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U.N. COUNCIL GETS PLAN TO LEAVE PART OF JERUSALEM UNDER JEWISH ADMINISTRATION

GENEVA, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- A plan for organizing the territory of Jerusalem as a "corpus separatum" under the general sovereignty of the United Nations, but at the same time dividing the territory into three portions to be administered respectively by Israel, Jordan and the U.N. was today presented to the U.N. Trusteeship Council by its president, Roger Garreau of France.

The "corpus separatum," Ambassador Garreau proposed, would be established within the boundaries envisaged by the U.N. General Assembly decision to internationalize Jerusalem. It would be under an international regime which would ensure the demilitarization and neutralization of the area. In addition, the territory would be constituted as an economic free zone with neither Israel nor Jordan having any power to collect duties on goods entering or leaving any part of the zone. Freedom of movement and access to the Holy Places in the territory would be guaranteed.

Under Ambassador Garreau's plan practically the entire new city would be placed under the authority and administration of Israel, together with the central railway station and the Jerusalem-Tel Aviv railroad. Two Arab quarters of the Old City, together with the Harem Al Sherif, Wadi el Joz and Ab el Zahira sections, as well as the entire American Colony, the Jericho Road, the Nablus Road to the north of the Sheikh Jerrach quarter and the Hebron Road to the southern portion of Bethlehem would be placed under the authority and administration of Jordan.

The final section of the zone would be organized as an "International City" under the collective sovereignty of the United Nations and the administration of the Trusteeship Council which would appoint as its representative a Governor of the Holy Places. The historical basis of the "International City" is a decree of 1757 of the Turkish Empire.

Hebrew University To Remain in U.N. Zone; Discussion Adjourned For A Week

The sector under U.N. administration would embrace an area taken in almost equal part from armistice-defined occupation zones held by Israel and Jordan. Included in this area would be: the Walling Wall; the Church of the Holy Sepulchre; all of Mt. Zion; the Mount of Olives; and, Mt. Scopus, including the road to the height and the Hadassah Hospital and Hebrew University. The actual territory to be taken from Israel and Jordan to make up the "International City" has not yet been defined.

Following an attack on the Garreau working paper by the Iraqi delegate to the Council, the members of that body voted to adjourn all discussion of the proposal until next Monday. The Philippine delegate supported the Iraqi opposition to the plan. The Council also decided to hear all interested parties during the debate on the future of Jerusalem, but would not extend a special invitation to either Israel or Jordan.

(The State Department is attempting to convince the Israel Government to accept the Garreau plan, promising that far reaching changes will be made in it, it was learned in Tel Aviv today. The Israel Government, however, has refused to enter

into any negotiations on the proposal. Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett will appear before Parliament tomorrow to report on the situation in relation to the plan.)

Inhabitants of U.N. Zone May Choose "International City" Citizenship

Under the plan presented today by Mr. Garreau to the Trusteeship Council, the inhabitants of the "International City" could either retain their present nationality or opt for citizenship of the "International City." They would elect, by universal suffrage, a municipal council whose composition would be determined in such a manner as would ensure equitable representation of the various religions, and which would administer the "International City" under the supervision of the Holy Places Governor. The Governor would accredit representatives to Israel and Jordan to ensure protection in those states of the interests of the "International City" and its citizens.

The Governor would be assisted by an advisory council whose main function would be to ensure good relations between the various religions and to settle religious disputes. He would also exercise, on behalf of the United Nations, the right to protect the Holy Places, religious institutions and sites situated outside the city in any part of Palestine. The Governor would direct the external affairs of the "International City" and would have at his disposal an international police force recruited by him without distinction as to nationality.

The statute would remain in force for a period of ten years, unless the Council thought it necessary to review its provisions at an earlier date, in which case the Council would amend those provisions as it thought fit. On the expiration of the ten-year period, the whole of the statute would be reviewed by the Trusteeship Council in the light of the experience acquired during the application of its provisions. The population of the "International City" would then be entitled to make known by referendum, their views on possible changes in the regime of the city, and the Council would in due course prescribe procedure for the carrying out of the referendum.

