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ISRAELI APPLICATION FOR U.N. MEMBERSHIP DELAYED; SPOKESMAN HITS BRITISH STAND ON BID

LAKE SUCCESS, April 6. (JTA) -- The Israeli application for U.N. membership sustained an additional delay today when the Soviet bloc in the General Committee launched a long debate on other items. The Committee will meet again tomorrow, but it appears that it may not reach the Israeli application until Friday.

Meanwhile, a spokesman of the Israeli mission to the U.N. today branded the British stand on Israel's application for admission as a twin violation of the Assembly's decisions. The Israeli statement followed a British announcement that it will abstain in the voting on the application unless the Israeli Government makes clear its position on the problems of the Arab refugees and Jerusalem, presumably to the satisfaction of the British.

The Israeli spokesman says the British stand violates the Paris Assembly decision of December 8, 1948, which in effect rules out any opposition to admission except on grounds based on the U.N. Charter provisions. The Charter simply specifies that a nation need be peace-loving and capable of carrying out its responsibilities as a member to be entitled to a seat in the world organization.

In addition, the Israeli mission says the British stand is a violation of the Assembly resolution which set up the Palestine Conciliation Commission as the legal organ for bringing about a solution of the outstanding peace problems in Palestine. If the British conditions were complied with, the refugee and Jerusalem problems would in effect be taken out of the hands of the Commission and placed in the hands of the Political Committee. At best, the work of the Commission would be snarled. At the worst, the debate might upset the delicate atmosphere in which the Commission is even now trying to set peace talks in motion.

ISRAEL DENIES SYRIAN CHARGES OF MILITARY ADVANCES; LABELS THEM PROPAGANDA OFFENSIVE

TEL AVIV, April 6. (JTA) -- The Israeli Government today received through the United Nations mediator's headquarters here a Syrian complaint that Israeli forces had advanced in some sectors of the Israeli-Syrian front.

An official spokesman here immediately denied the charges, asserting that they were part of a special political offensive designed to coincide with the opening of Israeli-Syrian armistice talks. He recalled that the Syrians were still in occupation of several points on Israeli territory which the U.N. had ordered them to evacuate several months ago.

Joseph Sprinzak, Speaker of the Israeli Knesset, will be Acting President of Israel during the absence from the country of Dr. Chaim Weizmann, who is scheduled to leave by plane for the United States tomorrow. His departure, originally scheduled for yesterday, was delayed when his plane developed engine trouble.

Eight policemen who served as supernumeraries under the Palestine Mandatory Government and who were among a group of such officers discharged by the Israeli Government in a reorganization move today occupied a section of the central police station here. They said they were staging a sit-down strike until they have been afforded an opportunity to be heard by a public commission.

U.N. PRESSURE RESPONSIBLE FOR ARAB STATES AGREEMENT TO MEET WITH ISRAEL IN GENEVA

TEL AVIV, April 6. (JTA) -- The acceptance by the Arab states of the invitation by the U.N. Palestine Conciliation Commission to meet in Geneva for a further "exchange of views" with the Commission and Israeli representatives was the result of Arab strategy and U.N. pressure, the Overseas News Agency reported from Beirut today.

Had the Arab states refused the invitation, which the Government of Israel had already indicated its willingness to accept, the U.N. body would have immediately reported to the current session of the U.N. General Assembly that its efforts to bring about a final settlement had reached an impasse, the O.N.A. correspondent said. Originally, the Arab Governments, certain that the General Assembly would place blame for an impasse on the Jews, had considered having the whole Palestine issue thrown back to the Assembly, and most of them had tentatively turned down the Commission's proposal. When the Commission, irritated by the Arabs' stand, bluntly warned their representatives that a substantial portion of the blame would fall on them, they agreed to reconsider.

