JORDAN ASKS U.N. TO SUSPEND ACTION IN DISPUTED LAND CLAIM, ISRAEL OFFICIAL REPORTS

JERUSALEM, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- The Government of Jordan has requested U.N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie to suspend further action over the disputed Naharayim area, Lt. Col. A. Harkavi, Israel's chief representative to the mixed armistice commissions, announced today. He explained that the Jordanians have "now observed the signature of John Glubb Pasha, Arab Legion commander during the Arab-Israel war, on a map showing that the disputed area was awarded to Israel" on June 22, 1949.

(A week-end press agency dispatch from Amman reported that the Jordan Government threatened to take military action within four days unless Israel forces withdrew from the Naharayim sector. U.N. truce chief Gen. William Riley declared in Tel Aviv that the disputed area was definitely in Israel territory, but added that he had legal reservations arising out of the fact that the land had belonged to Jordan before the Palestine fighting.)

Meanwhile, Arab radio stations in the Middle East launched a violent anti-Israel propaganda campaign during the week-end over the Israel-Jordan crisis. The British-controlled Near East Arabic Radio asserted that "Jordan considers the Israel action very serious and it might involve the Arabs in another war." It was also reported that the Syrian Cabinet discussed the alleged Israel "invasion of Arab territory" last Wednesday and then proceeded to contact all Arab capitals in order to line them up for a united stand. It is understood that Syria also informed Jordan that it is resolved "to drive out the Jews by force."

Col. Harkavi at the same time declared that Israel is deeply concerned over the "intensification recently of incidents along the Egyptian border, culminating in the mining of a military vehicle in the Negev (see P. 2)." Israel military officials, who view the incident with grave anxiety, "will raise the most energetic protest at the forthcoming meeting of the Israel-Egyptian mixed armistice commission," he added.

INCLUSION ON U.N. SECURITY COUNCIL AGENDA OF ISRAEL, EGYPT COMPLAINTS SET FOR TODAY

IAKE SUCCESS, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- The United Nations Security Council is expected to discuss tomorrow afternoon the inclusion of Egyptian and Israel complaints of alleged armistice violations on its agenda. Ambassador Aubrey S. Eban, who also heads Israel's delegation to the U.N., is expected to be present during the Council discussion. (Meanwhile, it was revealed late today that Israel Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett, who will head the Jewish state's delegation to the U.N. General Assembly opening on Tuesday, was scheduled to arrive in New York from Paris by air late tonight.)

Earlier, Israel called upon the Security Council to consider charges that two Arab nations--Egypt and Jordan--were "officially and publicly threatening aggressive action" against it. Israel filed four complaints for the Council's agenda. They included maintenance of an Egyptian blockade on Israel-bound shipping in the Suez Canal, inability of Israelis to go to their Jordan-held holy places and alleged Egyptian and Jordan violations of armistice procedures.

The move came one day after Egypt had put the Palestine case on the Council's list for Monday's session, after scheduled items on Korea and Formosa. Egypt's complaint charged Israel was violating the U.N. armistice by driving "thousands of Palestine Arabs" into Egyptian territory.

ISRAEL JEEP WRECKED BY LAND MINE IN CENTRAL NEGEV; HAND GRENADES THROWN FROM AMBUSH

JERUSALEM, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- An Israel military jeep was wrecked during the week-end when it struck a land mine in the central Negev, a military spokesman disclosed here today. Hand grenades were simultaneously thrown at the jeep from ambush, he said, but the occupants escaped without casualties.

Two Arab constables attached to the Israel police force and one Arab soldier of the Israel Army were bound and forced across the Israel border today by members of the Jordan National Guard stationed in the Arab triangle area.

The incident started when a 70-year-old Arab shepherd was held up by three Jordan National Guardsmen from Kfar Anin, located south of Affula, who made off with 17 heads of sheep. The two Arab constables and the Arab soldier were sent to the scene of the attack and as they approached the area, were fired on by the Arab Guardsmen.

The Israelis returned the fire, whereupon the Jordan National Guard leader called on the three Israel Arabs to desist from further firing and come up to the frontier to settle the dispute amicably. When the three Israelis approached the border, they were overpowered by eight Jordanians who bound them carefully and took them to Kfar Anin. An investigation has been launched.

Israel Army Ends Ten-Day Mopping-Up Operation Against Infiltrates

TEL AVIV, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- The Israel Army this week-end completed a ten-day "mopping-up operation" in the Beit Jibrin area, just north of the Negev desert.

