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Canada Calis for direct arab-jewish negotiations; warns israel cannot be destroyed

PARIS. Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Lester B. Pearson, newly-appointed Canadian Minis 4ter for External Affairs and head of the Canadian delegation at the United Nations. today told the Political Committee that a peace settlement in Palestine must be worked out by the Jews and Arabs through negotiations. He also called on the Arabs to admit the futility of trying to destroy Israel by force and urged them to recognize Israel's existence by negotiating with the Jews.

Making its first declaration on Palestine in the Committee, the Soviet Union today proclaimed its firm opposition to any solution in Palestine other than one based on last November's partition decision providing for the establishment of independent Jewish and Arab states. At the same time, it was learned that Australia will tomorrow introduce a resolution proposing that all outstanding questions between Israel and the Arab states be negotiated on the basis of the partition decision.

In line with his point that the final Palestine settlement must be worked out by the people who live in the country, Pearson suggested that the "United Nations can and should" make available its good offices to bring the parties together. He appealed to Israel to limit its demands, declaring that "the Jewish community cannot have it both ways. It cannot have all the territory given it by the November 29 resolution together with all the additional territory which it has been able to take by force of arms."

If the Jewish state moderated its demands, he continued, it would have the right to demand peace and recognition in return. Israel, the Canadian Minister declared, cannot be asked to "enter into negotiations for a settlement unless it is given some right to expect that such a settlement will mean peace for itself in Palestine. Be suggested that the General Assembly act at this session on the following three principles:

- 1. Recognition of the Jewish state. Perhaps it is unnecessary, he said, to defer recognition until the boundaries are finally established. He made it clear that Canada will judge Israel's fitness for U.W. membership on the basis of 12s compliance with the Security Council's truce and armistice resolutions.
- 2. The establishment of a small body of officers to assist the Arabs and the Jose in working out a final settlement based on the partition decision and the Bernadotte nian, while taking into account the de facto situation, in Palestine. He opposed forcing the proposed Bernadotte territorial solution on the Jews and Arabs as wesently embodied in the British resolution.
- 3. Endorsement of last November's resolution for international control of Jerusalem.

In a veiled reference to Britain's obstruction of the partition decision. Pearson said that the U.N. decision of last year has not been implemented, "encouraged or indeed permitted." He warned the Arabs that Israel was a powerful reality.

asserting that the U.N. would be doing the Arabs a disservice "if it encouraged them or permitted them to continue efforts to destroy by arms the Jewish state."

Russia's Semyon Trarapkin took the Security Council to task for failing to do
its duty in the Palestine case; instead of implementing the partition resolution, it
moved under British and American Leadership toward a revision of that decision, he
said. He charged that the late Count Folks Bernsdotte had exceeded his authority in
preparing a final solution and asserted that in doing so the mediator had obeyed the
wishes of the U.S. and British.

Soviet Delegate Assails Proposal to Exchange Negev for Galiles

"Rearaptin warned that if the General Assembly adopted Bernadette's recommendations the very life of the Jevieh state would be imperilled. He assailed the proposal to exchange a tiny area in Galilee for two-thirds of the territory of the Jevish State. The Soviet delegate also charged that the Bernadette proposal was aimed at planting the seeds of discord between the Jews and Arabs.

He denounced the Security Council's reference to Chapter VII of the U.N. Charter (which deals with threats to or breaches of the peace or acts of aggression) after the Jews had gained a military advantage, and blemed the policies of the Anglo-American bloc for causing the partition decision to remain a paper decision and for making a fisso of the mediator's work. The Soviet Union, Tearapkin said, demanded the withdrawal of all foreign troops from the territory of Israel and the Arab part of Falestine. He also said the Security Council should seek measures to prevent the resumption of hostilities.

Oscar Lenge of Poland, too, called on the Assembly to return to the partition decision. The details of territorial arrangements, economic union and cooperation between Inrael and the Arab part of Palestine should be settled by direct negotiations without outside interference, Lange said. He charged Britain and the United States with complicity in the Arab attack on the Jows which, he said, weakened the Arab armides.

Since the war started, he pointed cut, nothing has been heard in the U.N, concerning Egypt's demand for the evacuation of Suez by the British, and Iraq's opposition to its present treaty with Britain. These demands have been forfoited as the price for British support, the Pols declared.

