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**NEGOTIATIONS WITH U.S. GOVERNMENT FOR FINANCIAL AID TO ISRAEL TO START SOON**

**JERUSALEM, Nov. 7. (JTA) --** Basic preparations are being made for negotiations with the U.S. Government for securing American financial aid for Israel, it was reported today at a meeting of the Israel Cabinet. The meeting heard a report given by Mrs. Golda Myerson, Labor Minister, on her recent visit to the United States and on the National Planning Conference for Israel and Jewish Rehabilitation, which took place in Washington the week-end of October 27-29.

Mrs. Myerson reported that the Conference was attended by representatives of all Zionist and non-Zionist groups in the United States, except the American Council for Judaism and Communist Jewish groups. She said that arrangements are being made in the United States for the sale of Israel bonds, and emphasized that the Conference decided to expand the activities of the United Jewish Appeal.

The Cabinet today approved the draft of a bill fixing the term of office of the present session of Parliament. The Cabinet also reviewed the current situation in the immigrant reception camps and in work villages set up for new arrivals. A government report to the Knesset on the subject is expected to be made within two weeks. At its session today, the Cabinet also approved the International Convention for Civil Procedure.

Minister of Agriculture Pinhas Lubianiker, in his maiden speech to the Israel Parliament today, introduced a citrus-marketing bill which was adopted after the first reading.

A demand by the Herut that a special investigation be launched into police searches of newly-arrived immigrants from Poland--which took place at Haifa last week aboard the S.S. Protea--was referred to the Knesset's home committee. Police authorities who searched the Protea immigrants confiscated large quantities of food that the Polish Jews had brought with them.

**JEWISH AGENCY EXECUTIVE DISCUSSES NEED FOR COORDINATING U.S.A. DRIVE WITH BOND ISSUE**

**NEW YORK, Nov. 7. (JTA) --** The Jewish Agency executive, at its plenary session today, discussed its planned participation in a national conclave of Zionist leaders to be held in the Hotel Commodore here, on November 19, under the auspices of the American Zionist Council.

Debate indicated that the great majority of the executive agreed that the agenda of the conclave should be limited to items directly affecting the Zionist movement in the light of current developments, particularly the question of the role of American Zionism in implementing the four-point aid-Israel program approved two months ago in Jerusalem and endorsed again last week at the National Planning Conference in Washington.

Discussion continued on the United Jewish Appeal campaign and its relation to the projected bond issue by the Israel Government. Speakers emphasized the need for coordinating the two activities in such fashion as to achieve maximum benefit for Israel from both.

U.S. INTRODUCES RESOLUTION AT U.N. TO RAISE \$50,000,000 FOR PALESTINE REFUGEES

LAKE SUCCESS, Nov. 7. (JTA) -- The United States, United Kingdom, France and Turkey today introduced a resolution in the U.N. Special Political Committee calling for the raising of a U.N. fund to finance "reintegration" of Palestine refugees up to June 30, 1952. The committee left the question open pending a report from the U.N. Budgetary Committee on how to raise funds called for in the resolution.

The four-nation resolution declares that reintegration of the refugees either by repatriation or resettlement "is essential" and calls for a fund of \$30,000,000 for the next fiscal year for reintegration and a sum of \$20,000,000 to carry on relief during that same period. The only Arab delegate to speak--Jamali of Iraq--fervently opposed the resolution because he said it did not insist on repatriation.

"Reintegration" is a new concept that has appeared in the Palestine refugee problem to encompass either or both repatriation to Israel and resettlement in the Arab countries. In introducing the resolution, John C. Ross of the United States told the Committee his government was ready to request an undetermined amount of money from Congress for reintegration and relief of the Arab refugees. He insisted that the raising of the funds must be a joint effort among all nations.

Israel's Views on Palestine Refugees Outlined by Ambassador Eban

Israel's Ambassador Abba Eban, addressing today's session of the Special Political Committee, emphasized that the Government of Israel has repeatedly stated and now reaffirms its willingness to pay fair compensation for abandoned Arab lands. It considers it vital that any funds accruing from such compensation be credited to the refugee integration fund.

"In agreeing to immediate discussions with international agencies on the problems of compensation and on the establishment of a reintegration fund, Israel will regard itself as taking part in the first and most urgent installment of discussions leading to final peace," Mr. Eban said. "It must be borne in mind that Israel reserves its own financial claims under a final settlement with reference to the loss and damage which it has suffered as a result of war and invasion," he pointed out. He then summarized the views of the Israel Government on a solution of the Arab refugee problem as follows:

1. The most important step that can be taken towards the final solution of this problem would be for the General Assembly to act on the recommendation contained in the U.N. Conciliation Commission report suggesting that the parties be urged to engage without delay in direct discussions, within the framework of which the refugee problem should be given priority of consideration.
2. Israel supports the recommendations of the United Nations Relief and Work Agency for the continuance of the relief programs and of the works projects for Palestine refugees as an indispensable interim measure until final integration is achieved. It also offers its cooperation to the Committee of Experts of the Conciliation Commission's Reports.
3. Israel supports the recommendation contained in the UNRWA Report urging the creation of a reintegration fund to be applied to the permanent settlement of refugees and their integration into normal and productive life. It accepts the principle that any funds which Israel may agree to defray for compensation be credited to the integration fund instead of being dissipated in individual payments.

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ISRAEL GOVERNMENT WARNS JORDAN OF DANGERS OF FLOUTING U.N. ORDER ON MT. SCOPUS CONVOY

TEL AVIV, Nov. 7. (JTA) -- The Israel Government today warned Jordan of the "dangers" of its intractable attitude on the question of permitting the passage of a food supply convoy through the Arab Legion lines to the Jewish troops atop Mt. Scopus.

