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UNITED STATES AND BRITAIN REACH ACCORD ON PALESTINE ISSUE IN WASHINGTON TALKS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- General accord has been reached between British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and Secretary of State Dean Acheson in talks on the Palestine situation which have been taking place since Mr. Bevin's arrival in the United States, it was learned here today.

The State Department announced today that close consultations with regard to the Palestine situation will continue between the United States and Britain even after Foreign Secretary Bevin returns to London.

U.N. COMMISSION WANTS ISRAEL AND ARABS TO MODIFY THEIR TERRITORIAL DEMANDS

LAUSANNE, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- At the final meeting today of the three members of the United Nations Conciliation Commission for Palestine--representing the United States, France and Turkey--a decision was reached to request their governments to instruct their Ambassadors at Tel Aviv and in the Arab capitals to make the strongest requests to the states concerned to send fully qualified delegations to New York when the Commission resumes its sessions October 15.

They also requested their governments to make urgent representations to insure that those Arab and Israel delegations go to New York with new or modified instructions, particularly on the issue of the future territorial boundaries of Israel. They also emphasized once again their desire to see modifications in the respective attitudes of the Israelis and the Arabs, as outlined in the replies of the several states to the Commission's questionnaire issued last week.

Meanwhile, the U.N. Commission is preparing its first report on its activities for submission to the General Assembly which reconvenes at Lake Success on Tuesday. In this connection, the Commission members have decided that they would not include the full text of the Arabs' demand for Israel territory or the text of the Israel claim covering its future frontiers.

It has been merely decided, instead, to state the replies which the Commission has received, and to make the point that its members are seeking to obtain modifications of those responses. It is thought here that were the Commission to publish the full texts, particularly the Arab position, that would reveal the full extent of the gap existing on the territorial issues between the two parties to the dispute. In other words, the Commission is now concerned with minimizing, rather than overplaying, the nature of that gap.

FOREIGN MINISTER SHARETT WILL HEAD ISRAEL DELEGATION TO U.N. GENERAL ASSEMBLY

NEW YORK, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- The Israel Delegation to the forthcoming session of the United Nations General Assembly will be headed by Moshe Sharett, Minister for Foreign Affairs, it was announced here today. In his absence, the delegation will be led by Aubrey S. Eban, permanent representative to the U.N. It has not yet been decided at which stage of the proceedings Mr. Sharett will arrive in New York, the announcement said.

Pakistan's Foreign Minister, Sir Zafrulla Khan, key spokesman of Arab and Moslem interests in the United Nations, declared at a press conference today he will support an international regime for Jerusalem.

AMERICAN ZIONIST COUNCIL OPPOSES U.N. COMMISSION PLAN FOR JERUSALEM; RESUKES U.S. PRESSURE

NEW YORK, Sept. 14. (JTA) - Opposition to the recommendation of the U.N. Conciliation Commission to place Jerusalem under international jurisdiction was expressed here today by the American Zionist Council at a press conference addressed by Louis Lipsky, chairman of the Council, which represents all Zionist groups in the United States.

Declaring that "the proposal would be rejected by every Jew in every land as being both unjust and impracticable," Mr. Lipsky pointed out that the new city of Jerusalem--Jewish Jerusalem--is 95 percent Jewish in population. "It is inconceivable that there should be a sovereign state of Israel without a Jewish Jerusalem," he said.

"As Americans and as Jews, we protest the placing of Jerusalem under alien jurisdiction, and segregating the city built by Jews--an integral part of the new settlement--from the new-born state of Israel, as a moral outrage and an offense against history and tradition," the chairman of the Zionist Council declared.

Mr. Lipsky also voiced the deep concern of American Zionists over the many "disturbing reports" that the United States Government is "now pressing for a solution to certain aspects of the problem of the Middle East which we are bound to regard as hostile to the basic interests of Israel." He added that these reports cannot be dismissed "with the easy phrases of diplomatic language."

