SUBMITS TRUSTEESHIP PLAN TODAY TO UNITED NATIONS AS A "WORKING PAPER"

FLUSHING MEADOWS, April 19. (JTA) -- The U.N.General Assembly today referred Palestine question to its Political Committee and then promptly adjourned. The itical Committee will start its meetings tomorrow morning at Lake Success under chairmanship of T.F. Tsiang, of China.

trusteeship agreement to a handful of key delegations which will be presented to Meanwhile, the United States was quietly circulating a 47-article draft of Political Committee tomorrow as a working paper. The draft is a detailed elaboran of the 15-point program for Palestine trusteeship which Senator Warren R. Austin. d of the U.S. delegation, presented informally to members of the Security Council weeks ago. Under this plan. Palestine would be governed by the U.N. Trusteeship moil for a minimum of three years, or until the majority of Arabs and Jews agreed a plebiscite on the form of a new regime.

According to Austin's original proposal, an undesignated number of U.N. ber states would agree to underwrite the peace and stand ready to send troops to Palestine if called upon by the U.N.-appointed governor-general. While this ture of the project is not spelled out, it is assumed that the countries involved the U.S., Britain and France.

U.S. Urges Abolition of Land Purchase Restrictions, Favors Immigration

The U.S. draft agreement would specifically abolish the present restrictions the purchase of land in Palestine. There shall be "no limitation on the sale, chase or use of land," it reads, "which discriminates on the grounds of race, ionality, community or creed."

This feature, designed to appease Jewish demands, is counter-balanced by uses on immigration which are expected to be filled in after consultation and otiation with the Arabs and Jews. The American proposal divides immigration into categories: general and displaced persons. The number of "non-displaced persons" litted to Palestine is to be determined annually by the U.N. governor-general in cordance with Palestine's absorptive capacity.

Other salient recommendations in the U.S. proposal are:

1. The United Nations at large shall be the administering authority, acting rough a governor-general designated by and responsible to the Trusteeship Council. til a bi-cameral legislature (mes into being; 2. The governor-general will be pointed for a three-year term, subject to renewal in the event that the Jews and abs fail to accept an alternative plan for self-government; 3. The "House of presentatives," as it is called in the U.S. draft, would have an Arab majority ace it would be elected by proportional representation. The upper chamber, however, ald consist of 30 members: 15 Jews and 15 Arabs.

Palestine citizenship would be extended to all persons resident in the comon July 1, 1947 "who " re not on that date the nationals of any states outside of leatine" and those who file by Now 1, 1948, a renunciation of their former nationality.

PALESTINE COMMISSION ARANDONS DECISION TO ESTABLISH PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT

LAKE SUCCESS, April 19. (JTA) -- The U.N. Palestine Commission today agreed animously to abandon the establishment of a Jovish Provisional Council of Government provided in the partition decision which is now under reconsideration at the speak esseion of the General Assembly.

This action precludes recognition of any Jewish provisional government that y be established in Palestine after May 15, unless the Assembly fails to agree on usteeship as a substitute for partition.

At the same time, the Palestine Commission conceded that its plan for the reuitment of an interim Jerusalem police force has failed. The Commission's hope of cruiting 250 men to form a nucleus for the special Jerusalem police force out of itish personnel volunteering to remain in Palestine was dashed by a letter from a British delegation revealing that only 50 volunteers remain to choose from cause of the Commission's tardiness in arranging to retain them. These men, the etter said, are chiefly young and inexperienced, none of them officers or inspectors.

Faced with this prospect the Commission promptly cabled Pablo Ascarate, hief of the U.N. advance party in Palestine, to arrange for the retention of as my of the 50 as are suitable for service. The Commission also took exception to be implied accusation that it, rather than the Mandatory, was responsible for this allure. It painted out that its first call for volunteers issued last February was insissed by the British as a declaration of policy rather than a decision. At the ime, it was estimated that 4,000 men could have been retained. Furthermore, the ritish by refusing to permit the Commission entry into Palestine before May 1 had ade negotiation impossible.

The only reassuring note at today's special meeting was the announcement that mergency arrangements for shipping and stockpiling essential food supplies had been concluded between the Jevish Agency, the Arab Chamber of Commerce and Steel Brothers, I London firm of shippers and bankers.

