

REAR ADMIRAL FIFE, COMMANDER OF U.S. SUBMARINE FORCES, ATTACKS PROF. EINSTEIN

BOSTON, Nov. 18. (JTA) -- Rear Admiral James Fife, commander of the submarine force of the U.S. Atlantic Fleet, was quoted today by the Associated Press as stating that if Prof. Albert Einstein "doesn't like Americanism or our nationalism, then he should go back where he came from and try Mr. Hitler again."

Addressing the New England Council, the Admiral declared: "About three years ago I got a form letter from Mr. Albert Einstein. In it he referred to atomic energy making nationalism obsolete or outmoded. As we all know, he is a World Federalist or a One Worlder, or whatever you want to call it."

AMERICAN FRIENDS OF HEBREW UNIVERSITY REELECT DR. WECHSLER; WILL RAISE \$2,100,000

NEW YORK, Nov. 18. (JTA) -- Dr. Israel S. Wechsler was reelected president of the American Friends of the Hebrew University at the organization's annual meeting last night. Justice Felix Frankfurter, Dr. A.S.W. Rosenbach and Mrs. Felix M. Warburg were elected honorary presidents.

The Hebrew University, according to a report by the executive vice-president, High Salpeter, has set a goal of \$2,800,000 for its operations during the year 1949-50, and the American Friends will be responsible for raising \$2,100,000 of that amount. Societies of Friends of the Hebrew University in Great Britain, Canada and other countries will help to raise the remainder, it was reported at the meeting.

(The new academic year of Hebrew University here, which begins Monday, will record a total enrollment of 1,300, which is 400 more than the student body last year, a cable from Jerusalem said today. Lack of space continues to be the chief problem of the University, which is now scattered in 20 buildings in Jerusalem.)

ARGENTINA TO EXPAND RELATIONS WITH ISRAEL; CARDINAL ISSUES MESSAGE ON JERUSALEM

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 18. (JTA) -- The Argentine Government issued a statement today announcing its intentions "to intensify relations with the state of Israel." The official statement emphasized that the Argentine legation in Tel Aviv now functions only on a provisional basis, since the decree for the establishment of such a legation was approved by the Senate only, while the House of Representatives did not have time to approve it prior to its adjournment.

La Prensa, one of the leading Argentine newspapers, published an article today lauding the tolerant attitude of the Israel Government toward Catholic Holy Places in its territory. At the same time Cardinal Santiago Luis Copello, Archbishop of Buenos Aires, issued a message to be read on Sunday in all Catholic churches, emphasizing the Pope's call with regard to Jerusalem and the Holy Places in Palestine.

"While the U.N. General Assembly discusses the future of Jerusalem, it is the duty of all faithful Catholics to pray for the efficient safeguarding of the Holy City against future dangers of war and destruction, and that the Holy Places should always preserve their character which they have in the veneration of the faithful. The acquired rights of the Catholics in the Holy Land should be respected," Cardinal Copello's message said.

BERNARD BARUCH REVEALS HE WILL LEAVE ENTIRE ESTATE TO AID REHABILITATE HANDICAPPED

NEW YORK, Nov. 18. (JTA) -- Bernard M. Baruch revealed last night that he plans to will his entire estate to the promotion of physical medicine and rehabilitation. A principal supporter of the Baruch Committee on Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, Mr. Baruch has also been a leading sponsor of New York University's present rehabilitation center. The Baruch Committee on Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation was formed in 1944 with a \$1,100,000 gift from Mr. Baruch.

JEWISH AGRICULTURAL SABBATH TO BE OBSERVED THROUGHOUT COUNTRY; TO STIMULATE FARMING

NEW YORK, Nov. 18. (JTA) -- A "Jewish Agricultural Sabbath" designed to stimulate interest in farming among Jews in the United States, will be observed tomorrow by many Jewish communities throughout the country. The "Sabbath" has been proclaimed by the Synagogue Council of America in cooperation with the Jewish Agricultural Society.

The Jewish Agricultural Society today reported that never in its history have as many Jewish families been settled on land and as many agricultural loans been made as during the last year. The Society was formed 50 years ago through foundations set up by the philanthropist Baron Maurice de Hirsch.

24TH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF MIZRACHI WOMEN'S ORGANIZATION OPENS IN ATLANTIC CITY

ATLANTIC CITY, Nov. 18. (JTA) -- The 24th annual convention of the Mizrahi Women's Organization of America will open here tomorrow night with more than 1,000 delegates representing 50,000 members in all sections of the U.S. in attendance.

Problems of Youth Aliyah work, child-restoration, social welfare activities, Jewish National Fund efforts and related programs projected by the organization for 1950 will be considered. Speakers will include Rabbi Wolf Gold, member of the Jewish Agency executive who recently arrived here from Israel, and Gen. John Hildring, former U.S. Assistant Secretary of State. The convention will continue through Tuesday.

JAMES N. ROSENBERG OBSERVES HIS 75TH BIRTHDAY; SPENDS DAY WITH HIS FAMILY

NEW YORK, Nov. 18. (JTA) - James N. Rosenberg, noted American Jewish leader, will attain his 75th birthday on Sunday. He will mark it by spending the day in the intimate circle of members of his family at his country residence at Mamorneck, N.Y., it was learned today.

Mr. Rosenberg, who has a rich record of activity in Jewish communal life, is the honorary chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee. He is also the chairman of the Human Rights Committee of the National Conference of Christians and Jews and is chairman of the U.S. Committee for the U.N. Genocide Convention. He is the author of a number of books and many of his paintings have been acquired by more than twenty museums and art galleries throughout the country.

NATIONAL JEWISH WELFARE BOARD WILL HOLD ITS BIENNIAL CONVENTION IN CINCINNATI

NEW YORK, Nov. 18. (JTA) -- The 1950 biennial convention of the National Jewish Welfare Board will be held in Cincinnati from May 6 to 8, it was announced here today by Frank L. Weil, president of the organization. Charles W. Morris of Louisville, Ky., has been appointed chairman of the committee planning the convention, the announcement said.
