PERATE BATTLE DEVELOPS FOR OLD CITY OF JERUSALEM; SITUATION CONSIDERED CRITICAL

TEL AVIV, May 18. (JTA) -- The battle for the Old City of Jerusalem, where 500 Jevs are besieged by Arab units, flared up again today with Jevish fighters thimously attacking the Jaffa Gate in a desperate attempt to reach the beleagured es.

The situation was considered critical after the Jewish units were forced to the third under heavy Arab fire this afternoon from the Old City into which they have nestated during the night. Despite severe losses, the Jewish defenders inside the dotty were still holding out late today.

A new truce effort by the Urited Hations Truce Commission, backed by the made of the western powers, ended in a stalemate. Attacks by reinforced Arab dits, supported by artillery fire from the hills outside of the city, are endangeres the Holy Places within the ancient walls of the Old City.

Using heavy artillery, the Arabs also began shelling the Jewish sections of grusslem outside of the Old City. The areas under fire include the Mesh Shearim, with Israel and Rehavia quarters. In the center of the city, Jewish forces now control the German Colony and the Musrara section.

Arabs Intensify Bombing of Tel Aviv; Jews Occupy Acre After Severe Fight

A number of Jewish civilians were killed and many were wounded in three air attacks on Tel Aviv. One of the enemy planes was later shot down near Ness Ziona and its plict was captured by two uniformed Jewish girls, members of the Haganah.

(A Jewish plane was reported shot down by the Syrian air force over the Sea of Galilee, according to a communique issued in Demascus. The communique said that Syrian planes bombed Tiberias and destroyed parts of the Jewish settlement of Remat Laphtalia.)

RECOGNIZED ISRAEL ON BASIS OF PARTITION DECISION, AUSTIN TELLS SECURITY COUNCIL

LAKE SUCCESS, May 18. (JTA) -- In the first outspoken declaration of America's nicial attitude toward the new state of Israel, Sen. Warren R. Austin today relief that U.S. recognition applied to the territory described in the Jewish promation of May 14 was based on the General Assembly's partition resolution of last washer 29.

Austin refused to accept the challenge thrown out by Faris El Khouri of Syria at the United States justify its act of de facto recognition before the Security much!. There was no tribunal anywhere in the world, he said, which could question a swereign right of the United States to recognize Israel or any other state. It was a practical step," he added, "in recognition of the realities of the Pales-restitution."

He attacked the Arab objections to addressing a fact-finding questionnaire to be "Frovisional Government of Israel." He called the objections "spurious" and "of buildity."

"The United States has recognized the Provisional Government of Israel and ben it refers to that government it will call it the Provisional Government of meel," Austin declared. In deference to the "very delicate feelings that seem to mee around this horseehoe," he made it plain that the U.S. delegation would not make substituting the words "Jewigh authorities in Pelestine." This had been sugseted by Council President Alexandre Perodi of France to allay Arna fears that open reference to the Government of Israel would imply recognition by the United Nations.

A decision to address the questionnaire to the "Jewish Authorities in Palesties" was adopted late this evening after a full day of bickering on how the Israel gramment should be addressed. Britain, China and the Arab countries were opposed to the proposed U.S. wording.

Major Aubrey Eban of the Jewish Agency pointed out that if the Council desired actual information it would have to communicate with the Israel Government which is he cally one exercising control in the area. He would not, however, oppose addressangthe questionnaire to the "Jewish authorities in Palestine" so long as the Council materioted that the Government of Israel was the only such authority, he said.

Vassil Tarasenko of the U.S.S.R. said the debate had justified "all our fears." sailed for immediate action to stop the fighting in Palestine. Aimless discussion if the questions and their wording could go on indefinitely while the warfare continued, he stressed. "That was the practice of the League of Nations," Tarasenko kimed, "and also the chief reason for its failure."

TION OF WEIZMANN HALLED BY AMERICAN PRESS AND LEADING JEWISH ORGANIZATIONS

NEW YORK, May 18. (JTA) -- The election of Dr. Chaim Weizmann as President of Provisional Government of Israel was hailed today in leading American newspapers by Jewish leaders and major Jewish communal organizations.

The New York Times commented editorially that his election "comes now as a mal reward for years of faithful and distinguished service." After reviewing Dramann's career in many fields, it added that "he is bound to prove a powerful pilfof state in building the new nation which he helped so much to bring into being."

The Herald Tribune called the selection "a deserved recognition of a lifetime service to the cause which Israel embodies." Pointing out that the civil strife Palestine has become an avowed war, the newspaper ineists that Israel needs more in respect for her President.

"If the war is permitted to continue on its present basis -- that is, without y determination by the United Nations of the merits of the case -- the United States st, in simple fairness, lift the arms embargo to permit Israel to obtain arms," declared. "The embargo, as it now stands, is a negative act which gives positive it to the Arabs, and as such is not even consonant with a neutral attitude on the rt of this country."

Flag of Israel Hoisted Over Waldorf-Astoria, Residence of Dr. Weizmann

The flag of Israel was today flown side-by-side with the American flag at the alder-Astoria Hotel where Dr. Weizmenn is living during his stay in New York. According to protocol the flag of his nation flies over the residence of the chief of state wherever he may be. Dr. Emenuel Noumann today visited President Weizmann at his hotel and extended to him the well wishes of the Zionist Organization of America. A message of felicitations was also sent to Dr. Weizmann by Dr. Israel Goldstein, in healf of the World Confederation of General Zionists.

