ISRAEL WILL SEND "SUBSTANTIAL QUANTITIES" OF DRUGS TO U.N. ARMED FORCES IN KOREA

IAKE SUCCESS, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- United Nations headquarters here announced today that a cable was received by the U.N. Secretariat from Israel's Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett stating that "at this stage" Israel could supply "substantial quantities" of certain drugs at three to four weeks notice, to aid U.N. forces fighting in Korea.

POLICE PERMITS TO BE NEEDED IN ISRAEL FOR HOLDING OF OPEN-AIR MEETINGS, DENONSTRATIONS

JERUSALEM, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- The Israel Cabinet decided today to put into force the police ordinance introduced by the British administration in Palestine which movided that groups seeking to hold open-air meetings or demonstrations must first secure a permit from the District Commissioner of the area where the meetings are to be held.

Three Tel Aviv motion picture theatres were today exhibiting the American newsreel depicting the war in Korea which was cancelled during the week-end when demonstrators identified as Communists staged a series of outbursts at the Orion Theatre where the film was shown. Three other cinemas, including the Orion, are abstaining from showing the film for fear of further demonstrations.

Police authorities offered to protect the motion picture theatre showing the documentary film.

ISRAEL CABINET HEARS REPORT ON FINANCIAL TAIKS IN U.S., ENGLAND AND FRANCE

JERUSALEM, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- The results of his trip to the United States were reported today at a Cabinet meeting by David Rorowitz, director-general of Israel's Ministry of Finance. He also reported on his financial talks in England and France.

Finance Minister Eliezer Kaplan today declared that requests by industrialists in Jerusalem for raw materials will receive favorable consideration. He spoke at the opening of the first "Graft and Industrial Exhibition" in this city. The exhibit depicts the development of Jerusalem's industries, including the wine and liquor industry, confectioneries, carpentry, glass making and fur treatment.

Half of Jerusalem's population is now engaged in various industrial occupations, Mayor Daniel Auster told the exhibition guests attending the opening ceremony. He predicted a speedier development of the city with the completion of a municipal airport.

The Foreign Relation Committee of the Knesset today started discussion on the question of drafting an appeal to the Soviet Government to permit the emigration of Jews from the Soviet Union to the Jewish state. An announcement that such an appeal will be directed by the Israel Government to Moscow was made in parliament several days aro.

JORDAN MEMBERS OF ARMISTICE COMMISSION OUTLINE CONDITIONS FOR PEACE WITH ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- The conditions under which Jordan is willing to conclude permanent peace with Israel were outlined today in a broadcast over the British-controlled Near East Arabic Radio in Cyprus.

The broadcast said that the Jordan delegation to the mixed armistice commission beliëves that peace would be possible if Israel returns Jaffa and a section of Lydda to the Arabs, reopens the Jerusalem-Bethlehem road in exchange for Jordan's reopening the road from Jerusalem to Mt. Scopus, pays compensation to Arab refugees who fled from territory now belonging to Israel and restitutes the Ruttenberg power station to the Arabs.

A meeting of the Israel-Jordan armistice commission was scheduled for today in Jerusalem, but Jordanians at the last minute requested a postponement. No new date for a meeting was fired.

An Israel military spokesman confirmed today that a clash took place between an Israel military patrol and a band of Arab smugglers northeast of Beersheba last Wednesday night. He said ten smugglers were killed, ten were captured and three older men were handed over to the Arab Legion.

The smuggling band was divided into four groups, the spokesman said. He added that the Arabs were proceeding from Egypt to Jordan when they were intercepted in Jewish territory by a border patrol. The Israelis confiscated the smugglers' goods, which included large quantities of cotton, primus stoves, lamps and a large number of gold sovereigns.

MERCHANIS ASSOCIATION IN ISRAEL CALLS FOR "FREE ECONOMY AND FREE ENTER PRISE"

TEL AVIV, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- The General Merchants Association today made public the text of a resolution adopted at its national conference which closed here during the week-end. The major resolution emphasized that "only a free economy and free enterprise can bring about Israel's development" and increase foreign capital investment in the Jewish state.

Other resolutions called for closer relations between merchants in Israel and the Jewish middle class throughout the world and the sending of delegations abroad to expedite investment in Israel. The parley also urged merchants affiliated with political parties to adopt an "economic attitude in their respective parties compatible with the Association's plea for free initiative."

Agudah Parley In Israel Discusses Government's Economic Policy

TEL AVIV, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- Grave anxiety over the Israel Government's economic policies was voiced here last night at the opening session of a national conference of the Orthodox Agudas Israel Organization.

