BEN GURION INVITES ALL PARTIES INTO GOVERNMENT; LISTS CONDITIONS FOR JOINING COALITION

TEL AVIV, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Summing up a week-long debate on his report on the government's achievements during the last eight months and its future foreign and domestic policy, Premier David Ben Gurion today held open the door to all political parties in Israel to join his Mapai-led coalition government. He listed six major conditions, the acceptance of which would bring any party an invitation to join the government. They are:

1. A foreign policy based on peace with the Arabs and independence in relation to the world power blocs.
2. Equality of rights and duties for all citizens, including the Arabs.
3. A united Army.
4. An economic policy based on fighting the high cost of living, guaranteeing the freedom of industry and the safeguarding of private ownership.
5. Satisfaction of religious requirements without the establishment of a religious dictatorship.
6. Acceptance of joint responsibility by all parties in the coalition.

Declaring that the time is not yet ripe for adoption of a constitution, the Premier assured the Knesset that there is no need to fear that the government will remain in office beyond its term. The main task now, he said, is the gathering in of 500,000 Jews confronted by a catastrophe.

He released the total number of votes each of the Israel parties received among the armed forces during the Parliamentary elections early this year. They were: Mapai, 31,138; Mapam, 15,776; Herut, 11,151; Religious Bloc, 5,646; Progressives, 2,106; Fighters, 1,335; Sephardim, 1,250.

Finance Minister Eliezer Kaplan, who preceded the Premier, said that Israel's chances of success or failure in solving the problems of immigration absorption and land reclamation were equal. Success, he said, means independence for Israel, while failure means economic crisis. He revealed that the government has spent huge sums attempting to absorb the immigrants and fight joblessness. Despite this, he reported, 40,000 persons are currently unemployed and this figure may be doubled in the next ten months.

He warned Britain that it could not take advantage of Israel's desperate need for hard currency by continuing to hold on to bloated Israel sterling balances. This, he stated, will not cause Israel to bow to British economic demands.

General Zionists Demand Proclamation of Jerusalem as Israel Capital

TEL AVIV, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- The Israel General Zionist Party's annual conference concluded here late last night following the issuance of a call for the government to declare Jerusalem its capital, without delay. The parley also reelected Dr. Fritz Bernstein president of the party.

Resolutions adopted before the closing session urged the government to resist curtailment of Israel territory, fight emigration restrictions and ensure the free growth of Zionism where it is now impeded. They also urged the Knesset to adopt a Constitution, warned against the danger involved in the ruling party's obtaining an economic advantage over the General Zionists and announced a fund-raising campaign for party purposes.

BRITAIN DISAGREES WITH AUSTRALIA ON JERUSALEM ISSUE; WILL BACK MODERATE PROPOSALS

LAKE SUCCESS, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- A British delegation spokesman announced today his government will join with the United States in support of moderate proposals for a U.N. control regime of Holy Places in Jerusalem offered by the Palestine Conciliation Commission.

The British representative revealed that the more drastic Australian plan for internationalization of Jerusalem was drawn without consultation with the U.S. or British delegations. Britain agrees with the United States that the Australian proposals are not feasible.

With respect to the Economic Survey Mission proposals, the British spokesman said his government was ready to contribute its share to the proposed \$48,000,000 budget, providing the states directly interested in the projected public works plan give their full cooperation to the project. Without such cooperation, he indicated, the project could not succeed regardless of the amount of money raised to back it.

ISRAEL'S FOREIGN MINISTER CALLS ON HEAD OF U.S. DELEGATION TO UNITED NATIONS

NEW YORK, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Israel Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett, accompanied by Israel delegate Aubrey S. Eban, today paid a diplomatic call on Sen. Warren Austin, head of the American delegation at the United Nations. This was the first diplomatic call paid by Mr. Sharett since his arrival in the United States.

The National Council of Jewish Women called on the U.S. delegation to the United Nations today to support a solution of the problem of Jerusalem which ensures the democratic political rights of its residents by recognizing the present division of the city between the Israel and Arab governments. Mrs. Irving M. Engel, president of the Council, expressed her organization's approval of the proposal to place religious institutions and Holy Places in all of Palestine under U.N. supervision.

