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ISRAEL CABINET, IN SPECIAL MEETING, SUPPORTS U.N. SECURITY COUNCIL ACTION ON KOREA

TEL AVIV, July 2. (JTA) -- The Israel Cabinet at an extraordinary session held at the residence of President Chaim Weizmann at Rehovoth today adopted a resolution expressing support of the United Nations Security Council resolution calling upon all nations to assist South Korea. (See Lat. Success developments on Page 3.)

Immediately after the session the following statement was issued by the Cabinet: "The Israel Government opposes and condemns aggression whenever it occurs and from whatever quarter it emanates. In fulfillment of the United Nations Charter, Israel supports the Security Council in its efforts to put an end to the breach of the peace in Korea and to restore peace in that area. The government hopes that the United Nations will continue to endeavor to align all great nations in a common effort for the safeguarding of world peace."

U.S. Ambassador James G. McDonald today called at the Israel Foreign Ministry to deliver a note informing the Israel Government that the United States had imposed a blockade on the coast of Korea, in accordance with the Security Council resolution.

The Cabinet session, over which the President presided, was originally called as a farewell gesture to Dr. Weizmann who leaves for a European vacation Wednesday.

BROWDY PRESENTS FOUR-POINT PROGRAM TO Z.O.A. 53RD ANNUAL CONVENTION IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, July 2. (JTA) -- Benjamin Browdy, who several months ago was named to fill the unexpired term of the late president of the Zionist Organization of America, Daniel Frisch, was today nominated overwhelmingly for a full term as head of the organization. (As the Bulletin went to press, the voting had not yet taken place, but it was a virtual certainty that Mr. Browdy would be the next president of the Z.O.A.)

Last night at the opening session of the four-day convention, Mr. Browdy outlined a four-point program aimed at increasing the role of the Z.O.A. and expanding its activities, and calling on the Organization to take the lead in a campaign to democratize Jewish community life in this country. The major points of the program:

1. The creation of a commission on policy to be named by the Z.O.A. president through which all policy questions are to be cleared before they come up for final decision before the duly authorized bodies of the Zionist organization.

2. The sending to Israel of a Zionist delegation of 50 outstanding American businessmen from various parts of the country to study the whole problem of private investment in Israel.

3. The establishment of a national chaluziuth commission to organize and supervise ZOA projects of planned chalutzuth.

4. The convening of a conference on democratization of the Jewish community to which are to be invited all Jewish groups within and without the Zionist movement

interested in extending American Jewish democracy.

The Z.O.A. president told the 2,000 delegates that "the issue of the control of Jewish communal life in America can no longer be postponed or sidestopped." He charged that "in many communities, Jewish federation and welfare funds have arrogated to themselves the control over Jewish funds and have decreed allocations favoring the local institutions at the expense of the pressing and tragic needs of the Jewish homeland." This is being done" he asserted, "at a time when the state of Israel after having admitted 400,000 Jews in the last two years, is struggling desperately to secure shelter, food and sources of livelihood for the 100,000 Jews now fleeing for their lives from Iraq and perhaps an additional 100,000 streaming out from curtailed Rumania."

Calling for the raising of the budget of the Z.O.A. from last year's \$1,200,000 to \$2,000,000, Mr. Browdy said that "the Zionists of America are determined to obtain their full share from the Jewish public funds in the U.S." and warned that if they did not, "we will organize a campaign of our own in order to raise the necessary sums from the American Jewish community." Mr. Browdy proposed that the Z.O.A. henceforth conduct Israel projects of its own instead of subsisting on the satisfaction of having aided everybody and providing assistance to all other groups in Zionism."

The head of the Z.O.A. also urged the granting of a special status for the World Zionist Organization in Israel and endorsed the wholehearted cooperation of the World Zionist Organization with the Government of Israel on the principle of fair and equitable partnership. He reported that an American-Israel information service has been established. It is planned further to carry on an exchange program with Israel universities and American Jewish students and also to arrange for an interchange between Israel and the United States of outstanding leaders in the fields of science and the professions.

Silver Charges Israel Government Reduces Status of Zionist Organization

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, speaking tonight, charged the Israel Government with pursuing policies which reduce the status of the Zionist organization to such an extent that it leads many American Jews to "walk away" from the organization. The Zionist organization, he said, is in danger of becoming "the typical American lodge."

