SRAEL STARTS SURVEY OF MANHOWER; REGISTRATION FOR ARMY RESERVE STARTS SUNDAY

TEL AVIV, July 11. (JTA) -- Registration for army reserve service of all Isaal citizons between 20 and 49 years of ago will start this Sunday, it was ancounced here today. Men over 40 will be required to serve for two weeks. Those indor 40 will be liable to four weeks' service.

Meanwhile, the Israel Government today began a manpower survey designed to revide specific information concerning the distribution and occupations of some 50,000 men employed in Israel and Israel industries in various parts of the world.

Registration forms have been sent to every enterprise in the country which emloys one or more men. It is estimated that between 70,000 and 80,000 enterprises -ncluding collective settlements --will return the completed forms within the statutory one-week period.

The consus is being conducted by the government Labor Board which is composed of ropresentatives of various government departments and the Deputy Chief of Staff of the Army, and is headed by Zoov Shorf. The task of the board, Mr. Shorf teld newsmen, is to assign individual duties to each man in the event of an emergency. The body will contralize all data on available and reserve manpower and on military and civilian manpower needs.

The Cairo radio today reported that Egypt, which is not supporting the United Nations decision to check the Communist invasion of South Korea, is expecting financial and technical aid from the United States under President Truman's "Point Four Program" for under-developed areas. A committee of representatives of nearly all Egyptian government departments has been formed to discuss how best to use aid under Truman's plan, Soliman Chanam Bey, Minister of National Economy, told the Parliament last night, the broadcast said.

(From London it was reported that Labor members of the British Parliament suggested in Commons yesterday that Britain discentinue the sending of arms to Egypt in retaliation for the latter's failure to back the U.N. decision on Korea. Woodrew Wyatt, one of the Labor M.P.'s, said "it would have been better for us to have sent jet planes to the Far East rather than to have supplied them to Egypt." He added that Britain is new "the laughing stock of the Middle East" because it is "fooding the mouth that bites us.")

Communist Paper Says Israel Will Become A Battleground; Attacks Zionists

VIETNA, July 11. (JTA) -- The Prediction that Israel will become a war front is made by the newspaper Scantea, official organ of the Communist Party of Rumania, which reached here today from Bucharest.

"Evidence that Igrael will become a battleground is contained in the fact that the Americans are building a very important strategic highway from Istanbul to Cairo, passing through Israel," the Communist paper writes. It attacks Zionist leaders in Rumania for "preventing Jewish working people from building a happy life alongside the Rumanian people."

ISJORDAN, HOT A MEMBER OF UNITED NATIONS, SUPPORTS U.N. RESOLUTION ON KOREAN CONFLICT

LAKE SUCCESS, July 11. (JTA) -- The secretariat of the United Nations today cived a cablogren from the Government of Transjordan expressing support of "the tod Nations resolution aiming at defense of peace." The cable said that all resolutes aimed at proventing aggression should be carried out in a spirit of justice equity.

AEL WILL NOT CHANGE FOLICY OF DEFORTING ARAB INFILTREES. FREMIER ANNOUNCES

JERUSALEM, July 11. (JTA) -- Promier David Ben Gurien today told the opposing in the Israel Parliament that the government will not change its policy of deting Arab infiltrees.

"If the Farliament desires to change that policy it had better elect a new ormsent, but as long as the Farliament adheres to the policy outlined at the intion of the state the police and army will continue to search for and deport introes," he said. Replying to charges of irregularities during searches for infilose, he said that complaints should be made to the Ministries of Defense and Police persons responsible for misdeeds will be punished.

Earlior, Mosho Erom, Magan doputy, charged that during the raid last week on 1 Gosh, Arab village near Jorusalem, police and troops had deported children registed for school, persons living in the village for a year and in some cases methors a been deported and their children left behind. He demanded that the government store the villagers' confidence in Israel by reuniting families broken up by the portations.

Eron was joined by an Arab deputy, Mohamed Said el Zabi, of the Nazareth Demoatic Enrty, who complained of the "atrocious" behavior of the police and soldiers volved in the raid and charged that they deported children and aged people. A vote no confidence in the government was decicively defeated by the Knesset.

An official communique today revealed that a curfew was imposed at Kfar Tirah, Eastern Sharon near Remath Hakevesh, last Saturday and a party of Israel police and army personnel searched the village for Arab infiltrees and contraband.

Sovoral hundrod villagors were searched and questioned during the 12-hour poration, which was carried out with a minimum of inconvenience for the inhabitants. Small number of Arabs were detained and quantities of flour, tobacco, cloth, mylon reducts and soap which had been smuggled in were soized, as was a heard of several undred falsestmian pounds issued during the Mandatory regime.

