT PROGRAM FOR CIVIL RIGHTS OUTLINED AT RABBINICAL CONFERENCE

ST. LOUIS, April . (JTA) -- A three-point program for Jewish congregations to participate actively in the movement to implement and extend civil rights was outlined here at the opening session of a two-day meeting of the Commission on Justice and Peace of the Central Conference of American Rabbis by Rabbi Roland B. Gittelsohn, member of the President's Civil Rights Commission.

Speaking at the Commission's Institute on Judaism and Civil Rights, Rabbi Gittelsohn urged that the pulpit relate civil liberties to the basic religious principles and point out violations of them. Secondly, he suggested "the formation in every congregation of an action committee, consisting of laymen who will translate the pulpit exhortations for civil liberties into specific action." Finally, he advocated "the organization of joint inter-faith civil rights committees for synagogues and churches to serve as the voice of prophetic religion, Judaism and Christianity together."

FEDERATION OF JEWISH PHILANTHROPIES STARTS EMPLOYMENT DRIVE FOR PERSONS OVER 45

NEW YORK, April 18. (JTA) -- The Federation of Jewish Philanthropies began its drive here over the week-end to contact 50,000 employers in business, industry and professions in the metropolitan area to find employment for middle aged and older persons.

Representatives of the Federation Employment Service, an affiliate of the F.P., said it would ask local industrialists and business men to study their organizations to determine whether jobs could be made available to persons over 45 years of age. They will urge employers to try and find new positions within their organizations for older persons who cannot work at their original tasks, rather than dismiss them.

WAR IN PALESTINE WOULD MEAN BEGINNING OF END OF UNITED NATIONS, SAYS DR. GOLDMANN

STOCKHOLM, April 18. (JTA) -- War in Palestine would mean the beginning of the end for the United Nations, Dr. Nahum Goldmann, member of the executive committee of the Jewish Agency, told the Swedish press upon his arrival here today.

Dr. Goldmann's visit is made to obtain Swedish good will toward the Jews in Palestine. He said that giving up Jerusalem meant for the Jews what giving up Stockholm would involve for the Swedes. He stressed that an international police force of 2,000 men would be sufficient to keep order in Palestine.

100 PERSONS ATTEND ARGENTINE RALLY TO HONOR MARTYRS OF WARSAW GHETTO UPRISING

BUENOS AIRES, April 18. (JTA) -- Twenty-five thousand persons assembled here on the eve of the fifth anniversary of the Warsaw ghetto uprising to honor the ghetto fighters. The rally was held in the largest outdoor stadium in the city.

The rally sent a message to Warsaw expressing solidarity with the reconstruction of Jewish life in Poland, and voicing the conviction that a Jewish state in Palestine would be created soon. All Jewish shops will close here tomorrow afternoon at the same time the ghetto fighters' memorial will be unveiled in Warsaw.

HUNGARIAN PRESIDENT JOINS JEWISH LEADERS IN OPENING CEREMONIES OF NEW OSE NURSERY

BUDAPEST, April 18. (JTA) -- Hungarian President Tildy Zoltan and numerous other high government officials joined representatives of the Jewish Community Council and the Joint Distribution Committee today in the opening ceremonies of a new OSE-sponsored nursery here for needy Jewish children.

Minister of Social Welfare Olt Karoly, who spoke at the ceremony on behalf of the government, paid high tribute to the activities of the OSE throughout Europe. He said that the Hungarian branch of the health organization, although operating with limited funds, had set up health institutions of which the Hungarian Government, endeavoring to build its social welfare on modern bases, may justly be proud.

PALESTINE JEWRY NEEDS \$30,000,000 MONTHLY FOR DEFENSE. BUILDING, DR. GOLDSTEIN SAYS

NEW YORK, April 18. (JTA) -- Palestine Jewry requires \$30,000,000 monthly for its defense and building activities, Dr. Israel Goldstein, United Palestine Appeal national chairman, just returned from Tel Aviv, disclosed to a U.P.A. executive committee meeting this week-end.

Reporting on conditions in Palestine where he attended emergency sessions of the Zionist Actions Committee, Dr. Goldstein declared: "In the midst of war, Jewish immigrants continue to pour in, and building activity for the first three months of 1948 has exceeded any similar period in previous years. There is no unemployment. The morale of the entire Jewish Community is strong."

The U.P.A. chairman added however, that "there is a desperate need for money," which has caused "the Yishuv itself to launch a \$20,000,000 internal loan."

U.P.A. SPENT \$17,500,000 FOR RELIEF, RECONSTRUCTION OF POLISH JEWRY SINCE END OF WAR

NEW YORK, April 18. (JTA) -- More than \$17,500,000 has been spent by the United Distribution Committee since V-E Day for relief, reconstruction and resettlement of the estimated 100,000 Jewish survivors in Poland, according to a report issued by the United Jewish Appeal, on the eve of the fifth anniversary of the Warsaw ghetto uprising which is being observed tomorrow.

At the beginning of 1947, nearly 65,000 Polish Jews depended upon the Joint Distribution Committee for all types of relief aid. Today, according to J.D.C. leaders, only one-third of the country's Jews, consisting of the sick, invalids, the aged and other persons unable to work, are primarily dependent upon the agency's assistance program. Among them are 16,000 children, many of whom receive care in the 100 J.D.C.-supported homes. J.D.C. also maintains 85 dispensaries, hospitals, maternity centers and sanatoria in Poland.