Hamry Cattan, representing the Palestine Arch Higher Committee, again assected the partition decision and called for the oreation of a unitary Arch state in all of Palestine. He charged the Jews with throwing Palestine into chaos, causing Alcodahed, forcing 250,000 Arabs to become rofugees, looking Arab property and not sparing the Holy Places.

Australia Aims to Remove Palestine Issue from Present Assembly Session

A member of the Australian delegation tonight expressed confidence that when the Australian resolution is introduced temorrow it would obtain the support of a majority of the Political Committee. Be said he was convinced that the bulk of the Latin American bloc, at least three British dominions and probably the Slavic bloc would vote for it. Such an array of voting strength behind the Australian resolution would doom the British resolution.

It is reported that Australian Minister for External Affairs Serbert V. Neath has agreed to go along with the other proposals on the internationalization of the whole of Jerusalom rather than leave that an open question to be settled by the Social and Bonomic Council. It is said that the Australian resolution would take the cutter Plantine issue out of the hands of this season of the Assembly providing for a conciliation commission to report back to the next session in the event direct negotiations fall.

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EPPPTIAN ATTACES ON ISRAELI SETTLEMENTS CONTINUE; ISRAELI FORCES REPORT CASUALITIES

TEL AVIV, Nov. 22. (JTA) - Shelling of a police station at the settlement of Imara and various sectors of the Mivtahim settlement, both in the Regev and east of Eafa, continued through last night and this movening, un official Israeli communique stated. A number of Israeli casualties have been inflicted, and the Egyptians still hold the positions they seized in this week-end's trues violations.

A "food" parcel dropped by an Egyptian plane for Arab troops surrounded in the Falsia area was today picked up by Israeli troops when it fell wide of its mark. The sews found that the parcel contained not food for the Egyptian troops, but various allitary supplies including ammunition.

Meanwhile, it was announced that Arab tribal chieftains and sheikhs in the southern desert area and in the eastern portion of the Negov last week contacted Ispeali authorities in Beershoba to ask that their tribes be placed under Israeli prototion. Negotiations continue.

Leonard Bernstein of New York conducted the Israeli Philharmonic Orchestratia a concert at Beersheba yesterday. Hundreds of Israeli soldiers were in the autispace. The United Nations truce observers, who yesterday asked for several tickets to the concert, did not attend.

Contacts with Arab States Could Not Be Considered Peace Telks, Israel Says

Commenting on reports of peace negotiations between Israel and various Asab vates, a Foreign Cffice spokesman coday said: "Whatever contacts with the Arab states have been reported could not be described as peace talks or negotiations. The Israeli superities are as anxious as always to begin peace talks with the Arab states and yould do all in their power to help all the Arab states wishing to begin such negotiations to do so."

The Foreign Office last night announced that Israel will open legations in various European capitals including Budapest, Bucharest and Belgrade. An official of the Foreign Office told the press that negotiations are now in progress for the establishment of civilian air traffic between France and Israel. He revealed that Israeli representatives have participated in 20 international conferences thus far and that the Israeli representative in Britain enjoys the same status as the British representative in Israel.

It was amounced today that the lings Lydda airport will be opened to sivilized mediesday. The fideld was closed by the British in May and subsequently during badly in July when the Israelis captured it, driving out an Arab Legion garrison.

British Ex-Mayor of Jerusalem Demands Israeli Rights to Negev

LONDON, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Robert Graves, former British mayor of Jerusalam, bday defended the Israeli right to the Negav on the grounds that "they already dominate it," and that "they will make something of it." writing in the Daily Mail. Graves adds that "in the hands of the Arabs its possibilities will never be exploited.

The former Jerusalem administrator also sees the value in trading the Negov to Jerusalem, suggesting that if the Jeve get the Negov "it will perhaps be easier to insist on an international Jerusalem big enough to include Bethlethe". He proposes that such a Jerusalem-Bethlehm area could be administered jointly by the Arabs that such a international supervision. Craves insists that "there is no doubt that it could be done if there is a will to do it."

Meanwhile, he suggests that Britain would "lose nothing by granting official respirition to Israel, which as the mediator realized has come to stay,"

RESTRIN THANKS AMERICANS FOR THEIR AID TO ISRAEL; HITS HEITISH POLICY ON NEGEV

MEM YORK, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Cretitude to the deviate and non-Jovien communities of the United States for their movel and material assistance to Israel was expressed here tenight on behalf of the livrell deverment by Eliahn Epstein, special representative of Israel to the United States, at a Red Mogen Dovid dinner at the Valdorf-Astorie, at which Espheri Beyard Suope acted as teastmarker.