SRAELIS 2,000 STRIKING NURSES RETURN TO WORK; HISTADRUT AGREES TO RESENT THEIR DEMANDS

TEL AVIV, July 11. (JTA) -- Israel's 2,000 striking nurses returned to work odey following an agreement late last night with the Histadrut which consented to resent the strikers' demands to the government on condition that they resume their work in government, municipal and Hadassah hospitals. Earlier, the Histadrut outlawed the nurses' strike.

The five-day strike was precipitated by the rejection of the nurses' demands for a #2-hour six-day work wook during the summer menths, higher family allowances and longer wastions. It is understood that the government is willing to grant the requests on vacation and pay, but is unable to agree to a shorter working week owing to the shortege of nurses in Israel.

ing of england to tender garden barty at his palace to israel Parliamentary delication

LONDON, July 11. (JTA) -- The King of England will tender a garden party at uckingham Palace for the Israel Parliamentary delegation which is due to arrive by ir here temorrow. The affair will take place on Thursday afternoon.

Contrary to reports from Jorusalom that the left Socialist Maram party is not opposented on the delegation, it was learned here today that the delegation represents soven parties in the Israel Rarliament including the Maram. However, the exremo right-wing Horut Party, which is strongly anti-British, is not represented in the delegation.

The delegation will, upon its arrival, be met at the airfield by representaives of the British section of Interperliamentary Union and by officials of the Isact Legation. It will call on Thursday morning on the Lord Mayor of London at Manion House and will later be received by the Parliamentary Undersecretary of the
'oreign Office. On Friday the Israelis will lunch with Prime Minister Clement Attlee.
The delegation will spend more than a week in England during which it will meet with
loading members of the British Parliament on questions concerning British-Israel
Priendahla.

one U.S. Defendant pleads guilty. Two others judged innocent of shipping arms to israel

LOS ARGELES, July 11. (JTA) -- The trial of three men on charges of smuggling war material from California to Palestine in 1948 ended in Federal Court here yesterday when one defendant pleaded guilty and the charges against the other two were displicable.

The defendant who changed his plea to guilty was Herman N. Greenspun of Las Vegas, Novada. The other defendants were Lawrence C. Ivos and Lloyd Resemblum, both of New York. The judge will sentence Mr. Greenspun on Monday. The maximum sentence is two years imprisonment or \$10,000 in fines, or both.

WEIZMANN AND PARTY ARRIVE IN SWITZERLAND; OFFICIALLY WELCOMED IN BRIEF CEREMONY

ZURDE, July 11. (JTA) -- Israel President Weizmann and his party arrived in Switzerland yesterday afternoon and, after a brief welcoming ceremony at the frontier, Proceeded to a health resert on Lake Lucerne. When the party crossed the border from Italy it was not at the Chiasso station by Swiss cantonel and Federal representatives and by Dr. Monachon Kahany and Elizor Doron, Israel representatives in Switzerland.

EUDAPEST, July 11. (JTA) -- Shruel. Eliyashov, Israel Minister to Hungary, arrived here teday from Prague to present his credentials to the President.

U.S. MARITIME TRAINING VESSEL DUE TO VISIT HAIFA; 425 MEN TO BE GUESTS OF ISRAEL NAVY

HAIFA, July 11. (JTA) -- The American maritims training ship S.S. Empire State is due to dock here Thursday with 425 cadets, officers and men. They will spend six days here as quests of the Israel Navy.

GERMAN JEWISH GROUPS MEET IN FRANKFURT; ADVANCE DEMANDS TO WEST GERMAN GOVERNMENT

FRANKFURT, July 11. (JTA) -- A demand that the West German Government produce an official record of the facts of the extermination and persecution of European Jews during the Nazi regime was voiced at the first conference sponsored by the World Jewish Conpress in Germany, which concluded here today.

The conference called for legislation making incitement to racial hatred a punishable crime. It also urged revision of all text-books with anti-Semitic material and the dismissal of teachers who foster anti-Semitism in German schools.

Other demands advanced by the parley included the speeding up of restitution of property and stronger legislation for indemnification for loss of life, health and freedom. Assets confiscated from Nazi war criminals should be used for this purpose, the delegates urgod. The Bonn Government was also urged to help transfer heighloss and unclaimed Jowish property through authorized Jowish organizations.

The conference was attended by delegates of displaced Jews and Jews living in the Gorman communities of the three Western zones and the Western sector of Berlin, to "consider the urgent questions of the welfare of the Jews of Germany, now and in the future, and to ascertain their views on general Jewish questions relating to Germany."

