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J.D.C. RUSHES EMERGENCY DISASTER AID TO 5,000 JEWS IN STRICKEN MOROCCAN TOWN

PARIS, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Emergency disaster relief is being rushed by the Joint Distribution Committee to some 5,000 Jews rendered homeless by a tornado and flood which swept away much of the town of Sefrou, Morocco, last week, it was announced here today by the J.D.C.'s European headquarters.

Some two tons of emergency supplies, including food, clothing, medicines and blankets have already been supplied to the Jews. Trucks are still rolling from J.D.C. depots in Casablanca to the stricken area. The J.D.C. has already allocated 1,000,000 francs for the work, which is under the direction of William Bein, its director in Morocco. Mr. Bein has also organized a Jewish Relief Committee in Sefrou.

In a telephone conversation with the European headquarters, Mr. Bein reported that the bodies of 22 Jews have been recovered and that the search, which has already uncovered 68 victims of all faiths, continues.

The town is situated in the Atlas Mountains, some 12 miles from Fez. Its population was 18,000. Last Monday a torrential downpour which accompanied the tornado flooded the banks of the Aggai River, which runs through Sefrou. All bridges were washed out and many buildings along both banks of the river were destroyed, including the local power plant.

ISRAEL DELEGATE EXPLAINS HIS NATION'S OPPOSITION TO U.N. RECOGNITION OF ARAB LEAGUE

LAKE SUCCESS, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The U.N. General Assembly's Legal Committee spent most of this afternoon listening to a 35-page analysis of the reasons for Israel's opposition to the United Nations recognizing the Arab League as a regional organization under terms of the U.N. Charter.

The record speech for an Israel delegate was made by Dr. Jacob Robinson who drew a detailed contrast between the Arab League and the Organization of American States, the only regional arrangement now recognized by the U.N. He emphasized such features of the League as its ethnical rather than regional criterion for membership, its secrecy and its failure to live up to U.N. principles and interests. In general, Dr. Robinson's arguments were expanded from the memorandum on the issue circulated last week by the Israel delegation.

Earlier, Israel delegate Joseph Oren expressed Israel's approval of the U.N. advisory social welfare services. Speaking before the social committee, he opposed suggestions that the services should be limited to governments ready to bear the expense. He pointed out that the governments unable to finance the services themselves were precisely those requiring them most. He offered an amendment that would enable governments to make suggestions in the selection of experts for the project and to ensure that the inability of governments to finance projects would not reduce the services.

SOUTH AMERICAN ZIONIST PARLEY CLOSES; WIDER YOUTH EDUCATION, CHALUTZIUT SOUGHT

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The South American Zionist Conference concluded here today after approving resolutions calling for "major assistance to youth education and Chalutzit" and recommending initiation of a study of united fund-raising campaigns here.

The conference, attended by delegates from seven countries, also urged the introduction of sanctions against "those denying campaign contributions." The delegates also supported creation of an Israel Institute here under the auspices of the Israel Legation and Jewish Agency. Finally, the delegates called for centralization of the Agency's functions throughout Latin America.

Earlier, addressing the meeting, Zerubavel, left-wing member of the Jewish Agency executive, declared: "We do not want foreign investments which would exploit and sweat our workers." Zerubavel also attacked the "clerical" Jews and criticized Premier David Ben Gurion. His remarks were frequently interrupted and Elisha Dobkin, Jewish Agency leader, countered with a statement that Israel "wants and needs private capital" and demanded that the Russian "satellites let the Jews go to Israel."

U.S. CAN BEST AID ISRAEL BY HELPING BRING PEACE IN PALESTINE, LOUIS LIPSKY SAYS

NEW YORK, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- "The best service the United States Government can render Israel in its present struggle would be to bring about a just peace between the parties concerned and cease to allow itself to be used by the aggressors to force Israel into compromising positions in the political field," Louis Lipsky, chairman of the American Zionist Council, today told a press conference.

Mr. Lipsky, who has just returned from Israel where he attended the extraordinary economic conference, declared: "It is an affront to the Charter of the United Nations that the great effort of redemption and recovery which is going on in Israel should have to be conducted under the shadow of threat and aggression of United Nations members, and that Israel's economic stability and progress should be retarded by the pressing need to expand a large part of its inadequate financial resources on military defenses and military preparedness.

"The interrelation of the economic and political aspects of the Israeli problem must be taken into consideration. Unquestionably, it is to the advantage of the Arab states to prolong Israel's economic difficulties and to use them as a political weapon. Only an economically sound Israel will compel such respect by Arab countries and impel them to sit down with Israel for direct peace talks."

