ISRAELI COMMANDER WARNS JERUSALEM JEWS TO BE PREPARED FOR RESUMPTION OF HOSTILITIES

JERUSALEM, July 30. (JTA) -- Col. Moshe Dayan, recently appointed commander of the Jewish military forces in Jerusalem, in a city-wide broadcast today warned the Jewish population to be on guard against future Arab attacks which might be launched "at any moment."

Pointing proudly to the fact that "our military strength has increased lately," Col. Dayan declared that the troops must be backed by the entire population. "The war has not yet ended and we cannot afford to relax our efforts," he stated, calling on the civilians to continue building defenses and carrying out guard duties.

One of the reasons for the continued tension in this city, beside the almost daily sniper truce violations and the supply situation is the fact that the final demarcation lines between the Israeli and Egyptian forces in the southern outskirts of the city are still not set. This, plus the turning back of two Jewish supply convoys by the Arab Legion yesterday and today, has given the entire population the feeling that the Arabs intend to reopen hostilities.

Meanwhile, the first trial pumpings of water from Ras El Ain, in the Lydda-Tel Aviv district, by way of Latrun to this city have begun. United Nations truce observers, stationed in the no-man's-land around Latrun, permitted Jewish engineers to test the pumping machinery, which they found only slightly damaged although the area had been generously 'booby-trapped' by the Arabs.

Word spread here that baths and clean towels were in prospect. The report, however, was considerably premature. The water that finally began to flow was hoarded into reservoirs against the possibility of another interruption in the supply. Jewish doctors, meanwhile, reported several deaths of small children from "dehydration," the result of almost five hot months without a constant supply of water.

The food situation, however, is somewhat improved. Cigarettes are now obtainable on the free market, but most other commodities remain strictly rationed. The prevailing hardships would have little adverse effect upon the Jews' morale had they not to fear the imminent economic crisis threatened by the fact that most merchants and tradesmen are without goods and capital.

ISRAELI CABINET COMMITTEE ON JERUSALEM NAMED; TEL AVIV LIAISON BODY BEING FORMED

TEL AVIV, July 30. (JTA) -- A five-member Cabinet committee was appointed today to deal with all questions concerning the future status of Jerusalem. The committee members are: Rabbi Judah L. Fishman, Minister of Reparations; Rabbi I.M. Lewin, Social Welfare, Itzhak Gruenbaum, Interior; David Remez, Communications, and Aaron Zilbing, Agriculture.

Various departments within the Provisional Government have been instructed to assign liaison officers who will be attached to the soon-to-be appointed Jerusalem

military governor. Further decisions on Jerusalem are expected to be announced next week. An advisory committee made up of members of the State Council to aid the military governor will also be named shortly.

Israel May Demand Jerusalem for Jewish State, Shertok Indicates

Today's developments followed closely on the heels of Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Shertok's address to the State Council last night in which he indicated strongly that the Jews may demand the inclusion of Jerusalem into the boundaries of the state of Israel before the final peace discussions are concluded.

Rejecting U.N. mediator Count Folke Bernadotte's proposals for demilitarizing Jerusalem, Shertok declared that the General Assembly's partition decision--which included a plan for granting Jerusalem international status--was no longer "morally binding" on Israel. He added that Israel will demand reconsideration of its boundaries in view of the events that have transpired since the November 29 partition decision was reached.

The Israeli Foreign Minister also told the State Council that the Arab states, in the final peace discussions, will be asked to pay reparations for "the immense damage caused to the Jews" and for losses suffered by local Palestinian Arabs. Shertok also reiterated what he told Bernadotte earlier this week--that there can under no circumstances be any limitation placed on the immigration to Israel of Jews of military age during the truce period.

Practically every political party represented in the State Council--with the noticeable exception of the Mapai, Israel's largest party, of which Shertok is a member--urged that Jerusalem be included in the Jewish state. The Council also elected a foreign affairs committee of eight members to aid Shertok in formulating future policy. At the same time, Rabbi Wolf Gold, a member of the Jewish Agency executive, was elected fourth vice-chairman of the Council to represent the Mizrahi and Labor Mizrahi elements.

Premier David Ben Gurion, joining in the general debate following Shertok's address, refused to permit any discussion of the present security situation, declaring that the situation as it stands now is sufficiently "covered." Representatives from parties other than the Mapai--which Ben Gurion heads--criticized his "one-man" handling of the defense problem.

STRICT CHECK OF TRAFFIC IMPOSED BY U.N. ON TEL AVIV PORT; REPORT RENEWED FIGHTING

TEL AVIV, July 30. (JTA) -- United Nations truce control officers today imposed a strict security watch on the port of Tel Aviv. Two American and two French observers took up positions along the port while other U.N. officials undertook a rigid examination of all goods and passenger traffic arriving at the port. Persons of military age were scrutinized with particular care.

The U.N. officials' action in this city's harbor area came at the same time that Arab truce violations were reported in Jerusalem, on the north-eastern front and to an increasing degree in the southern desert. Egyptian attacks on Jewish convoys in the Negev were reported today south of the Majdal Falujja line. Three Egyptian planes operating in the Karatiya sector bombed Jewish positions.

