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POSTERS IN JERUSALEM CAUTION JEWS AGAINST DISORDERS AT ARRIVAL OF U.N. MISSION

JERUSALEM, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Huge posters put up all over Jerusalem today cautioned Jewish inhabitants of the city against being misled by an extremist Jewish religious sect which is accused of planning to create disorders and disturbances when representatives of the U.N. Conciliation Commission's economic survey mission arrive here next week.

Headlined "So The People Will Know," and signed by a newly organized group of "religious youth," the posters violently attack the small sect of religious zealots who are known as the Neturay Karta, or "Guardians of the City."

Describing the sect as a fifth column, the posters charge that its leaders, "who are agents of the British and King Abdullah of Transjordan," intend to organize a demonstration in favor of internationalization of the entire city. Members of Neturay Karta have always opposed the concept of Zionism and of a Jewish state, believing that a Jewish state could only be revived after the coming of the Messiah.

The unprecedented attack on them by a group of equally orthodox but less fanatical youths is apparently intended to forestall any major effort by the Neturay Karta adherents to influence the new United Nations mission. The posters also call on the government to investigate the group and its "financial backers and patrons."

ISRAEL CABINET DISCUSSES PREPARATIONS FOR RECEIVING U.N. ECONOMIC MISSION

TEL AVIV, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- The Israel Cabinet met today to hear a report on preparations for receiving the U.N. Conciliation Commission's economic survey mission which is expected to arrive here early next week. The Cabinet also discussed the situation of Jews living in Arab countries.

The appointment of a special three-man committee to represent the Jewish state in conversations with the economic commission was later announced. The committee is made up of David Horowitz, director-general of the Finance Ministry; Gershon Meron, economic adviser to the Foreign Ministry; and Zalman Lifschitz, special adviser on territorial affairs to Premier David Ben Gurion.

The Israel-Transjordan armistice commission yesterday adjourned for one week following a fruitless seven-hour discussion of the situation of the Arab village of Wadi Fukin, near Bethlehem, whose Arab inhabitants have been told they may return from exile, over the objections of Israel authorities. A similar situation which developed in the village of El Harbich, on the border of the "triangle" area near Katun, was also discussed.

Before the commission adjourned, it appointed a subcommittee of one Israeli, one Transjordanian and one U.N. representative to investigate an Israel complaint that Transjordan forces ambushed an Israel truck near Gharandal, in the Negev, on Aug. 31. Two Israel soldiers were killed in the incident and three were wounded.

More than 3,000 Jewish immigrants arrived in Haifa during the past few days. The largest contingent of Jews from one country was represented by 830 Turkish immigrants. A total of 1,260 immigrants disembarked from the Israel transport Atzmaut, which they boarded at Marseilles.

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AMERICANS OF ARAB DESCENT APPEAR BEFORE SENATE SUBCOMMITTEE; SLANDER ISRAEL'S TROOPS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Members of the Senate immigration subcommittee were told by Americans of Arab descent today that the Arab states are "feverishly building up their armies" against Israel since they believe that they "have lost a battle but not the war."

The statement was made by Prof. John G. Hazam, of the City College of New York, who is the president of the Institute of Arab-American Affairs. He was one of a group of three who appeared before the subcommittee with a demand that the United States revise the law for admission of displaced persons in a manner which would allow Arab refugees to enter this country. The other two were: George M. Barakat, executive director of the American Middle East Relief, Inc., and Mrs. Louis Nassif of Wheeling, W. Va.

Alleging that Israel troops had terrorized Arab villagers, Prof. Hazam said that the Arabs may retaliate, on Jews still living in Arab countries. He also attacked American Jews for helping the Jewish state. The allegation that Israel troops used terror methods which caused the displacement of "nearly all" of the Arab refugees was made also by Mr. Barakat. Mrs. Nassif, who described herself as a "Red Cross person" who recently returned from visiting Arab refugee camps, said the Arabs were "the most unfortunate of all DP's."

NO ARAB GOVERNMENTS REPLIED TO ISRAEL'S OFFER TO REUNITE WAR-SEPARATED ARAB FAMILIES

JERUSALEM, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Neither the Arab refugees nor any Arab government have replied in writing to Israel's offer to reunite Arab families broken up as a result of the flight of scores of thousands of Palestine Arabs from Israel last year, Moshe Pearlman, Israel Government spokesman, declared at a press conference today.

