out, AVIV. Merch 6. (JYA) -- Henry Vigier, personal deputy to acting U.N. medir Ralph J. Bunche, and Gon. William Riley, Dr. Bunche's calef of staff, today con-

wed with Israeli military and Foreign Office representatives on the Rhodes armisto parley with Transjordan and the negotiations with Lebanon.

Following the three-hour conference, the U.N. deputies proceeded to Beirut to ofer with representatives of the Lebanese Government. It is understood that both them will be present at Ras el Makura, Israeli-Lebanese border town, tomorrow when he third joint armistice session is scheduled to be held.

It was understood here that little progress has been made at these talks bearea of Syria's unwillingness to evacuate Mishmar Hayarden. Israel has demanded that obtaon, through whose territory alone the invaders can be supplied, force Syria to athors before it will agree to make any concessions. (A report from Damascus yeswiss stated that Syria had accepted Dr. Bunche's invitation to attend an agmistice erley with Israel at Rhodes.)

Meanwhile, the Rhodes conference was adjourned temporarily this week-end while the respective delegations returned to their capitals for new instructions. Reuven bilosh, civilian head of the Israeli delegation, is expected to return to Rhodes toborrow after conferring with the Foreign Office here.

Transjorden Reported to Have Drafted Seven-Point Program for Negotiations

LOHDON, March 6. (JTM) -- Transjordan has drafted a seven-point program for mediation with Israel, it was reported here today in informed circles. The program, which is said to be opposed in part by Britain, provides:

1. A permanent peace settlement for Jerusalem directly between Transjordan and Israel; 2. Settlement of the Latrum pocket held by Transjordan on the Tel Aviv-Serusalen road; 3. Settlement of the status of the Ruthenberg electric power stations to Transjordan territory; 4. Freedom of movement on the Jerusalem-Jaffa road, with free port facilities for Transjordan in Jaffa. This point also presupposes the return of Lydds and Ramleh to the Arabs; 5. Freedom of access to the Holy Places in the Old City of Jerusalem; 6. Return of Arab refugees to Jerusalem and Israel; and 7. Compenstion for refugees not returning to their homes in Israel.

The main difference between Britain and Transjordan concerns the future of the refugees and Jorusalem. The Transjordenians desire to press only for a token return d refugees to Israel, preferring to settle the rafugees within Abdullah's kingdom, with would swell the country's population and give it some claim on Israel for Arab reparations and compensation.

The British fear that a separate agreement would isolate Transjordan from the other Arabs and destroy the last important point which the Arab states have in common. Over Jerusalem, the divergence is the same. The British fear Transjordan's isolatice, while the Transfordanians prefer to take the Old City, rather than gamble on sitting more by holding out.

MONT BAILS SECURITY COUNCIL FAVORABLE VOTE ON ISRAEL'S U.N. MEMBERSHIP BID

TEL AVIV. March 6. (JTA) -- The decision of the United Nations Security Counn wider to recommend admittance of Israel into the U.N. was acclaimed this weeked by Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Shertok.

The decision, he said, was particularly gratifying because such a large majorty massed it, including the United States, Russia, France, China, two Latin American milics and Morsey and Conada, That Britain could not bring itself to vote but abbeing he said, showed how hard certain prejudices die, but this was something the tate of Israel would have to take in its stride. "It is a fair assumption." Shertok wied. "that the decision of the Security Council assures our admission at the forthwaing session of the U.N. General Assembly."

Although the U.N. Conciliation Commission for Palestine is not in session become its various members are touring different parts of Palestine, its sub-commission on the future of Jerusalem is still meeting here. Yestorday the sub-commission held two meetings. Although it was expected that it would meet with Arab and Jewish represontatives acon, the Israeli Foreign Office has not yet named lisison men to meet with the sub-commission, although Transfordan has.

The exchange of Egyptian and Israeli prisoners of war, which is scheduled to begin tomorrow, is expected to last three or four days, it was learned hore today. The procedure for the exchange was decided upon yesterday at a meeting of the mixed armistice commission at Auja. Meanwhile, several hunared Arab civilians who remained behind in Faluja when the Egyptian /ruy evacuated the town today left for Hebron. They could not leave earlier because Transfordan was late in giving them permission to cross the Arab Legion's lines to the city. This leaves only several hundred Arabs in Faluja who have elected to remain as citizens of Israel.