Rabbi A. Abramowich, general secretary of the organization, who opened the meeting, announced that a national convention of the Agudas Israel will take place in Jerusalem nort week. He charged that the government's economic programs were "threatening the eristence of the middle classes."

Jacob Rosenheim, world leader of the Agudah, urged "immediate union" of all dissenting factions in the organization and called on them to accept the central rule of the world organization.

SAME DEPT. SPONSORS STUDY OF U.S. LEGISLATIVE BODIES BY KNESSET CHIEF SECRETARY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- Moshe Rosetti, chief secretary of the Knesset, is making a two-month tour of the United States to study the organization of federal, state, and municipal legislative bodies, the State Department said today. His visit is sponsored by the Department through the grant-in-aid program for the exchange of mersons.

As Chief Secretary of the Israel parliament, Mr. Rosetti is in charge of all administration connected with the parliament. A former official of the municipality of Stephney, London, Mr. Rosetti also served as chief of the information department of the Jewish Agency in Britain and as secretary of the Jewish National Board of Great Britain.

MAZI VICTIMS REDOVER \$100,000,000 IN U.S. ZONE OF GERMANY; 85,000 CIAIMS STILL BENDING

FRANKFURT, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- Settlement of restitution claims filed by persons prosecuted by the Nazis now totals 418,696,927 Deutsche marks, (about \$100,000,000) in property and money, officials of the U.S. zone of Germany revealed here paterday. About 85,000 claims still remain unsettled, they reported.

Admitting that the Nazi victims, mostly Jews, would only collect a fraction of the property confiscated by the Germans during the Hitler regime, the officials said that the value of settlements still pending is impossible to estimate.

Of the total thus far collected, the Jewish Restitution Successor Organization -- which recovers property left by heirless Jewish victims and distributes the money among Jewish welfere organizations -- received \$880,000. Claimants in the U.S. were awarded \$4,443,500, in Germany \$1,850,000, while those in Israel received \$358,000.

UNITED NATIONS COMMITTEE URGES ELECTION OF U.N. HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR REFUGEES

GENEVA, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- The social committee of the U.N. Economic and Social Council today adopted a resolution providing for election by the General Assembly of a High Commissioner for Refugees.

The resolution was adopted by nine votes in favor, none against and six abstentions—Britain, Canada, Australia, Denmark, Rakistan, and India. It will go to the next General Assembly, after approval by the Economic and Social Council.

JENS IN HUNGARY CHARGED WITH SABOTAGING FIVE-YEAR PLAN, UNDERGROUND REPORT SAYS

NEW YCRK, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- The charge that anti-Semitic tendencies exist in Communist Hungary and that "they are directed from higher places, probably by orders from Moscow," was made in the New York Times today by Bela Fabian, member of the executive committee of the Hungarian National Council.

Mr. Fabian, who emphasizes that the Eungarian National Council is receiving reliable underground reports from Hungary, sags that the official instigators of the "anti-Semitic tendencies" are Minister Joseph Revai, former Communist Minister Istvan Kossa and Joseph Gem, a member of the Hungarian parliament. "The Jews are accused of sabotaging Hungary's Five-Year Plan," he reports.

DEFORTATION OF FORMER GESTAFO OFFICIAL WHO KILLED 200,000 JEWS DEMANDED IN BRAZIL

RIO DE JAMEIRO, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- Jews here last night stoned the business premises of Herbert Cukurs, said to have been responsible for the slaughter of 200,000 Jews while head of the Nazi Gestapo in Lithuania, Reuters reported.

The attack, at the Rodrigo de Freitas Lake, followed a meeting to protest against the government's refusal to expel Cukurs from the country. Police arrested three Jews alleged to have been involved in the stone-throwing demonstration, the report said.

ENGLISH-JEWISH MEWSEAPERS ASSN. HITS "UNETHICAL TACTICS" IN ADVERTISING SOLICITING

DETROIT, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- The American Association of English-Jevish Newspapers, in a strongly-worded statement released today, calls the attention of all American Jevish communities to "unethical and scandalous tactics" charged against a number of publications calling themselves "national magazines" in solicitation of avertising, and warms that continuation of such practices will harm the existing newspapers. In several instances, important national organizations which publish some of the guilty periodicals share in the accusations.

The publishers of newspapers affilized with the American Association of English-Jevish Newspapers charge in their statement that national organizations have been "duped" by irresponsible solicitors to submit to a scheme which involves the clipping of advertisements from issues of English-Jevish newspapers--particularly holiday editions; the mailing of copies of such advertisements to the advertisers, giving the impression that they appeared in the columns of the magazines in whose behalf the solicitations are made; the attaching of a bill to the ads asking for immediate payment for them, in one case giving the advertiser five days in which to reject the ad, else making himself responsible for its use.