The conference decided to establish a coordinating committee to work out proposals for common consultations on action by Jowish organizations in the three zones of Western Gormany and Borlin. The committee will be composed of three members each from the British and American zones, two each from the French zone and the Saar, and one member from the western sector of Borlin.

BERGEN-BEISEN CAMP CLOSED IN BRITISH ZONE OF GERMANY; NAZIS MIRDERED 30,000 JEWS THERE

BELSKI, Gornany, July 11. (JTA) -- The Borgon-Bolson camp here was closed yesterday and turned ever to the British Army.

During the Nazi regime 30m,000 Jows were nurdered at the infamous concentration camp. After the war, the British used the camp for displaced Jows. Later, the International Refugee Organization took ever its administration. It was estimated that some 100,000 Jows were processed at the Belson camp prior to emigration between 1945 and the present.

GERMAN JEW NAMED PROSECUTOR OF CITY IN LOWER SAXONY; ANTI-SEMITIC JUDGE DISMISSED

MUNICH, July 11. (JTA) -- A Gorman Jow has been maned prosecutor of the city of Brunswick, it was announced in the Lewer Sarony legiclature today by Acting Minister of Justice Dr. Worner Hefmeister. During the course of the discussion in the legislature on the subject, Wilhelm Ellinghaus, former Minister of Justice and a deputy, declared that it was very important to the government that anti-Sanites should not be named either presecutors or Judges.

The Muorttenberg-Baden logislature was informed by the provincial Minister of Justice that Stuttgart Judge Hans Kettnacker has been dismissed because of an anti-Semitic statement. Stuttgart Jows protected that in the course of a trial, Judge Kettnacker had said that it was unimportant to him whether the defendant had been a "Hazi gauleiter or unsuccessfully tried three times to gas a rabbi."

SCCIATION OF JEWISH CHAHAINS ELECTS SUPPORT TO TRUMAN'S EFFORTS ON KORRAN CONFLICT

NEW YORK, July 11. (JTA) -- The Association of Jewish Chaplains of the U.S. rmed Forces today made public a resolution giving full support to "the efforts of he President of the United States in his appeal to the Soviet Union to cooperate a the effort to end hostilities in Koreas". The resolution commends the President's etormination "to solve the present crisis by working with and through the machinery of the United Nations."

The resolution cells upon Americans of all faiths "to pray and to work for he triumph of peace, freedom and democracy in all lands." It emphasizes that "in his atomic ora, as in all past and future ages, war is not inevitable and peace is an's proper hope and goal."

The Association declined to support, for the time being, a proposal to have the Jowish chaplains' flag become the official religious flag of the American synatogue to replace the Zionist flag. It was emphasized that members of the Association felt that, in time, this suggestion might be adopted but that the time is not yet ripe for it.

The Association issued a call to the American rabbinate "to urge and inspire the entire American Jowish community to dedicate itself to the strengthening of Israel" through: 1. A greater intensification of the religious spirit, both in America and in Israel; 2. A more intimate reciprocal cultural affiliation; 3. A fuller exchange of scientific knewledge and a closer occurring association, including the support of the United Jowish Appeal; 4. Constant American political alertness for the protection of Israel.

JEWISH AGENCY IN ARCENTINA HONORS MEIR GROSSMAN; EXFLAINS HIS STAND ON ZIONIST MOVEMENT

BUENOS AIRES, July 11. (JTA) -- A proposal that the World Zionist Congress become "a kind of a second chember" of the Israel Parliament was made here today by Meir Grossman, veteran Revisionist leader, at a reception tendered in his honor by the Jovish Agency.

Mr. Grossman insisted that such a move was necessary to enable the Zionist movement to influence the policies of the Jewish state. At another meeting, called by the central committee of the local Revisionist Party, Mr. Grossman explained his position in the current dispute within the Revisionist-Horut Party in Israel.

THIRTY AMERICAN JEWISH GROUES SEND 90 DELEGATES TO WORLD HEBREW CULTURAL CONGRESS

NEW YORK, July 11. (JTA) -- Samuel J. Borowsky of New York, president of the Histadruth Ivrith of America and president of the National Council for Jowish Education, left today by plane for Israel to attend the first World Hebrew Cultural Congress which will open in Jerusalem on July 24th. Mr. Borowsky will head a delegation of 90 American representatives from 30 national Jowish organizations and institutions of higher learning.

WORLD CENTER FOR STUDY OF SPINOZA'S HILLOSO HY FOUNDED IN HALFA

HAIFA, July 11. (JTA) -- A world contor for the study of the philosophy of Baruch Spinoza, the seventeenth-century Dutch-born Jewish philosopher, was founded here today.
