COMMUNISTS DEMONSTRATE IN JERUSALEM AND TEL AVIV AGAINST U.S. INTERVENTION IN KOREA

JERUSALEM, July 9. (JTA) -- Communist demonstrations against the Israel Government's stand on Korea were held last night in Jerusalem, Tel Aviv and Haifa.

In this city some 50 persons marched through the streets carrying Hebrew and English banners reading: "Hands Off Korea," "We Want Peace" and "End American Aggression." The demonstrators attracted little attention.

In Tel Aviv several hundred Communists carried banners reading: "Israel for the Israelis, Korea for the Koreans." They held a meeting near the American consulate which was addressed by a speaker who condemned American intervention in Korea.

The left-wing Socialist Mapam Party has called 50 mass meetings in various parts of Israel to protest against the Israel Government's decision to support the U.N. Security Council resolution on Korea. The main slogan of the rallies are: "Hands Off Korea."

The United States Embassy here announced that all American Air Force reserve pilots must report to the air attache at the embassy within 72 hours.

FIVE ARAB STATES SUPPORT UNITED NATIONS RESOLUTION ON CEASE-FIRE IN KOREA

LAKE SUCCESS, July 9. (JTA) -- Iraq, Syria, Saudi Arabia and Yemen today joined Lebanon in sending a non-committal reply to the United Nations in support of the Security Council resolution of June 25 which called for a cease-fire in Korea and ordered the North Koreans to halt their invasion of South Korea.

The replies do not specifically mention the Security Council's resolution of June 27 which calls on members of the U.N. "to furnish such assistance to the Republic of Korea as may be necessary to repel the armed attack and to restore international peace and security in the area."

This action on the part of the five members of the Arab League virtually expresses disapproval of the stand taken by Egypt in abstaining from support of the Security Council resolution on aid to Korea. A reported Saudi Arabian note to Cairo was understood to stress that Egypt's decision ran "counter to Saudi Arabian policy."

It was reported from Cairo that Egypt is disappointed over the guarded resolutions of the other Arab states. The most influential newspapers in Cairo--representing both the Wafd Party and the more conservative political forces--have expressed surprise and chagrin at the action of the other Arab League members and criticized them for failing to demonstrate pan-Arab solidarity.

U.N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie yesterday sent to General Douglas MacArthur, commander of the U.S. forces on Korea, the same blue-white U.N. flag which flew in Palestine during the U.N.-supervised truce negotiations. The flag was presented to chief U.S. delegate Warren Austin for transfer to MacArthur.

UNITED NATIONS CONCILIATION COMMISSION ON PALESTINE TO PROCEED TO JERUSALEM

GENEVA, July 9. (JTA) -- The United Nations Conciliation Commission for Palestine, which is now in Geneva attempting to negotiate permanent peace treaties between Israel and the Arab countries, will proceed to Jerusalem next week, it was announced here this week-end.

ISRAEL POLICE APPREHEND 105 INFILTRERS IN RAID ON ARAB VILLAGE NEAR JERUSALEM

JERUSALEM, July 9. (JTA) -- In a sudden raid, Israel police this week-end swept down on the Arab village of Abu Gosh, west of here, and rounded up 105 infiltrers. The raid was begun at dawn and a curfew was immediately begun. Police began a house-to-house search demanding to see Israel Government identity cards, which were issued only to Arabs and Jewish residents in Israel.

Today the mukhtar of the village telegraphed Joseph Sprinzak, Acting President of Israel, Premier David Ben Gurion and Foreign Minister Moshe Sharrett pleading with them to postpone the deportation of the infiltrers until after they had given a hearing to a delegation from the village. The Arab leader's message declared that the delay was necessary to "avert a calamity which threatens our women, children, the aged and innocent men."

In an Upper Galilee settlement a Jewish guard, Shalom Monachen, was killed last night by parading infiltrers from Syrian territory.

HISTADRUT CALLS ON NURSES TO END FOUR-DAY STRIKE AS ORDERLIES JOIN WALK-OUT

TEL AVIV, July 9. (JTA) -- The executive council of the Histadrut today called on some 2,000 nurses in Israel hospitals and clinics who are now in the fourth day of a nationwide strike to return to work by Tuesday.

Meanwhile, about 100 orderlies today walked off their jobs and joined the nurses. Several hundred doctors have threatened to stop work unless their demands for improvement in wages and working conditions are met.

At the same time the Histadrut executive expressed support of the nurses demands. It threatened, however, that if the nurses did not return to work the matter would be turned over to the Histadrut secretariat for action. Earlier this week-end the executive criticized the nurses for going on strike "without adequate consultation."