"These shocking practices have outraged not only Jewish advertisers but also non-Jews who have called our member newspapers to express their resentment," the statement says. "One magazine was told by an advertiser that he is interested in supporting only the local newspapers. In many instances the attitude of 'a plague on both your houses' has resulted in direct harm to the English-Jewish weekly newspapers which are constantly called upon to render services to the very organizations. which now seek to stab them in the back by their unethical practices.

"The American Association of English-Jewish Newspapers has made a sincere effort to avoid a scandal," the statement continues. "He have called this matter to the attention of the National Community Relations Advisory Council, and we hope that the N.C.R.A.C. will be strong enough to solve this internal problem. We have prevailed upon our member newspapers not to turn the matter over to their respective Business breaus and to the U.S. Postal authorities. But we are forced to make this public statement in our own columns and through the Jewish Telegraphic Agency in order that responsible Jews-advertisers and those who are concerned that the highest Jewish ethical values should be enforced-should not be misled by irresponsible solicitors."

The statement is signed by Philip Slomovitz, president of the Association and ditor of The Detroit Jewish News; Elias Jacobs, publisher, Buffalo Jewish Review, and Jacques Back, editor, Nashville Observer, secretaries; Ieo H. Frisch, publisher, Minneaplois Jewish World, treasurer; Robert S. Gamsey, editor, Denver Jewish News; Irving C. Rhodes, publisher, Wisconsin Jewish Chronicle; A. Slabot, Jewish Ledger, New Orleans, Iā.; Myer Kelēman, B'nai B'rith Messenger, Los Angelēs. It alsō has the endorsement of seven other members of the Association's executive committee and an additional 23 affiliated publishers.

CALIFORNIA EDUCATION BOARD ASKED TO BAR DISCRIMINATION IN COMMERCIAL SCHOOLS

SAN FRAIDISCO, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- The California State Board of Education was saked to take immediate action to eliminate racial and religious discrimination in the admission policy of commercial training schools.

The request was made by the California Federation for Civic Unity in a letter to Roy Simpson, State Superintendent of Rublic Instruction. The letter charged that "instances of such discrimination have been reported and confirmed on several instances, especially where veterans have been involved."

The letter said that "an overall policy solution be undertaken in the accreditation standards of the State Board of Education." Such action would avoid embar-rassing certain schools by raising specific cases where discrimination has been found.

GERALD L.K. SMITH ATTACKS JEWS AT LOS ANGELES MEETING; CITES CHICAGO TRIBUNE SLANDER

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- The charge that Jews are running the United States was voiced here by Gerald L.K. Smith, leader of the anti-Semitic Christian Nationalist Crusade, addressing a meeting of about 1,500 persons here.

He also mentioned the article published recently by the Chicago Tribune against Henry Morgenthau, Supreme Court Justice Felix Frankfurter and Senator Herbert Lehman but failed to say that the editors of the paper apologized to representatives of Jevish organizations for the anti-Jewish insinuations which the article contained.

DEMOCRATS AND REPUBLICANS IN CALIFORNIA URGE LEGISLATION TO COMBAT EMPLOYMENT BIAS

SACRAMENTO, Calif. Aug. 14. (JTA) -- Planks urging legislation guaranteeing equal employment opportunity regardless of race, color, or creed to all Americans were adopted by both the Republican and Democratic State Central Committees at their party conventions here this week-end. The Democrats adopted a plank calling outright for F.E.R.G. legislation by the California legislature, with a commission and the necessary enforcement machinery.

The Republicans adopted a plank reading: "No principle of this republic is more basic than insuring the equality of all individuals in their right to live, to be free to work, to own property and to pursue happiness. Equal opportunity in these matters must always be guaranteed all individuals regardless of race, religion, color, or place of birth. We urge favorable enactment of legislature to this end."

ISRAEL BARTICIBATES IN "INTERNATIONAL EARTH CEREMONY" HELD IN LOS ANGELES

IOS ANGELES, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- Israel, along with 18 other countries, took part in the "International Earth Ceremony" held here. The noted cellist, Gregor Platigorsky, represented Israel. As a gesture of world peace, soil from the 19 participating countries was blended with American soil. A tree will later be planted in the blended soil.

ONE-AND-HALF SQUARE MILES OF OLIVE TREES DESTROYED IN HUGE FIRE SOUTH OF HALFA

HAIFA, Aug. 14. (JTA) -- One-and-a-half square miles of clive trees near Athlit, ten miles south of Haifa, were destroyed by fire. The blaze was brought under control after an eight-hour struggle by fire brigades and 200 volunteers.