While advocating international machinery to guarantee freedom of access to the Holy Places for all religious groups, Mrs. Engel asserted that "the problems raised by the political status of Jerusalem can only be solved in harmony with the established and legitimate interests of the people who live in the city." The realities of the situation are that the new city is an integral part of the State of Israel and that the Old City is occupied by the Arabs, she said. "Thus, the Jewish population of Jerusalem can be assured of its democratic political rights only if the new city continues to be an integral part of Israel," she pointed out.

The United Zionists-Revisionists of America today issued a statement declaring that a divided Jerusalem, not less than an internationalized Jerusalem, would be a threat to the security of Israel, and thus to the peace of the entire Middle East. "Division of the Holy City would mean the perpetuation of Arab rule in the Old City and the building up of a British-dominated kingdom in the very heart of the Jewish state," the statement said. "The Jewish people will never acquiesce to such a scheme -- they will never surrender the City of David to Abdullah."

HEAD OF CATHOLIC CHURCH IN ARGENTINA DISCUSSES JERUSALEM WITH ISRAEL MINISTER

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 22, (JTA) -- Primate Cardinal Santiago Copello, head of the Catholic Church in Buenos Aires, today received Dr. Yaacov Tsur, Israel Minister here. They held a lengthy and friendly talk on the problem of Jerusalem and the Holy Places.

ONE JEWISH CHILD RESCUED IN NORWEGIAN AIR CRASH; 26 DEAD; FATE OF EIGHT UNKNOWN

OSLO, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- One Jewish child, Isaac Allal, was today found alive in the wreckage of a Dutch DC-3 transport plane which crashed some 30 miles west of this city Sunday, it was announced here.

The child was immediately rushed to a hospital for treatment. Twenty-six persons are known to have been killed and the fate of eight is still in doubt. The plane carried 29 children, two nurses and a crew of four. The children were coming from Morocco for eight months of medical treatment and instruction prior to their eventual immigration to Israel. The project, of which they were one part, is maintained by the Youth Aliyah movement.

The plane, chartered by the Joint Distribution Committee, crashed in a rugged forest area and the explosion which resulted was heard some distance away. It is for this reason that the major search effort was concentrated in this sector. In all some 2,200 soldiers, policemen, airmen and civilians were engaged in the two-day hunt. Planes from the air forces of Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Holland participated.

(Members of the executive committee of the J.D.C. today offered a prayer for the children who perished in the wreck and appealed for continued aid to be made available to "tens of thousands of needy Jewish children still in North African slums, in distressed areas of Europe and in Israel." Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, J.D.C. vice-chairman, led the prayer at a meeting of the executive committee this afternoon at the Hotel Commodore.)

ISRAEL'S AMBASSADOR IN WASHINGTON SAYS IRAQ CONTINUES TO PERSECUTE JEWS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Israel Ambassador Elishu Elath said today that persecution of Iraqi Jewry continues unabated according to "indirect" advices from the Near East.

The Ambassador conferred today with Raymond Hare, acting Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs. The discussion was said to have involved "routine technical matters."

(A spokesman for the French Foreign Office, commenting on a World Jewish Congress memorandum on the persecution of Jews in Iraq, asserted today that France, "faithful to its tradition, will not fail to intervene with the means at its disposal in all cases where fundamental human rights and the rights of minorities seem endangered," a cable from Paris reported.)

HAGANAH OFFICER WHO ORDERED TUBIAWSKI EXECUTED FOUND GUILTY; GETS ONE-DAY JAIL TERM

TEL AVIV, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Isaac Beer, former Haganah officer who was accused of ordering the execution of an innocent Haganah member in Jerusalem on charges of aiding the enemy during the fighting last year, was found guilty today but was sentenced to only one day of imprisonment. The victim of what the Israel Government later admitted had been a tragic mistake was Meir Tubianski.

The court said it had considered that the "atmosphere at the time was poisoned by constant suspicion of espionage" and had also taken into account Beer's long and loyal service to the Haganah. Unless a reprieve is forthcoming from President Weizmann, Beer's sentence will be carried out within a month's time.

ISRAEL CONSUL IN BUDAPEST SUMMONED TO TEL AVIV FOR TALKS ON JEWISH EMIGRATION

TEL AVIV, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- A. Ben Tzur, first secretary of the Israel Legation in Hungary and Israel consul in Budapest, was summoned here today for consultations on the question of Jewish emigration from Hungary.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT PLEDGED TO ACT AGAINST NEWSPAPERS SPREADING NAZISM IN GERMANY

LONDON, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- The British Government will take action against newspapers spreading Nazism and anti-Semitism in Germany, Foreign Undersecretary Christopher Mayhew pledged in Commons last night.

