IN GIRION REJECTS MARAM CONDITIONS FOR PARTICIPATION IN COALITION COVERNMENT

TEL AVIV, Feb. 6. (JTA) -- "So far our read has been independent of outside influences and will remain so, therefore no conditions or guarantees concerning the forstion of a coalition government are acceptable to the Mapai," Premier David Ben Guron last night declared at a Labor Party conference here. The statement was interpreted as a reply to conditions demanded by the left-wing Mapam for participation is a coalition government.

The Mapam central committee demanded a written guarantee of a minimum foreign and demestic program from a Mapai-led coalition government. The foreign policy demands west 1, Complete political and economic independence of any international the granting of bases in Israel to foreign powers; and 4. Opposition to accepting any ald under the Marshall Flan.

The internal policy demanded by the Mapam was: 1. Exploitation of the county's natural resources; 2. Termination of all foreign monopolistic concessions; 3. Placing the chief taxation burden on property owners; 4. Concentration of foreign trads in the hands of the state; 5. Imposition of price control; 6. Reduction of the prits of manufacturers; and, 7. Guarantee of the right to strike and rejection of all proposals for compulsory labor arbitration.

Ben Gurion also attacked the right-wing Irgun-sponsored Heruth, in his speech to the parley which was called in preparation for the Feb. 15 elections in the Hisbard. He criticized "those who would impose a rule of capital." The Premier also called for the cultivation of large waste areas in Israel and stated that the present guaration is in a position to realize the national dream—the gathering in of the siles and the creation in the Jewish state of conditions for the fulfillment of both lowers and socialism. However, this fulfillment is impossible without the particition of the Jews of the rest of the world, he declared.

Foreign Minister Moshe Shertok, who attacked the Mapam for what he called its starts to split the labor movement, expressed the bollef that the next period in the listory of Israel will be devoted to the pursuit of peace, although he refused to much the possibility of a resumption of fighting. He called for the establishment of pinner reserves among the Jews of U.S., Latin America and other countries.

EMEL COVERNMENT CONFIRMS SALE OF 1,000,000 DUNAMS OF LAND TO JEWISH NATIONAL FUND

TH AVIV, Feb. 6. (JTA) -- Abraham Harzfeld, agricultural expert of the Jevth Mational Fund, disclosed here today that the J.N.F. has received a letter from the Israeli Government, confirming the sale of 1,000,000 dunams (250,000 acres) to the J.M.F.

The enclosed bill-of-sale itemized the inclusion of 600,000 dunams in Galile, parts of the corridor leading to Jerusalem and the area between Beershe'a and dua. The remaining 400,000 dunams are in the Negev. A third of the money to be nested by the government of Israel from the J.N.F. for the land will be spent on the establishment of new settlements.

BRABIL BOYPTIAN DELEGATIONS AT RHODES ARMISTICE PARLEY REPORTEDLY REACH "WORKING BASIS"

LONDON, Feb. 6. (JTA) -- Israeli and Egyptian delegates at the Rhodes armistics negotiations today reached a "vorling basis" for the demarcation of armistice lines in the Negev, Reuters today reported from Rhodes.

The military members of both delegations met today for a second time in two days under the chairmenship of American Brig. Gen. William Riley, U.W. chief of staff in Felestine. This development is accepted in informed circles at Rhodes to mean that the discussions have now entered a technical stage.

Issterday, Routers reported that both Syria and Lebanon had accepted acting U.M. mediator Dr. Ralph J. Bunchs's invitation to join the Rhodes parley, on condition that the Jews evacuate the territory they hold in Lebanon. Today, however, it carried a report from Damascus to the effect that Khaled el Azem, Syrian Premier, had denied that his government had accepted the invitation.

MEMBERS OF UNITED NATIONS PALESTINE CONCILIATION COMMISSION BEGIN INSPECTION TOURS

JENUALEM, Feb. 6. (JTA) -- The three members of the U.M. Palestine Concilliaton Commission today began the practical aspect of their assignment when Mark Ethnidgs, U.S. member went to Tel Aviv, and Claude de Boissanger of France and Emsein Yalchin of Turkey went to Jericho to inspect Arab refugee camps there. A report from Tel Aviv said that Ethnidge had lumbed with American representative Jems G. MacDonald and then returned to Jerusalem.

A report on the Ramallah radio, controlled by Transjordan, stated that the Comission members would shortly embark on a five or six-week tour of Middle East capitals. After that, the broadcester said, they would go to Geneva to write their report to the Security Council.

Yesterday, de Boissanger told newsmen that the Commission must submit its report no later than Septeaber, 1949, but may complete its work earlier. He pointed out that the Commission's terms of reference are so wide that it may actually arrive stany solution, provided it meets with agreement by both the Arabs and the Jews.