(Reuters reported today from Aden that the first group of some 860 Yemenite less of military age given permission to emigrate from a refugee camp here to Israel, were today flown to the Jewish state. The report added that the British authorities in Aden have asked Yemon to halt the flow of Yomenite Jewish refugees to Aden from which they hope to reach Israel. They are reported to be arriving in Aden at the rate of 100 a month.)

REPAIN'S ABSTENTION OF ISRAELI MEMBERSHIP WOTE AT U.N. CRITICIZED AT POALE ZION BAFLEY

LONDON, March 6. (JTA) -- The abstantion of Britain on the Security Council wote recommending the admission of Israel into the United Nations was criticized here this week-end at a national conference of the Ponle Zion of Britain by four Jewish Members of Parliament who addressed the conference. The M.P.'s, all of whom touched on one aspect or another of the relations between Britain and Israel, were Sidney Silverman, Ian Mikardo. Barnett Janner and S. Segal.

The conforence sent greetings to President Weizmann, Premier-designate David Ben Gurich and the Knesseth (Constituent Assembly) of Israel. A number of speakers expressed themselves in favor of a merger of the Mapai and Mapan parties in Israel, provided their was no compromise of principle as a result of such a consolidation. It was announced that Morgan Phillips, chairman of the British Labor Party, sent congratulations to the Mapai on its victory in the recent elections.

The allocation of 1,000 Israeli views to be used for Jowish emigration from Britain in the next few months was announced today by Itahak Werfel, head of the Jewish Agency immigration department, in an address before a meeting of the Palestine Committee, which is composed of representatives of all Zionist groups. Werfel streased the importance of training youths for picneer work in Israel.

MAISH FUND-RAISING IN 1948 HIGHEST IF HISTORY, CJFAF SAYS; \$180.000.000 RAISED

MEM YORK, March 6. (JTA) -- American Jewish fund-raising in 1948 reached the ment took in its history with 180 federations and welfare funds reporting a total 5:80 478,426 reised for overseas, national, regional and local needs. it was reled here in a report issued today by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welre Funds.

A comprehensive survey of the 180 communities showed a 29 percent increase by some agencies over 1947, the report stated. In total dollars, the increase was 1958,322 more than the \$139,920,104 raised in 1947. The statistics do not include mumity Chest income.

The CJFWF analysis divided the drives on the basis of spring and fall comms. Final figures from 139 spring campaign communities showed a total of \$159.-2.608 raised in 1948. This represented an increase of 33 percent over the \$119.989.-5 raised in the spring of 1947. Pointing out that totals for fall campaigns are ill incomplete in many cases, the report declared that communities are "extending eir efforts to achieve maximum results." The 41 reporting communities have thus far seed \$20,675,818, as compared with \$19,930,839 in the fall of 1947.

Stanley C. Myore, CJFWF president, declared that the figures illustrate that emunities are "making the most concentrated effort in history" to meet their overas and home responsibilities. "An even greater effort may be expected in 1949," he aid, "as communities organize their campaigns and work intensively toward exceeding Il provious totals," he concluded.

949 U.J.A. IRIVE TO BE LAUNCHED FORMALLY AT ERMERGENCY PARLEY IN WASHINGTON MARCH 19

NEW YORK, March 6. (JTA) -- The 1949 campaign of the United Jewish Appeal all be launched formally at an Emergency National Conference of the U.J.A. which will s held in Washington on Merch 19 and 20, Henry Morgenthau, Jr., general chairman, anmunced here this week-end. Some 1,200 Jewish leaders from all parts of the country re expected to attend the Washington parley.

Tomorrow, Morgonthau revealed, leaders of the U.J.A., Jewish Agency, United Falestine Appeal and United Service for New Americans will join in an extraordinary conference by telephone with some 15,000 persons in 150 communities from coast to cost. The mass conforences will signal the start of community drives in behalf of the U.J.A. in the 150 cities and will be on a national hoak-up.