The Zionist leader called for a "Fair Deal" attitude by President Truman toward Israel. He requested an end to all "overt or covert pressures" on Israel to cede parts of its territory to Arab states, and urged the United States not to support any policy which would call upon Israel "to absorb impossible numbers of Arab refugees who fled Palestine at the behest of Arab war leaders." He also called for active American support for the initiation of direct negotiations between Israel and the Arab states, looking toward final peace settlements.

U.N. COMMISSION PLAN FOR JERUSALEM REGIME IS "IMPRACTICABLE," ISRAEL GOVERNMENT SAYS

TEL AVIV, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- An Israel Government spokesman, commenting on the U.N. Conciliation Commission's plan for an international regime for Jerusalem, which was made public yesterday, said that although the scheme "differs in several aspects from earlier proposals for internationalization of Jerusalem the plan nevertheless adheres to concepts which experience and reality have proven impracticable."

The spokesman asserted that the Commission's proposal ignores the fundamental problems of sovereignty. "Without a positive solution to this problem, no stable regime can be set up in Jerusalem," he stated, adding that the "plan also contains a number of proposals which Israel and the Jews of Jerusalem cannot possibly accept." The spokesman said the Israel Government would reply in full to the Commission's proposal when it comes before the General Assembly.

"The Government of Israel continues to adhere to the proposals for resolving the Jerusalem problem submitted by the Israel representative before the Ad Hoc Political Committee of the U.N. Assembly in May," the spokesman declared. "Those proposals assure full satisfaction for the rights and vital interests of all religions and churches without detriment to the basic interests of the state of Israel and Jerusalem's Jews. The Israel Government persists in its views that any settlement of the Jerusalem issue which in any degree severs Jewish Jerusalem from the state of Israel is devoid of reality," he said.

YOUTH WHO AIMED GUN AT ISRAEL CABINET SENT BACK TO JAIL; THREATENS TO FAST TO DEATH

TEL AVIV, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- Abraham Tzafati, who brandished a loaded Sten gun at members of Israel's Cabinet, including Premier David Ben Gurion, in the Knesset, was recommitted to 15 days in prison today following a preliminary hearing in magistrate's court. The youth said he would fast to death unless the Knesset expressed willingness to hear his plan for erection of a "World Peace Center" in Jerusalem on the site of the ancient Temple.

Meanwhile, reports reaching here from Teheran, Tzafati's native city, reveal that the youth returned to Israel only three months ago after he attempted to organize a campaign of anti-British terror in Iran. Iranian police succeeded in apprehending him and he was sentenced to jail for a year for entering the country illegally. However, because of his "mental instability," Tzafati was released after a few weeks' interment. It is not known how the youth succeeded in reaching Israel but he apparently crossed the borders of several Arab countries to arrive here from Iran.

ONE-SIXTH OF 160 SURVIVING SAMARITAN JEWS ENTER ISRAEL FOR PERMANENT RESETTLEMENT

JERUSALEM, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- Itzhak Ben Amram, high priest of the Samaritan sect, is expected to cross Jewish lines tomorrow from Nablus to enter the new city of Jerusalem for consultations with Israel leaders, including Itzhak Ben Zvi, Histadrut leader, it was disclosed here today.

Thirty of the 160 surviving Samaritans recently crossed the Israel frontier to settle in the Jewish state. Minister of Immigration Moshe Shapira informed the group that the Israel Government regards the Samaritans as Jews.

U.S. MEMBER OF CONCILIATION COMMISSION VOICES OPTIMISM ON SOLUTION OF PALESTINE ISSUE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- Paul A. Porter, American representative to the U.N. Conciliation Commission, expressed optimism today on the eventual solution of problems in Palestine.

Addressing a meeting of the American Veterans Committee here, he said, "conditions can improve to where it will be easy to develop peaceful settlement" if President Truman's Point Four program is carried out. He hailed the economic survey mission, predicting that "we can develop a series of solutions within the framework of an economic solution." Mr. Porter warned that the solution would not be entirely satisfactory "to the extremes of either group."

