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BIG POWERS URGE U.N. TRUSTEESHIP COUNCIL TO REFER JERUSALEM ISSUE BACK TO ASSEMBLY

LAKE SUCCESS, June 12. (JTA) -- A resolution proposing that the U.N. Trusteeship Council refer the Jerusalem issue back to the General Assembly, together with the new Israel plan to place the Holy Places under a U.N. protectorate rather than to place the entire Jerusalem area under international trusteeship, was recommended today by a number of delegations at the Council session here at which the Jerusalem problem came up for discussion.

The Council decided to postpone decision on this resolution until Wednesday, at the same time instructing the Secretariat to prepare a report by tomorrow afternoon on the deliberations conducted by the Council with regard to the Jerusalem question. The proposal to refer the entire issue to the General Assembly was supported by the United States, Britain, France, Belgium and other countries. It would have been voted upon tonight if not for a request by the Philippine delegate to delay the vote in order to give him the opportunity to consult with his government.

The U.S. told the Trusteeship Council that it was "impracticable at this time to proceed with the implementation of the statute for Jerusalem" and, in conjunction with Britain and New Zealand, proposed that the question be referred back to the Assembly for further consideration.

Referring to the Israel proposal for a U.N. protectorate for the Holy Places, the three nations maintained that the Council was not the place to consider the merits of this proposal but suggested that it be included in the Council reports to the Assembly. U.S. delegate Francis B. Sayre declared that "it is still our hope that the two governments most directly concerned will be able to agree on arrangements for Jerusalem which would be satisfactory to them and to the interests of the world community in that city."

Aubrey S. Eban, Israel delegate to the U.N. and Ambassador to the U.S., told the Council that the Jewish state had no objections to deferment of consideration of its proposal until the Assembly meets. In fact, he said, the new Israel plan had been drawn up "to illuminate in advance certain lines along which the General Assembly might proceed" on the question of Jerusalem.

Israel is content, he added, to have its proposal discussed by the Assembly and asked only that the Council submit the proposal in full in its report to the Assembly. He took sharp issue with the delegate of Iraq, Awni Khalidi, who in a speech to the Council reiterated the Arabs' firm stand for complete internationalization of the Holy City. In his address he bitterly assailed former Council president Roger Garreau, of France, as well as the Israel proposal.

In reply, M. Garreau repeated that in his last week's report to the Council he had not changed his own support for internationalization but had only given an objective account of Israel's cooperation and good faith in dealing with him and the Council and the "absurdity" of Jordan's failure to cooperate.

Earlier, Israel, in the first opportunity offered it so far to express a view on the Chinese representation issue in the United Nations, joined eight other nations to vote in favor of inviting Communist China to send a representative to the U.N. Technical Assistance Conference, which opened today.

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ISRAEL'S NEW OFFER ON HOLY PLACES IS "SACRIFICE OF SOVEREIGNTY," DR. GOLDMANN SAYS

NEW YORK, June 12. (JTA) -- Dr. Mahum Goldmann, chairman of the American Section of the Jewish Agency, today issued a statement declaring Israel's offer to hand over its Holy Places to the custody of the United Nations to be a "significant sacrifice of sovereignty in the interests of permanent peace and of friendly relations with the Christian and Moslem worlds." The statement reads:

"Israel's offer to turn over the Holy Places in its area to the custody of the United Nations represents a magnificent sacrifice of sovereignty in the interests of permanent peace and of friendly relations with the Christian and Moslem worlds. It must be emphasized that from the day the state was proclaimed, the government and people of Israel pledged themselves to protect the Holy Places and to keep them accessible to the people of all faiths.

"In its desire to meet the complaints of those who professed dissatisfaction with such national guarantees, the Israel Government last year offered to enter into agreements with the Secretary General of the United Nations concerning the safety and accessibility of the Holy Places. This year Israel is prepared to yield infinitely more - it is ready to relinquish its sovereign rights in portions of its own sovereign area to the General Assembly of the United Nations.

"This is an offer unprecedented in history. It reflects Israel's unshakable will to peace and its loyalty to the U.N., and at the same time provides a basis for a just and durable solution of the Jerusalem problem. Already endorsed in principle by a distinguished list of Christian leaders in the United States and elsewhere, the offer must surely commend itself to men of good will everywhere."