U.N. CONCILIATION COMMISSION FAVORS DIRECT CONTACT BETWEEN ISRAEL AND ARAB STATES

GENEVA, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- The establishment of direct contact between the representatives of Israel and the Arab states is "indispensable" if the U.N. Conciliation Commission on Palestine is to continue to mediate effectively between them, a Commission communique said today.

The communique was issued this afternoon after the members of the three-nation body had had their first formal meeting with Arab and Israel delegates since reopening of the latest series of sessions. The statement also revealed that the Commission has not yet determined its attitude toward an Arab request that the body prepare a plan on which to base its mediation efforts.

Gideon Raphael, Israel representative to the mediation sessions, expressed his government's desire to cooperate with the Conciliation Commission, but stressed that in that event the "era of shadow boxing" must end. For Israel, the test of Arab sincerity is Arab preparedness to enter into direct negotiations, he said, adding that Israel is opposed to mediation by the Commission as a substitute for direct negotiations.

Mr. Raphael also said that it was the view of his government that a protocol signed by Israel and the Arab states before the Commission at Lausanne last May 12 is no longer of practical value. (The details of the document were never made public.)

DIRECT TALKS BETWEEN ISRAEL AND JORDAN RESUMED; ISRAEL OFFERS PASSAGE TO JORDAN

JERUSALEM, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- Direct peace talks between Israel and Jordan were resumed today, it was reported in well-informed circles here this afternoon. Jordan, it was learned, is requesting Haifa as an outlet to the Mediterranean, with a "corridor" to the port in which Arab refugees from Palestine should be settled.

The Israel Government, it was understood, has rejected this demand, but is offering Jordan a passage through Israel territory to the port of Gaza, which is in Egyptian hands. For the time being, this counterproposal has been rejected by Jordan. The final decision, it is believed here, will depend on the outcome of the present talks between England and Egypt and whether the British Government succeeds in persuading Egypt to hand over the city of Gaza to King Abdullah of Jordan.

The British-controlled Near East radio said in a broadcast today that Jordan is now more than ever anxious for peace with Israel. The main aims of Jordan, the broadcast said, are: to establish commercial links with Israel, to get a free passage through Israel territory to the Mediterranean and to reach a compromise with Israel on the status of Jerusalem.

NEW FOOD CONTROLS DUE, ISRAEL RATIONING MINISTER SAYS; SEEKS FOOD FROM U.S.

JERUSALEM, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- The Israel man-in-the-street is due to take another notch in his belt, Dr. Dov Joseph, Minister for Supply and Rationing, indicated here today at a press conference. Minister Joseph announced that additional controls will be placed on food production throughout the country.

At the same time, the Minister revealed that negotiations are being conducted with the United States for the export to Israel of low-priced food. The Minister also reported that the Israel Government intends to increase the area of agricultural land in this country, which is used for direct food production.

The Ministry of Agriculture announced today that there will be an ample supply of potatoes in Israel this year. It revealed that thousands of acres of land have been put under potato cultivation, which is 10 times the potato area. The Ministry also announced that plans are being worked out to restore the country's olive groves for the purpose of increasing olive production.

A herd of 700 cattle arrived here from the United States. They were purchased from funds allocated from the U.S. \$100,000,000 loan. This is the second shipment of choice cattle to arrive from the U.S.

THREE ARABS KILLED BY ISRAEL PATROLS WHEN THEY ATTEMPT TO INFILTRATE JEWISH AREAS

TEL AVIV, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- Three Arabs were killed and three captured last night in a clash with Israel Army detachments which developed when the Arabs attempted to infiltrate Israel territory near Rehovot and Nathanya, it was reported today.

The first two Israel families have taken up permanent residence in Elath, southernmost tip of Israel located on the Gulf of Aqaba, it was disclosed today.

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BRITAIN SATISFIED WITH RELATIONS WITH ISRAEL; DE JURE RECOGNITION NOT IMMINENT

LONDON, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- An authoritative British source today discounted a statement made at a recent meeting of the Board of Deputies of British Jews to the effect that British de jure recognition of Israel could be expected in the near future.

"We are quite happy with the present relationship," the same source said. He pointed out that full relations exist in the spirit, if not in the letter. Formal de jure recognition, he suggested, may follow conclusion of a peace treaty with at least one Arab country and definition of Israel's borders.

