MMAL PERCENTAGE RESULTS OF ISRAELI ELECTIONS ANNOUNCED; MAPAI WINS 44 OF 118 SEATS

TEL AVIV, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- Final percentage results in Israel's first nationdelections were made known here today. They are:

Mapai, 35.82 percent; Mapam, 14.77; Religious Bloc, 12.35; Herith, 11.52; Genml Minists, 5.27; Progressives, 4.14; Sephardim, 3.51; Communists, 3.51; Arab Demomts, 1.72; Sternicts, 1.24.

Approximately 3,500 votes are required for each seat in the Constituent Assembles Some 85 percent of the eligible voters cast their ballots, it was announced.

Magi obtained a total of 152,972 votes; Mapam, 63,107; Religious Bloc, 52,633; Heruth,
My.20; Generel Zionists, 22,524; Progressives, 17,680; Sephardim, 15,017; Communists,
My.99; Mazareth Arab ticket, 7,387; Sternists, 5,299; Yemenites, 4,639. With the exmaxim of WIZO, it is unlikely that any minor candidates have polled sufficient votes
to seat any candidates.

SERIOK RECEIVES OFFICIAL NOTIFICATION OF BRITISH GOVERNMENT'S RECOGNITION OF ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Shertok today recated British Consul-General Cyril Marriot who transmitted to him the contents of httish Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin's announcement in London yesterday that Britain has decided to accord de facto recognition to Israel. Shertok and Marriott conferred for 30 minutes.

Shertck told Marriott that he echoed Bevin's hope that this is the beginning of friendly relations between the two nations and promised to reply in writing to british message of recognition as soon as a report is received from London concerning a meeting yesterday between Bevin and the acting Israeli representative in London, I.J. Linton. The Israeli Foreign Minister said he would await the arrival of layin's suggestions concerning the exchange of diplomatic representatives.

Official messages of recognition of Israel were received during the week-end for Bolland, Australia, New Zealand and the United Kingdom. An official message is meeted from Switzerland today while formal notification is due here very soon from the Sandinavian countries.

Davar, official organ of the Mapai party, said in an editorial today that reempition of Israel by Britain, the British Dominions and the Western European countries means an end of the fight for the existence of Israel. "Israel," the editorial
emtimed, "must, however, continue its fight for its boundaries. The world is comalled to admit that Israel is a political and military fact, which can defend itself.
Israel is assured of its place in the family of nations," the paper added.

Esaretz, leading General Zionist paper, saw in Britain's recognition of Israel brits surrender to the facts of reality," but emphasized that "never was such a sature made with such a lack of good will." The Freedom Party's official publication, Eruth, warned that recognition by Britain means "small changes in details but modanges in the general line of Bevin's Falestine policy."

LRO. MODES RESOLUTION TO REIMBURSE PRIVATE GROUPS FOR TRANSFER OF DP'S TO ISRAEL

CENTUA, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- A resolution empowering the secretary-general of the hometical Refugee Organization to reimburse private organizations for the movement of displaced persons to larned, up to a total of \$4,000,000, was adopted here over the weak-mod by the I.R.O. executive committee. The resolution in effect resolude an eight-month-old ben on financial assistance to refugees seeking to enter lornel.

The final draft of the resolution also provides that in the event any funds reministry the private organizations are reimbursed, further transportation to the wish state can be financed by the I.R.O. subject to consultations with the U.N. Condition Commission for Palestine. The director-general must also seek the executive committee's approval to expend more than \$4,000,000 for the resettlement of refixes in Israel. Officials of Jewish organizations have pointed out that approximately 60,000 eligible displaced persons were transferred to Israel since last May 18, that the I.R.O. prohibition on financial add went into effect.

AMA, OPPOSITION GROUP CRITICIZES LEADERSHIP; DECIDES TO BAISE \$250,000 FUND

NEW YORK, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- A resolution criticizing the present leadership of the Manist Organization of America for "its attack on the Jevish Agency executive" as slopted here today at a conference arranged by the Committee for Progressive Zionin, an opposition group within the Z.O.A. Principal speakers at the meeting were In Stephen S. Wise, Louis Lipsky and Judge Louis E. Levinthal.

The resolution expressed "confidence" in the Jerusalem members of the Agency wantive, who are scheduled to arrive in this country this week and assured the extense members of "our loval support in all their endeavors to achieve effective correction in American Zicnicm." MO POLISH SCCUTS WORK FOR TWO MONTES TO RESTORE DAMAGED JEWISH CEMETERY IN KIELCE

WARSAW, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- A detachment of 500 Polish scouts, working for two mits under orders from Col. S. Vishlitz, governor of the province of Kielce, has empleted the erection of a brick wall around the Jewish cemetery in the town of igles, it was reported here today.

The cemetery was used by the Germans during the war as an execution court and 1946 a mob of Polish programists murdered 42 Kielce Jews. Many tembstones from the metery had been scattered by vandals through the streets of Kielce and the Polish conts supervised the return of these monuments to their proper places in the burial promiss. They also exhaused the bodies of 1,000 non-Jewish Poles who had been killed by the Germans and buried in the Jewish cemetery.

A message of thanks to Col. Vishlitz for his role in restoring the cemetory soforwarded to him by the Congregation of Jewish Communities in Poland. Col. Vishlitudertook the two-month task following a request made by Pinchas Aysenberg, chairenf the Kielce Jewish community.

ALC. SPENT \$2,250,000 IN JANUARY TO MOVE JEWS TO ISRAEL AND U.S., U.J.A. REPORTS

NM YORK, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- The transfer to Israel and the United States durthe 1949 of more then 200,000 Jews from Europe and other areas is running well ahead fishedule, with nearly 22,000 having been brought to the Jewish state during Janzy, it was reported today by the United Jewish Appeal.

The Joint Distribution Committee, a constituent agency of the U.J.A. which wrages the transportation of all Jewish refugees leaving Europe, expended a record \$2,50,000 for emigration purposes during January, and estimates it will require \$2,50,000 for February, the U.J.A. said. The J.D.C. expects to be called upon to \$2,50,000 for Jews Leave the Continent next month.

WHENLAN PRESIDENT ASSURES W.J.C. HE WILL UNGE REPEAL OF RESTRICTIVE LAWS

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.