SENATOR PEPPER MEETS WITH BEN GURION; SAYS HE WILL BACK U.S. MILITARY AID TO ISRAEL

NEW YORK, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- A New York Times dispatch from Tel Aviv today quoted U.S. Senator Claude Pepper--who is visiting Israel as a member of a Congressional committee--as stating, following a meeting with Premier David Ben Gurion, that he would recommend U.S. military and any other aid required by the Jewish state.

REPORTS THAT DR. SILVER WILL HEAD ISRAEL BOND DRIVE IN U.S. ARE TERMED UNFOUNDED

NEW YORK, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Informed quarters in New York described today as entirely without foundation week-end reports quoted in Jerusalem dispatches that Dr. Abba Hillel Silver will head the projected Israel loan campaign in the United States. The reports were quoted by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency yesterday.

ISRAEL PREMIER CONFERS WITH LABOR, INDUSTRY LEADERS ON STATE'S ECONOMIC PROBLEMS

JERUSALEM, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Premier David Ben Gurion spent all day yesterday conferring with representatives of trade, industry and labor on Israel's economic problems.

At the same time, the Minister of Justice, Dr. Pincas Rosen, conferred with police and military police officials on methods of combatting the blackmarket.

ISRAEL-JORDAN ARMISTICE COMMITTEE ON JERUSALEM RESUMES SESSIONS AFTER LONG DELAY

JERUSALEM, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The special Israel-Jordan armistice commission on Jerusalem problems, which had suspended meetings for a number of months, resumed sessions yesterday.

U.N. truce chief Maj. Gen. William E. Riley, who attended the session, stressed the importance of the resumption of work by the committee and the many possibilities for its work to cement relations between the two countries. The heads of both delegations to the committee also emphasized the importance of solving the major problems in Jerusalem still outstanding between the nations.

EGYPT PREPARES TO PURCHASE ARMS ABROAD; SYRIA BOYCOTTS CYPRUS OVER ISRAEL TRADE

LONDON, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The Egyptian Cabinet decided yesterday to allocate some 3,000,000 pounds for the purchase of arms abroad, it was reported here today in a dispatch from Cairo. The dispatch said that the action was taken in view of the fact that Britain has reduced the quantity and type of armaments it will sell Egypt.

Syria and several other Arab states have decided to curtail their trade with Cyprus in view of the island's increasing trade commitments with Israel, it was reported here from Beirut.

COMPENSATION CLAIMS UNDER ANGLO-ISRAEL AGREEMENT WILL BE DISCUSSED IN TEL AVIV

LONDON, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- A mission comprising representatives of the British Foreign Office, Colonial Office and the treasury will proceed shortly to Tel Aviv to discuss the details of compensation claims under the recently-concluded Anglo-Israel financial arrangement, it was learned authoritatively here today.

TEL AVIV COURT HEARS EX-OSWIECIM INMATES TESTIFY AGAINST WOMAN WAR CRIMES DEFENDANT

TEL AVIV, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Charges of additional cruelties ascribed to Elsa Trenk--an Israel resident accused of mistreatment of Jewish women inmates in the notorious Nazi Oswiecim death camp--were made today in magistrate's court by Chava Gottlieb, a witness for the prosecution. Miss Gottlieb told the court how, while she was interned in Oswiecim, she was struck by the Trenk woman while she was standing in line, vainly awaiting a hand-out of food.

As a result of the beating, the Jewish witness continued, her hearing had been permanently impaired. Miss Gottlieb also testified that on several occasions she saw the Trenk woman beat a number of mothers and daughters. Another witness, Berta Rosner, told the court that she was confined to bread and water at hard labor after she struck back at the defendant.

DEED FOR SAFEGUARDING OF JEWISH MINORITY IN LIBYA IS STRESSED IN REPORT TO U.N.

PARIS, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The significant part played in the economy of Libya by Jewish and other minority groups and the necessity for providing these groups with adequate constitutional safeguards before the United Nations turns the country over to the Libyan population for self-government 16 months hence are stressed in a report by U.N. High Commissioner for Libya Adrian Pelt to the United Nations General Assembly.

The report, made public today by the United Nations Information Center here, recommends direct negotiations between representatives of the Jewish, Italian, Maltese and Greek minorities and representatives of the future Libyan National Assembly in order to discuss specific clauses to protect the rights of these minorities in the future Libyan constitution.

Elsewhere in the report, which deals with the historical development of the former Italian colony, Commissioner Pelt says that the settlement of the future status of the minorities is "a particularly delicate matter in view of their economic and financial interests and the important place they accordingly occupy in the general economy of the country."

ISRAEL POLICY OF NON-IDENTIFICATION WITH EAST OR WEST STILL IN FORCE, PARLEY HEARS

LONDON, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Israel has not abandoned its policy of non-identification with either the Western or the Eastern Bloc, Dr. Herzl Berger, Israel Mapai leader, last night told a British Labor Zionist conference.

