ERAEL AND EGYPT SIGN CEASE-FIRE AGREEMENT; ARE STALEMATED ON ARMISTICE NEGOTIATIONS

LAKE SUCCESS. Jan. 25. (JTA) -- Acting mediator Ralph J. Bunche notified the inited Nations today that a formal cease-fire agreement was concluded at Rhodes beteen the Egyptian and Israeli delegations before they returned to their respective enitals for government consultations on the stalemated armistice negotiations. (See me 3 for additional information.)

The agreement confirms a previous decision that a general cease-fire should m into effect on all fronts and describes the new accord as "a complete and enduring cease-fire between all elements of our military or para-military forces on land. sea and in the air wherever located."

The agreement laid down the principle that no element of Israel's or Egypt's ground or air forces shall advance beyond the present battle lines and bars naval forces from entering into waters off the coastline now held by the other party. Both sides agreed to facilitate complete supervision of the truce by U.N. observers. The agreement, concluded yesterday, was signed for Israel by Walter Eytan, of the Foreign Ministry, and Col. Yigal Yadin. Army Chief of Operations.

Dr. Bunche admitted that "severe divergencies in viewpoint have been encountered during the past few days." The negotiations are continuing, however, and it is still hoped that agreement can be reached, he reported.

State Dept. Urged to Intervene Against Disruption of Israeli-Egyptian Talks

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25. (JTA) -- Senator Herbert R. O'Connor of Maryland, in a speech to the Senate today urged the State Department to do everything in its power to prevent the intervention of any country in the Palestine peace talks now going on et Rhodes.

"Our country should, at this moment, use every means at its command to contime the world that amicable adjustments of difficulties should be encouraged and at thered," he said. He emphasized that in view of the truce thus far achieved in that area "it would seem a most unfortunate moment for any action which would tend to disrupt the current conference."

TEL AVIV, Jan. 25. (JTA) -- In brilliant sunshine and in a quiet holiday samphere, Jews and Arabs throughout Israel cast their votes today in the first ational election since the establishment of the Jewish state.

Final result of the elections will not be known before the end of the week .

Long queues of voters lined up from the early morning hours before the thoumust of polling stations throughout the country. Order at the polls was maintained in fel Aviv by civilian guards. Neither police nor military units were near the ming stations.

Premier David Ben Gurion and his wife were among the early voters at a statim in northern Tel Aviv. President Dr. Chaim Weizmann, who has been confined to be for a week, voted at Rehovoth. In Arab-populated areas, separate lines were formed in front of the polling states by Arab women. Arrival of Members of U.N. Conciliation Group Overshadowed by Elections

The arrival here last night of members of the United Nations Palestine Confiliation Commission was overshadowed by last-minute election speeches made simultaneously by leading Mapai, Mapam and Mizrachi leaders in halls, movie theatres and ther public places. Jerusalem's Jows turned out to hear late pre-election commending by Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Shertok, Dr. Moshe Sneh, leader of the United Friers Party, and Rabbi Meir Berlin, member of the State Council and top Mizrachi leader.

RITER CABINET POSTPONES RECOGNITION OF ISRAEL; BEVIN WANTS FIVE-NATION ACTION

LONDON, Jan. 25. (JTA) -- Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin succeeded today in promating a special Cabinet meeting to delay Britain's de facto recognition of Israel.

Contending that the Brussels pact nations--France, Britain, The Netherlands, Migim and Luxembourg--should not together, Bevin persuaded the Cabinet to agree to sky further action until after a meeting of the five-nation representatives in Londom Thursday.

It is learned that unless the Parliamentary debate tomorrow forces a change, hitain's recognition of Israel will have political strings attached to it and will smally be carried out with little good grace.

BLY GRAMS DE FACTO RECOGNITION TO ISRAEL; COMMERCIAL TALKS INITIATED IN ROME

RME, Jan. 25. (JTA) -- Italy has granted de facto recognition to the state disrel, a Foreign Ministry spokesman announced today to the press. He added that the mising of the Italian consular representative in Tel Aviv to diplomatic rank was imient. "Commercial negotiations between the two countries are now proceeding in [50,]" he revealed.

SAME APPROVES OPENING OF ISPAELI CONSULATE; JEWISH STATE'S ENVOY TO BE RECEIVED TODAY

ATHEMS, Jan. 25. (JTA) -- The Greek Foreign Ministry has authorized the opening of an Israeli consulate here, it was revealed today by Jevish sources. Israeli interactive to Greece, Ascher Moissis, will be received tomorrow by the Greek Foreign Minister, it was added.

ENALL-BOYPTIAN ARMISTICE NEGOTIATIONS BREAK DOWN; EGYPTIANS REFUSE COMPROMISE

RECORS, Jan. 25. (JTA) -- The direct armistice negotiations being held here between Egypt and Israel have definitely bruken down. The climax of the negotiations are early today when acting U.N. mediator Dr. Ralph J. Bunche faced the Egyptian blegation with a strong request that it either indicate some intention to compromise of gasept responsibility for the breakdown of the talks.

Although it was announced that informal talks may be resumed on Thursday, cession of the negotiations is considered inevitable. The Egyptian delegation is unlimly to deviate from its position, held steadily for seven days, and the possibility of any further Israeli concessions is remote.

TEST 1,500 RELEASED CYPRUS JEWS ARRIVE IN HAIFA; WARSHIPS GIVE THEM ROUSING WELCOME

HAIFA, Jan. 25. (JTA) -- The first transport of 1,469 Jews to leave Cyprus following the decision of the British to release the 11,000 detainees on the Greek island arrived here today aboard the S.S. Galila.