Ex-Colonial Minister Terms Israel's Proposals on Jerusalem "Sensible"

JERUSALEM, June 12. (JTA) -- "Israel's proposals for the settlement of the Jerusalem question are sensible and quite sufficient," Leopold Amery, former British Colonial Minister, told correspondents here after returning from a visit to King Abdullah of Transjordan. "I met a sincere will for peace among responsible leaders on both sides of the Jordan, and detected nothing irreconcilable in their viewpoints," he said.

The former Minister paid high praise to the constructive work in both countries, especially in Israel. "Your state will be able to truly and speedily develop when there will be peace, which is essential to both Israel and Jordan, and I sincerely hope peace will come soon," he said.

KING ABDULLAH IS URGED TO REPLACE ARMISTICE AGREEMENT WITH NON-AGGRESSION PACT

LONDON, June 12. (JTA) -- Emphasizing that both Israel and Jordan are trying to prevent frontier incidents, the London Times said in an editorial that the incidents which have developed during the last few days on the Israel-Jordan border show the need of replacing the armistice agreement by at least a formal non-aggression pact. The editorial points out that Jordan cannot conclude a peace pact without risking expulsion from the Arab league.

"The Government of Israel," the British newspaper said, "has more than once declared its readiness to enter peace negotiations with Jordan as with other Arab states." The editorial pointed out that Abdullah very badly needs an outlet on the Mediterranean which Israel could give him.

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HOSTILITIES CONTINUE ALONG ISRAEL-TRANSJORDAN BORDER; U.N. CHIEF MAY ENTER PICTURE

TEL AVIV, June 12. (JTA) -- The hostilities along the Transjordan-Israel border in the Hebron area continued today and show no signs of ending, it was reported here. At the same time, it began to look as though U.N. Chief of Staff Gen. William E. Riley might take a hand in the deadlocked unofficial negotiations which have not yet succeeded in ending the raids by Transjordan infiltrators in the Negev and Jerusalem areas.

A last-minute hitch today developed in plans to send mixed Israel-Transjordan patrols out along mutual borders. The Arab Legion failed to keep its promise to release three Israel soldiers apprehended after they accidentally crossed the lines into Transjordan territory, and the Israel Army has refused to enter into the new arrangement until the three are freed.

INQUIRY COMMISSION ON RELIGIOUS EDUCATION IN CAMPS PUBLISHES REPORT; EXONERATES GOVT.

JERUSALEM, June 12. (JTA) -- A special commission or inquiry appointed by the Israel Cabinet to study education among Orthodox children in the immigrant camps, a situation which several months ago presented the coalition government with its first major crisis, today published a 131-page report of its findings.

The report, which was completed May 9 after the members of the commission heard 101 witnesses at 33 sessions, clears the government of coercion in forcing Yemenite youths to have their sideburns shorn. The report says that a "mistake was made" in handing over the education of immigrant children, especially those from Yemen and North Africa, to an "incompetent" Jewish Agency staff.

Although Nahum Lewin, director of the Agency cultural department, who was responsible for the education program in the camps, was cleared of charges of "inquisitorial action and destruction of culture," he was held responsible for a "serious deficiency in religious education" in the camps. It was learned last week that Mr. Lewin had resigned his post.

The commission also stated that it did not consider messages sent abroad by the Religious Bloc, at the time of the Cabinet crisis, prior to the formation of the commission, to have been prompted by anti-government intentions.

ISRAEL YOUTHS LEAVE FOR UNITED STATES TO RECEIVE TRAINING AS AVIATION MECHANICS

TEL AVIV, June 12. (JTA) -- Fifty-one Israeli youths last night took off from here on the first leg of the first trans-Atlantic flight from Israel to the United States ever flown by a plane of the El Al Company, government-subsidized airline.

The 51 will spend one year in an American civilian training school learning aviation mechanics. They were chosen from among hundreds of applicants who underwent a rigorous examination for the course.

HISTADRUT OPPOSES SOCIALIZED MEDICINE; WANTS INDEPENDENCE FOR OWN MEDICAL SYSTEM

HAIFA, June 12. (JTA) -- Opposition to socialized medicine in Israel was expressed in a resolution adopted last night at the closing session of the convention of Kupat Holim, the medical and health insurance organization maintained by Israel's Federation of Labor. The resolution urged the organization to remain independent, but also asks the government to grant an allotment toward the Kupat Holim budget.

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ITALY RESTORES BUSINESS RIGHTS TO PERSONS VICTIMIZED BY FASCIST RACIAL LAWS

ROME, June 12. (JTA) -- Italian Jews who, for racial or political reasons, lost the right to operate pharmacies or sell certain types of goods during the fascist regime now have that right restored to them under a law promulgated by the Italian Government.