A number of Arab infiltrates who have been mining Israel roads and otherwise ambushing Jewish soldiers and settlers were killed and many more were driven out of Israel territory. A number of Israel soldiers were killed in such a land mine ambush some weeks ago.

ISRAEL OFFICIAL SAYS 34,000 TURKISH JEWS SETTLED IN ISRAEL, 900 RETURNED TO ISTANBUL

ISTANBUL, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Sabetai Dinar, head of the Turkish Department of the Israel Foreign Office, who arrived here for a short visit, declared today that 34,000 Turkish Jews have settled in Israel since its establishment while only 900-- "most of whom were unprepared for the life and conditions in the Jewish state"--returned to Turkey.

Mr. Dinar conferred with senior officials of the Turkish Foreign Ministry, all of whom, he said, showed "sympathetic understanding of Israel's problems." He declared that Israel appreciated the efforts of the Turkish member on the U.N. Palestine Conciliation Commission to bring peace and stability to the Middle East, and voiced the hope that the Turkish people would realize that the U.N. Commission's failure is not the fault of the Israelis.

U.N. OFFICIALS IN JERUSALEM HONOR BERNADOTTE ON SECOND ANNIVERSARY OF ASSASSINATION

JERUSALEM, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- United Nations officials here today paid tribute to the memory of Count Folke Bernadotte, U.N. Palestine mediator, who was assassinated in Jerusalem two years ago by extremists. Abraham Nissan, Israel's Minister to Sweden and Denmark, attended a special service honoring the late Swedish diplomat which was held at St. Andrew's Church here.

PERON SAYS NO DIRECT ACTION CAN BE TAKEN AGAINST ANTI-SEMITIC PAPERS IN ARGENTINA

Buenos Aires, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- The DAIA, central representative body of Argentine Jewry, today received a reply from President Juan Peron to its appeal last week that he take measures against anti-Semitic publications in Argentina. The reply pointed out that direct action could not be taken against the newspapers because they enjoy the freedom of the press.

The reply, signed by the President's secretary, says that the sentiments of the publications cited by the DAIA do not represent the feelings of the Argentine people and that the "President's opinions regarding the question which has caused you concern are well known and no campaign intending to change them will succeed." The note concluded with the hope that the expression of the President's sentiments would allay the fears of the Jewish community.

Earlier, President Peron was quoted by a spokesman of the O.I.A. (Organizacion Israelita Argentina), pro-Peron Jewish group, as declaring that recent anti-Semitic street incidents which took place here were also directed against the government and were intended to destroy the "prevailing harmony."

Solomon Chichilnitsky, acting president of the O.I.A., said after a meeting with Peron that the Argentine President assured him that discrimination against Jewish physicians in public hospitals will not be tolerated. Peron also promised to approve the admission to Argentina of 25 Jewish families who will be settled on Jewish Colonization Association land, as well as the entry of 20 Jewish writers now living in Paris, the O.I.A. leader added.

NEW JEWISH BANK TO OPEN IN BERLIN NEXT MONTH; TO ADMINISTER RESTITUTION CLAIMS

Berlin, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- A newly-founded Jewish bank, with an initial capitalization of 500,000 Deutschmarks, will be opened here early next month, it was announced here today.

The bank will administer funds received from restitution claims on behalf of Jews presently living abroad or for the heirs of the original owners, advise claimants in restitution matters, and devote particular attention to the problem of bloated accounts and the possibilities of their transfer abroad. The bank's board includes Adolph Schoyer, Dr. Kurt Werthauer, Heinz Galinski and other communal leaders.

Earlier, it was reported from Weisbaden that Werner Hilpert, Finance Minister of Hesse, banned the Jewish Bank for Industry and Commerce, the only Jewish-owned bank in Western Germany, from continuing its activities. An official statement said the ban had been imposed after an inquiry into the bank's activities by a state-appointed committee last month.

Herr Hilpert ordered the investigation, according to German press reports, after the bank was alleged to have paid about \$1,050,000 of restitution claims in cash to an unnamed alien whose whereabouts were unknown. The bank's board of managers declared these allegations were "completely unfounded."

410 HUNGARIAN JEWISH EMIGRANTS LEAVE BUDAPEST EN ROUTE TO ISRAEL; ABOUT 2,000 DEPARTED

Budaest, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- A group of 410 Jewish immigrants from Hungary left here for Venice, Italy, where they will embark on the Israel transport Komeniut which will take them to Haifa.

To date a total of 1,960 Hungarian Jewish immigrants left this country for Israel under terms of the Israel-Hungarian emigration agreement. About half of the emigrants were women and the rest were men and children.

