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U.N. TRUSTEESHIP COUNCIL MEETS TODAY ON JERUSALEM; WILL MAP INTERNATIONALIZATION PLAN

LAKE SUCCESS, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- The question of setting up an international regime in Jerusalem in accordance with the decision of the U.N. General Assembly will be taken up by the U.N. Trusteeship Council tomorrow at a session which will be presided over by French Ambassador Roger Garreau. Ambassador Garreau has indicated that an extraordinary plenary session of the Council on the Jerusalem question might be opened in Geneva January 9.

A spokesman for the American delegation at the United Nations today told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that neither the United States nor Britain favors holding the Trusteeship Council session in Geneva. He added that the U.S. advocates the holding of the January session at Lake Success. The Council is expected to invite Israel and Transjordan to take part in its plan for establishing international control and installing a U.N. Governor over Jerusalem.

ISRAEL CABINET WILL ISSUE DECLARATION TODAY ON JERUSALEM; MAY TRANSFER PARLIAMENT

TEL AVIV, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- The Israel Cabinet will make a declaration in the Knesset tomorrow rejecting the United Nations General Assembly decision to place Jerusalem under an international trusteeship and will insist that the city will remain "forever" the capital of Israel, it was indicated here today.

It was reported here today that the Cabinet, which met on the Jerusalem situation for several hours last night, is determined to transfer the Knesset and a majority of the government offices to Jerusalem.

The Knesset Foreign Affairs Committee today heard a report of the Cabinet discussion of last night. The Herut members of the Committee today renewed their demand for immediate discussion of a bill which their party has introduced in the Knesset calling for immediate proclamation of Jerusalem as Israel's capital.

A stormy meeting of the Mapai Party is currently in session. Members of the party heard the government's intentions today for the first time, and some of them are insisting upon a more moderate position pending the return of Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett. Meanwhile, Menahem Beigin, Herut leader and former chief of the underground Irgun Zvai Leumi, today declared that "if Jerusalem is put under foreign rule the underground will arise again."

Transjordan Offers Terms to Israel for Recognition of Jewish State

JERUSALEM, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- King Abdullah of Transjordan is ready to recognize Israel, return the Old City of Jerusalem to the Jews and open the roads to Mount Scopus and to Latrun, it was reported here today.

In return, Abdullah has asked that Israel grant him an outlet on the Mediterranean Sea, either Haifa or Jaffa, and guarantee that it will not declare war if Transjordan annexes the Arab parts of Palestine. These proposals were made at a recent high-level meeting by Transjordanians and referred to the Israel Government, the report said.

PEOPLE OF ISRAEL WILL WIN ON JERUSALEM ISSUE BY "SITTING TIGHT," SHARETT DECLARES

VINELAND, N.J., Dec. 12. (JTA) -- Israel's Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett, speaking at the dedication ceremony here of a Hachalutz training farm, declared that "the people of Israel will win by simply sitting tight."

"The question is not what Israel will do, but what will the United Nations do?" he asked. "Nothing can dislodge Israel from the position it occupies in Jerusalem or take the city out of the hands of Israel," he added.

The Minister expressed his appreciation of the role played by the United States at the U.N. General Assembly on the question of Jerusalem. "It was one of the few countries that had retained its sense of perspective during the discussions."

BRITISH FOREIGN EXPERTS MEET TO STUDY IMPLICATIONS OF U.N. RESOLUTION ON JERUSALEM

LONDON, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- Foreign Office experts met today to study the full implications of the United Nations General Assembly decision for internationalizing Jerusalem. Serious decisions on the subject will be taken, it is learned, before Secretary Bevin sets out for Colombo, Ceylon, to attend the Jan. 7 conference of Commonwealth foreign ministers.

Spokesmen of the Foreign Office were unwilling today to comment formally on the General Assembly's vote on Jerusalem, beyond reiterating that Britain's decision was firm not to cooperate in implementing the U.N. decision unless both the Arabs of the Old City, controlled by Transjordan, and the Jews of the new city, held by Israel, agreed to it.

Rabbis from the pulpits of synagogues throughout England stressed this weekend that the disappointing decision of the U.N. to internationalize Jerusalem must surely be modified, the U.N. must find some way to adjust the situation, since not only the Jews of the world but also the major powers, such as Britain and the United States, regard it as impracticable.