He added that "our relations with the West are closer not because we chose so, but because of the attitude of other powers." Speaking on the problem of Jews emigrating from Europe, he asserted that in the West Jews could emigrate as a right, while in the Eastern European countries permission to emigrate is granted as a favor. He also said it was not possible to collect funds in Eastern Europe to train pioneers for Israel nor exchange delegations with Jewish communities in these countries.

Melach Neustadt, another Israel Mapai representative, outlined the domestic policies of the Israel Government and insisted that though the Mapai Party is the major factor in the government coalition it must give way in some instances to the wishes of the other groups in the Cabinet.

LOYALTY AND SERVICE OF IRISH JEWS IS LAUDED IN TALK BY MINISTER FOR EXTERNAL AFFAIRS

DUBLIN, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The Jews of Eire were praised last night by Eire's Minister for External Affairs, Sean McBride, for their loyalty to the country and their efforts in behalf of all national causes.

Speaking at a meeting of Liberal Jews, Minister McBride asserted that the Irish people had always shown understanding and tolerance of the Jews and had never persecuted any religious group--Jew or non-Jew.

AUSTRIAN MINISTER TO PROCEED WITH RESTITUTION LAW AMENDMENT DESPITE JEWISH PROTESTS

LONDON, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Despite "noisy protests," Austrian Justice Minister Otto Tschadek declared yesterday that he is proceeding with plans to amend Austrian restitution legislation, it was reported here from Vienna. The protests, from Jews and others, is aimed at features of the amendment which would compensate persons forced to yield up Nazi-confiscated property from the proceeds of Jewish hairless property and would expropriate Jewish owners from land which they hold as "absentee owners."

ANDERS DENIES HE IS ANTI-SEMITIC; SAYS CHARGES AGAINST HIM EMANATE FROM MOSCOW RADIO

NEW YORK, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Gen. Wladyslaw Anders, Polish anti-Semitic leader who was permitted by State Department authorities to come to the United States to participate in the Pulaski Day parade here yesterday, told a press conference last night that he was not anti-Semitic. He said the charges against him emanate not from the Jewish people, but from the Moscow radio.

Anders said that of all the non-Catholic groups in the army that fought under his command in the Italian campaign in World War II, the Jews had the highest percentage of officers. He added that of 667 Polish Jews in his army, 176 were officers. A Pulaski Day dinner celebration at the Waldorf-Astoria was picketed last night by groups protesting the presence of the Polish general.

VICE-PRESIDENT BARKLEY URGES SUPPORT OF U.J.A. AT MIDWEST REGIONAL CONFERENCE

HAMMOND, Ind., Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Appealing for support of the United Jewish Appeal, Vice-President Alben W. Barkley last night told a regional U.J.A. conference here attended by 400 delegates from northern Indiana and southern Michigan that no nation can live by itself while others are enslaved. The attack on democratic freedom, Mr. Barkley said, was "why the U.S. went into Korea."

JEWISH NATIONAL FUND OF PHILADELPHIA LAUNCHES JUBILEE CELEBRATION OF FUND

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The jubilee celebration of the Jewish National Fund of Philadelphia was launched here last night at a rally attended by 1,500 persons. Bartley C. Crum, former member of the Anglo-American Commission of Inquiry on Palestine, recalled that "Israel was the only nation in the entire Middle East which tried, with its meager resources, to back the U.N. decision on Korea."

Senator Francis Myers of Pennsylvania, in a message to the meeting, lauded the work of the J.N.F., asserting that it has become an "integral part of American life in the last 50 years of its existence." Other speakers included Samuel Daroff, honorary president of the Allied Jewish Appeal here, and William Sylk, vice-president of the Zionist Organization of America.

NATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS WILL OFFER NATIONWIDE RADIO SERIES TO BETTER HUMAN RELATIONS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Twenty-six leading fraternal, women's, labor, youth, farm and other community organizations have joined with the National Conference of Christians and Jews in a radio series designed to promote improved human relations. The program, consisting of 27 weekly broadcasts, will begin on the National Broadcasting Company October 7. Each organization will have a special week for its presentation.

GROUP OF 62 JEWISH DISPLACED PERSONS IMMIGRANTS SPONSORED BY U.S.N.A. ARRIVES IN U.S.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- A group of 62 Jewish displaced persons immigrants sponsored by the United Service for New Americans arrived here during the week-end aboard an International Refugee Organization vessel.

DR. MOSES GOLDMAN NAMED PROVISIONAL HEAD OF ARGENTINE OFFICE OF WORLD JEWISH CONGRESS

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Dr. Moses Goldman, member of the World Jewish Congress executive, has been appointed provisional head of the Argentine office of the W.J.C. to replace the late Dr. Jacob Hellman, who died recently.