More than 1,500 guests attended the gathering at which messages were read from President Truman, President Chaim Weizmann, and Israell Prime Ministor David Ben diminon. The event highlighted the current drive of the Red Mogen Dovid to enroll 250,000 members as a means of providing a ficet of ambulances, medical and first aid supplies for Israel.

Emphasizing that the people of Israel "have great trust in the American people and their devotion to the principles of justice and democracy," Epstein eadd: "ite in Israel are grateful beyond words for the support given to our state by Americans generally and by the Jewish community in particular. Your efforts in the Red Mogen Dovid are an integral part of the kind of constructive assistance which we cherish so describe."

The Israeli envoy bitterly attacked the British Government for its present efforts to deprive Israel of the Negev. "The Labor Government," he said, which under the banner of a socialist program, is nationalizing the production of steel in their country, has, during the war in Palestine, continuously supplied this steel in the forms of rifles, tanks, and planes to their found. Area allies to fight and destroy the only democracy in the Middle East. This same Labor Government is now desperately trying to deprive lareal of its legitizate territory in the Negev, where planeses spirit and enterprise may create a flourishing garden of social and economic progress."

U.S. PROTESTING EGYPT'S SEIZURE OF AMERICAN CARGO ON PRETEXT IT WAS BOUND FOR ISRAEL

WASHINDTON, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- The United States is making a formal protest against the action of the Expytian Government last week in seizing the cargo of the U.S. merchant ship, the Flying Trader, on the pretext that it was bound for Israel, a State Department official said today.

The protest is "presumably" based on the grounds that the United States has never recognized the existence of a state of war between Egypt and Israel. The Egyptians, who seized the cargo over the "energetic" protests of the American Consul in Port Said maintained that the cargo was destined for Israel.

The U.S. Covernment also considered the action of the Egyptian Government to be contrary to international practice and the Susz Canal Convention of 1888 which provides that all vessels shall be permitted free transit at all times through the canal.

A State Department spolement said last west that the 38 tractors saized by the Egyptians were part of an original shipment of 51 tractors that had been shipped from New York bound for Tel Aviv and Haife. Because of "undue delay in discharge at Haife, the spokemen said, only 12 tractors were taken off the ship and the rest were shipped to Bonday where they remained in storage until their New York owner requested their return to New York. The rest of the cargo, 4,000 bars of rice loaded in Sian, was bound for Genca for trans-shipment to "various firms in Switzerland," the spokement cald. The rice was also saized by the Egyptian Governments.

U.S. JEMS EXPECTED TO RAISE MAJOR PORTION OF \$236.496.000 REQUIRED BY U.P.A. AGENCIES

MEM YORK, Nov. 22. (JEA) -- A total of \$236,496,000, the major portion of it to be raised by Jews in this country, is required by United Pelestine Appeal agencies in Israel for a comprehensive program of repatriating and rehabilitating the great number of immigrants entering the Jewish state during the current fiscal year ending October, 1949, Herman L. Weisman, acting national chairman of the U.F.A., announced last night.

Declaring that Israel, in effect, "is confronting American Jewry with its greatest challenge" because of the unprecedented influx of immigrants, Wolsman disclosed that the greatest single item on the budget is the sum of \$99,150,000 covering the total cost of immigration, initial care and housing of refugees. He said the budgetary estimates were calculated on the basis of 120,000 newcomers entering Israel this fiscal wear, which is considered a minimal flaure.

Of the total immigration expenditures, at least \$10,500,000 is earmarked for resons, relief and training of refugees in Europe and this Middle Eastern countries. In accordance with agreements to be worked out under the 1949 United Jovish Appeal, Weisman said the Joint Distribution Committee would probably continue to assume transportation costs as part of its program,

Initial care of newcomers, including temporary maintenance, special assistance and rehabilitation involves an expenditure of \$30,000,000. Construction of blueing for immigrants called for an allocation by U.P.A. agencies in Irreal of \$48,000,000 toward the total cost of upwards of \$70,000,000. Included within the over-all immigration aspect of the U.P.A. agencies are to expend \$10,200,000.

The provisional budget of the Jevich Netional Fund, which covers the land acquisition espect of the U.P.A. program to make possible the repatriation of the homeless immigrants, includes for the current fiscal year the purchase of some 300,000 acres, participation in a colonization program and extensive land improvement. Cost of this program totals \$77,280,000.