He stated that it was his opinion that the problem of Jerusalem would be the cost difficult for the Commission to solve. (Reports published in the New York pressurely stated that the Commission was considering a protest to the Israeli Government sainst the abolition of the military administration in Jerusalem. It was stated that the Commission members felt that the Israeli action represented a step toward the americant of the city, thus threatening the establishment of an international radge in Jorusalem.)

VIST MIDDLE HAST AID PROGRAM BEING CONSIDERED BY CONGRESSMEN; MAY REACH \$1,000,000,000

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6. (JTA) -- Legislation is now being drafted that, if passed, might give up to a billion dollars world of American economic assistance to Israel and the Arab states of the Middle East, it was learned over the week-end.

A group of House members including Rep. Abraham J. Multer, will probably join in spensoring the proposed bill for which Administration support may be sought. The kerican aid proposed in the bill would very likely be earmarked for such development projects an a Tigris-Euphrates Valley Authority and a Jordan River Valley Authority. Other projects in the Negov and the Nile Valley might also be considered under the plan.

Eliahu Epstein, Israeli special representative to the United States, conferred with Secretary of State Dean Achoson this week-and for more than half an hour. The State Department later said that Epstein had come at the request of Secretary Acheson, but would not disclose the nature of the discussion.

The Department had no comment on a report that the United States and Israel kd agreed to exchange embassadors and maintain embassies rather than legations in their respective countries. Authoritative sources have disclosed, however, that the U.S. action last Monday in granting de jure recognition to Israel will mean an extense of ambassadors.

MORMAY GRANTS DE FACTO RECOGNITION TO ISRAEL; INFORMS SHERTOK OF DECISION

CSLO, Feb. 6. (JTA) -- De facto recognition of Israel was announced here over the weekend by the Norwegien Foreign Office. Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Shertok was informed of the decision by a cable from the Norwegian Foreign Office.

The President, members of the delegation said, had informed them that Argentina had decided to recognize Israel.

BITAIN NAMES ALEXANDER KNOW HELM, MINISTER TO HUNGARY, AS ITS REPRESENTATIVE TO THE AVIY

LANDON, Feb. 6. (JTA) -- The British Foreign Office today announced that itemander Knox Helm, Great Britain's Minister to Hungary, has been appointed the United Hingdon's representative to Tel Aviv. Pending the arrival of Helm, Cyrial Maradot, British consul-general in Haifa, will continue to represent Britain in Israel.

THISH DP CAMPS IN EUROPE WILL BE CLASED BY TORE 1950, HARER PREDICTS IN REPORT TO ARMY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6. (JTA) -- Most of the Jewish displaced persons camps in Aurose can be closed by June 30, 1940, barring "unforeseen events" in Israel or elsewars, Dr. William Haber, retiring advisor on Jewish affairs to the United States Army in Garrany, said in a report to Army Secretary Kenneth C. Royall released today. Dr. Ester made the prediction in a final report on his work in Europe from January, 1985 to January, 1949.

Jewish displaced persons have been leaving the U.S. zones of Germany and Austria at the rate of 4,000 to 5,000 a month, Dr. Habor said. With the expected progess in the American displaced persons program, especially if liberalizing amendments to the law are adopted, he said, a substantial number of Jewish IP's will be eligible for similation to the United States. In addition, he said, the Israeli Government has tantative plans to remove all Jewish displaced persons in Germany and Austria who wish to go to Israel by September of this year.

Resettlement is the only real solution to the problem of Jewish displaced persons, Dr. Haber said, reporting that "the past year represents a period that has skwn the greatest advance in the solution of the Jewish displaced persons problem since the end of the war." During that time, he said, approximately 37,500 Jewish P's were resettled from the American zone in Germany and about 9,000 from the U.S. man in Austria. At the end of Last year, he said, approximately 75,000 Jewish displaced persons remained in the U.S. zone of Germany and about 9,700 in the U.S. zone of America.

Dr. Raber preised the role of the Army in the care of the Jewish DP's. U.S. my officials and their staffs, he said, had generally "followed a pattern which has raised the dignity of the people and has given them a feeling of security." Friction which one existed between the Jewish DP's and the Army because of the seemingly static nature of the problem has been eliminated now that the mass novement of the DP's at of the occupation zones appears to be in full swing, he stated. He particularly raised the Army for assisting in the movement of Jewish DP's to Israel and criticized the International Refugee Organization for its failure in this respect.