WORLD BROTHERHOOD ORGANIZATION FORMED IN PARIS; RELIGIOUS GROUPS MEET TO EXPAND IT

PARIS, June 12. (JTA) -- A two-day conference of religious organizations will open at Strasbourg tomorrow to create a commission of religious organizations of World Brotherhood, a new organization formed here last night after a four-day conference, which was attended by over 150 delegates from 12 nations.

World Brotherhood was established to promote "amity, understanding and co-operation" among peoples of various races, religions, nationalities and cultures. The movement is an outgrowth of the National Conference of Christians and Jews in the United States.

Endorsing the formation of the body, Dr. Isaye Schwartz, Chief Rabbi of France, declared: "At the present time, when so many clouds are accumulating on the horizon, there is no task more holy and more necessary than that presented to us." Among the members of an interim committee formed at the conference are Everett R. Clinchy, head of the National Conference of Christians and Jews; Roger Strauss, chairman of the board of the American Smelting and Refining Company; and Arthur H. Compton, American educator, scientist and pioneer in atomic research.

EAST BERLIN MAYOR ORDERS PROSECUTION OF VANDALS WHO DESECRATE JEWISH CEMETERIES

BERLIN, June 12. (JTA) -- East Berlin's Mayor, Friedrich Ebert, has ordered the public prosecutor to vigorously prosecute and punish "all acts of vandalism against Jewish cemeteries."

Mayor Ebert also sent a letter of regret to the Jewish community of Berlin for the recent desecrations of the Jewish cemetery in Weissensee, in the Soviet sector of the city. He stated that "criminal elements" in his portion of the city had been "encouraged" by the open toleration of anti-Semitic behavior in West Germany."

LOYALTY OF BRITISH JEWS TO BRITAIN STRESSED AT CONFERENCE OF ANGLO-JEWISH ASSOCIATION

LONDON, June 12. (JTA) -- Ewen Montagu, president of the Anglo-Jewish Association, this week-end reaffirmed the "allegiance and loyalty" of British Jews to Britain. He spoke at the first provincial conference of the organization, which was held at Birmingham this week-end with delegates from all parts of the country attending.

Leonard Stein, former president of the A.J.A., declared that to British Jews, as well as to other Englishmen, Israel is a foreign country. However, he stressed that to Jews it means more than other foreign countries. During a discussion of the situation of the Jews in Eastern European countries, Montague said that he felt that intervention in their behalf was "unfortunately likely to do more harm than good."

RABBINICAL COUNCIL PARLEY TO STUDY RELATIONS WITH JEWISH PHILANTHROPIC GROUPS IN U.S.

CHICAGO, June 12. (JTA) -- The relationship between Orthodox Jewry in the United States and "Jewish philanthropic agencies which flaunt the Sabbath and violate dietary laws at public conferences and gatherings" will be deliberated at the annual convention of the Rabbinical Council of America, which opened the first of its four-day sessions here today with delegates from 40 states and Canada in attendance.

Rabbi Theodore L. Adams, of Jersey City, N.J., convention chairman, announced that the delegates will also "establish a relationship with Israel's religious Jewry and devise means of securing financial independence for schools of Jewish learning in this country and Israel." Rabbi Israel Tabak, of Baltimore, president of the Council, announced he would recommend the convocation of a national conference of Orthodox institutions in the U.S. to deliberate on common problems. The convention will also endeavor to work out a "unified program of standards for Orthodox synagogues" in the United States, it was announced.

CENTRAL CONFERENCE OF AMERICAN RABBIS ELECTS RABBI PHILIP BERNSTEIN AS PRESIDENT

CINCINNATI, June 12. (JTA) -- Rabbi Philip S. Bernstein, of Rochester, N.Y., was elected president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis last night at the current session of the organization. He succeeds Dr. Jacob Marcus, of Cincinnati, who declined renomination.

Earlier, delegates attending the Conference's symposium on "The Future of the American Jewish Community" heard Dr. Abba Hillel Silver assert that the Jewish community in the United States "owes to itself and to history to take over its full measure of responsibility for carrying on the historic work of Judaism." Dr. Abram L. Sachar, president of Brandeis University, also addressed the symposium.