The first national Mizrachi conference in Britain since the establishment of the state of Israel unanimously adopted a resolution calling on the British Government and other countries to "give every support" to the new state to enable it to carry out its large-scale programs of immigrant absorption.

U.S. AND BRITAIN CRITICIZED AT LONDON MEETING FOR STAND ON SHIPPING ARMS TO ARABS

LONDON, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- The United States and Britain were criticized at a mass meeting here last night for the British shipment of arms to the Arab countries and American approval of this policy.

The meeting marked the opening of a campaign by the Zionist Federation of Britain against the United Nations decision to place Jerusalem under international trusteeship. In criticism of the idea of internationalizing Jerusalem, it was stated that it would be "~~fatal~~ to turn Jerusalem into another Berlin or Trieste."

ACHESON ASSAILED BY FRISCH FOR JUSTIFYING SHIPMENT OF BRITISH ARMS TO ARAB STATES

NEW YORK, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- Secretary of State Dean Acheson was accused last night by Daniel Frisch, president of the Zionist Organization of America, of "invoking British treaties to justify British arms shipments to Arab states." Mr. Frisch, who was scheduled to address a dinner tendered in his honor at the Hotel Waldorf-Astoria by Bnai Zion, was unable to appear because of illness. His address was read for him by Mendel Fisher, executive director of the Jewish National Fund.

"If the State Department is so firmly convinced of the peaceful intentions of the Arab states," Mr. Frisch declared, "why not have the United States guarantee the security of Israel against any attack? The shipment of arms to the Arab states in the midst of this inflammable situation in the Middle East is clearly pouring oil on the fire of war against Israel, treaty or no treaty," he added.

Aubrey S. Eban, Israel delegate to the United Nations who was also scheduled to address the dinner, revealed in a message that he was "summoned to Jerusalem for urgent consultations." Mr. Eban stated that "were the authority of the government of Israel to be removed from Jerusalem today, the life and civilization of the city would fall, operate in anarchy and ruin."

Other speakers included Louis Lipsky, chairman of the American Zionist Council; Prof. Selig Brodetsky, president of the Hebrew University who is now visiting the U.S.; and Harry A. Pine, president of Bnai Zion.

MAJOR JEWISH ORGANIZATIONS DENOUNCE "LIBERALIZED" DP BILL ADOPTED BY SENATE COMMITTEE

NEW YORK, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- Jewish organizations in the United States today denounced the amended Displaced Persons Bill as adopted last week by the Senate Judiciary Committee. In a statement issued through the National Community Relations Advisory Council, the coordinating body of these organizations, it was emphasized that the bill in its amended form "would defeat and subvert the very purpose of displaced persons legislation."

In identical letters to all members of the U.S. Senate, the members of the Upper House were urged to vote against the bill as reported by the Senate Judiciary Committee on January 25. The letter was signed by Jacob Blaustein, president of the American Jewish Committee; Rabbi Irving Miller, president of the American Jewish Congress; Meier Steinbrink, national chairman of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith; Adolph Held, chairman of the Jewish Labor Committee; Jackson J. Holtz, national commander of the Jewish War Veterans of the United States; Rabbi Maurice N. Eisendrath, president of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations; Irving Kane, chairman of the National Community Relations Advisory Council; and Mrs. Irving M. Engel, president of the National Council of Jewish Women.

The Senators were urged to take the following actions to meet the major objections in the Committee's bill: 1. Retain the definition of displaced persons contained in the existing Act; 2. Eliminate all provisions for mortgaging of future quotas; 3. Join the House of Representatives in eliminating the 40 percent priority to displaced persons from areas which have been de facto annexed by a foreign power; 4. Eliminate all provisions for special benefits to particular groups of displaced persons, which are not extended to the entire body of displaced persons.

Also, 5. Eliminate the inferential endorsement of racism implicit in the so-called "volksdeutsche" provision; 6. Join the House of Representatives in eliminating from the existing Act the 30 percent preference for agriculturists; 7. Retain in the Displaced Persons Commission the responsibility for selection and authority for determination of eligibility; and 8. Retain the language of the existing Act with regard to exclusion of undemocratic elements.