Neither the Jews of Jerusalem nor elsewhere in Israel are at all perturbed by the U.N. decision to internationalize Jerusalem, the Tel Aviv correspondent of the Times of London writes today. He adds, "the paucity of comment by the usually articulate leaders and the lack of public demonstration best indicate the resolve of this remarkably positive nation."

LITTLE ENTHUSIASM SEEN IN FRENCH PRESS OVER NATION'S VOTE ON JERUSALEM ISSUE AT U.N.

PARIS, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- None of the major French newspapers have expressed approval of France's action in voting for the U.N. resolution to internationalize Jerusalem under the administration of the U.N. Trusteeship Council.

Newspapers of all shades of political opinion are in agreement that the only basic result of the U.N. action has been to bring Israel and Transjordan into agreement--in opposition to the U.N. plan. Most commentators believe that the U.N.'s prestige will suffer when it proves incapable of imposing its solution on the city.

French Zionist circles do not show too much concern over the vote. The general opinion in these circles is that an "unjust and impracticable" decision may, in the long run, prove less harmful to Israel than one which would have offered a few concessions to Israel and which would have been implemented.

GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS STAGE FOUR-HOUR "WARNING STRIKE" IN ISRAEL; DEMAND PROMOTIONS

HAIFA, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- A total of 3,600 Israel Government officials, employed in 45 departments, staged a four-hour "warning strike" and issued an ultimatum that their promotion proposals must be granted by Dec. 20. Failing that, the strikers said they would issue a call for a general strike the following day. All government officials in Afulah, Tiberias and Safed joined the strike.

Premier David Ben Gurion today refused to accept the resignation of Dr. Yacov Shapira, Israel Attorney-General, until the Cabinet had had an opportunity to discuss the matter. Dr. Felix Rosenbluth, Minister of Justice, denied that the proffered resignation had been prompted by differences existing between himself and the Attorney-General.

U.N. OFFICIALS PREVENT ESTABLISHMENT OF HERUT COLONY NEAR ISRAEL-SYRIAN FRONTIER

TEL AVIV, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- A group of settlers, members of the Herut Party, have been prevented from establishing a settlement named Bnei Zfat on land in the Mishmar Hayarden sector by United Nations truce personnel, it was learned today. The U.N. personnel claimed that establishment of such a settlement would violate the Israel-Syrian armistice agreement.

Fourteen new settlements--six individual and eight collective--were established in Israel during November, bringing the year's total to 115, it was announced today. The total number of settlements in the country is now 577.

The first 20 families of a settlement between Petach Tikvah and Yehudia for 100 families of war veterans celebrated today the occupation of their new homes. The middle class village will be called Magshimim. The inhabitants will engage in mixed farming. There are now 30 middle class settlements in Israel, with a total population of 10,000 members.

The 26th settlement in the Negev was established last night by the Hashomer Hatzair. It is one of the most remote outposts in the Negev.

CRIME INCIDENCE IN ISRAEL CORRESPONDS TO AVERAGE IN OTHER COUNTRIES; FEWER MURDERS

LONDON, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- While the crime incidence in Israel corresponds to the average in other countries, except for fewer murders, the attention of the police of the Jewish state is today concentrated on checking the organized infiltration of armed bands and Arab cattle thieves, Yehuskiel Sahar, Inspector General of the Israel police, told a press conference here today.

Inspector Sahar outlined the structure of the tasks of the police force, modelled largely after the British police whose organization methods he came here to study. In reply to questions, he said that "no underground now exists in Israel."

FIRST GROUP OF REPATRIATED ARABS WILL REACH ISRAEL FROM LEBANON TODAY

TEL AVIV, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- The first group of Palestine Arabs to be repatriated from Lebanon to Israel to rejoin their families is due to cross the frontier tomorrow. They will number 77.

CENTRAL JEWISH COMMITTEE IN MUNICH OPPOSES ALL EFFORTS TO KEEP JEWS IN GERMANY

MUNICH, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- The Central Jewish Committee of Germany has issued a statement asserting that it is adhering "strictly" to its promises of liquidating as soon as possible all DP camps in the American zone of Germany and moving the displaced Jews out of this country.

The statement also declared that the Committee does not agree with the Jewish communities in Germany which feel that Jews may rebuild a life in this country. Without specifically naming organizations or individuals involved, the Committee has placed itself on record as opposing all efforts to keep Jews in Germany, and has stated that there "is no possibility" of maintaining an organized Jewish life in Germany.