HIAS ASKS U.S. RELATIVES OF DP IMMIGRANTS TO FILE JOB, HOUSING ASSURANCES NOW

NEW YORK, June 12. (JTA) -- Pointing to the passage of the liberalized DP immigration measure by both Houses of Congress, HIAS today called on all persons in this country who intend to execute housing and job assurances for DP's to do so at once. The appeal pointed out that such assurances have in many cases been delayed because relatives in DP camps were ineligible under the old law, adding that immigrants are processed in the order in which assurances of housing and jobs for them are filed.

FUND ESTABLISHED BY A.D.L. IN MEMORY OF SIGMUND LIVINGSTON, FOUNDER OF ORGANIZATION

NEW YORK, June 12. (JTA) -- Establishment of a Sigmund Livingston Memorial Fund to honor the Midwest lawyer and Jewish communal leader who founded the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith was announced here today on the fourth anniversary of his death. Organized by a group of the late attorney's friends and associates in the A.D.L., the fund will be used for fellowships and scientific studies at various colleges and universities in the fields of intergroup and human relations and prejudice.

Born in Germany in 1872, Mr. Livingston arrived in this country as a child. His family settled in Bloomington, Ill., where he attended school. After passing the Illinois bar he began the practice of law in Chicago. In 1913 Mr. Livingston suggested the creation of a special committee within the B'nai B'rith to campaign against anti-Semitism and the defamation of Jews. He was chosen head of this ad hoc group which was later replaced by the formal establishment of the Anti-Defamation League.

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BRITH ABRAHAM CONVENTION AWARDS FIRST STEPHEN WISE PLAQUE TO HENRY MORGENTHAU

ATLANTIC CITY, June 12. (JTA) -- Henry Morgenthau Jr., general chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, was today awarded the first Stephen S. Wise Memorial Plaque by the Independent Order Brith Abraham for distinguished service in behalf of the rescue and rehabilitation of displaced Jews.

The presentation was announced at the convention now in session here of the Order. Governor Thomas Dewey of New York, in a message to the convention, said he was "deeply happy" over the success of the state's new legislation combatting employment discrimination.

FIFTEEN STUDENTS ARE GRADUATED FROM HEBREW TEACHERS COLLEGE IN BOSTON

BOSTON, June 12. (JTA) -- Fifteen students were graduated from the Hebrew Teachers College here yesterday, with seven receiving the degree of Bachelor of Hebrew Education and the other eight teacher diplomas. Dr. Horace M. Kallen, of the New School of Social Research, New York, delivered the commencement address.

DULUTH RABBI RECEIVES HONORARY DEGREE FROM CONGREGATIONALIST COLLEGE IN WISCONSIN

DULUTH, Minn., June 12. (JTA) -- Rabbi William B. Silverman, spiritual leader of Temple Emanuel here, was awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity by Northland College, Ashland, Wisc., at commencement exercises held yesterday. The Congregationalist school of higher learning honored Rabbi Silverman for promoting inter-faith understanding in his community.

HARRY GREENSTEIN, FORMER ADVISER ON JEWISH AFFAIRS TO AMG, AWARDED HONORARY DOCTORATE

BALTIMORE, June 12. (JTA) -- Harry Greenstein, executive director of the Associated Jewish Charities here and formerly adviser on Jewish affairs to the U.S. High Command in Germany and Austria, was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Laws degree by the University of Maryland. Mr. Greenstein served in the early 1930's as Civil Works Administrator of Maryland.

EDDIE CANTOR ARRIVES IN ISRAEL; MET BY U.S. AMBASSADOR; JASCHA HEIFETZ LEAVES ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, June 12. (JTA) -- Eddie Cantor, famous American comedian who is one of the most active personalities in the United Jewish Appeal, arrived today in Israel. Mr. Cantor was met at the airport by U.S. Ambassador James G. McDonald, and representatives of the Israel Government and the Jewish Agency as well as by a huge crowd of newsmen and admirers.

The world-renowned violinist Jascha Heifetz left Israel last night at the conclusion of a successful series of concerts performed in various parts of the Jewish state. Before boarding the plane, Mr. Heifetz expressed satisfaction with his Israel tour and promised to return for further concerts.

JOSEPH SPRINZAK, SPEAKER OF KNESSET, LEAVES ARGENTINA FOR VISIT TO URUGUAY

BUENOS AIRES, June 12. (JTA) -- Joseph Sprinzak, Speaker of the Israel parliament, left here for Uruguay after spending more than a fortnight in this country aiding the current United Israel Campaign.

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