"American Jews are beginning to walk away from an organization which peripherally touches the essential task of today and tomorrow. They are losing interest in an organization which is prohibited from raising funds even for its own parties in Israel which other Zionist parties are permitted to do", he continued. "The Government of Israel should make up its mind whether it really wants a strong Zionist organization to carry on for a considerable time in the future. If it does it will have to curb its own quite natural propensities towards centralization and deliberately replenish the power and authority of the Zionist organization."

Louis Lipsky, chairman of the American Zionist Council, who presided at this afternoon's session devoted to "The Z.O.A. on the American scene," urged a radical re-novation of Zionist policy by ... uniting Zionist groups of all parties in any given territory in one unified organization. While permitting the different parties a limited autonomy in their societies, the plan would join them in a larger body for practical purposes.

Mr. Lipsky warned that unless such unified territorial bodies are set up within the Jewish communities, "there will ensue a demoralization out of which will come the reduction in the influence and authority and productiveness of the Zionist organization to a level which may be tantamount to liquidation."

SOUTH AFRICAN JEW FLIES TO KOREA AS PERSONAL REPRESENTATIVE OF U.N. SECRETARY-GENERAL

LAKE SUCCESS, July 2, (JTA) -- Col. Alfred George Katzin, South African Jew who has been appointed United Nations Secretary-General Trygve Lie's personal representative in Korea and head of the U.S. Secretariat in Korea, left Seattle today for Tokyo.

Col. Katzin was accompanied by another South African Jew in the U.N. service. He is George Movshon, a producer of the daily U.N. radio program "The U.N. Today," who will serve as information officer of the Korea secretariat.

U.N. circles were this week end anticipating replies from a number of nations, including Israel and most of the Arab states, to the U.N. Security Council resolution calling on all nations to give military aid to South Korea. The only Arab country to respond thus far is Egypt which also was the first nation to refuse military aid. Egyptian delegate Mahmoud Fawzi Bey said that Egypt would abstain because the U.N. had failed to act against the "savage aggression" of world Zionism in the Palestine situation.

(The Sunday newspapers in London today cited the U.N. solution of the Palestine war as an example of what the U.N. should do in the present Korean situation. One columnist, writing under the name of "man of the people," declared that "what the United Nations did in Palestine where the blazing dispute between the Arabs and the Jews was eventually settled by the rule of law could be done again in Korea.")

The Jewish War Veterans of the United States this week-end issued a statement pledging wholehearted support to President Truman's "prompt action in countering the Communist invasion of South Korea." The statement was signed by Jackson J. Holtz of Boston, Mass., national commander of the organization.

2,000 JEWS FROM VILLAGES OF PERSIAN KURDISTAN ARRIVE IN ISRAEL; MORE EXPECTED SOON

JERUSALEM, July 2. (JTA) -- From the remote mountain villages of Persian Kurdistan, 2,000 Jews have already come to Israel and this figure will soon be doubled, Yitzhak Raphael, Jewish Agency immigration chief, reported this week-end. Eighty percent of all immigrants who will come to Israel in the next few months will be Jews from Iran, Iraq, Poland and Rumania, he added.

Most of the 150,000 Jews in Iran live in extreme poverty and wish to go to Israel, Mr. Raphael said. Two thousand Iraqi Jews have already reached Israel, while the average monthly number of Iraqi Jewish immigrants is expected to rise to 4,000 soon, he continued.

The Agency official stated that neither the Jewish Agency for the Israel Government-Agency coordinating board has any intentions of curbing immigration to Israel. During the first six months of 1950, he said, an average of 12,000 Jews arrived in Israel, with all expectations that the monthly average will rise to 18,000. He anticipated a total immigration this year of 180,000. Mr. Raphael emphasized that the Agency's immigration department will not wind up its activities in Germany "so long as candidates for immigration are to be found there."

DELEGATION OF ISRAEL NEWSPAPERMEN VISITS TURKEY TO STUDY CONDITIONS THERE.

TEL AVIV, July 2, (JTA) -- A delegation of Israel journalists left here this week-end for a visit to Turkey. They will remain there for a week to study various aspects of Turkish culture and politics to establish closer relations with newspapermen's organizations in Turkey.

The Turkish charge d'affaires here, Seyfullah Esin, was raised to the rank of Minister Envoy Extraordinary, the Israel Government was informed today.

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BRITAIN GETS CONFLICTING REPORTS ON ISRAEL REACTION TO AGREEMENT ON HAIFA OIL PLANTS

LONDON, July 2. (JTA) -- Conflicting reports on the reception accorded in Israel to the agreement reached between British oil firms and an Israel delegation reached here this week-end from Tel Aviv.