The Commission announced that Stoel Brothers would advance 80 percent of the lunds needed to import 26,000 tens of wheat, 4,200 tens of sugar and 650 tens of seat. This amount, the Commission said, would ensure adequate food stocks until luly 15. The British concern will be responsible for shipping and warehousing these imports in Palestine though the British Government will act as purchasing agent. Distribution will have to be made by Jevish and Arab authorities in Palestine which together are required to advance 20 percent of the total, \$5,200,000.

It was amounced today that the Palestine Covernment has asked the United Lingdom to release this sum out of blocked Palestinian storling belances. The Palestine Administration has already issued import licenses, the Commission was advised, to cover these emergency shipments.

PROVISIONAL JEHISH CABINET INTRODUCES INCOME TAX FLAN TO REPLACE GOVERNMENT LEVY

TEL AVIV, April 19. (JTA) -- Anticipating the establishment of a Jewish Government after the expiration of the Felestine Mandate on May 15, the Provisional Jewish Cabinet last night laurehed a "Jewish State Fund" to collect income taxes from the Jewish community. Employers were asked to deduct withholding taxes from their employees salaries, as soon as the Palestine Government's income tax collection coames.

Meanwhile, the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Council have instructed all Jewish civil service employees to remain at their posts until further notice to prevent any possible damage to public installation or disruption of services after May 15. T.A. NEWS

AB POPULATION OF TIBERIAS EVACUATED BY BRITISH; HAGANAH PROCLAIMS JEWISH REGIME

JERUSALEM, April 19. (JTA) -- The entire Arab population of the mixed town Tiberias, in northern Palestine, was evacuated today under supervision of British cops. The evacuation was completed by early this evening at which time the Jewish arter of the town was placed under curfew.

Immediately after the evacuation began, the local Haganah leader proclaimed e existence of a "Jewish independent regime" in Tiberias. He also announced the tablishment of a special Jewish military police force to keep order in the town and ard all abandoned property, including that owned by the Arabs or the government, well as to protect the hely places of all three religions against damage and tresiss. During the curfew hours tonight an Arab was shot by an unidentified sniper.

The Tiberias Jewish community council issued a statement pointing out that e "Arabs have not been expelled from the town. They were the first to attack and ft when the Jews replied, but they will return one day to their homes as free tizens with full rights.

The Haganah today claimed to have captured an important Arab military leader Jerusalem. The man, Hanna Azouri, was kidnapped by a party of armed Jews tother with Major J. Reeper, an official of the Palestine Supreme Court. Reefer was estioned for three hours and then was released, but Azouri, who is also said to be court official, is still missing.

The Jewish Agency today charged the British with being "practically a third rty" in the war and of aiding the Arab Legion in its anti-Jewish activities. The arge was made by an Agency spokesman commenting on an official government statement ncerning yesterday's fierce battle at Neve Yaacob to the effect that the engagement is provoked by Jews firing on an Arab Legion armored patrol car.

Jewish traffic was rerouted in Jerusalem for several hours this afternoon in der to avoid King George Avenua, one of the main thoroughfares in the city, because e street was under Arab mortar fire. During an exchange of fire between the Arabs d Jevish forces in this area, British troops fired several heavy shells at the wish positions and wounded a number of Haganah men.

The Palestine Covernment has issued an official warning to all British naonals to leave the country before May 15, after which date the government cannot fer them protection. The warning declared that the government would not be liable losses incurred by the abandonment of business and homes by Britons who followed e government's advice.

ONIST LEADERS REPORT PALESTINE JESS WILL FIGHT ATTEMPT TO IMPEDE INDEPENDENCE

NEW YORK, April 19. (JTA) -- The "stupefying insptitude" of the State Departnt in relation to the Palestine situation was denounced here tonight by Mr. Emanuel umann, president of the Zionist Organisation of America, addressing a raily of 000 metropolitan Elonist leaders and key workers. BERS OF POLISH CABINET ATTEND UNVEILING OF WARSAW LEMORIAL TO CHETTO FIGHTERS

WAPSAW, April 19. (JTA) -- Thousands of Poles and Jows today attended ceredes here marking the fifth anniversary of the uprising in the Warsaw ghetto in
ch over 40,000 Jews lost their livos. Among the perticipants in the ceremonies,
ch included the unveiling of a large memorial to the Jewish fighters and martyrs,
e some 3,000 delegates from communities in all parts of Poland, 200 delegates
I Jewish communities outside the country and representatives of the Polish Governt, the army and all political parties.