Mr. Pearlman added that the refugees themselves and the Arab states are using the Arab refugee problem as pressure against Israel and as a means of obtaining money from the United Nations or the United States. He revealed that since the start of registration on Aug. 1, Israel authorities in Jerusalem received only 18 applications for the reuniting of 40 war-separated Arabs.

The Israel Government spokesman stated that the Tel Aviv regime never received officially or through diplomatic channels any information concerning a reported French Foreign Ministry plan for the internationalization of Jerusalem.

CONSCRIPTION OF GIRLS FOR ISRAEL ARMY CRITICIZED BY ORTHODOX LABORITE WOMEN

TEL AVIV, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Delegates attending the first countrywide conference of the women's division of the Mizrahi Labor Party today heard the majority of speakers declare that the inclusion of women in the newly-passed government conscription law is "harmful to women's psychology and morale and will lead to disturbances in family life."

The majority of the speakers, however, voiced approval of mobilization of Israel women for agricultural training and settlement in farming colonies where, it was emphasized, they could also receive basic military training.

Most speakers at today's session also urged Mizrahi laborite women not to join the world Mizrahi women's organization, but to maintain their independence within the framework of the Epcel Hamizrahi organization. The need for setting up homes for newly-arriving religious women in Israel to enable them to continue to adhere to their traditional religious life was also discussed.

ROMANIAN AND ISRAEL COMPANIES SIGN AGREEMENT TO EXCHANGE \$3,000,000 WORTH OF GOODS

BUCAREST, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- An agreement between nationalized Rumanian firms and private Israel companies providing for the exchange of \$3,000,000 worth of goods was signed today. The Rumanians will send timber for orange crates, cattle and agricultural products to Israel, while they will receive from the Jewish state citrus oils, razor blades, pharmaceuticals and artificial teeth.

Involved in the deal are the sale by Rumania of 12,000 tons of ground salt, 1,000 tons of sunflower seed cake and 900 tons of millet, the last two serving as feed for cattle. In addition, a limited barter arrangement has been concluded for the exchange of Rumanian writing paper and artificial dentures manufactured in Israel.

ALL MINORITY GROUPS TO BE PROTECTED IN ITALIAN GOVERNMENT TREATY WITH TRIPOLI

LONDON, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- The Italian Government has agreed to include all minorities in the proposed treaty to protect the rights of Italian minorities in an independent Tripoli, following the forthcoming elections there under international supervision, it was announced here today by the World Jewish Congress.

The announcement said that the decision was reached following conversations conducted at the Italian Foreign Ministry in Rome by Rev. Maurice Perlzweig, in behalf of the W.J.C., and Dr. Rafaelo Cantoni, president of the Union of Italian Jewish Communities. The talks chiefly concerned the position of Jewish minorities in the former Italian colonies and resulted in complete agreement on a common approach at the forthcoming session of the U.N. General Assembly, the announcement added.

REPRESENTATIVES OF GERMAN JEWISH COMMUNITIES, DP'S DISCUSS FORMATION OF CENTRAL BODY

FRANKFURT, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Delegates attending a conference of Jewish communities and displaced persons in Germany here today took up the question of creating a common representative body for all Jews in Germany. Harry Greenstein, adviser on Jewish affairs to the American Military Government, said that such a group should be the "highest body, representing all Jews in Germany."

Dr. L. Livneh, Israel consul here, suggested to the delegates that Jews living in Eastern Germany be included in the proposed body to "demonstrate Jewish unity." A subcommission to draft a program for the new body was appointed and will report back to the delegates at their next meeting here in October.

FRENCH JEWS SAY GERMANY CANNOT BE RECOGNIZED UNTIL SHE REJECTS RACIAL IDEOLOGIES

PARIS, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- The CRIF, central representative body of French Jewry, adopted a resolution today declaring that political recognition of Germany is not possible until "she proves she sincerely rejects all racial ideologies and carries out all obligations concerning the restitution and compensation of Nazi victims."

The resolution also called on the French Government to take all necessary measures to prevent the entry into France of any German publications indulging in racist propaganda.

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AMERICAN MILITARY AUTHORITIES INVESTIGATE EXCAVATION OF JEWISH MASS GRAVE AT DACHAU

MUNICH, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- The American Military Government in Germany has begun an investigation of the opening of a mass grave at the Dachau concentration camp by German workmen of a contracting concern which was using the soil thus obtained for commercial purposes.

