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IRREL ASKS FOR "EARLIEST POSSIBLE" ANSWER FROM ARAB STATES ON ITS PEACE PROPOSAL

TEL AVIV, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Following up his oral request yesterday to U.N. mediator Count Folke Bernadotte to transmit an Israeli invitation to the Arab governments for a peace conference, Foreign Minister Moshe Shertok today confirmed this request in a lotter to the mediator. Shertok asked in the letter for the earliest mossible reply from the Arab states, to be sent through Bernadotte.

There was great surprise today among the Jevish population at Shertok's suddon peace proposal to the Araba, especially since Invaeli military leaders are inclined to the view that a third round of warfare might prove to be decisively in favor of Israel. In addition the belief had grown here that war was again becoming inevitable.

It is understood that King Abdullah of Transjordan is ready to act on Shertok's peace move by calling a special conference to consider Israel's invitation. It is also learned from U.N. circles here that the King will propose that plenipotentiries from all the belligerent perties meet to discuss armistice torms.

U.N. Circles Optimistic on Outcome of Direct Arab-Jewish Talks

Atdullah's strong card today is the plight of some 250,000 Arab war refugees and the adament stand taken by the Israeli authorities that they are not prepared seen to consider the return of the Palestine Arabs prior to a general peace settlement. It is understood that, for his part, Abdullah will take the position that a settlement of the refugee problem is essential if the Arab states are to be spared a catastrophe this winter.

Because of this situation, United Mations circles here are more optimistic about a constructive outcome to the negotiations between the Arab states and Israel than consideration of the surface facts night otherwise warrant.

(Israel's invitation to the belligorent Arab states for peace talks was praised highly today in the New York press. The New York Times, in a leading editorial, welcomed the invitation, declaring that the move for direct negotiations between Israel and the Arab governments "io in line with the statesmanlike policy pursued by the Israeli Government since its formation." The World-Tolegram commented that "all friends of peace and international order will be encouraged by the statesmanhip of Foreign Minister Shertok of Israel in taking the initiative.")

It was learned here today that the annual meeting of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization, which was scheduled to take place this year in Beirut in October, has been postponed because of the Palestine situation. J.T.A. NEWS

TEL AVIV, Aug. 6. U.N. MEDIATOR DROPS ALL PLANS FOR FUTURE OF JERUSALEM; "TEMSE SITUATION" REPORTED

TEL AVIV, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- All proposals for the future of Jerusalem have ten dropped, a U.N. spokesman said here today. He added that U.N. mediator Count take Bernadotte "never made a proposal for an Arab Jerusalem."

Additional U.N. observers have been speeded to Jerusalem because of the "tense situation" there, the spokesman declared. They will try to establish a no-man's land in the city due to the constant and increasing sniping.

Meanwhile, a complete deadlock seems to have developed over the question of pining water to Jewish Jerusalem from an Arab-controlled station. However, water productly stored in cisterns is still being distributed by tank trucks in the Jewish mass of the city.

Jean Nieuwenhuys, Belgian consul and chairman of the U.N. Truce Commission, left for Arman today in a last attempt to straighten out the problem. When U.N. saidtor Count Folke Bernedotte was here Tuesday he expressed the hope that the Arableton would consent to permit the flow of water from the coastal plain via the Arabmentelled Latrun stretch "if not, further steps would have to be considered," Bernatitte embhasized.

ELESTIE TOPS LIST OF ISSUES IN U.N. SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT TO GENERAL ASSEMBLY

IAKE SUCCESS, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- The subject of Palestine tops the list of maproperty political issues covered in the annual report of U.N. Secretary-General Trygve the to the forthcoming session of the General Assembly, it was learned here today.

The Palestine issue also heads the list of major disputes which have come before the international body during the past year. Since the end of May, Israeli passport officers in many countries have been issuing visas which have been recognized in practice by the governments of the countries of transit. Visas are granted on arrival to persons from countries where there is as yet no Israeli passport officer.

THE HARS APPEAL FOR U.S. BACKING OF \$100,000,000 LOAN TO ISRAEL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Two Senate leaders today appealed to the U.S. Exerment to grant de jure recognition to Israel, back the \$100,000,000 lcan appliation for Israel now with the Export-Import Bank and sponsor membership in the U.N. for the new Jevish state. Senators Claude pepper, a Democrat, and Owen Brewster, a spublican, made the pleas on the Senate floor.

SHATE BODY VOTES AGAINST AMENDING DP ACT; CHANCES FOR LIBERALIZATION VIRTUALLY NIL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- The Senate sub-committee on displaced persons triay voted. 2-2 against amending the Displaced Persons Act which provides for the emission of 205,000 refugees to the United States within two years. The sub-committee the killed all hopes that the bill can be changed at the special session of Congest to eliminate the many discriminatory features which have been criticized by resident Truman and many civic, religious and political organizations.

Son, Kenneth S. Wherry of Nebraska, Republican Party whip, has announced on the floor of the Senate that the Upper House will consider no legislation at this session which is not backed by favorable committee action. The House committee on DP's has revealed that it will take no action on the DP's unless the move is initiated in the Senate.

It appeared virtually certain today that Congress will not pass a supplemental empropriation of \$2,000,000 for administration of the Displaced Persons Act. In a statement concerning the various supplementary appropriations which President Truman said the special session to pass, the chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, Sen. Styles Bridges, said the committee would only consider the fund requests state the House had acted upon them. A House Appropriations Committee adde said no extent had been taken in that committee on the displaced persons appropriation and there were no plans at present to do so.

Although there are now a total of 11,000 Jews still detained on the island, "every Cyprus refugee has been assisted in one form or another through J.D.C. relief and rehabilitation aid in the camps," Mr. Leavitt pointed out. More than one and a half million pounds of foodstuffs, 83,800 pounds of clothing and 66,000 pounds of other supplies have been sent to Cyprus by the agency, it was reported.