AMERICAN JEWISH COMMITTEE DELEGATION ARRIVES IN ISRAEL; MEETS WITH PREMIER BEN GURION

TEL AVIV, April 6. (JTA) -- A delegation representing the American Jewish Committee was received here today by Premier David Ben Gurion and discussed with him problems of economic development in Israel and relations between Israel and Jews in the United States.

The delegation also called on Rabbi Judah L. Fishman, Minister of Religion, and was received at the Tel Aviv municipality. The party, which arrived here last night at Ben Gurion's invitation, was headed by Jacob Blaustein, of Baltimore, president of the A.J.C., and included Dr. John Slawson, Irving Engel, Simon Segal and Richard Schuster.

An all-out economic effort was urged by Premier Ben Gurion yesterday in an address opening the Congress of the Israeli Journalists Association at Habimah Hall. Ben Gurion warned that the main dangers confronting Israel when it was founded, in the military, political and economic fields, are still present but are not so bad in the military and economic sphere. The main danger now is economic, he emphasized.

An immediate effort must be made to speed up the absorption of immigrants, Ben Gurion said, to increase new housing potentialities and to develop large-scale pioneering for land settlement.

U.S. MARINES STATIONED IN JERUSALEM GET ISRAELI CONSENT TO CROSS LINES TO GO TO AMMAN

JERUSALEM, April 6. (JTA) -- A detachment of U.S. Marines serving as guards at the American Consulate here was to cross the Israeli-Arab Legion truce lines today to go to Amman--Transjordan capital--to provide a guard of honor at the reception given by the United States Legation there for King Abdullah. Israeli military authorities agreed today to the movement of the Marines through their lines.

The remains of Dr. Theodor Herzl, founder of the modern Zionist movement, will be transferred to Israel this year and interned on Mt. Carmel, according to his wishes, Dr. A. Lauterbach, of the World Zionist Organization, announced. Dr. Lauterbach said that obstacles which had previously blocked agreement on transferring the Herzl remains had now been overcome, although many Zionists are still insistent that the remains should be interred in Jerusalem. Dr. Herzl died in 1904 and is buried in Vienna.

EMIGRATION RATE OF JEWS FROM TURKEY TO ISRAEL HITS RECORD HIGH; 5,700 LEFT IN MARCH

ISTANBUL, April 6. (JTA) -- A record number of 5,700 Jewish emigrants left Turkey for Israel during March, it was revealed here today. About 1,150 of them embarked directly at Izmir, while the remainder sailed from this port for Haifa.

The rate of emigration is expected to be maintained during April. Thousands of Jews have already obtained their passports and during the first few days of this month 1,200 emigrants left from here and 500 sailed from Izmir. The movement of Jews out of this country has already had its effect in the retail fields, particularly in the retailing of hosiery in which Jews were apparently heavily represented. The Turkish press has commented on the situation, asserting that it will be difficult to replace Jewish merchants who left.

ISRAELI GOV. APPOINTS ARPALSA ECONOMIC REPRESENTATIVE IN ARGENTINA; TRADE TALKS OPEN

BUENOS AIRES, April 6. (JTA) -- The Israeli Government has appointed the Argentine Palestine Economic Corporation (ARPALSA) its representative in all economic transactions with the Argentine Government, it was announced here. Negotiations for conclusion of an economic treaty between Israel and Argentina have already been started with Dr. Carlos Grunberg, Israeli liaison official here, participating in the talks.

Since the proclamation of Israeli statehood, more than \$5,000,000 worth of goods have been purchased by the Jewish state from Argentina, it was revealed by Dr. David Mirelman, vice-president of the ARPALSA. He said that no goods from Israel were imported by Argentina because the Argentine Central Bank has refused to extend import licenses for Israeli products.

Argentine President Juan Peron recently pledged that trade relations between Israel and Argentina will be on a reciprocal basis. It is expected, therefore, that in time Israeli products will reach this country and will include cement, artificial teeth, chemicals, wines, citrus fruits, diamonds and religious articles.