Hadassah representatives told a press conference that the organization, which operates a wide network of hospitals and clinics, had agreed to the wage demands of the nurses but could not agree to a seven-hour working day. A reduction in hours would mean a reduction in the number of beds which Hadassah facilities could offer, they said, adding that if the strike continues patients may have to be sent home from hospitals.

ISRAEL TO CELEBRATE 3,000TH ANNIVERSARY OF JERUSALEM AS ITS CAPITAL IN 1952

TEL AVIV, July 9. (JTA) -- Israel will celebrate the 3,000th anniversary of Jerusalem as its capital in the spring of 1952, it was announced here today at a public rally.

Speaking at the meeting, Foreign Minister Moshe Sharrett declared: "The stronger we make our position in Jerusalem by construction and population, the sooner we will bring about an international arrangement for Jerusalem as the capital of Israel."

J.N.F. ACQUIRED 1,000,000 DUNAMS OF ARAB LAND; PAID \$30,000,000 TO ISRAEL GOVERNMENT

TEL AVIV, July 9. (JTA) -- A million dunams (250,000 acres) of land abandoned by Arabs in Israel was bought last year by the Jewish National Fund, it was announced this week-end by Dr. Abraham Granot, head of the J.N.F., at a reception tendered to him on the occasion of his sixtieth birthday. Dr. Granot revealed that more than \$30,000,000 was paid for this land by the J.N.F. to the Israel Government, which is the custodian of abandoned Arab property.

The J.N.F. director also disclosed that his organization this year invested \$20,000,000 in establishing new settlements. About 10,000 new immigrants, he said, are at present engaged in afforestation projects carried out by the Jewish National Fund. More than 3,000,000 trees were planted by the J.N.F. last year and 5,000,000 trees will be planted this year. The organization is also active in reclamation of desert land in the Negev and in financing housing projects, Dr. Granot reported.

The budget of the Jewish National Fund for this year is about \$50,000,000, of which \$30,000,000 has been collected from Jews in all parts of the world, notably in the United States. The remainder is being covered by loans, including a \$6,000,000 loan from Swiss banks and a \$4,000,000 loan from French banks. The Jewish National Fund is also negotiating a \$6,000,000 loan with Swedish financiers, Dr. Granot said.

AMERICAN AND FRENCH CONSULS ATTEND CEREMONY IN ISRAEL SETTLEMENT "ADOPTED" BY U.S. JEWS

JERUSALEM, July 9. (JTA) -- The United States and French consuls here this week-end attended a ceremony at the Neve Ilan settlement which was "adopted" by the Zionist region of Long Island, New York, and populated by French and Belgian immigrants who, as Maquis, fought the Nazis.

The ceremony marked the laying of a cornerstone of a kindergarten in the collective settlement. The funds for the building were raised among Zionists in Long Island. The Long Island Region has also sent refrigerators and egg incubators to the settlement.

At a luncheon which followed the ceremony, the American and French consuls praised the achievements of the settlement which was founded three years ago on land belonging to the Jewish National Fund. Other speakers included H. George Rayne, former dean of New York University, who announced that he came here to negotiate with the Israel authorities for the inclusion of the Jewish state in the framework of the "Save the Children Organization," of which he is a vice-president.

AMERICAN MIZRACHI LEADERS CONFER WITH ISRAEL MINISTER OF REESTABLISHING SANHEDRIN

JERUSALEM, July 9. (JTA) -- American Mizrahi leaders, who have just arrived in Israel, are conferring with Minister of Religion Judah L. Maimon on the possibility of reviving the Sanhedrin, ancient Jewish tribunal. The American religious Zionists, headed by Pincas Churgin, president of the Mizrahi Organization of the U.S., are also discussing with Dr. Maimon plans for the establishment of an institute for higher Jewish studies and various religious problems pertaining to Israel.

JERUSALEM TO INCREASE FREQUENCY OF WATER DISTRIBUTION AS RESULT OF NEW MAINS

JERUSALEM, July 9. (JTA) -- As a result of the new water supply system recently completed here, water will now be distributed every sixth day instead of every seventh day, it has been announced by Mayor Daniel Auster. In about two weeks water distribution will be made every fifth day and so on, until by the end of August water will be flowing freely all week long, the Mayor added.

REPRESENTATIVES OF JEWISH ORGANIZATIONS PLAN END OF JEWISH DP PROBLEM IN GERMANY

MUNICH, July 9. (JTA) -- Plans to remove all displaced Jews from Germany by 1951 were discussed at a parley between ELAS and Joint Distribution Committee representatives at Berchtesgaden, it was learned here today.

The conferees were told that under the new U.S. DP Immigration Act some 25,000 Jews would enter the U.S., while Canada, Australia, Israel, South American countries and others would take an additional 25,000 persons, thus ending the Jewish DP problem.