He told questioners that the government is aware of the fact that there are still individuals and groups in Germany which hold Nazi views. Although he pointed out that the British occupying forces have the power to take action against the Nazis and to protect "democratic government in Germany," he said that the initiative should come from the Germans. However, he added, the British Government "will not hesitate to take appropriate action when necessary."

Two Mosleyites fined for "obstructing" traffic during an anti-Semitic demonstration in London's Piccadilly Circus last month yesterday gave notice in court of their intention to appeal the sentences. Sir Oswald Mosley was one of the spectators in the court.

HARRY GREENSTEIN WARNS OF CONTINUED STRONG ANTI-JEWISH SENTIMENTS AMONG GERMANS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Harry Greenstein, retiring adviser on Jewish affairs to the U.S. authorities in Germany, who has now returned to the United States, has warned of continued strong anti-Jewish sentiment among Germans in the official report on his mission.

"It is imperative that the occupying powers recognize in anti-Semitism a negation of the democratic principles and an unmistakable sign of the resurgence of German nationalism in its most vicious form," he said in his report. Education of the German people to democratic ways may take generations, he pointed out, but the degree of its success "may very well spell the difference between peace or war, a liberal or a reactionary world."

Mr. Greenstein was welcomed back to Baltimore yesterday at a celebration in his honor at Hotel Emerson, sponsored by the Associated Jewish Charities and the Jewish Welfare Fund. He has been executive director of both for over 20 years.

GERMAN COURT IN BERLIN SENTENCES TWO FOR DESECRATING MEMORIAL TO JEWISH WAR DEAD

BERLIN, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Two Germans were today sentenced to eight-month prison terms in a German court here for desecrating a memorial to Jewish victims of the Nazis in the Berlin Jewish cemetery. The Germans were Hans Waskow, 22, and Kurt Zeitel, 26.

Defense counsel for three Nazis convicted and sentenced by an American court at Baireuth, Bavaria, for desecrating the only synagogue in the town of Marktredwitz earlier this year today announced that an appeal will be made to an American review board. He charged that the desecration had been carried out by Jews in order to "discriminate against the defendants and the Marktredwitz population."

In Bamberg, also in Bavaria, a German court dismissed charges against three German boys, aged 10, 13 and 15, who had overturned tombstones in a Jewish cemetery. Before he freed them, the judge gave them a warning.

78 JEWISH TOURISTS FROM EUROPE NOT ALLOWED TO LAND IN URUGUAY; ARE RETURNED TO FRANCE

MONTVIDEO, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- A group of 78 Jewish tourists from Europe who arrived here aboard the French vessel, "Florida," were not permitted to land by Uruguayan immigration authorities.

All of the Jews, who carried visas issued by the Uruguayan consulate in Paris, were returned to France aboard the same vessel that brought them here. It is not known here whether the French Government will allow them to land since all of them are Polish citizens.

NATIONAL COUNCIL OF JEWISH WOMEN TO CLOSE ORPHANAGE FOR JEWISH GIRLS IN GREECE

ATHENS, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- The orphanage for Jewish girls maintained here by the National Council of Jewish Women of the U.S. will be closed as of Dec. 31, it was announced today. The institution was set up to care for Israel-bound orphaned girls, the last three of whom will depart from here shortly for the Jewish state.

The Central Board of Jewish Communities of Greece has forwarded a request to government authorities to order the removal of squatters from the Jewish cemetery in the town of Verria, in northern Greece, it was disclosed today.

MINNESOTA GOVERNOR URGES END OF RACIAL, RELIGIOUS BIAS; ADDRESSES CATHOLIC PARLEY

ATLANTIC CITY, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- The eradication of racial and religious bias was advocated here last night by Minnesota's Governor Luther Youngdahl in an address to the National Conference of Catholic Charities.

Gov. Youngdahl cited the benefits derived by all sections of the population in the efforts to find new homes for displaced persons who have arrived in this country. "The DP program has given us many benefits," he said, adding that an "important value has been the opportunity to have Catholic, Protestant and Jewish people working together for a common cause and thus learning to know and respect one another more."