JEWISH INSTITUTE SUBMITS EVIDENCE AGAINST NAZI WAR CRIMINALS WHO OPERATED IN POLAND

WARSAW, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- The Jewish Historical Institute of Poland, at the request of the chief of the Commission for German War Crimes in Poland, today turned over a substantial amount of evidence against Erich Koch, the "hangman of Bialystok"; Martin Weiss, Nazi gauleiter at Vilno; and M. Thalmer, Gestapo official at the Belohatow camp. All three are to be extradited to Poland to stand trial.

Meanwhile, Polish authorities have decided to erect "museums of martyrdom" not only at Oswiecim and Majdanek but also at Gross-Rosen, where part of the camp buildings of the former extermination center will be preserved. Some objects of the former extermination camps at Sobibor, Belzec, Chelmno and Tremblinka will also be preserved.

BAVARIAN OFFICIALS CHARGED WITH DESECRATING DACHAU GRAVES TO HIDE NAZI CRIMES

PARIS, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- A French commission which investigated the recent desecration of a mass grave of Nazi victims, mostly Jews, at Dachau, has charged that several Bavarian officials were among the Germans responsible for the desecration, it was learned here today.

The report of the commission, which included several deputies in the National Assembly, declared that the Germans were attempting to level the Latenberg Hill, near the grave site, in order to cover up and hide all traces of the Nazi crimes in this area. It is estimated that the remains of some 25,000 victims of the Germans are buried in the area.

U.S. HIGH COMMISSIONER IN GERMANY IS ASKED NOT TO FREE GERMAN WAR CRIMINALS

NEW YORK, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- The World Jewish Congress has called upon U.S. High Commissioner John J. McCloy to firmly reject any demands by the Bonn Government for the freeing of German war criminals, it was announced here today.

The action came after recent reports disclosed that Dr. Thomas Dehler, Minister of Justice in the Western German Government, would ask for a general pardon for German war criminals now serving sentences in the U.S. war crimes prison at Landsberg. Dehler was quoted as saying that such sentences would probably not be passed now since "things are regarded more dispassionately today."

SWASTIKAS PAINTED ON MEMORIAL TABLET FOR NAZI VICTIMS IN AUSTRIA; OFFICIAL BLAMES JEWS

LINZ, Austria, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- Unidentified persons painted swastikas and Nazi storm-trooper signs on the memorial tablet for victims of Nazi concentration camps at Wels, Upper Austria. Members of the Organization of Concentration Camp Inmates protested to the vice-mayor of Wels, a member of the League of Independent Voters. The official replied, when asked whom he believed had committed the desecration, "The Jews I guess."

ASSEMBLY OF JEWISH FEDERATIONS VOTES TO STRENGTHEN NATIONAL FUND RAISING FOR ALL NEEDS

CINCINNATI, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- The General Assembly of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds concluded its session here last night with the adoption of a series of resolutions designed to strengthen 1950 national fund-raising for total Jewish needs in Israel, overseas and in this country. Stanley C. Myers, of Miami, was reelected president of the Council.

The 500 delegates, representing 265 Jewish communities in the United States and Canada, reaffirmed the "right and responsibility" of each community to make the "final determination of its campaign goal and of its budget allocations," but placed upon each community "the responsibility for giving fullest consideration to requests for funds by the United Jewish Appeal and other agencies."

The delegates also acted upon a recommendation of the Committee on Stable and Unified Fund Raising, which sought to develop a closer working partnership between national agencies and the communities which raise funds for all valid Jewish causes. A resolution on this matter urged extension of the principle contained in the recent organization of a joint liaison committee of the Council and the United Jewish Appeal which will consider mutual problems and aid in resolving questions of U.J.A. relationships with communities.

Regarding a suggested national Jewish welfare fund, which would both raise and distribute funds, it was decided that such a fund was neither "feasible nor practicable" at the present time. Another resolution passed by the Assembly urged the establishment in Israel of a central philanthropic fund and budget for all Israel welfare purposes.

The delegates also urged that each community make questions of relationships between the communities and the national and overseas agencies part of the regular business of their boards of directors. Another action cited the "desperate emergency of the United Jewish Appeal for cash" and urged all communities to make every effort to make the maximum amount of cash available to the U.J.A. in the "shortest possible time."

