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ISRAEL STARTS SURVEY OF MANPOWER; REGISTRATION FOR ARMY RESERVE STARTS SUNDAY

TEL AVIV, July 11. (JTA) -- Registration for army reserve service of all Israel citizens between 20 and 49 years of age will start this Sunday, it was announced here today. Men over 40 will be required to serve for two weeks. Those under 40 will be liable to four weeks' service.

Meanwhile, the Israel Government today began a manpower survey designed to provide specific information concerning the distribution and occupations of some 50,000 men employed in Israel and Israel industries in various parts of the world.

Registration forms have been sent to every enterprise in the country which employs one or more men. It is estimated that between 70,000 and 80,000 enterprises--including collective settlements--will return the completed forms within the statutory one-week period.

The census is being conducted by the government Labor Board which is composed of representatives of various government departments and the Deputy Chief of Staff of the Army, and is headed by Zeev Shorff. The task of the board, Mr. Shorff told newsmen, is to assign individual duties to each man in the event of an emergency. The body will centralize all data on available and reserve manpower and on military and civilian manpower needs.

The Cairo radio today reported that Egypt, which is not supporting the United Nations decision to check the Communist invasion of South Korea, is expecting financial and technical aid from the United States under President Truman's "Point Four Program" for under-developed areas. A committee of representatives of nearly all Egyptian government departments has been formed to discuss how best to use aid under Truman's plan, Soliman Ghannam Bey, Minister of National Economy, told the Parliament last night, the broadcast said.

(From London it was reported that Labor members of the British Parliament suggested in Commons yesterday that Britain discontinue the sending of arms to Egypt in retaliation for the latter's failure to back the U.N. decision on Korea. Woodrow Wyatt, one of the Labor M.P.'s, said "it would have been better for us to have sent jet planes to the Far East rather than to have supplied them to Egypt." He added that Britain is now "the laughing stock of the Middle East" because it is "feeding the mouth that bites us.")

Communist Paper Says Israel Will Become A Battleground; Attacks Zionists

VIENNA, July 11. (JTA) -- The prediction that Israel will become a war front is made by the newspaper Scantea, official organ of the Communist Party of Rumania, which reached here today from Bucharest.

"Evidence that Israel will become a battleground is contained in the fact that the Americans are building a very important strategic highway from Istanbul to Cairo, passing through Israel," the Communist paper writes. It attacks Zionist leaders in Rumania for "preventing Jewish working people from building a happy life alongside the Rumanian people."

JORDAN, NOT A MEMBER OF UNITED NATIONS, SUPPORTS U.N. RESOLUTION ON KOREAN CONFLICT

LAKE SUCCESS, July 11. (JTA) -- The secretariat of the United Nations today received a cablegram from the Government of Transjordan expressing support of "the United Nations resolution aiming at defense of peace." The cable said that all resolutions aimed at preventing aggression should be carried out in a spirit of justice and equity.

ISRAEL WILL NOT CHANGE POLICY OF DEPORTING ARAB INFILTRATORS, PREMIER ANNOUNCES

JERUSALEM, July 11. (JTA) -- Premier David Ben Gurion today told the opposition in the Israel Parliament that the government will not change its policy of deporting Arab infiltrators.

"If the Parliament desires to change that policy it had better elect a new government, but as long as the Parliament adheres to the policy outlined at the inception of the state the police and army will continue to search for and deport infiltrators," he said. Replying to charges of irregularities during searches for infiltrators, he said that complaints should be made to the Ministries of Defense and Police and persons responsible for misdeeds will be punished.

Earlier, Moshe Eron, Mapai deputy, charged that during the raid last week on a Gosh, Arab village near Jerusalem, police and troops had deported children registered for school, persons living in the village for a year and in some cases mothers had been deported and their children left behind. He demanded that the government restore the villagers' confidence in Israel by reuniting families broken up by the deportations.

Eron was joined by an Arab deputy, Mohamed Said el Zabi, of the Nazareth Democratic Party, who complained of the "atrocious" behavior of the police and soldiers involved in the raid and charged that they deported children and aged people. A vote of no confidence in the government was decisively defeated by the Knesset.

An official communique today revealed that a curfew was imposed at Kfar Tirah, an Eastern Sharon near Ramath Hakovosh, last Saturday and a party of Israel police and Army personnel searched the village for Arab infiltrators and contraband.

Several hundred villagers were searched and questioned during the 12-hour operation, which was carried out with a minimum of inconvenience for the inhabitants. A small number of Arabs were detained and quantities of flour, tobacco, cloth, nylon products and soap which had been smuggled in were seized, as was a hoard of several hundred Palestinian pounds issued during the Mandatory regime.

ISRAEL'S 2,000 STRIKING NURSES RETURN TO WORK; HISTADRUT AGREES TO PRESENT THEIR DEMANDS

TEL AVIV, July 11. (JTA) -- Israel's 2,000 striking nurses returned to work today following an agreement late last night with the Histadrut which consented to present the strikers' demands to the government on condition that they resume their work in government, municipal and Hadassah hospitals. Earlier, the Histadrut outlawed the nurses' strike.

The five-day strike was precipitated by the rejection of the nurses' demands for a 42-hour six-day work week during the summer months, higher family allowances and longer vacations. It is understood that the government is willing to grant the requests on vacation and pay, but is unable to agree to a shorter working week owing to the shortage of nurses in Israel.

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KING OF ENGLAND TO TENDER GARDEN PARTY AT HIS PALACE TO ISRAEL PARLIAMENTARY DELEGATION

LONDON, July 11. (JTA) -- The King of England will tender a garden party at Buckingham Palace for the Israel Parliamentary delegation which is due to arrive by air here tomorrow. The affair will take place on Thursday afternoon.