The Israeli warship, Haganah, went out to meet the vessel while she was still meth high seas. When the Galila entered Israeli territorial waters, the Haganah ind three salvos in honor of the new arrivals. Nearly every ship in Haifa harbor as decorated and beflagged for the occasion and most Israeli naval vessels and small ents stemmed out to sea to accompany the Cyprus Jews on the last leg of their journs to Israel.

Bands played on several Israeli ships as the Galila approached the harbor. Exercus non-Israeli freighters joined in the crescende of greeting and sent up deafning hoots of welcome. A Exitish ship in port holeted the Union Jack in honor of the imigrants while the flags of many other nations were also raised, joining with Israel's emblem in bidding the Jews welcome. The only ships which did not participate in the celebration were American and French warships and a Turkish freighter.

Thousands of wildly cheering spectators lined the Haifa docks since early mming. When the ship docked, Immigration Minister Moshe Shapiro, senior Government and Jevish Agency officials and high-ranking Army and Police officers boarded the fallia. An estimated 20,000 Jevs crowded into the port area and saug Hatikvah as the figus Jevs disembarked. Army, Navy and Police units presented arms as the immigrants would past them. Minister Shapiro took the salute of the armed forces.

In a statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, made abcard the Gelila, Shapir declared: "This is a great day for Israel. The day is forgotten when the Yishuv that immigrants wept together when foreign soldiers forced the refugees coming he to go to Cyprus. Kicked out by foreigners, these same refugees are returning thay, velcomed by their own Army, Navy and Air Force, and received by their own goverment, velcoming them back with 'Bracha' and wishing them 'Yishuv Tov' in Israel."

The immigrants constituted a cross-section of the 52,000 Jewish detainess who has passed through the Cyprus detention camps since 1946. Their embarkation was aided by representatives of the Joint Distribution Committee and the Red Mogen Povid.

The grin was purchased with funds collected among Jews throughout Poland and reached the lette tate on the Polish wassel, S.S. Torun.

MIGRATION OF 200,000 JEWS TO ISRAEL IN 1949 WILL COST \$200,000,000, EXPERT SAYS

THE AVIV, Jan. 25. (JTA) -- "The immigration of 200,000 Jews to Israel in 1949 all cost \$200,000,000," David Horowitz, economic advisor to the Israeli Government, nowted here today. At the same time he announced that agricultural and industrial schinery imported from abroad will be duty-free.

The Ministry for Trade and Industry has approved the initiation of 70 new instrial projects to cost \$40,000,000 and to employ 10,000 workers, Dr. Fritz Berntain, Minister for Trade and Industry, announced at a press conference here. Most of the plants will manufacture items which have never been produced in Israel before.

Bernstein also announced that a new industrial center, costing \$60,000,000, will be erected in the Maifa Bay area on some 12,500 acres. The project will be named to Hahm Administration, for the Kishon River which empties into the Mediterranean at Maifa.

NUSTURE POTASH COMPANY DECIDES TO EXPAND OPERATIONS ON DEAD SEA CHEMICAL DEPOSITS

NEW YORK, Jan. 25. (JTA) -- The Palestine Economic Corporation today anomoded that an outstanding American chemical engineering firm had been engaged to as a capital investment blueprint for the expanded operation of the chemical explication of the Dead Sea. The natural resources of the Dead Sea have been estimized at \$2,000,000,000 tons, with potash alone enough to cover the present world resources for 2,000 years.

He spoke at a lunchéon meeting of the New York Chapter of the Mercen Council for Judaism.

"No group among us has been more fervently and sincerely American than citiss of Jevish faith," he said. "They have been foremost in public spirit and civic
swise, in generous support of institutions which promote public welfare. Many of
sta have been elected to public office and no one has questioned the single-mindedss with which they have given themselves to the commonwealth. No one has the
dightest grounds for questioning any division of their allegiance to this nation.
It this new concern on the part of numbers of Jews for a national state startled
their fellow American citizens." He expressed the opinion that "Judaism is a relide and not a nation."

WITE CLESEKING MUST LEAVE UNITED STATES; STATE DEPT. EXPLAINS ISSUING HIM VISA

NEW YORK, Jan. 25. (JTA) -- Walter Gieseking, German concert planist whose manual from the United States was demanded yesterday by the American Jewish Congress with sati-Defamation League on the ground that he was a Nazi collaborator, was shaded to return to Germany by air today after he was detained by agents of the impation and Naturalization Service.

The first in a series of nation-wide concert performances which he was schedulated give at Carnegie Hall yesterday to a sold-out house was canceled at the last wints. Immigration Service officials said they undertook a preliminary investigation into Gleseking's record, despite the fact that he obtained a visa to the U.S. which was approved by the State Department. (A State Department spokesman in Washingta splained today that the Department did not have sufficient evidence to bar is sealed from the U.S. at the time a visa was issued to him.)

THE BUTZLIAH IN CERMANY SHIPS 7,000 RELIGIOUS BOOKS TO ISRAEL FOR USE OF ARMY MEMBERS

MNICH, Jan. 25. (JTA) -- Seven thousand religious books, including 5,000 inles, were shipped today to Israel by the American Vaad Hatzalah Emergency Fund here for the use of Israeli Army members. Printed in Germany under the supervision of the leal Yad Eatzalah committee, the volumes were prepared at the request of Dr. Chaim Libraeli representative here.