One report says that the results of the Anglo-Israel oil talks were received "with considerable dissatisfaction." Leading Israel economists and leaders of the opposition parties claim that the Israel delegation failed to achieve a significant improvement in Israel's oil supply.

On the other hand, the London Times correspondent in Tel Aviv emphasized that "the easing of Israel's internal oil situation--a triple problem of finance, transport and international politics--will do something to help the Israel Government through its present economic difficulties." The correspondent says that the rationing of gasoline which had been forecast in Israel for July may now not be necessary.

Revealing that British oil for the Haifa refineries will be shipped from "a South American sterling source," the correspondent says the refineries will be reopened in Haifa in less than three months. This development, he reports, has given considerable satisfaction "to all but the extremists who prefer to see the Israel Government revoke the British concession and attempt to operate the Haifa oil refineries independently."

ISRAEL PRESIDENT AND DIRECTOR OF WEIZMANN INSTITUTE DISCOVER NEW CHEMICAL PROCESS

TEL AVIV, July 2. (JTA) -- An important new chemical invention has been discovered by President Chaim Weizmann and Dr. David E. Bergman, director of Weizmann Institute of Science at Rehovoth, it was announced here today. The invention is a result of experiments conducted during the past few weeks at the Weizmann Institute.

Details of the invention were not made public. However, it is known that the invention involves new methods of cracking petroleum as well as some products of petroleum. The invention is said to be of considerable importance to the chemical industry.

AMERICAN ORTHODOX RABBIS APPEAL TO ISRAEL PREMIER TO HALT IMPORT OF NON-KOSHER MEAT

NEW YORK, July 2. (JTA) -- Israel Premier David Ben Gurion was asked this week-end by the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the United States and Canada to prevent the importation of non-kosher meat from the United States to Israel.

The Union sent a cable to the Premier declaring that the American rabbinate is "profoundly shocked" at reports from Israel that the Ministry of Supply has decided to import non-kosher meat. "This act constitutes a gross abuse of our religion," the cable said.

Meanwhile, the Rabbinical Council of America, an Orthodox body, has announced that a delegation of rabbis, representing the Council, has departed for Israel to study the religious needs of new settlers in the Jewish state and the facilities for the religious education of children. Following their return to this country after the summer, the delegation will report its findings to the executive committee of the Council, which represents 500 Orthodox congregations in the U.S. and Canada.

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CANADA PREPARED TO ACCEPT AS IMMIGRANTS UKRAINIANS WHO AIDED NAZIS IN MURDER OF JEWS

TORONTO, July 2. (JTA) -- Considerable consternation was aroused here over a statement by a high government official that Canada is prepared to accept as immigrants thousands of Ukrainians who served as members of a Nazi-organized Ukrainian division which formed part of the German Army in World War II.

Prior to his joining this division -- which was known as the S.S. Galician division -- each member had to take an oath to fight against the Jews. A photostatic copy of the text of this oath was reproduced in a local newspaper which reported the wartime activities of the division.

Members of this division are said to have participated directly in the German Army and Gestapo mass annihilation of Jews. The division was formed by the Nazis on Soviet territory and after the fall of Hitler's regime the entire division surrendered to the U.S. Army. Most of the members of the Ukrainian Division are now in England expecting to be admitted as immigrants into Canada.

It was also reported here from Ottawa that the Canadian Government is considering the admission as immigrants of about half a million Volksdeutsche from Europe.

MOSLEYITE CANDIDATE BADLY BEATEN IN BRITISH BY-ELECTION; RECEIVES 34 OF 4,000 VOTES

LONDON, July 2. (JTA) -- A Mosleyite Union Movement candidate in a Hampstead by-election suffered a crushing defeat this week-end when he polled a total of 34 votes as compared with the victorious Conservative candidate who got 2,500 and the Labor candidate who received 1,500 votes.

During the election campaign, the Mosleyites distributed leaflets blaming "alien Jews" for the housing shortage in London.

J.C.A. AND ARGENTINE COLONISTS PLAN NEW PROGRAM TO HALT "DRIFT FROM LAND" BY JEWS

LONDON, July 2. (JTA) -- A new effort to halt the "drift from the land" in Jewish agricultural colonies in Argentina will be made as a result of a conference here of leaders of the Jewish Colonization Association and J.C.A. settlers from Argentina, it was announced today.