An AMG spokesman today announced that the grave has already been ordered closed. He laid responsibility for the desecration of the site, at which was found a Star of David, on the Bavarian Government. He added that Bavaria had been warned three times in the past year or so to provide adequate care for the mass grave which is believed to contain the remains of 2,000 victims of the Nazis.

(In New York, a telegram of protest was yesterday sent to John J. McCloy, American High Commissioner for Germany, by Justice Meir Steinbrink, chairman of the Anti-Defamation League, against the excavation of the grave. Justice Steinbrink asserted that if this action is left unchallenged, it will "become a signal to the Germans that the American authorities condone their bestialities of the past and their current disregard for all human decencies."

(An editorial in the New York Times today termed the German action "obviously offensive" and added that "it seems incredible that it could have been conceived even by those whose memories are untroubled by guilt or unharmed by twelve years of German history." The editorial insisted that the "least" that the German people could do--and something "the German people owe the world"--is to set aside as a "monument and a solemn reminder of the dignity of man" the place where these victims of Nazism rest.)

EUROPEAN CONSULTATIVE COUNCIL RECOMMENDS ESTABLISHMENT OF WORLD COURT OF HUMAN RIGHTS

STRASBOURG, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- The European Consultative Assembly yesterday recommended the establishment of an international supreme court to guarantee human rights and fundamental freedoms, just before it concluded its first session here. The original suggestion that the Council of Europe guarantee human rights was made by Winston Churchill and a group of delegates from various countries.

The vote in favor of the resolution was 65 to 1, with 17 abstentions. The lone opposition vote was cast by a member of the British Labor delegation, as were eight of the abstainers. The remainder of the abstaining group was composed of Conservative and Catholic representatives.

Before the court can be established, the Council of Europe, of which the Assembly is the lower house, must approve the resolution. The upper house, the Council of Ministers, on which are represented the Foreign Ministers of the twelve nations composing the Council of Europe, will begin to discuss all the recommendations of the Assembly in about six to eight weeks.

AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION REJECTS U.N. GENOCIDE CONVENTION; CONDEMNS MASS KILLINGS

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- The American Bar Association yesterday rejected the United Nations convention to outlaw genocide. However, in a "compromise" resolution adopted after a stormy three-hour session in the Association's House of Delegates the lawyers condemned the mass killing of innocent peoples. The reason given for the rejection of the convention was that it involved vital Constitutional questions and it was feared that an international tribunal to punish violations of the convention supersede American courts.

800 JEWISH COMMUNAL LEADERS MEET IN WASHINGTON; DISCUSS U.J.A. NEEDS AND OBLIGATIONS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- More than 800 Jewish communal leaders from 34 states assembled here at the Statler Hotel today for the opening tomorrow of the Emergency National Conference of the United Jewish Appeal to consider the role of American Jews in the future development of Israel. Henry Morgenthau, Jr., general chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, described the conference as a "crisis meeting," declaring that American Jews "stand at the crossroads of their responsibility in relation to the Jews of Israel and other parts of the world.

"The crucial problem before this conference is the continuation of the partnership between American Jews and the Jews of Israel in the building of the Jewish state," Mr. Morgenthau said. "In the 16 months since Israel was established, more than 285,000 immigrants have entered its gates. This tremendous influx has created a crisis for the people of Israel. Although they have steadfastly refused to consider any restrictions on immigration, they are unable alone to provide the funds to house and rehabilitate the newcomers.

"The Jewish communities of the United States have a solemn obligation, to provide the cash which is needed to receive, house and settle the immigrants, so that they may take their place in the building of Israel, and not become a burden which can threaten the orderly developments of the state," Mr. Morgenthau declared. "American Jewry pledged that it would make possible the uninterrupted flow into Israel of every homeless Jew who wished to enter. It must now make good on that pledge."

Leading Israel spokesmen, including Ambassador to the United States Eliahu Elath and Aubrey S. Eban, chief of the Israeli delegation at the United Nations, will report to the conference on the current situation in the Jewish state. The conference will open officially at a dinner tomorrow night while all of Sunday will be given over to a discussion by communal leaders of "The Measure of American Jewish Responsibility" in relation to the needs of the agencies of the United Jewish Appeal.

