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ISRAEL CABINET DISCUSSES FOREIGN POLICY IN LIGHT OF KOREAN CONFLICT; GETS U.N. RESOLUTION

JERUSALEM, June 28. (JTA) -- The Korean situation, although not directly affecting Israel, was discussed today by the Israel Cabinet. Foreign policy questions were reviewed at the meeting in terms of the latest international developments.

It was learned here today that the U.N. Security Council's resolution on Korea was received yesterday by the Israel Government. An acknowledgment of its receipt was cabled today by Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett to U.N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie.

At today's Cabinet meeting agreement was reached on suggestions to be submitted to the Israel Parliament regarding the naming of a deputy for President Chaim Weizmann to replace him during his absence. Dr. Weizmann is expected to leave soon for a rest in Switzerland.

Problems concerning the continuation of the emergency law on military security were also discussed at the session. Full accord was reached by all members of the Cabinet with regard to these problems. Rabbi J.L. Maimon, Minister of Religion, did not participate in today's meeting although it was announced yesterday by the Religious Bloc that he would remain in the Cabinet. Rabbi Maimon walked out of a Cabinet meeting last week in protest against the government's decision to import non-Kosher meat from the United States.

Meanwhile, the Israel Parliament passed a 59,465,000-pound (\$166,502,000) revenue bill for the current fiscal year. The vote was 60-34. The Parliament added an anticipated 4,500,000 pounds to the bill after it was submitted by the government. This was accomplished through provision for stricter collection of income tax, higher excise taxes on tobacco, gasoline and alcoholic beverages, increased license fees on motor vehicles and higher land taxes.

As an inducement to increase exports and savings, the bill was amended so that the Finance Minister may grant tax exemptions on earnings from abroad; payment of bonuses up to 15 percent for increased production; and deductions of up to 500 pounds on savings in government bond issues designated by the Finance Ministry.

EGYPTIAN TROOPS FIRE ON ARAB REFUGEES IN GAZA AREA WHO SEEK TO REACH ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, June 28. (JTA) -- Egyptian troops in the Gaza area opened fire on demonstrating Arab refugees, the Saudi Arabian radio reported today. The broadcast, which was monitored here, also said that many of the refugees are attempting to flee to Transjordan or Israel territory.

Summer camps for Arab children in Israel will be opened soon for the first time, it was announced today. An estimated 20,000 Arab youngsters living in the Jewish state will be sent to 100 summer camps supervised by the Ministry of Social Welfare.

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JEWISH AGENCY WILL NOT AID ABLE-BODIED IMMIGRANTS WHO REFUSE TO WORK AS ASSIGNED

JERUSALEM, June 28. (JTA) -- Able-bodied immigrant men of working age will not receive any aid from the Jewish Agency if they refuse to go to places of work to which they are directed, it was announced today. The decision was taken by the joint coordinating board of the Agency and the government as part of a plan to take newcomers out of the reception camps at the earliest opportunity and put them into the productive life of the country.

The Ministry of Labor announced last night that it is allocating \$1,400,000 for the development of "auxiliary immigrant farm units." The money will be transferred to a special fund supervised by the Jewish Agency and the Histadrut, Israel's general federation of labor.

An immigrant camp for 300 newly-arrived families is under construction near the coastal town of Naharia. The immigrants assigned to the new camp will help in the construction of some 500 new housing units.

ULTRA-ORTHODOX JEWISH SECT MAY HALE ISRAEL BEFORE INTERNATIONAL COURT OF JUSTICE

JERUSALEM, June 28. (JTA) -- The ultra-Orthodox Jewish sect Neturei Karta is exploring the possibility of haling the Israel Government before the International Court of Justice at The Hague, it was learned here today.

The sect has sought the advice of Prof. Nathan Fienberg, international law expert at the Hebrew University, on the possibilities of battling the legality of the Israel draft in Jerusalem which has called up to service members of the group. The Neturei Karta has refused to recognize Israel sovereignty over Jerusalem and has advocated internationalization of the city at United Nations hearings.

Sephardic Chief Rabbi Ben Zion Uziel of Israel celebrated his 70th birthday yesterday. Chief Rabbi Isaac Halevi Herzog presided at a special celebration honoring Rabbi Uziel. Messages of felicitations were received from President Weizmann and members of the Israel Cabinet.

ISRAEL DELEGATION LEAVES FOR U.S. AFTER CONCLUDING TALKS TO REOPEN HAIFA REFINERIES

LONDON, June 28. (JTA) -- Negotiations between an Israel delegation, headed by David Horowitz, director-general of the Israel Treasury, and British oil company representatives for the reopening of the Haifa refineries were concluded here today. However, it is expected that the refineries will not be opened for about three months.

It is understood that Consolidated Refineries has concluded arrangements for obtaining oil to be processed at Haifa. Shipments will be begun as soon as is practicable and the refining processes will be started when a sufficient stock of crude oil is on hand. It is also expected that the refineries will be able to supply all the oil normally used by Israel.

Mr. Horowitz and one other member of the delegation left for the United States tonight. Mr. Horowitz emphasized that his trip to the U.S. is not connected with oil negotiations, although he indicated that talks for obtaining oil from America will be initiated some time in the future. He also revealed that the agreement with the British companies will save Israel about \$2,800,000 annually in foreign exchange and will provide employment for some 600-700 Israel workers.