BROWDY TELLS Z.O.A. BARLEY ISRAEL DECISION ON UNLIMITED IMMIGRATION IS "IRREVOCABLE"

NEW YORK, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Benjamin G. Browdy, president of the Zionist Organization of America, today termed as "irrevocable" the decision of the Israel Government to keep the doors of the Jewish state wide open to unlimited immigration despite the serious impact of such an influx upon the economic condition of the country.

"Israel is prepared, if necessary, to receive 1,000,000 immigrants within the next three years, and certainly a minimum of 600,000," he said. "Prime Minister Ben-Gurion described this as a matter of great urgency. The integration of 600,000 immigrants within three years will require \$1,500,000,000, of which \$1,000,000,000 must be forthcoming through the United Jewish Appeal, private investments, and a bond issue loan from American Jewry."

Addressing a meeting of the national executive committee of the Z.O.A. at the Hotel Biltmore, attended by members from all parts of the country, Mr. Browdy, who last week returned from the extraordinary economic conference in Jerusalem convened by the Israel Government and the Jewish Agency, declared that although Israel is now confronted by serious economic difficulties, there is no imminence of an economic collapse. Reports to this effect are greatly exaggerated, he said. "The inflationary trend reported from sources outside of Israel is not in evidence," he added.

Charges Resurgence of Anti-Semitic Propaganda Resulting from Korean War

Referring to developments on the American scene, Mr. Browdy declared that while the Z.O.A. is resolved to do its full share in the all-out effort to mobilize maximum economic aid for Israel, it is also determined to play an ever greater part in American civic affairs. The Z.O.A. president charged that "dark forces in this country, which have been thriving on racial and religious prejudices, are now engaged in exploiting the tension that has been engendered by the Korean war to intensify their anti-Jewish propaganda."

"American Jews, as an integral part of the American community, fully and wholeheartedly support the action of our Government in Korea in its effort to halt Communist aggression," he declared. Asserting that anti-Semitic forces in this country, by their "propaganda and activities in arousing racial and religious prejudices and dissention, are undermining the very foundation of democracy on which this country is built," Mr. Browdy voiced the hope that the U.S. Government "will not treat these activities lightly and will, as in the case of Communist activities, take drastic action to combat them. The Z.O.A. president said his organization will join other national Jewish organizations in this country in a "relentless fight to expose these forces and to render them harmless."

Dr. Emanuel Neumann, former president of the Z.O.A., referring to the Jerusalem conference, said: "The discussions were marked by seriousness and a great sense of responsibility. Leaders of the Israel Government made full and frank presentations of the financial and economic problems confronting the state and documented the case for a vastly increased outlay of funds during the next three years. The proposal to launch a public loan was subjected to critical examination and the arguments pro and con carefully considered. The statement which finally emerged was adopted virtually without dissent."

Dr. Harris J. Levine, president of the Jewish National Fund of America, said the J.N.F. decided to purchase from the Israel Development Company--the Israel Government agency in charge of enemy property--60,000 dunams of land, comprising the Huleh region. He also announced that the J.N.F. has adopted a program calling for "the planting of 3,000,000 trees in Israel within the next 12 months, in a great effort to improve the soil of Israel and at the same time to provide employment for the new immigrants."

COALITION BETWEEN MAPAI IN ISRAEL AND GENERAL ZIONISTS ABROAD URGED BY DR. GOLDMANN

PARIS, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Dr. Nahum Goldmann, chairman of the American section of the Jewish Agency, addressing the opening session of the European conference of General Zionists here today, said that a "coalition is necessary between the Mapai in Israel and the General Zionists in the Diaspora." The General Zionists, he added, must be "prepared for an honest alliance, which is possible only through goodwill and mutual understanding."

Warning against the "dangerous illusion" that Zionism had "become useless following creation of the state of Israel," Dr. Goldmann said the experience of the last two years has shown that "Israel alone cannot fulfill the aim of Zionism--that is, the ingathering of exiles--and Jews throughout the world must be made conscious of their responsibility towards Israel."

This consciousness, Dr. Goldmann declared, is "strengthened through political parties which form a "necessary link between Zionists abroad and Israel." He added: "The cooperation of the Government of Israel with the Jewish Agency must be based on an honest coalition between labor in Israel and Zionists in the Galut."

Earlier, Dr. Goldmann said that the recent emergency economic conference of Israel and American Jewish leaders in Jerusalem made Americans aware of the magnitude of the problem facing Israel and convinced them that a campaign in behalf of the Jewish state cannot be conducted merely along humanitarian lines but must be based on constructive conceptions.

