IBRANLI FOREIGN MINISTER CALLS FOR FRIENDLY RELATIONS WITH UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT

TEL AVIV, July 4. (JTA) -- Israel: Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett, addressing the opening session of the Mapai Youth convention here, declared during the week-end that the Jewish state must have friendly relations with the American Government despite the recent "disputes and unjustified pressure." Mr. Sharett added: "We will never forget the great help of the U.S.S.R. and we will never consede the right of East European Jews to immigrate to Israel." Fremier David Ben Gurion was also a featured speaker at the convention's opening session.

Israel through neutrality in world affairs seeks peace, Mr. Ben Gurion told the convention. Israel must take the best of each country, he went on. From the United States, it can learn the lesson of individual freedom, and much is to be learned also from Ozeoboalovakia and Russia, without becoming a satellite of East or West.

"We do not believe the world is split in two, half black and half white. The belief that there is a dispute only between East and West is untrue. There is, for instance, a dispute between the Cominform states of Eastern Europe and Yugoslavia. We believe peace is a possibility among all states and between blocs," he said.

Mapai, he went on, for 50 years has been based on the principles of national social freedom, mutual aid and the brotherhood of man Therefore, he stated, others may larm Socialism from Mapai, rather than vice versa. He urged the Mapai youth to a great plondering effort to renew the barren areas and to scientific achievements," since the future of Israel must be based on the development of industry."

Mr. Sharett urged the Mapai youth delegates to build an extensive network of agricultural settlements to "tructify the barron areas and especially to establish a chain of semi-military settlements on the borders." Despite the present knue situation, and despite the fact that Israel seeks peace, he cautioned, "we must not forget the surrounding heatile countries."

Zalman Shazar, Minister of Education, asked for thousands of educators of youth to work in the immigrant camps. The convention was attended by 6,000 Mapai youth from 152 settlements and 16 Army camps. Resolutions were adopted calling for a mass draft of youth to help in the immigrant camps.

Immigration Minister Moche Shapira conferred today with Israell Ambassador to the U.S., Eliahn Elath, on the possibilities of American immigration to the Jevish state. Exclier, Minister Shapira received a delegation of CSE leaders from Geneva and Paris who are now visiting Israel. The delegation reviewed plans for the extension of GSE programs to this country.

A delegation of the World Union of Jewish Students arrived at Lydda Airport today from Paris. The delegation plans to set up an international study camp to accommodate 250 students.

BRITAIN TO RELEASE \$6,000,000 IN CONTRIBUTIONS TO IBRAEL, ENVOY IN TEL AVIV REVEALS

TEL AVIV, July 4. (JTA) -- The British Government will release \$6,000,000 in contributions by British Jewry which had formerly been prohibited to Inread, British Minister Alexander Knox Helm advised David Erroutiz, Undersecretary of the Braeli Treasury. This concession was made at the Anglo-Ioraeli financial talks, opened earlier by Ioraeli Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett.

APACIPTICE AGRESMENT BETWEEN ISRAEL AND SYRIA EXPECTED TO BE CONCLIDED BY END OF WEEK

TEL AVIV, July 4. (JTA) -- An armistice agreement with Syria is expected to be reached by the end of this week or the beginning of next week, it was learned today, following talks yesteriay at Mahanain.

The Israell and Syrian delegations reached agreement in principle on the Samis of U.N. Acting Mediator Ralph J. Buncho's plan for demilitarization of territory held by the Syrian Army. Two subcommittees were set up to deal with formulation of an armistice and with military affairs. All the participants expressed great optimism after the meating.

An agreement that the Israeli amy, with a United Nations observer present to represent Transjordan, would investigate Transjordan's charges of alleged Israeli breaches of the armistice pact was reached after a four-hour discussion yeterday by the Israeli-Transjordan mixed armistice commission, it was learned today.

U.M. CONCILIATION BODY SEEKING TO PREVENT PALESTINE ISSUE FROM COMING BEFORE ASSEMBLY

IAUBANNE, July 4. (JTA) -- The U.N. Palestine Conciliation Commission is consulting with Trygvo Lie, U.N. Scoretary-Ceneral, to see if it is possible to keep Palestine off the general Assembly.

In the Commission's view, it was reported today, this would greatly facilitate progress at Lausanne and provide the U.M. edlegates at the Assembly with an expected and velocus reliefs. A plea clong the same lines was made today as the last of the Israeli and Arab delegations dispersed to seek new instructions from their governments on the future of the peace talks here. The Commission members appealed particularly to Israel and Expet not to talk the issue to the General Assembly.

A Commission spoissman felt that conciliation efforts at Lausanne could not be advanced if staged against the background of a verbal match between the Arabs of Egypt, Transjorden, Lehanon and Syria, and the Israelis, at Lake Success.

If Mr. Lie agrees to leave Palestine off the agenda, the Commission expects to make only a formal report to the General Assembly and to seek an extension of its powers and period of work. This course offers the best keep of obtaining a satisfactory outcome to the peace negotiations, in the Commission's view.

If the General Assembly should insist on receiving a report, however, the Commission proposes to outline in September the precise stages which it has reached and to submit certain recommendations of its own.

At the moment, the Commission has sought to persuade all parties concerned that it is advisable to leave the General Assembly out of the Läusanne talke, until seasthing definite has been achieved. It is assumed here that the General Assembly will probably meet again in the spring of 1950--after its session in September is concluded--and it is felt that might be a suitable moment for winding up the Falestine issue with a final settlement.

NUMBER OF JEWS IN ISRAEL IN MAY TOTALLED 861,000; FIVE-MONTH CAIN OF 100,000 NOTED

TEL AVIV, July 4. (JEA) -- The Jewish population of Israel at the end of May was 861,000, as compared with 779,000 at the end of 1948, it was amnounced by the statistics division of the soverment.

50,000 JENIER BOOKS LOOTED BY NAZIS ARE NOW IN N. T. 170 BE DISTRIBUTED THROUGHOUT U.S.

MEM YORK, July 1, (JTA) -- Approximately 50,000 Jewish books, looted by Mexis from institutions and individuals in Europe between 1933 and 1945, and receivered by Allied military authorities after V-E Day, or now in New York and will be distributed to libraries and educational institutions throughout the country before the end of 1949, it was amounced today by Jewish Cultural Reconstruction, Inc., an organization Counded at the end of the war to trace and relocate stolen Jewish cultural traceaures.

Communications have already been addressed to major American Jovieh Libraries, educational and religious institutions, advising them of the project and inviting them to make application for the volumes from the collection, Prof. Salo Baron, president of the J.C.R., said.

TOURIST TRAFFIC TO ISRAEL INCREASING: OVER 5,400 AMERICANS RECEIVED VISAS IN 1949

(JTA) -- Tourist traffic to Israel is steadily increasing and the number of vises issued in the United States in the first six months of this jear was 5,437, it was announced today by Arthur Lourie, Consul Ceneral of Israel. In June the number of vises issued at the Consulate General in New York City, and at the Lee Annotes Consulate totaled 1.594.