In a message to Dr. Weizmann, the Jewish Labor Committee hailed his election, stating that "no man living has contributed so much" toward the creation of Israel. We have deep faith that under your leadership the state of Israel will be steered in the direction of building the community to attain economic and political equality for all inhabitants so that peace and justice will prevail for our long suffering people."

Expressing the deep appreciation of all American Jews for President Truman's contribution "to the consummation of the two-thousand-year-old hope of the Jewish people," Louis Lipsky, chairman of the executive committee of the American Jewish Conference, appealed today to the Chief Executive "to check the lewless invasion by meighboring Arab states into the state of Israel." Lipsky urged that the U.S. "support action in the Security Council leading to the indictment of the Arab states as agressors and that the government allow the shipment of arms and munitions to Israel to enable it to defend itself."

Greetings were today sent to the women of Israel and to the new Jewish state by Dr. Gene Weltfish, president of the Congress of American Women, who hailed the constitutional guarantees of equality irrespective of race, religion or sex, salemnicated by Premier David Ben Gurion in his proclamation a few days ago. In another message to Ben Gurion, the Congress pledged "itself to urge Amorica to lift the arms embargo against the Jews and to help them repel foreign invasion."

Mrs. Israel Goldstein, president of Pioneer Women, the women's labor Zionist Organization of America, speaking for its 30,000 members, pledged loyal support to the new Jewish nation, and declared: "We accept the challenge which destiny has decreed to us to be an example to the world of the meaning of justice, brotherhood and understanding."

OFFICIALS WANT REFUGEE IMMIGRANTS TO LAND AT SEAFORT FAR FROM NEW YORK CITY

ATLANTIC CITY, May 18. (JTA) -- A number of U.S. Government officials have tested the desirability of landing refugee immigrants at a seaport far from New City, it was revealed today at the annual convention of the National Conference juvish Social Welfere meeting here.

In disclosing this, Joseph E. Beck, executive director of the United Service New Americans, emphasized that "this means that the immigrants will have to be stributed rapidly throughout the land." He estimated that some 27,000 to 30,000 will enter the United States annually for the next two years if the Fellows Bill passed.

"About 600,000 Jews now in Europe may eventually emigrate to the new Jewish ate of Israel," Dr. Nathan Reich, research consultant of the Joint Distribution emittee, told the meeting.

"The first category of immigrants, in terms of urgency, which will receive appriority in resettlement," Dr. Reich doclared, "comprises the 200,000-odd dislated Jews now in Germany, Italy and Cyprus. The second broad category comprises the promately 800,000 Jews living in the countries stretching from the Baltic to the lack Sea--Poland, Czechoslovakia, Rumania, Rungary, Bulgaria and Yugoslavia.

"In terms of objective conditions, the bulk of the Jews in this area could, it continued aid and over a period of years, become re-ostablished. However, the set experiences of the Jews in this area; the latent, but deep-esated hostility on the part of substantial segments of national populations; the instinctive lack of aith in the future and the almost pathological fear that things that have happened in the past may happen eagin, are factors which combined produce the vide-pyread sairs to leave. Whether this desire to leave will actually harden into determination to leave, depends on the developments both in the Eastern European countries and in the new Jewish state," he said.

The third category includes the Jews of Western Europe, the bulk of whem are of little importance as a source of emigration potential," he said. Expressing the opinion that the establishment of Israel would have no immediate effect on the milef needs of the Jews in Europe, Dr. Reich stated that it might reduce the relief load on the Continent within the next few years. He said that any reduction in the test of assisting the Jews of Europe might be offset by several major factors, including: 1. The need for increased aid to Jews in Moslem countries; 2. The increased set services to Jews remaining in Europe, "who might constitute an older age from mable to care for its ewn needs."

BEDRICAL ASSEMBLY URGES DEVELOPMENT OF "SPIRITUAL ABSORPTIVE CAPACITY" FOR U.S. JEWS

CHICAGO, May 18. (JTA) -- Speakers at today's session of the 48th annual contion of the Rabbinical Assembly of Azerica agreed that one of the "major tasks of samerican rabbinate is to help build a spiritual absorptive capacity in the Jewish runnity so that it may derive the maximum benefit from the religious and cultural finences which will flow from the Jewish state of Israel."

The 250 Conservative rabbis from all parts of the U.S. and Canada attending senesting heard Rabbi Morris Adler, of Detroit, assert that while "the role of the setting heard and central in the economy of Jewish life, we must not fall into secure of placing unreasonable reliance upon it for our cultural and spiritual saltion as a Jewish community."

About 90 rabbis are now enrolled in the Assembly's retirement program, it was eparted, while approximately a score of refugee rabbis have been placed in pulpits moughout the country through the cooperation of the Assembly and the United Service or New Americans.

A call for the organization of a "World Union for Conservative Judaism" was souded here last night by Pabbi Israel M. Goldman, president of the Assembly. Reviewing the activities of two Assembly missions sont to Latin America and Italy last year, as well as the flow of correspondence with Jewish religious leaders in all parts of the world, Dr. Goldman declared:

"The global unity of Jewieh life is recognized by all and the time is now ripe for us to give organizational expression of a world-wide character to our movement. I am confident that when Conservative Judaism, the first Jewish religious movement indemous to the United States, undertakes such a move, the seeds we have planted here in the past 60 years will flourish in other lands as well."

Rabbi Bernard Segal, executive director of the Assembly, presented a report on the organization's achievements of the past year. Fointing out that courts of Jewish law had proviously functioned only in the Greater New York area, Rabbi Segal said that much courts have now been organized in Chicago and in Philadelphia. The courts, he episimed, deal with the interpretation of Jewish religious law and are under the supervision of the Assembly's law commission.