ISRAEL NEEDS AMERICAN "KNOW-HOW," AMBASSADOR ELATH TELLS JEWISH WORKERS CONVENTION

ASBURY PARK, N.J., Jan. 30. (JTA) -- Addressing the convention of the Jewish National Workers Alliance here, Israel Ambassador Elisha Elath last night stressed that Israel needs "American know-how." He said: "We need experts to show us the way to perfect methods of building and work, to raise our agricultural and industrial production and help us to use the new techniques."

Louis Segal, general secretary of the organization, presiding at today's session, told the delegates that since the last convention in 1946, the number of English-speaking branches of the Alliance has doubled, reaching a total of 66. The report of the general executive committee, presented today, gave the assets of the Alliance as \$2,300,479.00. A total of 11,001 new members, it was reported, were enrolled in the past three years.

MORGENTHAU RETURNS FROM ISRAEL; WARNS AGAINST FAILURE TO HELP JEWS LEAVE ARAB LANDS

NEW YORK, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- Henry Morgenthau, Jr., general chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, returned today from Israel with the warning that the failure of American Jews to provide adequate funds through the United Jewish Appeal may doom the many thousands of Jews in Arab lands "to live out their lives under abject suffering and poverty." He said that "the Jews of Israel will not stand for any limitation of immigration."

OVER 90 PERCENT OF MIXED MARRIAGES ARE FAILURES, RABBINICAL PARLEY IN BOSTON HEARS

BOSTON, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- More than 90 percent of mixed marriages have turned out to be unsuccessful, Rabbi Israel Tabak, president of the Rabbinical Council of America, said today in opening a two-day conference of the Council, which represents some 400 American-trained Orthodox rabbis.

Declaring that intermarriage "tends to weaken the stamina of American population," Dr. Tabak called upon the Jews of America "to be alert and on guard against its spread." He emphasized that not only are intermarriages against the most hallowed principles of the Jewish faith, but they "undermine the stability of the home, increase the number of unhappy marriages, and bring children into the world with a rift in their souls which can never be healed."

KU KLUX KLAN GROUPS MERGE; DECLARE WAR AGAINST B'NAI B'RITH AND OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Jan. 30. (JTA) -- "War" against the B'nai B'rith, the Federal Council of Churches of Christ of America and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People was declared here last night in a statement issued by leaders of three Ku Klux Klan groups which were merged into a united body.

The three groups are: the Federated Klans of Alabama, the Southern Knights of the Ku Klux Klan and the Association of Carolina Klans. The only Ku Klux Klan groups which are still outside the united Klan is the Klavern of Atlanta.

DELEGATION OF JEWS AND NON-JEWS ASKS ONTARIO PREMIER FOR MORE LAWS AGAINST BIAS

TORONTO, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- "Canada has been built on a cornerstone of tolerance to all races and creeds, and has been an example to the world in this respect," Premier Frost of Ontario told a delegation here which presented a brief asking for more extensive laws against racial and religious discrimination.

The delegation, which represented 70 Jewish and non-Jewish organizations, asked that present legislation be extended to combat discrimination in employment, housing and public places. The Premier emphasized that he will protect the interests of the minorities. He pointed out, however, that "the attitude taken generally in this country shows that many races can live and progress together."

DR. BUNCHE NAMED TO RECEIVE 1950 INTERFAITH AWARD OF JEWISH WAR VETERANS

NEW YORK, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- Dr. Ralph Bunche, director of the United Nations Trusteeship Council, has been named to receive the 1950 Interfaith Award of the New York Department of the Jewish War Veterans, it was announced today by Arthur J. Aronson, department commander.

The award is for Dr. Bunche's "outstanding contributions in the betterment of human relations among all peoples," Mr. Aronson said. In the form of a plaque, the award will be given to Dr. Bunche on May 17.

ANFENGER NAMED HEAD OF DENVER JEWISH HOSPITAL; SECOND HALF-CENTURY OF SERVICE BEGINS

DENVER, Jan. 30. (JTA) -- Milton L. Anfenger has been reelected president of the National Jewish Hospital of Denver, it was announced here today. The Hospital is now entering its second half-century of service to the nation's needy tuberculous. Opened in 1899 by B'nai B'rith, the hospital has given more than 3,100,000 free patient days care to persons from every state in the U.S.