ROSENWALD CRITICIZES AMERICAN JEWISH COMMITTEE FOR STIMULATING PRO-ISRAEL FEELINGS

NEW YORK, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Lessing J. Rosenwald, president of the American Council for Judaism, today made public a statement charging American Zionists with issuing "hundreds of statements in favor of Jewish nationalism, involving American Jews in Israeli national problems, or identifying Judaism with Israeli projects." At the same time, the statement severely criticized the American Jewish Committee for "sponsoring a number of projects to stimulate pro-Israel feelings."

Mr. Rosenwald vigorously denied that the Council had raised the issue of dual loyalty. "On the contrary," he asserted, "the Council has insisted that Jews have only a single national attachment to the United States. We have simply pointed to statements already published in the public press by Zionists and said 'these statements, attitudes, actions, involvements in Israel politics, economics or culture, are not representative of all Jews.'"

TEXAS ZIONISTS URGE THAT DR. SILVER BE DRAFTED AS U.J.A. GENERAL CHAIRMAN IN 1950

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 22. (JTA) -- A resolution urging that Dr. Abba Hillel Silver be drafted for the post of general chairman of the United Jewish Appeal for 1950 was adopted here by the board of directors of the Southwest Region of the Zionist Organization of America.

MIZRACHI WOMEN'S ORGANIZATION OF AMERICA ADOPTS \$1,500,000 BUDGET FOR COMING YEAR

ATLANTIC CITY, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- A budget of \$1,500,000 for the coming year was adopted here last night by 1,000 delegates from all sections of the country attending the 24th annual convention of the Mizrahi Women's Organization of America. Half of this sum was earmarked for Youth Aliyah and child-restoration programs while the remaining \$750,000 will be used for education and social service programs in Israel.

A resolution calling on President Truman and Secretary of State Dean Acheson to support Israel's "just claim to Jerusalem, the ancient mother city" was adopted. Speakers at the convention, which closes today, included Rabbi Wolf Gold, member of the Jewish Agency executive in Jerusalem, Gen. John Hillaring, former Assistant Secretary of State, and Mendel H. Fisher, executive director of the Jewish National Fund. Mrs. Lionel Golub, of New York, was unanimously elected national president.

DR. SIMON BERNSTEIN HONORED IN NEW YORK UPON RETIREMENT FROM "ZIONIST CIVIL SERVICE"

NEW YORK, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Leaders of the Zionist movement today honored Dr. Simon Bernstein, Hebrew scholar and writer, at a luncheon tendered him by the Jewish Agency on the occasion of Dr. Bernstein's retirement after "37 years of Zionist civil service." Speakers included Berl Locker, Agency executive chairman; Dr. Nahum Goldmann, chairman of the Agency's American section; Louis Lipsky, chairman of the American Zionist Council; Daniel Frisch, president of the Zionist Organization of America, and other Zionist leaders.

After joining the Zionist movement in 1912, Dr. Bernstein served in many top Zionist posts. He was director of the Palestine bureau of the Agency since 1922 and supervised the entry of thousands of Jewish refugees to Palestine during World War II. Dr. Bernstein plans to pursue his studies in medieval Hebrew poetry, a field in which he is a recognized authority.

JUNIOR HADASSAH OPENS 26TH ANNUAL CONVENTION IN PITTSBURGH; 1,000 DELEGATES ATTEND

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- The 26th annual convention of Junior Hadassah will open here tomorrow with 1,000 delegates from all sections of the U.S. in attendance. The convention will "formulate plans for implementing a program that calls for greater participation on the part of American Jewish youth in their communities and for their continued aid in helping Israel grow to full political, economic and social security," it was announced.

JACOB GUTMAN ELECTED PRESIDENT OF FEDERATION OF JEWISH CHARITIES OF PHILADELPHIA

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- Jacob C. Gutman, noted civic and philanthropic leader, was elected today president of the Federation of Jewish Charities of Philadelphia. He succeeds Elias Wolf, who retired from the post after the customary three-year period. Other officers of the Federation chosen today include Samuel S. Fels, Joseph J. Gabel, Samuel A. Goldberg and Edward A. Wolf, all vice-presidents; Leonard B. Geis, treasurer; and George M. Kohn, secretary.

OLDEST YIDDISH DAILY NEWSPAPER IN LATIN AMERICA CELEBRATES 35TH ANNIVERSARY

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 22. (JTA) -- The 35th anniversary of the oldest Yiddish daily newspaper in Latin America, the "Yiddische Zeitung," was celebrated here today. The paper, of which Matias Stolar is director, enjoys the largest circulation of any Jewish newspaper in Argentina.