In the forefront of the ceremonies were survivors of the ghetto battle and ish partisans who fought with the Polish and Soviet armies during the war. Among representatives of the government were Premier Josef Cyrankiewicz, Minister for tice Henryk Swiatkowski and Minister Without Portfolio Wladislaw Baranowski.

Swiatkowski, addressing the meeting, declared: "In the name of the Folish ernment and people I pay tribute to the heroic deeds and battle of the Jews of Warsaw ghetto. Those at the head of the present Polish Government such as Premier ankievicz and Deputy Premier Gomulka themselves participated actively in the fight aid the ghetto insurgents. In the future the Polish Government will give assisted to the fight of the Jewish people for liborty."

Adolph Berman, noted Jewish partisan leader and head of the Jewish Central mittee of Poland, who presided over the Warsev meeting, stated that "the Polish se who fought for the honor of the Jewish nation will, if necessary, voluntarily for their blood as a contribution to the liberty and statehood of Palestine Jewy."

Among the other speakers at the Warsaw ceremony were former partisans Antek kierman and Chaika Grossman who told the story of the weeks-long battle. A speal choir of 250 orphaned Jewish children sang partisan hymns and battle songs. Inlar commemorative meetings were held in many other Polish cities and in Warsaw, oclaw and Krakow the government radio presented special memorial programs.

Cost of Monument Covered Mostly by Jevish Communities Abread

The granite memorial which was unveiled here is 50 feet high and 30 feet wide a features four memorahs, one at each corner. The lights in the memorahs will burn smally. The center piece, cast in broaze by the noted Jewish sculptor Prof. then Rappaport, depicts a group of ghetto fighters on one side, and a party of Jews ing shipped to their deaths by the Nazis, on the other face. The monument, on the ot where the first contingent of some 2,000 Nazi troops entered the ghetto to supress the uprising, cost 100,000,000 zlotys. The Polish Government contributed 0,000,000 zlotys, Polish Jowry 18,000,000 and the rest was raised by contributions from Jews throughout the world.

Simultaneously, a "Museum of Jewish Martyrdom" was opened here today by the evish Historical Institute. Authentic photographs and other graphic evidence porraying the life of the Jews of Poland in the various Hazi ghettoes—including torm of blood-stained Scrolls and prayer shavis, as well as drums, shoes and purses made if parchment ripped from the Torahe—fill the museum.

A picture gallery featuring the paintings of 50 Jewish painters who perished t the hands of the Nazis was also opened today. A library containing the volumes etrieved from 75 famous Jevish libraries destroyed suring the war, as well as other ears literary materials, has also been established.

S. MILITARY AUTHORITIES ORDER REMOVAL OF DISPLACED JEWS FROM CAMP IN AUSTRIA

VIENNA, April 19. (JTA) -- The American military commander in Austria has dered the transfer of some 450 displaced Jews from the New Palestine camp at alzburg to other camps in the U.S. zone, it was revealed here today. The move was dertaken to provide additional quarters for the families of American military personel on duty in Austria who are now living in what the Army terms inadequate earters.

The Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish chaplain attached to the U.S. mmend in Austria and the Jewish Central Committee are cooperating with the Army in a transfer. No objections have been raised by either the DP's or Jewish voluntary blief organizations because there are a sufficient number of vacancies in other amps in the country to provide for the transferred Jewish families.

Special provision will be made for camp inmates who were formerly imprisoned a concentration camps. They will be permitted to choose quarters in the larger DP enters or find houses in the Austrian community.

ORMER MAYOR OF JASSY ARRESTED IN BUCHAREST; WILL STAND TRIAL FOR MASSACRE OF JEWS

EUCHAREST, April 19. (JTA) -- Constantin Ifrim, former mayor of the Rumanian ity of Jassy, has been arrested here and will stand trial among nearly 100 other persons for responsibility in the Jassy massacre of 1941 in which 14,000 Jews were Laughtered. it was resorted today.

Ifrim, who was known to the Jews of Jassy as one of their worst prosecutors, led his home for Bucharest nearly four years ago in an attempt to escape the revenge of the population of the city. It was at Ifrim's orders that the centuries-old Jewsh cemetery of Jassy was descrated and criss-crossed with streets paved with tempstones.