Although Israel's planes did not take to the air to retaliate for the bombings, it was pointed out today by an Israeli spokesman that the Egyptian attacks have been continuing for the past three nights. "It is clear that the Egyptians are making a serious effort to halt our columns," the spokesman said. "They are trying to take

certain heights from which they could harass our convoys. We are retaliating by attacking Egyptian convoys and a considerable amount of artillery fire has already been exchanged. The fighting will go on until the U.N. takes the necessary action," he added.

In the northeastern area of Israel, a new outburst of fighting flared up today when a force of Arab irregulars attacked Jewish positions between Tیره and Ramat Hakovesh, athwart the Tel Aviv-Haifa main highway. Jewish officials described the fighting as a serious truce violation.

Arabs Driven Off With Heavy Casualties on Central Front

Striking in daylight, the large Arab force--which Israeli authorities said was well equipped with arms--made a frontal attack on a Jewish outpost whose small garrison held out until reinforcements were brought up. An Israeli Army spokesman asserted that the attackers were driven off with heavy casualties while the Jews lost one dead and two wounded. After the Arabs removed their dead, U.N. observers arrived on the scene to investigate the incident.

A second attempt by a Jewish supply convoy from Tel Aviv to get through to Jerusalem via the main highway failed again today when Arab Legion armored cars blocked the road at the Latrun junction and the Jews were forced to turn back and later proceeded along the new, wartime-built "Burma Road."

An official announcement disclosed that the national loan drive for \$20,000,-000--which was announced when Israeli was proclaimed--has ended with the goal over-subscribed by \$400,000.

John Sheringham, British "vice-consul" in Arab-held Jerusalem, today asked Israeli Attorney-General Jacob Schapira for permission to visit the four Britons detained by the government on charges of espionage. (The fifth was released in custody of his Jewish father-in-law.) Sheringham was permitted to visit the Britons on condition that he remain in sight--but not hearing--of an Israeli policeman.

BRITAIN TO ASK U.N. TO LUMP ARAB REFUGEES FROM PALESTINE WITH DP JEWS OF EUROPE

LAKE SUCCESS, July 30. (JTA) -- The British delegation to the United Nations today revealed unofficially that it will ask the International Refugee Organization to assume responsibility for an estimated 300,000 Arab refugees from Israeli-occupied territory. The United Kingdom delegation also indicated that it will ask the Security Council to recommend this course of action and that the British will suggest that the problem of some 250,000 Jewish refugees in Europe be handled in the same category.

An Israeli spokesman here, commenting on the refusal yesterday of the Trusteeship Council to act on the draft of a Jerusalem international statute, said that this action would seem to indicate that the U.N. is no longer interested in such an international regime for the city. Pointing out that the Jews originally wanted the city as part of their state, he said that the Jews gave way in deference to the pleas made in the name of Christian sentiment. Since then he said the record of indifference plus the U.N. mediator's suggestion to turn the city over to the Arabs may compel the Jews to reexamine the entire matter.

In a letter to the president of the Security Council, Aubrey Eban, Israeli representative to the U.N., answering points raised by the British delegation in the matter of five Britons arrested in Israel on charges of espionage, stated that the men are being tried under laws promulgated by the British Mandate Administration. Asserting that the Israeli Government does not consider it fitting to comment on the case while it is being considered in the courts, Eban confined his statements to pointing out the legality of the prosecutor's and the court's handling of the case.

AGUDAH LEADER CONFERS WITH BRITISH OFFICIAL ON PALESTINE AND JERUSALEM PROBLEMS

GENEVA, July 30. (JTA) -- H.L. Goodman, political secretary of the Agudas Israel, today conferred with Hector McNeil, British Foreign Under-Secretary, who is attending the meeting of the Human Rights Commission here, on the problem of recognizing Israel and the internationalization of Jerusalem.

Goodman informed McNeil of his organization's interest in seeing Britain extend recognition to the Jewish state and in backing the proposed internationalization of Jerusalem. He also expressed the Agudah's opposition to U.N. mediator Count Folke Bernadotte's proposal that Jerusalem be incorporated within Transjordan.

McNeil indicated that the British did not support this phase of Bernadotte's proposal, but envisaged the possibility of the establishment of a free port at Haifa. He added that the British Government would prefer to see the outcome of Bernadotte's current efforts before reaching a decision on recognition of Israel.

CONTINGENT OF 474 JEWISH REFUGEES, INCLUDING WOMEN AND CHILDREN, LEAVES ITALY FOR ISRAEL

ROME, July 30. (JTA) -- A group of 474 displaced Jews--men, women and children--left for Israel today aboard the S.S. Caserta, it was reported here from Naples. Dr. Leon Bernstein, chairman of the Central Committee of Jewish Refugees of Italy, is also on board. He will attend conferences in Israel during the next few weeks.