WarnstAnti-Semitism Still Deeply Rooted in Germany

Dr. Haber warned that "Enti-Semitism is still deeply rooted in Germany. It manifests itself in many ways," he said. "In the desecration of cometeries, in proceeding articles in the press, in publicly holding the Jewish displaced persons excisively responsible for the black market, in occasional blood libel rumors, and in the obvious public antagonism against the Jews with whom the Germans come in contact." German themselves admit that anti-Jewish acts, especially against Jewish DP's, might courf it be occupation authorities loft, he said, and most of the young people of the German Jewish community "have definite intentions of quitting their country."

Dr. Heber declared that he thought it would be "a crucial error" for U.S. sufficities to yield to Germen pressure to bring the Jewish displaced persons under the control fo German police, octensibly for better law enforcement. "Although the levish displaced persons problem is in its liquidation phase," he said, "the time has not yet come when the Jewish displaced persons can be safely transferred to the jurisdiction of the German authorities."

Dr. Heber said that a law providing for the restitution of identifiable property confiscated by the Nazis from racial, religious and political persecutes, was examined in the American zone, but that none existed in the British zone and the one in the French zone was imadequate because it did not make any provision for the transfer of heirland property to a successor organization.

\$1,000,000 RAISED FOR HISTADRUT. AT LAROR PARLEY; 3,000 DELEGATES ATTEND CONFERENCE

NEW YORK, Feb. 6. (JTA) -- One million dollars was raised here for the Histairut today at an emergency conference spontored by the National Committee for Lebor Falestine. The 3,000 delegates from 325 cities in the U.S. and Canada also hedged themselves to raise an additional \$1,500,000 within the next two weeks.

Aubrey S. Eban, Israeli representative to the United Nations, and chief speaker at the parley, revealed that the Jewish state would renew its application for admission to the U.N. in time to have it considered by the General Assembly which meets at Lake Success late in April. He pointed out that the present membership of the Security Council, which must first pass on the application, includes nine states which have recognized Israel.

He stated that in spite of Israel's achievements thus far, many problems have yet to be settled. Theso, he listed as settlement of boundaries, clarification of Israel's relation to the United Nations, peace negotiations, and demobilization of Israel's armed forces.

Berl Locker, chairman of the Jerusalem section of the Jewish Agency, enother speaker at the conference, said that Israel is today the greatest force in the Middle Bast. "Hundreds of thousands of Jews from Europe and the Moslem lands are anxiously waiting their turn to go to Israel, where they are offored a chance to begin life anew without the persecution they have known for so many years," he said. "The workers of Israel are heartened by the immigration, for every Jew who enters Israel strengthens our ranks and fortifies us in our work for the development of Israel."

Gershon Agronsky, special Histadrut envoy to the U.S. and Canada, asserted that despite Britain's recognition of Israel, Persign Minister Ernest Bevin and his "group" will do their utmost to try to restrict Israel by proposing a reduction in Jewish territory to please Bevin's "loyal Arabs and satellites." Charles S. Elmerman, vice-precident of the International Ladies Gamment Verhers Union, who recently returned from a special mission to Israel, hailed the work of the Histadrut.

The conference passed resolutions praising Fresident Truman for granting de pre recognition to the state of Israel, and congratulating Frime Minister David Beg Curion upon the Mapai victory in the recent Israeli elections. United States Seretary of Labor Maurice J. Tobin hailed the work of the Histadrut in a special Essage to the conference.

TEREN UNIVERSITY STUDENTS APPEAL FOR INCREASED AID FROM ISRAELI GOVERNMENT

JERUSALEM, Feb. 6. (JTA) -- Six hundred students of the Hobrew University today appealed to the Israeli Government, the Jevish Agency and Jows throughout the world to increese their efforts in behulf of the University "in view of the new responsibilities of the University which have resulted from the creation of the state of Israel."

The appeal was made at a rally at which Communications Minister David Remez spoke. University students in the armed forces urged that they be released in view of the present need for the training of scientific workers, but emphasized that the ready to fight again if that becomes necessary.

Remez celled for an amalgamation of manual and scientific labor as the basis for the Jewich state. Deniel Auster, Mayor of Jeruselem and Sir Leon Simon, chairman of the executive council of the University, greated the new rector, Dr. Simoha Assaf, a mecher of the Israeli Supreme Court, who outlined the University's plans for oraning a medical school in the Spring and a law school in Autumn.

"Of great importance to the present and future generations of America is the evelopment of a program of civil liberties guaranteeing to all people the heritage of headom which we have received from the founders of this nation," the President said is a letter to the chairman of the conference, E. Raymond Wilson. "A free system can where only when there is freedom of opinion, expression, and conscience," Truman said

WEURC, AT J.D.C. REGIONAL PARLEY, CALLS FOR UNLTY IN AMERICAN JEWISH COMMUNITY

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 6. (JTA) -- The need for unity in American Jewish life to assure success of the 1949 campaign of the United Jewish Appeal was under-wared here today by Edward M.M.