Meanwhile, the ARPALSA announced that it is arranging a special tourist trip to Israel in May. A plane accommodating 40 passengers has already been chartered for the purpose, it was revealed. Other organizations have disclosed that they are organizing excursions to the Jewish state.

PLANS TO SHIP \$1,200,000 WORTH OF SUPPLIES TO ISRAEL INCLUDING 400 TONS OF MEAT

WARSAW, April 6. (JTA) -- The Polish Government will export to Israel \$1,200,000 worth of supplies under the terms of an agreement recently concluded with Ben Goldfarb, representing the Israeli Government. The supplies represent funds blocked in this country and, in keeping with a previously-established principle, are being exported to the Jewish state in lieu of Polish money.

Under the agreement, Israel will receive 400 tons of kosher canned meat which will be prepared in Stettin under the supervision of six local rabbis and the chief Jewish chaplain of the Polish Army, Dr. David Kahane. Forty percent of the workers who will prepare the meat must be recruited from among the Jewish population of Stettin, the agreement stipulates. Poland will also send to Israel fish products and poultry, while citrus products will be brought here from Israel.

FIRST INTERNATIONAL POSTWAR MACCABI GAMES WILL BE HELD IN ISRAEL IN SEPTEMBER, 1950

LONDON, April 6. (JTA) -- The World Maccabi Union announced at a conference that the first international athletic competition sponsored by the organization will be held in Israel in September, 1950, a Reuters dispatch from Amsterdam reports. Delegates from ten European countries and Israel attended the Amsterdam meeting, a report added.

TRUMAN RECEIVES A.D.L. ANNUAL AWARD IN WHITE HOUSE CEREMONY; PLEDGES CIVIL RIGHTS FIGHT

WASHINGTON, April 6. (JTA) -- President Truman was presented with "America's Democratic Legacy Medallion" by the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith at the White House shortly after noon today. The President said he was happy to accept the award.

Meier Steinbrink, New York State Supreme Court Justice and chairman of the A.D.L., who made the presentation, pledged to the President the support of B'nai B'rith in his civil rights stand. Steinbrink asked the President not to lose courage or faith in his program to insure civil rights for all Americans.

In his letter to the A.D.L. accepting the award, President Truman wrote: "I am sincerely grateful to have been selected as the recipient of the America's Democratic Legacy Award, given annually by your distinguished organization, the Anti-Defamation League of the B'nai B'rith.

"I am aware of the vigorous educational program and the practical efforts by your organization to foster an understanding of democratic rights and responsibilities. Your definition of America's democratic legacy is admirable. It is indeed a legacy in the hearts and minds of the people. Our goal should be the protection and security that can be given all our people under a civil rights program designed to meet the needs of our times. Such a program I have placed before Congress. In the effort to have it translated into law, I shall look forward to the support of organizations such as yours."

FIRST NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON DISPLACED PERSONS OPENS IN CHICAGO; USIA OFFICIALS ATTEND

CHICAGO, April 6. (JTA) -- The first national conference on displaced persons opened here yesterday at the Hotel Stevens under the auspices of the Displaced Persons Commission. Members of various state DP commissions are attending the sessions to discuss resettlement problems of DP immigrants arriving in the United States. The parley will close tomorrow.

Among the representatives of voluntary aid agencies participating in the parley are William Rosenwald, honorary president of the United Service for New Americans, who is a member of the New York State commission; Joseph E. Beck, its executive director, and Miss Ann Potluck, director of the U.S.N.A. migration department. The U.S.N.A. is represented at the parley by Samuel A. Telsey, president; Maurice Eigon, executive assistant, and William Males, chief consultant.

J.W.V. PRESENTS TOP AWARD TO GEN. OMAR BRADLEY; BEN GURION, EDDIE CANTOR ALSO CITED

NEW YORK, April 6. (JTA) -- The Jewish War Veterans last night presented the highest award--the Meritorious Service Medal--to Gen. Omar N. Bradley, Army chief of staff, at a \$100-plate Waldorf-Astoria dinner marking the 54th anniversary of the founding of the organization. The presentation was made by Henry Morgenthau Jr., general chairman of the United Jewish Appeal.