Among the positive moves to be made will be the expansion of small farm holdings, wherever land is available, in order to improve the standard of living of the settlers. Children of J.C.A. settlers will be aided in setting up farms of their own and land of departing colonists will be repurchased for distribution among new colonists or old settlers needing additional land. As in the past, land will be sold to colonists at prices substantially below the market price. It was also agreed to intensify cooperation between J.C.A. and the settlers and to establish in Buenos Aires a joint consultative committee to consider all problems of the colonists and the organization.

FORMER CHIEF RABBI OF RUMANIA ASKS U.N. BARLEY TO ACT ON RELIGIOUS HATRED IN TEXTS

GENEVA, July 2. (JTA) -- A demand that passages in religious textbooks which foster religious hatred be eliminated was made here today by former Rumanian Chief Rabbi Alexander Shafraan, speaking on behalf of the United Jewish Educational and Cultural Organization. He spoke at the fourth conference of non-governmental organizations, sponsored by the United National Information Department.

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NEW HONORARY MEMBER OF ORGANIZATION OF CANADIAN VETERANS OF ISRAEL WAR

NEW YORK, July 2. (JTA) -- U.S. Consul Eugene L. Padberg, Jr., was named an honorary member of a newly-formed organization of Israel war veterans. The organization also has branches in Montreal and in Toronto. Some of its members are preparing to return to Israel to join communal settlements. Mr. Padberg served for 16 months in the U.S. Embassy in Tel Aviv prior to his appointment to the Winnipeg post.

ISRAEL LEADERS HONOR WORLD HEAD OF JEWISH NATIONAL FUND ON HIS 60TH BIRTHDAY

JERUSALEM, July 2. (JTA) -- Tribute was paid to Dr. Abraham Granot, world head of the Jewish National Fund and a General Zionist deputy in the Knesset, this week-end by Premier David Ben Gurion and other leading Israel Government leaders on the occasion of Dr. Granot's 60th birthday. A dinner in Dr. Granot's honor was tendered by the Israel Premier.

MIZRACHI YOUTH LEADERS, EDUCATORS LEAVE FOR ISRAEL TO STUDY RELIGIOUS COMMUNITY NEEDS

NEW YORK, July 2. (JTA) -- A group of 53 persons, including leading American Jewish educators and Mizrahi youth leaders, left here today for Israel aboard an El Al plane. The 53 will spend six weeks in Israel during which they will get a first-hand view of the accomplishments and needs of the religious community in Israel and will visit schools, youth centers and children's homes and other installations maintained by various Mizrahi groups in the U.S.

DR. ALBERT BERG, WORLD FAMOUS SURGEON AND NOTED PHILANTHROPIST, DIES AT 77

NEW YORK, July 2. (JTA) -- Dr. Albert A. Berg, noted surgeon, philanthropist and former president of the International College of Surgeons died here this week-end. He was 77 years old.

For almost half-a-century one of America's outstanding surgeons, Dr. Berg was a pioneer in abdominal surgery. He was one of the surgeons who developed the radical operation for stomach and duodenal ulcers. He was a founder of the International College of Surgeons, which he served as president for four years, from 1943 to 1947.

It was Dr. Berg's large but unannounced gift last year to the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, which made possible the purchase of property in New York for the construction of a seven-story building which will become the U.A.H.C.'s headquarters. Dr. Berg provided funds in 1944 for the construction of a research laboratory at Mt. Sinai Hospital. In 1940 he gave the New York Public Library a collection of 3,000 rare old books and the \$2,000,000 W.T. Howe collection of 16,000 volumes of English and American 19th century literature.

RABBI MAX WIENER, ZIONIST LEADER, RELIGIOUS EDUCATOR, DIES IN NEW YORK AT 68

NEW YORK, July 2. (JTA) -- Rabbi Max Wiener, president of the Theodor Herzl Society, District 81, of the Zionist Organization of America, died here this week-end at the age of 68. Rabbi Wiener, who was active in the educational work of Congregation Habonim, was also a member of the editorial board of the Reconstructionist, bi-weekly religious publication.

WOLF NICHENSON, EX-PRESIDENT OF ARGENTINE ZIONIST FEDERATION, DIES AT 60

BUENOS AIRES, July 2. (JTA) -- Wolf Nicholson, former president of the Zionist Federation of Argentina and author of the "History of Zionism," written in Spanish, died here this week-end at the age of sixty.