ZECH WHO DENOUNCED JEWISH FRIEND TO MAZIS SENTENCED TO LIFE BY PEOPLES COURT

PRAGUE, April 19. (JTA) -- Jiri Novacek, a Czech who denounced a Jewish riend to the Nazi occupation authorities and caused his deportation and eventual leath in a concentration camp, was today sentenced to life imprisonment by a Peoples fourt here.

The denunciation took place in 1943. A Czech member of the military police attached to the Nazi headquarters, to whom Novacek denounced his friend, Jindrich Roudnicky, testiffed for the prosecution. The only reason Novacek escaped the leath penalty was that several other Jews testified in his behalf, asserting that be had never done anything to injure them although he was in a position to do so during the occupation.

JEWISH CHAPLAIN IN FRENCE ARMY IN GERMANY ELEVATED TO HONORARY RANK OF GENERAL

PARIS, April 19. (JTA) -- The senior Jewish chaplain among the French forces on duty in the French zone of Germany has been elevated to the honorary rank of general, it was amnounced here this week-end. Previously, only the senior Catholic chaplain held a general rank.

A Foreign Office spokesman has denied reports that the government withdrew licenses for the shipment of arms and ammunition by private firms to Lebanon and Syria. The spokesman said that while the situation in Palestine remains "confused" the government would not export arms to those countries, but that this policy would not interfere with contracts between private munitions makers and "e Arab governments.

ISIONIST PARTY EXPELLED FROM RANKS OF ZIONIST CROANIZATION OF TRANSYLVANIA

BUCHAREST, April 19. (JTA) -- The executive of the Zionist Organization of asylvania has expelled the provincial United Zionist-Revisionist Party, it was orted today in dispatches from Timiscara where the body met.

The action, which ratified an earlier decision of a regional Zionist confere, followed charges that the Revisionist group had engaged in "activities contrary the democratic principles of the Zionist Organization."

S IN SO. AFRICA UNEASY OVER CURRENT NATIONAL ELECTIONS. JEWISH EDITOR REPORTS

NEW YORK, April 19. (JTA) -- The violence in Palestine has caused a slight se in anti-Semitism on the part of the British population in South Africa, Leon idberg, editor and publisher of the South African Jevish Times, declared here today on his arrival from Johannesburg to attend the Amorican Newspaper Publishers Association convention which opened today at the Waldorf-Astoria Robel.

Although the Jews in Scuth Africa believe that the United Party, which is aded by Premier Jan Saute, will emerge victorious in the national elections, which e to take place next month, there is great concern among the Jews over the fact at the Nationalist Party, well-known for its anti-Semitic views, is providing strong position to the government party, wr. Feldberg said. He predicted that the South rican delegation at the U.N. General Assembly will continue to support the particining of Palestire into Jewish and Areb states.

South African Jewry is nearly 100 percent actively pro-Zionist, Mr. Feldpresented. Although the Jewish community is comparatively young, interest in Jewsh life is very high, he reported. The 100,000 Jews in the country, half of whom re concentrated in Johannesburg and Capetown, support every possible Jewish underaking.

Religious life at present is weak due to the long-time shortage of religious eaders and instructors, he declared. A Hebrev teachers training school has been escallished in Johannesburg in an attempt to solve this problem. In addition to their oles in the country's business and professional life, many South African Jews are leaders in the country's agricultural life, he disclosed.

RGENTINE JEWISH DELEGATION MET WITH ARCE; HE MADE NO PROMISES ON PALESTINE

EUENOS AIRES, April 19. (JTA) --Dr. Jose Arce, Argentine delegate to the inited Nations who was elected president of the special Pelestine session of the Genral Assembly Friday by a bloc of Latin Amorican and Arab states votes, received a levish delegation here recently in connection with the Pelestine question, it was reported today.

An announcement by the DAIA, central Jewish representative body in Argentina, disclosed that the delegation -- comprising Dr. Moises Coldman, honorary president of DAIA, Samual Rabinovich, president of the Zionist Federation, and Dr. Leon Dujovns -- mot with Arce on the latter's visit here and discussed the Palestine problem with him.

The DAIA announcement said that Arce was "very friendly" to the delegation, but it was learned that he made no promises to the Jews concerning Palestine.