PURCHASING MISSION ARRIVES IN CZECHOSLOVAKIA FROM ISRAEL; COMMERCIAL TIES TO BE EXPANDED

PRAGUE, July 30. (JTA) -- A food-purchasing mission arrived here from Israel, headed by David Simy, director of the cooperative Hamashbir. A. Cahane, vice-chairman of the Tel Aviv Chamber of Commerce, accompanied the group and will attempt to expand the commercial ties between Czechoslovakia and Israel. He is scheduled to meet with high Czech officials within a few days.

SWEDISH HEAD OF INTERNATIONAL OLYMPICS COMMITTEE HIT FOR DISQUALIFYING ISRAEL

STOCKHOLM, July 30. (JTA) -- Sigfrid Edstroem, chairman of the International Olympic Committee, was sharply criticized in the Swedish press today for ruling Israel ineligible for participation in the international sports festival. One newspaper, the Expressen, urged that he resign his post immediately, and pointed out that he previously had agreed to the holding of Olympic events in Germany.

BRITISH GOVT. OFFICE INVESTIGATING CHARGE MOSLEY IS SMUGGLING NAZI PAMPHLETS TO GERMANY

LONDON, July 30. (JTA) -- Foreign Office officials said today that they were investigating charges that Sir Oswald Mosley, notorious anti-Semitic leader in Britain, is engaged in a project to smuggle pro-Nazi publications into Germany. Anti-Fascist leaders charged that Mosley's group is financing the printing of these pamphlets in Britain and getting them into Germany illegally.

SOUTH AFRICAN JEWISH LEADER INSPECTS ORT AND OSE INSTALLATIONS IN MOROCCO

PARIS, July 30. (JTA) -- Rabbi M.C. Weiler, a member of the ORT world executive and spiritual leader of the Johannesburg Reform Congregation, returned here today from an extended tour of ORT installations in Morocco. He inspected ORT and OSE installations in Casablanca, Marrakech, Meknes, Fes and Sefrou.

NEW ORGANIZATION TO PROMOTE CIVIL AVIATION IN ISRAEL FORMED; WILL RAISE FUNDS

NEW YORK, July 30. (JTA) -- The American Friends of Aviation in Israel, an organization to raise funds for the establishment of aeronautical schools, workshops, hangars and training fields for the training of aviation personnel in Israel, has been launched in New York, it was announced here today.

The organization, which is endorsed by the Government of Israel, will co-operate with the General Council of Aviation in Israel, a public body in the Jewish state which has the support of all parties and groups in its program of developing civil aviation. Among the members of the executive committee of the new group are Judge Morris Rothenberg, head of the Jewish National Fund, and Benjamin Weinberg, of the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society. Rep. Emanuel Celler is a member of the national board, while Menachom Kellari and Allen Roberts are executive secretary and executive director, respectively.

NATIONAL CITIZENS COUNCIL ON CIVIL RIGHTS FORMED BY GROUP OF RELIGIOUS, CIVIC LEADERS

NEW YORK, July 30. (JTA) -- The formation of a National Citizens Council on Civil Rights to promote the establishment of a permanent governmental commission on civil rights, was announced here yesterday by 48 religious, educational, business and civic leaders.

In a statement released by its temporary chairman, Dean Ernest O. Melby, the Council said that "full civil rights can best be won in each man's backyard" and that the "American heritage of civil rights must be kept before the American people as a non-partisan, non-political issue." Among those comprising the Council are former Governor Herbert H. Lehman, Herbert Bayard Swope, Gerard Swope, Judge Joseph M. Prosser, New York State Attorney General Nathaniel L. Goldstein, Morris L. Ernst, Rabbi William F. Rosenblum, Justice Meir Steinbrink, Albert Lasker and Leo Cherne.

JEWISH EDUCATION BOARD OF CHICAGO LAUNCHES TEACHER CERTIFICATION PROGRAM

CHICAGO, July 30. (JTA) -- A program of teacher certification for Sunday School instructors has been launched by the Board of Jewish Education of Chicago, to take effect during the coming school term, it was announced today by Dr. Samuel M. Blumenfeld, Superintendent of Schools for the Board.

A certificate will be awarded those who have had five years of successful teaching experience, or who hold a diploma of the Sunday School Training Course of the College of Jewish Studies, or its equivalent. Provision is made for temporary certification of those who do not fully meet the requirements of training or experience, and for students who may teach in an apprentice capacity while they are pursuing their studies in a recognized school of Jewish learning.

BARON PIERRE DE GUNZBOURG, VETERAN JEWISH CRT LEADER, DIES IN PARIS AT 76

PARIS, July 30. (JTA) -- Baron Pierre de Gunzbourg, president of the European Friends of CRT and head of the World CRT Reconstruction Fund, died here last night at the age of 76.

Baron Gunzbourg, who was active for many years in various CRT activities, was a member of the board of directors of the American CRT Federation and of the Central Board of the World CRT Union. He fled to the United States during the war when the Nazis overran France. He was a member of a Russian-Jewish baronial family of financiers and philanthropists.