ISRAEL REPRESENTATIVE TO NEGOTIATE TRADE RELATIONS WITH CZECHOSLOVAKIA AND HUNGARY

TEL AVIV, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- Dr. M. Kinori, member of the Israel Ministry of Trade, left today for Prague to conduct trade negotiations between Israel and Czechoslovakia. He will also visit Budapest to discuss commercial relations between Israel and the Hungarian Government.

EGYPT PROPOSES U.N. HEALTH BODY MEET IN GENEVA; IS RELUCTANT TO ADMIT ISRAEL DELEGATES

LONDON, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- The Egyptian Government has suggested that the Eastern Mediterranean Regional Office of the World Health Organization, which was scheduled to meet in Alexandria this week, hold its conference in Geneva, Reuters reported today from Cairo. It is believed that Egypt's desire to change the meeting place of the W.H.O. stems from unwillingness on her part to admit Israel representatives to the parley.

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UNITED NATIONS BODY PLANS WORLDWIDE DRIVE TO COMBAT RACIAL PREJUDICE

PARIS, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- A campaign to combat racial prejudice is among the proposals for the 1950 program of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), submitted by the director-general in connection with the fourth session of the group's general conference opening here on Monday.

The proposal to fight prejudice calls for a definition by experts of racial problems in order to determine the major forms of misconceptions and methods for combating them. A series of pamphlets would then be issued and, with the scientific facts thus available, a campaign of popular enlightenment could be undertaken.

GERMAN MUNICIPALITY WITHDRAWS NOMINATION OF JEWISH PHYSICIAN TO HEAD CITY HOSPITAL

FRANKFURT, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- The Offenbach city administration today denied a report by the independent "Frankfurter Rundschau" here that it has withdrawn the nomination of a Jewish physician to be head of the city's women hospital because of his racial origin, Reuters reported.

The city administration officially declared that "purely objective" reasons had caused the final nomination of another candidate. The paper had claimed that the deputy mayor, Dr. A. Kasperkowitz, had protested against the nomination of the Jewish physician--Dr. Herbert Levin--on the grounds that "Offenbach women could not be expected to be handed over to a Jewish physician as one has to take into consideration that he has resentments against non-Jewish persons."

The official denial did not mention the newspaper's report which said that Dr. Levin had already been voted as head of the Offenbach hospital by a majority decision of the city administration. It was not possible to obtain any statement from the city administration as to whether or not and on what grounds this reported first decision was revoked, the Reuters report said. The denial stated that the final nomination of another candidate was "the result of considerations taking into account merely objective interests and the interests of the city of Offenbach."

CANADIAN JEWISH CONGRESS DENIES GOVT. PRACTICES DISCRIMINATION IN ADMISSION OF DP'S

MONTREAL, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- The Canadian Jewish Congress today released an open letter addressed to Rabbi Abraham L. Feinberg, of Toronto, a member of its executive committee, taking issue with recent charges made by him that Canadian immigration authorities are discriminating against prospective Jewish DP immigrants seeking admission to this country.

The letter, signed by Saul Hayes, executive director of the Congress, said that the Canadian government effectively cooperated with Jewish leaders in matters of Jewish immigration. It emphasized that if Rabbi Feinberg's charges were in essence true "we would not have been able to obtain the entry of a fraction of the Jews who have come into this country on our representations."

UNITED NATIONS IS ASKED TO INVESTIGATE DEPORTATIONS OF JEWS FROM UKRAINE

LAKE SUCCESS, Sept. 14. (JTA) -- The American Jewish League Against Communism again submitted a protest to the Secretariat of the United Nations against reported deportations of Jews from the Ukraine to Siberia. The League asked the U.N. to investigate press reports that Jews in the Ukraine who have relatives in America and in England are being exiled to Siberia.