The warning came on the heels of a statement by the senior Jordan delegate on the mixed Israel-Jordan armistice commission that "we are a sovereign nation. We take orders from nobody, not even the United Nations." The Jordanian, Azmi Mashashibi, was defying an order by U.N. truce chief Gen. William E. Riley to permit the convoy to pass in accordance with previously established regulations. The defy was made in the presence of Col. Benmet de Ridder, acting U.N. Chief of Staff.

An Israel Government spokesman declared that Mashashibi's statement reflects an attitude of the Jordan authorities which Israel regards as dangerous. "It is gravely disturbing," he stated, "to find a responsible senior official of the Jordan Government not only flouting the United Nations but denying its authority in matters where such authority is specifically established by the terms of the armistice agreement."

U.S. EMBASSY WARNS AMERICANS IN ISRAEL NOT TO VOTE IN LOCAL ELECTIONS; MAY LOSE CITIZENSHIP

TEL AVIV, Nov. 7. (JTA) -- The U.S. Embassy here today warned all American citizens in Israel against participating in the municipal elections which are scheduled to take place in a number of localities on November 14. The warning said that they will lose their citizenship if they vote.

The election campaign is at its peak in Tel Aviv, but the various parties in the campaign are concentrating not so much on local issues as on the national scene. The results of the municipal elections will indicate the extent to which various groups have grown in strength since the arrival of some 200,000 new immigrants after the last national elections in January, 1949.

TEL AVIV AND JAFFA DOCK WORKERS ON STOPPAGE IN SUPPORT OF WAGE AND HOURS DEMANDS

TEL AVIV, Nov. 7. (JTA) -- The ports of Jaffa and Tel Aviv were quiet yesterday as dock workers began a stoppage in support of their demands for higher wages, an eight-hour day and no overtime work.

The Histadrut, meanwhile, decided to appoint a three-man committee to study the situation, in effect rejecting the workers' uncompromising attitude. The local dock workers have threatened to disrupt operations in the port of Haifa, Israel's chief seaport, unless the Haifa dock workers support them.

BEN GURION SENDS CONGRATULATORY MESSAGE TO STALIN ON 33RD ANNIVERSARY OF REVOLUTION

JERUSALEM, Nov. 7. (JTA) -- Premier David Ben-Gurion today sent a congratulatory cable to Soviet Premier Josef Stalin on the occasion of the 33rd anniversary of the October Revolution. The message said:

"On the occasion of the 33rd anniversary of the great October Revolution, pray accept on behalf of the state of Israel and on my own behalf our best wishes to you personally and to the Soviet Government and all its peoples. Our people, building its historic homeland, remember well the part played by the Soviet Union in defeating the Nazi enemy as well as its contribution towards the establishment of the state of Israel. We send to the peoples of the U.S.S.R. our sincere wishes for economic and cultural prosperity, happiness and permanent peace."

HALF OF ARGENTINE JEWISH POPULATION IS NATIVE-BORN; 57 PERCENT ARE ARGENTINE CITIZENS

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Slightly over 50 percent of the Jews of Argentina are native-born, but only 57 percent of the entire Jewish community are citizens, Yedidie Efron, noted Zionist educator, reported today.

Writing in the Yiddische Zeitung, Mr. Efron, who has conducted a population study among Argentine Jews for a number of years, declared that of 350,000 Jews in the country, 178,000 are native-born. Of those who are immigrants only 24,500 have been naturalized.

HEBREW UNION COLLEGE ANNOUNCES NEW POLICY; PROVIDES RESIDENT PRE-RABBINIC STUDY

CINCINNATI, Nov. 7. (JTA) -- In a move to accommodate otherwise qualified young men who desire to enter the rabbinate but have not mastered the Hebrew language, the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion here has established the policy of inviting college graduates to spend a year on the Ohio campus for an accelerated program to prepare them for admission as candidates for the Master of Hebrew Letters degree and ordination as rabbis, it was announced today by Rabbi Robert L. Katz, director of admissions and field activities at the Liberal rabbinic college.

"Many Jewish young men," Rabbi Katz said, "have discovered in recent years a new and greater interest in understanding their Jewish heritage, and themselves as Jews, because of the impact of international tensions, the shadow of the atom war and the crisis in human relations. Many of them are turning from the physical sciences to a concern with people, and are rediscovering the moral values in, and a need for, religion."

Rabbi Katz pointed out that the armed forces have lowered eligibility rules, and are now accepting rabbis for chaplaincy commissions on graduation instead of waiting until after the candidate has completed a year of rabbinical service. In addition to the needs of the Chaplains Corps, Rabbi Katz said, places are opening up in congregations that are relinquishing their spiritual leaders to the military services. "Other calls for rabbis are coming in constantly from new Liberal and Reform Jewish congregations springing up throughout the nation, and for educational posts in Jewish religious schools and higher institutions of learning," Rabbi Katz stated.

CHANUKAH CANDLES FOR EXPORT TO U.S. ARE CONSECRATED IN JERUSALEM CEREMONIES

JERUSALEM, Nov. 7. (JTA) -- A special ceremony consecrating Chanukah candles which will be exported to the United States took place at historic Mount Zion here today. Top officials of the Ministry of Religion and the Chief Rabbinate's office participated in the rites.

In addition to the special Chanukah candles, Jerusalem will turn out for export to the United States candles for the Sabbath, for Havdalah--marking conclusion of the Sabbath--for weddings, death anniversaries, Bar Mitzvahs and other occasions.

Following today's ceremonies at Mount Zion, a group of rabbis and religious leaders descended to a cave in the mountainside which is dedicated to the memory of the 6,000,000 Jews who perished at the hands of the Nazis. Special candles were lit in the cave.

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