Other J.W.V. awards were presented to Israeli Premier David Ben Gurion for his leadership of the new state and to Eddie Cantor for his entertainment efforts in behalf of the armed forces and disabled war veterans. Israeli Ambassador to the United States Eliahu Elath accepted the award in behalf of Ben Gurion. Controller Lazarus Joseph of this city presided.

In a message to the dinner, President Truman lauded the Jewish War Veterans for having "worked continuously to promote the highest type of citizenship among all Americans."

NEW JERSEY GOVERNOR SIGNS CIVIL RIGHTS LEGISLATION TO ENCOURAGE RACIAL, RELIGIOUS TOLERANCE

TRENTON, N.J., April 6. (JTA) -- Civil rights legislation designed to encourage racial and religious tolerance in employment, education, recreation and public accommodations in this state was signed yesterday by Gov. Alfred E. Driscoll. The New Jersey governor voiced the hope that a "spirit of tolerance" would result from the new law.

SENATE REJECTS PROPOSAL TO BAR RACIAL BIAS IN DISTRIBUTION OF E.C.A. FUNDS IN MOROCCO

WASHINGTON, April 6. (JTA) -- The Senate last night rejected, by 45 to 33, a amendment to E.C.A. legislation proposed by Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy to curb discrimination in French Morocco against Jewish and Moslem religious groups and American businessmen. McCarthy said that former Vichy French officials were discriminating in handling distribution of E.C.A. shipments.

TRAINING BUREAU FOR JEWISH COMMUNAL SERVICE GETS N.Y. STATE BOARD OF REGENTS CHARTER

NEW YORK, April 6. (JTA) -- The N.Y. State Board of Regents has granted a three-year charter to the Training Bureau for Jewish Communal Service, it was announced today by George Rabinoff, director. The charter gives the bureau the right to "conduct a program of training for administrative service in Jewish community organizations and develop other training programs required for personnel in Jewish communal work."

The Bureau will begin its third class in advanced studies in Jewish community organization in June. The 15-month course includes five months of seminar work and six months of field activity. Dr. Maurice B. Hexter, executive vice-president of the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies, is chairman of this course.

YESHIVA UNIVERSITY TO OPEN PSYCHO-EDUCATIONAL CLINIC TO AID MALADJUSTED REFUGEE CHILDREN

NEW YORK, April 6. (JTA) -- Yeshiva University will open next week a psycho-educational clinic specializing in the adjustment problems of refugee children in the United States, it was announced today by Dr. Samuel Belkin, president. Dr. Julius B. Miller, professor of psychology and author of "School and Community," will head the clinic, which will also deal with the problems of gifted children.

ARTHUR IMMERGLUECK, CLOSE COLLABORATOR OF HERZL, DIES IN ENGLAND AT AGE OF 72

LONDON, April 6. (JTA) -- Dr. Arthur Immerglueck died here yesterday at the age of 72. He was one of the closest collaborators of the late Theodor Herzl, founder of political Zionism, and was formerly president of the Zionist Organization of Austria. He was also one of the founders of the Jacob Ehrlich Society of Austrian Zionists in England.

While he lived in Vienna, before the Anschluss, he was a partner of the late Jacob Ehrlich in a law firm. The firm represented Zionists before the Vienna County Council.

ZEEV GLUSKIN, EARLY MEMBER OF CHOVEVEI ZION AND ONE OF FOUNDERS OF TEL AVIV, DIES

TEL AVIV, April 6. (JTA) -- Zeev Gluskin, one of the early members of the Chovevei Zion movement and a founder of the Gush Company here, died today at the age of 89. He was one of the early settlers and founders of Tel Aviv.