Contrary to reports from Jerusalem that the left Socialist Mapam party is not represented on the delegation, it was learned here today that the delegation represents seven parties in the Israel Parliament including the Mapam. However, the extreme right-wing Horut Party, which is strongly anti-British, is not represented in the delegation.

The delegation will, upon its arrival, be met at the airfield by representatives of the British section of Interparliamentary Union and by officials of the Israel Legation. It will call on Thursday morning on the Lord Mayor of London at Mansion House and will later be received by the Parliamentary Undersecretary of the Foreign Office. On Friday the Israelis will lunch with Prime Minister Clement Attlee. The delegation will spend more than a week in England during which it will meet with leading members of the British Parliament on questions concerning British-Israel friendship.

ONE U.S. DEFENDANT PLEADS GUILTY. TWO OTHERS JUDGED INNOCENT OF SHIPPING ARMS TO ISRAEL

LOS ANGELES, July 11. (JTA) -- The trial of three men on charges of smuggling war material from California to Palestine in 1948 ended in Federal Court here yesterday when one defendant pleaded guilty and the charges against the other two were dismissed.

The defendant who changed his plea to guilty was Norman N. Greenspan of Las Vegas, Nevada. The other defendants were Lawrence C. Ives and Lloyd Rosenblum, both of New York. The judge will sentence Mr. Greenspan on Monday. The maximum sentence is two years imprisonment or \$10,000 in fines, or both.

WEIZMANN AND PARTY ARRIVE IN SWITZERLAND; OFFICIALLY WELCOMED IN BRIEF CEREMONY

ZURICH, July 11. (JTA) -- Israel President Weizmann and his party arrived in Switzerland yesterday afternoon and, after a brief welcoming ceremony at the frontier, proceeded to a health resort on Lake Lucerne. When the party crossed the border from Italy it was met at the Chiasso station by Swiss cantonal and Federal representatives and by Dr. Monachon Kahany and Eliezer Doron, Israel representatives in Switzerland.

ISRAEL MINISTER TO HUNGARY ARRIVES IN BUDAPEST TO PRESENT CREDENTIALS TO PRESIDENT

BUDAPEST, July 11. (JTA) -- Shmuel Eliyashov, Israel Minister to Hungary, arrived here today from Prague to present his credentials to the President.

U.S. MARITIME TRAINING VESSEL DUE TO VISIT HAIFA; 425 MEN TO BE GUESTS OF ISRAEL NAVY

HAIFA, July 11. (JTA) -- The American maritime training ship S.S. Empire State is due to dock here Thursday with 425 cadets, officers and men. They will spend six days here as guests of the Israel Navy.

GERMAN JEWISH GROUPS MEET IN FRANKFURT; ADVANCE DEMANDS TO WEST GERMAN GOVERNMENT

FRANKFURT, July 11. (JTA) -- A demand that the West German Government produce an official record of the facts of the extermination and persecution of European Jews during the Nazi regime was voiced at the first conference sponsored by the World Jewish Congress in Germany, which concluded here today.

The conference called for legislation making incitement to racial hatred a punishable crime. It also urged revision of all text-books with anti-Semitic material and the dismissal of teachers who foster anti-Semitism in German schools.

Other demands advanced by the parley included the speeding up of restitution of property and stronger legislation for indemnification for loss of life, health and freedom. Assets confiscated from Nazi war criminals should be used for this purpose, the delegates urged. The Bonn Government was also urged to help transfer heirless and unclaimed Jewish property through authorized Jewish organizations.

The conference was attended by delegates of displaced Jews and Jews living in German communities of the three Western zones and the Western sector of Berlin, to "consider the urgent questions of the welfare of the Jews of Germany, now and in the future, and to ascertain their views on general Jewish questions relating to Germany."

The conference decided to establish a coordinating committee to work out proposals for common consultations on action by Jewish organizations in the three zones of Western Germany and Berlin. The committee will be composed of three members each from the British and American zones, two each from the French zone and the Saar, and one member from the western sector of Berlin.

BERGEN-BELSEN CAMP CLOSED IN BRITISH ZONE OF GERMANY; NAZIS MURDERED 30,000 JEWS THERE

BELSEN, Germany, July 11. (JTA) -- The Bergen-Belsen camp here was closed yesterday and turned over to the British Army.

During the Nazi regime some 30,000 Jews were murdered at the infamous concentration camp. After the war, the British used the camp for displaced Jews. Later, the International Refugee Organization took over its administration. It was estimated that some 100,000 Jews were processed at the Belsen camp prior to emigration between 1945 and the present.

GERMAN JEW NAMED PROSECUTOR OF CITY IN LOWER SAXONY; ANTI-SEMITIC JUDGE DISMISSED

MUNICH, July 11. (JTA) -- A German Jew has been named prosecutor of the city of Brunswick, it was announced in the Lower Saxony legislature today by Acting Minister of Justice Dr. Werner Hofmeister. During the course of the discussion in the legislature on the subject, Wilhelm Ellinghaus, former Minister of Justice and a deputy, declared that it was very important to the government that anti-Semites should not be named either prosecutors or judges.

The Wuertemberg-Baden legislature was informed by the provincial Minister of Justice that Stuttgart Judge Hans Kottnacker has been dismissed because of an anti-Semitic statement. Stuttgart Jews protested that in the course of a trial, Judge Kottnacker had said that it was unimportant to him whether the defendant had been a "Nazi gauleiter or unsuccessfully tried three times to gas a rabbi."