UNITED STATES HIGH COMMISSIONER McCLOY DENIES ANTI-SEMITISM GROWING IN GERMANY

FRANKFURT, June 28. (JTA) -- John J. McCloy, American High Commissioner in Germany, last night expressed the opinion that there is no problem of "rising anti-Semitism" in Germany, although he admitted that anti-Semitic manifestations were in fact taking place. Mr. McCloy explained the recent anti-Semitic acts as "vestiges of anti-Semitism after years of vicious orientation and training" by the Nazis.

Commissioner McCloy's estimate of the situation was contained in a letter to Mrs. Herbert Stein, president of a Jewish society of Seattle, Washington, who had communicated to the High Commissioner her organization's concern over anti-democratic developments in German political and social life.

The Commissioner's letter declared that "acts of anti-Semitism have alarmed not only you and other Americans, but have drawn increased attention from all the occupation powers and the German press." He also pointed out that in recent months West German President Theodor Heuss, Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, the Parliament, various newspapers and the churches have all spoken out against anti-Semitism. This public expression of indignation has had a salutary effect, he added.

Regarding the appointment of former Nazi Party members to official positions, which was also raised by Mrs. Stein, Commissioner McCloy admitted that "it is true that now and then persons with active Nazi backgrounds attain office," but explained that "in these cases there are well-defined lines of procedure for checking the appointment to high office of persons considered inimical or dangerous to the aims and purposes of the occupation. Countering this is one of the continuing basic operations of the United States High Commissioner."

As for restitution, Mr. McCloy stressed the difficulties encountered in getting the program under way, placing particular emphasis on the problem of getting a qualified staff to carry out the program. The difficulties, he continued, "are gradually being overcome" and the program will be completed by the end of 1951. He also estimated that all court cases arising from the restitution program will be settled by the middle of 1952.

The Commissioner denied that there is a general parole program in effect for war criminals and insisted that no such program is contemplated. He added: "It is, however, characteristic of any civilized government that there be in authority an executive to exercise clemency in appropriate cases. Such authorities are particularly necessary respecting war crimes cases since there is no provision for judicial reviews of these cases."

TRUMAN CITES NAZI ANNIHILATION OF JEWS IN PLEA FOR U.S. RATIFICATION OF GENOCIDE PACT

WASHINGTON, June 28. (JTA) -- Citing the mass annihilation of Jews by the Nazis in Europe as one of the "most shocking examples" of genocide, President Truman expressed the hope that the U.S. Senate will ratify the United Nations Genocide Pact before it adjourns its present session.

The President condemned the Nazi attempt "to exterminate an entire religious group, deliberately and methodically." He spoke at the laying of the cornerstone of the new Federal Court building here. "We must do our part to outlaw forever the mass murder of innocent peoples," he stated.

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GERMAN JURY SENTENCES TWO YOUTHS TO PRISON FOR DESECRATING JEWISH CEMETERY

MUNICH, June 28. (JTA) -- A German jury in Wuerzburg, in the U.S. zone, today sentenced two young Germans to jail for desecrating the local Jewish cemetery last May. The youths, Helmut Schweisser and Heinz Lingstaedt, received two- and one-year prison sentences, respectively.

JEWISH GROUPS ATTEND GENEVA BARLEY OF NON-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS AIDING U.N.

GENEVA, June 28. (JTA) -- A meeting of non-governmental organizations associated with the United Nations opened here today, with the participation of representatives of the World Jewish Congress, World Union for Progressive Judaism, Agudas Israel, Consultative Council of Jewish Organizations, Coordinating Board of Jewish Organizations, CSE, and Jewish educational organizations.

JEWISH CHAPLAINS OPEN CONVENTION IN NEWPORT; DISCUSS INTERNATIONAL PROBLEMS

NEWPORT, R.I., June 28. (JTA) -- The third national convention of the Association of Jewish Chaplains of the U.S. Army and Navy opened here last night to discuss problems concerning the affairs of the association and to analyze issues of national and international concern.

The convention will hear reports on denazification programs in Germany, civil rights and liberties in the United States, how American Jewry can strengthen Israel and problems concerning world peace. The membership of the association consists of 35 rabbis who have served, or who are now serving, with the armed forces of the United States.

The convention will commemorate the 175th anniversary of the birth of Judah Touro, who was born in Newport in 1775, while his father was serving as rabbi of that community and who is famed in American history as a philanthropist and patriot. A Touro memorial service will be conducted by the association in the Touro Synagogue of Newport, with Governor John O. Pastore of Rhode Island and Dr. David de Sola Pool of New York as principal speakers.

The purpose of the association is to "foster the spirit of fellowship which has been created through the sharing of a common military experience and to set forth the attitudes on matters of common concern to a large group of American rabbis who represent a cross-section of American Jewish life, and whose loyalty to both America and Judaism has been visibly demonstrated through their service to the Jewish men in the armed forces."

WESTERN POWERS DO NOT TAKE SERIOUSLY ARAB THREATS TO AID COMMUNISTS OVER ISRAEL POLICY

BOSTON, June 28. (JTA) -- Threats that Arabs will join hands with the Russians to oppose the "pro-Jewish" policy of America and Great Britain are not taken very seriously by the western powers, the Christian Science Monitor declared yesterday in a special article on Communism and the Middle East.

The article added that statements to this effect by prominent Egyptian and Syrian statesmen during the past few months are viewed as attempts to win greater concessions from the West. There is "every reason to believe that Arab leaders, members of the ruling families, will not risk their own social and economic position by dealing with the revolutionary forces in the world," the Monitor stated.