Wer-ravaged Jerusalem, Weisman said in the budgetary report, requires extensive repair for the settlement of newcomers, as well as special housing projects
and development of agriculture in the city's hinterland which necessitates an expenditure by U.P.A. agencies of \$15,000,000. At the same time, Weisman disclosed
that \$33,150,000 is allocated for: premotion of trade and industry in sernalem; repairs of war damages throughout Israel, exclusive of Jerusalem; grants for educational and cultural purposes; previous allocations which could not be met out of last
year's budget.

JEJSH AGENCY IS PREPARING TO AID IMMIGRATION OF 200,000 JEWS TO ISRAEL IN 1949

PARIS, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- The Jewish Agency is preparing to aid the immigration of 200,000 Jews to Israel next year, Ellaim Dokkin, head of the Agency's immigration department, declared here today prior to his department for New York and South America in connection with fund drives for Israel. Dr. Dokkin emphasized that \$150,000,000 is urgently needed for immigration and colonization.

JES IN CYPRUS CAMP FILE HABBAS CORPUS WRIT IN SUPREME COURT; HEARING EXPECTED

EXECUTA, Cyrus, Hov. 22. (JTA) -- The 5,163 Jove of military age at present held in the kylotymbou Comp today filed an application for a writ of habess corpus in the name of their camp leader, Mordecai Berling, in the Cyrus Suprame Court. The date of the hearing has not yet been fixed.

RIGHTY JEWISH REFUGEES LEAVE AUSTRIA FOR GERMAN PORT TO SAIL FOR UNITED STATES

SALZBURG, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Eighty Jews were emong the refugees who left Salzburg today for Bremerhaven where they are scheduled to depart for America November 28. This is the second transport of refugees from Austria since implementation of the U.S. Displaced Persons Act.

The only Jewish DP camp in the Eritish zone of Austria was dissolved today. The abtion was taken, it was said, to facilitate the transport of Jewish refugees from the American zone.

NATIONAL WOMEN'S LEAGUE CONVENTION ASES FOR LIBERALIZATION OF DP IMMIGRATION LAW

AFLAFIC CITY, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Criticizing the present law governing admission of displaced persons to the United States as "discriminatory," the convention of the National Aumen's League today adopted a resolution urging the revision of the law so as to permit the entry of 100,000 refugees annually for the next four years, withour reward to reac or nationality.

The resolution suggested that applicants for admission to the United States be carefully screened on the basis of their record during the Mazi occupation. Another resolution called upon national jettlen organizations to take steps toward the formation of "a democratic and unified body representing American joury." Mrs. Barnett E. Ropelman of New York was realected president of the organization.

HIAS REPORTS AIDING 175 DISPLACED JEWS TO REACH UNITED STATES UNDER DP LAW

NEW YORK, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- A total of 175 of the 273 displaced Jews who arrived last Friday in Boston aboard the U.S. Army transport Gen. Omer Bundy from Germany were processed by the HIAS, it was amounced here today by the headquarters of the organization.

ORT ESTABLISHES COMMITTEE IN ISRAEL; WILL OPEN TWENTY TRADE SCHOOLS BEFORE END OF YEAR

PARIS, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- The establishment of an ORT committee in Israel was announced here today by Pr. Aaron Syngalouski, executive chairman of the World Ort Union, who is now on a mission in Israel. The committee represents all sections of the committy and was assured of government support.

Dr. Syngalowii reported that 20 trade schools would be established in Israel by the end of 1945 for new immigrants and workers. The Tel Aviv municipality will provide buildings for schools for treating vatchmakers, dental technicians, makers of precision instruments, automobile mechanics, electrical, radio and telephone engineers, tallors, spinners and weavers. Special workshops will be set up for war invalids. A carpet industry for Journalem, with Tranian instructors, is planned. Dr. Syngalowski said that equipment is being transferred from ORT schools in Europe. The program was outlined at a meeting arranged by the Tel Aviv municipality, at which 300 preminent persons were present.

DELEMITICH OF U.J.A. ORGANIZATIONS ARRIVES IN IBRAEL; STARTS ON COUNTRY-WIDE TOUR

HAIFA, Nov. 22. (JEA) -- The thirty-four member delegation representing the Council of Organizations of the United Jevish Appeal landed at the Haifa airport and was met by a representative of the Esraeli Foreign Office. The delegates sang the Hatikvah and the Star Spangled Banner upon leaving the plane. They will start on a country-wide tour today.