In addition to Mr. Myers, other officers elected included: vice-presidents, Herbert R. Abeles, Newark; Julian Freeman, Indianapolis; Norman S. Goetz, New York; William Rosenwald, New York; and Robert J. Koshland, San Francisco. Milton Kahn, Boston, was reelected secretary, and Sylvan Gotshal, New York, was reelected treasurer.

YESHIVA UNIVERSITY PLANS TO CONFER DOCTOR OF MEDICINE DEGREE; TO HAVE MEDICAL SCHOOL

NEW YORK, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- Yeshiva University is about to apply for the right to amend its charter so that it may include the Doctor of Medicine degree among other degrees which the University now has the right to confer. It was announced here last night at the 21st annual Scholarship Fund dinner for the University, held at the Hotel Astor.

Discussions are now being held to develop plans for closer affiliation among hospitals in New York to make available laboratory and clinical facilities of these institutions to future medical students of Yeshiva University, vice-president Charles H. Silver reported at the dinner.

These and other plans, when completed, will throw open the doors of the first Jewish-sponsored medical school in this country, Mr. Silver stated. He added that "this school will have no other condition for admission except merit." Other speakers at the dinner included Brig. Gen. Carlos P. Romulo, president of the U.N. General Assembly, and Dr. Samuel Belkin, president of the University.

STATE DEPARTMENT CONTRIBUTES SEVERAL THOUSAND SCIENTIFIC BOOKS TO HEBREW UNIVERSITY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- Several thousand scientific and medical volumes were presented last night to the Hebrew University at Jerusalem "as the gift of the American people." The presentation was made to Dr. Maurice Herzmark, president of the local chapter of the American Friends of the University, by Lawrence W. Morris of the State Department. Members of the Israel Embassy staff and other State Department officials attended the presentation ceremony.

The collection, valued at \$25,000, was described as the first part of a perpetual loan to the Hebrew University from the U.S. Library at Tel Aviv. It was said the total value of the book collection may reach \$250,000.

AMERICAN JEWISH CONGRESS SAYS U.N.'S DECISION ON JERUSALEM IS "FLIGHT FROM REASON"

NEW YORK, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- The executive committee of the American Jewish Congress yesterday termed the U.N. General Assembly's decision to set up an international regime for Jerusalem as a "flight from reason and reality powered by vested interests, unsavory political ambitions and persistent anti-Israel animus."

The Agudas Israel World organization, at an executive board meeting, adopted a resolution declaring that the "Jewish people, indissolubly connected with the Holy City of Jerusalem, will never agree to any form of separation from it." The resolution added that "since implementation of the decision might lead to serious disorders and unrest, Agudas Israel appeals to the U.N. not to implement its decision and reconsider the question of Jerusalem."

B'NAI B'RITH PRESIDENT CALLS FOR FORMATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS COMMISSION IN U.S.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- Frank Goldman of Lowell, Mass., president of B'nai B'rith, last night called for the establishment of a national commission on human rights in the United States, as a step toward safeguarding civil rights and fundamental freedoms. Addressing the 90th anniversary dinner of Rehovoth Lodge of B'nai B'rith, he said: "If we want the protection of human rights, and the fight against violations of human rights to be more than a pious wish, we should do something about it now."

HIAS COUNCIL OF ORGANIZATIONS PARLEY ASKS NEW OR AMENDED DP IMMIGRATION MEASURE

NEW YORK, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- A resolution asking Congress for the adoption of a new DP immigration law or an amended form of the present act was adopted here last night at the 20th annual convention of the HIAS Council of Organizations.

Another of the eight resolutions adopted unanimously denied charges of dual allegiance which have been "carelessly levelled at some Jews in this country." Among the featured speakers at the parley were Edward J. Shaughnessy, director of the New York District of the Immigration and Naturalization Service; Samuel Talsey, president of HIAS, and Vincent Impellitteri, president of the New York City Council and Acting Mayor.

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS SENDS EXPEDITION TO MT. SINAI TO FILM ANCIENT MANUSCRIPTS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12. (JTA) -- The Library of Congress has sent an expedition to the Mt. Sinai area to microfilm more than 500,000 pages of ancient manuscripts, it was revealed today. The expedition will leave Philadelphia by ship tomorrow.