POLISH GOVERNMENT REPORTED LIMITING ISSUANCE OF PASSPORTS TO ISRAEL IMMIGRANTS

LONDON, July 9. (JTA) -- The Polish Government has decided to limit the number of passports it issues to Israel-bound Jews, it was reported here today from Warsaw. The number to be issued will be 150 a day until the end of August, it was said. Simultaneously, it was reported that the government has decided to intensify its anti-Zionist propaganda.

BERTRAND RUSSELL WARNS AGAINST ANTI-SEMITISM; SAYS IT CAUSED SPAIN'S DECAY, HITLER'S FALL

SYDNEY, July 9. (JTA) -- Anti-Semitism is an obstacle to world government, Bertrand Russell, noted philosopher who is visiting Australia on a lecture tour, declared here this week-end.

"Hostility to Jews is the most single unfortunate and beastly example of race prejudice," Mr. Russell said. "Those attributing traditional faults to Jews are merely rationalizing." He pointed out that the persecution of Jews in Spain in the Middle Ages caused the decay of that country and that Germany was defeated in the second World War because of Hitler's anti-Jewish policy.

70TH ANNIVERSARY OF WORLD ORT UNION MARKED AT ANNUAL MEETING OF CENTRAL BOARD

GENEVA, July 9. (JTA) -- The 70th anniversary of the World ORT Union was celebrated today at the opening of a three-day annual meeting of the enlarged central board of the ORT at Montreux.

Delegates from ORT organizations in thirty countries of Europe, North America, South America, North Africa and South Africa and Israel will participate in the sessions. A general survey of the organization's activities will be presented, and organizational and financial matters will be discussed.

ISRAEL BRANCH OF KAISER-FRAZER PLACES ORDER IN AUSTRIA FOR STEEL FOR HAIFA PLANT

VIENNA, July 9. (JTA) -- The Israel branch of the Kaiser-Frazer automobile company of Haifa has placed an order with the United Austrian Iron and Steel Works for a supply of structural steel to be used for an assembly plant of the company. The Austrian firm had to guarantee early delivery because Kaiser-Frazer intends to begin automobile production this fall.

NOTRE DAME ALUMNI ASSOCIATION OF NEW YORK MAKES CONTRIBUTION TO UNITED JEWISH APPEAL

NEW YORK, July 9. (JTA) -- The Notre Dame Alumni Association of New York, whose membership is largely Irish, this week-end made a contribution to the United Jewish Appeal, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., chairman of the National Christian Committee of the U.J.A., announced. R.A. Hamilton, chairman of the Notre Dame Club of New York Trust Fund, said that the contribution had been inspired by the club's belief in "charity for and toward all, regardless of color, creed or religion."

THREE ISRAEL SCIENTISTS WIN WEIZMANN AWARDS; PRIZES OFFERED BY CITY OF TEL AVIV

TEL AVIV, July 9. (JTA) -- Three Israel scientists today received the Weizmann Prize for Science, which is awarded by the Tel Aviv municipality, at a ceremony here. Two brothers named Katchalsky received the prize for research in albumen, while Dr. Kurt Mander received the award for research in plant physiology.

JEWISH EDUCATOR TO SURVEY EDUCATIONAL NEEDS OF JEWS IN CENTRAL AND SOUTH AMERICA

NEW YORK, July 9. (JTA) -- A survey of the cultural and educational needs of the Jewish communities in Central and South America and the West Indies will be made this summer by Mordecai Ealovi, prominent Jewish educator, it was announced today by the World Zionist Organization, sponsor of the undertaking.

Mr. Ealovi is leaving tomorrow by air and will be gone for six weeks. He will visit Mexico, Guatemala, El Salvador, Costa Rica, Panama, Colombia, Ecuador, Venezuela, Curacao, Netherlands West Indies and Cuba. His trip is intended to stimulate cultural and educational activities among Jews in those countries and to foster a closer relationship between them and Jewry in North America, the World Zionist Organization stated.

DELEGATION OF ARGENTINE JEWS HONORS MEMORY OF BARON DE HIRSCH AT PARIS CEMETERY

PARIS, July 9. (JTA) -- A delegation of Argentine Jews today visited the grave of Baron de Hirsch at Montmartre to pay their respects to the memory of the philanthropist whose bequests made possible the settlement of Jews on the land.

The delegation represents farmers who settled in Argentina with the aid of the Jewish Colonization Association. Present at the ceremony, besides the Argentine delegation, were representatives of the J.C.A. Administrative Council and the Alianza Israelita Universelle.

ISRAEL APPOINTS FIRST TRADE COMMISSIONER TO INDIA AND SOUTHEAST ASIA

TEL AVIV, July 9. (JTA) -- W.F. Pollack, an Israel citizen living in Bombay, has been appointed Israel Trade Commissioner for India and Southeast Asia, effective September 1, 1950, it was announced here today.