ORTHODOX RABBIS IN U.S. AND CANADA OPPOSE ESTABLISHMENT OF UNIVERSAL RABBINIC BODY

NEW YORK, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Opposition to the establishment of any universal authoritative rabbinic body under whatever name was expressed here today by the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the United States and Canada. The Union sent a cable to the Chief Rabbinate in Israel which reads:

"At a meeting of our executive a resolution was unanimously adopted declaring that our organization most emphatically protests against any attempt toward creation of a universal authoritative Rabbinic body under whatever name. Public life is too dominated by political trends, factionalism and strife. Our generation is orphaned and poor in outstanding Rabbinic authorities. The establishment of any such sole authority would endanger the future of our faith."

SO. AFRICAN ZIONIST CONFERENCE OPENS TODAY; DELEGATES FROM ALL PARTS OF UNION ATTEND

JOHANNESBURG, So. Africa, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- The four-day meeting of the South African Zionist Conference will open here Saturday night following a series of meetings which began here last night under the auspices of the South African Women's Zionist Conference. Zionist youth and other parleys were scheduled to open today. Delegates attending the meetings come from all parts of the Union as well as Rhodesia.

Meir Grossman, member of the Jewish Agency executive who arrived here last night from Jerusalem, will be one of the principal speakers at the four-day convulse. Newly-appointed Israel Consul-General for South Africa, Edward Goitien, received a tumultuous ovation when he brought greetings from his government to the women's parley.

NATIONAL JEWISH YOUTH CONFERENCE ASKS LIBERALIZATION OF DP IMMIGRATION ACT

NARROWSBURG, N.Y., Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Liberalization of the Displaced Persons Act of 1948 without limiting or discriminatory clauses to allow a greater number of displaced persons to enter the United States was urged upon Congress by the annual assembly of the National Jewish Youth Conference in one of a series of resolutions at its closing session.

In another resolution the assembly called on the U.S. Senate to establish quickly its proposed committee to investigate the resurgence of Nazism in Germany. The assembly also expressed its appreciation to President Truman and Congress for their interest in the problems of child and youth health and security as evidenced by the President's convening of a Mid-Century White House Conference on Children and Youth in 1950, and pledged its full support to the 1950 conference.

The N.J.Y.C. also voted to defend the rights of all minorities "wherever and whenever challenged by discrimination and abridgement of civil rights." Expressing its "admiration and pride" in the new state of Israel, the assembly pledged its "efforts on behalf of Israel" and agreed to aid the new state in every way possible.

Arnulf M. Pins was reelected national chairman of the N.J.Y.C. together with an executive committee of 45. The new executive committee, which will meet later in the year when its membership has been augmented by additions from the national Jewish youth organizations affiliated with N.J.Y.C. and from regional youth councils, will elect the other officers. A provisional constitution, to be operative until 1950, was also adopted yesterday.

Urge Youth to Seek Jobs in Rabbinate, Jewish Education

Other major actions of the assembly included: 1. A call to American Jewish youth to investigate the professional opportunities available in the fields of Jewish social work, Jewish education and the rabbinate with a view to entering those professions; 2. A pledge to cooperate with existing schools in those fields and with other interested groups in the formation of a graduate school of Jewish social work; 3. A request to local, regional and national Jewish community organizations to give Jewish youth and young adults greater representation on the governing bodies of such agencies; 4. Urged the National Jewish Welfare Board to continue its sponsorship of, interest in and assistance to the Conference.

An intensive program of parent education on the part of Jewish community centers, Jewish schools and synagogues to help parents "make the home environment a source of dynamic Jewish living and to bring to parents a knowledge of the problems of children and young adults in living as Jews" was proposed in the report of the assembly's Commission on Jewish Education. This commission was one of eight in which the delegates dealt exhaustively with the major concerns of American Jewish youth and presented a series of findings which will serve as guide posts to the N.J.Y.C.'s incoming administration.

The same commission urged that greater efforts be made to include Hebrew in the curricula of colleges and public high schools and found that a knowledge of Yiddish "is a key to an important facet of Jewish culture." Special programs of Jewish education for girls and increased financial support for Jewish education on the part of Jewish community agencies were urged by the commission. It also asked for greater participation by young people in Jewish Center and synagogue programs and attendance at Jewish summer camps "as a source of Jewish information, inspiration and experience."