He also expressed the opinion that the prospects are good for an enlarged fund-raising and bond-selling campaign in the United States and said that once it is decided to float a bond issue, it will take at least six months to get it under way, since arrangements must be made in many countries. The bond issue will not be confined to the U.S., he added.

AMERICAN JEWISH COMMITTEE PROTESTS APPOINTMENT OF NAZIS TO GOVERNMENT OF SCHLESWIG

PARIS, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- A protest against the appointment of Walter Bertram, a former leading Nazi, as Minister-President of the Province of Schleswig-Holstein, in the British zone of Germany, was issued here today by the European office of the American Jewish Committee. The protest was also directed against the appointment of Hans Asbach, former Nazi military governor of the Ukraine, as Minister of Social Affairs in the same provincial government.

JEWISH CEMETERY IN GERMANY IS REDEDICATED; SPEAKERS VOW END TO NAZI BARBARISM

DUESSELDORF, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Municipal authorities and representatives of Catholic and Protestant churches today attended rededication ceremonies for the Jewish cemetery at Opladen. Destroyed during the Nazi regime, the cemetery was officially handed over to the Duesseldorf Jewish community, whose jurisdiction extends to Opladen. Speakers at the ceremonies vowed to prevent a recurrence of Nazi barbarism and to maintain democracy in Germany.

GENERAL ANDERS, POLISH ANTI-SEMITIC, GETS STATE DEPARTMENT PERMISSION TO VISIT U.S.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- The State Department during the week-end confirmed that Gen. Wladyslaw Anders, anti-Semitic Polish leader, has been cleared for a private visit to the United States and should arrive in New York about September 24.

A spokesman for the Polish American Congress said that Anders would be honored as principal speaker at a Pulaaki Day Dinner at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York on October 1. It was explained that Anders is "a good anti-Communist."

MAJOR U.S. JEWISH ORGANIZATIONS URGE PRESIDENT TRUMAN TO VETO ANTI-SUBVERSIVE BILL

NEW YORK, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Eight major Jewish organizations, in combination with a number of other liberal, labor, welfare and religious organizations, today urged President Truman to veto the anti-subversive bill (H.R. 9490) reported out by a Congressional Conference Committee on the grounds that this legislation represents "the use of totalitarian methods to fight totalitarian dangers."

In a telegram to the President, the organizations said: "We feel as you do that the bill jeopardizes the rights of individuals and organizations which not only are not subversive but are dedicated in principle and program to the fight against Communism. We feel as you do that this bill is a violation of traditional American guarantees of individual freedom."

Declaring that the Communist threat can be "adequately dealt with by strengthening of espionage and other genuine security laws," the organizations urged the President to issue a "stinging" veto message which might help to "restore those liberties which already are being violated in all too many communities in our great country." Jewish organizations which signed the statement were: American Jewish Committee; American Jewish Congress; Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith; Jewish Labor Committee; Jewish War Veterans of U.S.A.; National Community Relations Advisory Council; National Council of Jewish Women; and Union of American Hebrew Congregations.

U.S. SUPREME COURT JUSTICE DOUGLAS WILL RECEIVE ANNUAL YESHIVA UNIVERSITY AWARD

NEW YORK, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Justice William O. Douglas of the United States Supreme Court was named today to receive Yeshiva University's annual Morris Morgestern Award which will be presented at the University's Charter Day Dinner to be held November 12 at the Hotel Astor.

Justice Douglas will receive the award for "his outstanding contributions in furthering humanitarian principles and brilliant espousal of our democratic way of life." Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt was last year's recipient of the award.

EL AL, ISRAEL AIRLINE, FLIES HOME GROUP OF U.S. CATHOLIC PILGRIMS STRANDED IN ROME

NEW YORK, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- El Al, Israel National Airlines, has come to the aid of Catholic Holy Year pilgrims stranded in Europe because their chartered aircraft has been diverted to the Korean Airlift, it was disclosed today.

By arranging a special flight out of Lydda, El Al was able to fly home 27 of the 84 American Catholic pilgrims stranded in Rome. The remaining Americans will be carried home on subsequent flights shortly. Recently El Al flew home to the United States large numbers of American students and educators stranded in London, Paris and Luxembourg.

NEW ISRAEL MINISTER TO NETHERLANDS PRESENTS HIS CREDENTIALS TO QUEEN JULIANA

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Michael Amir, Israel Minister to the Netherlands, presented his credentials to Queen Juliana here. Afterwards, when the Israel Minister inspected a guard of honor, Jewish schoolchildren watching the ceremonies from the famous Damplatz shouted "Heded" (hurray).
