ISRAEL PRESENTS NOTE TO BIG POWERS ON JEWISE INDEMNIFICATION CLAIMS AGAINST GERMANY

TEL AVIV, Jan. 17. (JTA) -- Israel envoys to Washington, London and Paris today delivered identical notes to the American, British and French Government outlining the Jewish people's claims on Germany for the murder and application of six million Jews in Nazi-dominated Europe. A similar note was handed to the Soviet charge d'affaires here. The communication made the following five points:

- 1. Six years after the surrender of Germany Allied decrees are largely unfulfilled requests. The powers of the Allies under the occupation statutes should be retained by the four powers.
- Israel, which has accepted the largest number of Jewish immigrants, is especially interested in the satisfaction of their claims, and supports their claims for compensation for physical injury sustained in Germany prior to and during the war.
- 3. The Israel Government requests that the occupying powers utilize legal machinery to ensure speedy and effective settlement of these claims. It suggests that a special law be enacted to cover all the German states where claims cannot presently be processed because of arbitrary restrictions concerning dates and residence requirements. The general law should prevent a victim's claim being invalidated because the claimant left the place of the crime after a certain date and now regides outside Germany.
- 4. These claims are forwarded not only in the name of Israel, but for the Jevish people as a whole. The handling of claims against Germany is rendered illusory because of lack of currency transfer facilities. It is immoral to apply currency transfer restrictions to the claims of persoutees, permitting Germany to benefit from the mass murder and rapine wrought by the Masis.
- 5. Apart from the satisfaction of individual claims, Israel reserves the right to forward general claims for the wholesale destruction of European Jewry.

No official estimate has been released of the total of the individual claims for compensation. Informed sources here believe that it exceeds 100,000,000 pounds (\$280,000,000).

Ambassador Epan Presents Israel's Note on Germany to Secretary of State

VASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (JTA) — Ambassador Abba Eban of Israel today presented to Socretary of State Dean Abbason a note outlining the claims of the Israel Government against Germany for restitution of Jewish property and indemnification of Maxivictus now in the Joyish State.

The note points out that while certain laws for restitution and indemnification were enacted by the occupation authorities in Germany, the provisions remain largely unfulfilled. "The claimants are now seriously disturbed lest such prospects T.A. News 🍙 -2-

exist of having their claims met should be mulified by the steps being contemplated the occupying powers to divest themselves of control of the affairs of the Federal gram Republic, the note says. "It is importive that the Federal German authorities accept financial liability under the existing legislation, jointly and severally the header."

"A unified general claims law is required for the whole of Germany, modeled the law enforced in the U.S. zone, but dispensing with the arbitrary restriction in the claims of displaced persons bused on qualifying dates for sofourn in Germany," he note recommends. "The general currency restrictions are meant to apply to German inhabitants r foreign investors who wish to transfer funds in the normal course, and there can a no justification for applying them to those Jevs who escaped or survived the Rasi egime and now desire to utilise the proceeds of their assets and claims to make ossible their rehabilitation elsewhere," the Israel Government emphasized.

"Those Jevish losses for which Germany must be held accountable, and which to not fall within the scope of the laws providing restitution and indemnification, an only be made scod on a collective basis, by the satisfaction of reparations blaims on behalf of largel and the Jevish people," the mote said. In respect of such claims, as well as in research of the historic indemnity which Germany oves to the Jevish people for the wholesale destruction of Buropean Jewry, the Government of Breel makes an oppress reservation, which will form the subject of a separate note."

"Atonement by the German Government and people for the injury inflicted upon the Jewish people is a necessary prelude to any political and moral rehabilitation of Germany in the eyes of the civilized world. The Government of Inreal cannot reconcile itself to the enjoyment by Germany of the fruit of its rapine and murder, while the victims of an unholy German regime are denied all comfort and redress," the note declares.

JENISH LEADERS FROM ALL ZONES OF GERMANY NAME CENTRAL REPRESENTATIVE BODY

JEWISH COMMUNITIES PLEASE PARTICIPATION IN ACTIVITIES TO MEET TO SE OF ARMED SERVICES

OAKIAED, Calif., Jan. 17. (JTA) -- Recommendations for establishment of coordinating committee: by local communities to seek maximum cooperation in the timing, publicity and observance of campaigns on behalf of Esrael's "four point program" marked the three-day annual assembly of the Western States Region of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, held here this week. More than 200 delegates representing 26 western Jewish communities participated.

Other major resolutions adopted at the conference included: 1. Strengthening of local community organizations as the best means for the planning and financing of Jevish services; 2. Pledging the support, cooperation and participation of the Jevish communities in activities to meet the needs of the armed services and the civilian population during the present national emergency.

Pointing out that American Jewry has come to realize that the needs at home, in Europe and in Israel are individable, Herbert R. Abeles, CIFWF national vice-president, declared that through the principle of central organization the Jewish communities are bringing together all groups for the scale in which "all of us believe and for which all of us can work." The Jewish federations, welfare funds and community councils have survived the test of time and organized. he stressed.

Harry Inrie, CIMP executive director, emphasized the role of the Jewish community in the planning and financing of local services. He noted that these programs are divided into two groups. "The first group has in some respects a non-sectarian character for it consists of basic services such as health, welfare and recreation which are made available to the entire community," he explained. "The second category includes services for education, cultural development and religious life and it is essentially sectarian to meet the needs of our Jewish population."

Raphael Brandes of Tucson was reelected 1951 president of the Western States Region. Howard Desky, Oakland; Eli Levenson, San Dieso; and Robert Sinton, San Francisco; were elected vice-presidents; and Ben Solnit, Los Angeles, was named treasurer.

Four jewish ceaplains serve with U.S. Armed Forces in Korka; U.S.O. Revived

NEW YORK, Jan. 17: (JTh) -- Four Jewish chaplains with the American armed forces in Korea are keeping in constant touch with the troops and are continuing religious and cultural programs for Jewish personnel, it was reported here today by the National Jewish Welfare Spard.

The United Service Organization of World War II, in which the Mational Jewish Welfare Board represented the Jewish community in the work of providing religious, welfare and recreational services to the armed forces, was revived this week. The J.W.B. is once again a member.

EESREW UNION COLLEGE TO CONSIDER REPLACEMENTS FOR RABBIS JOINING U.S. ARMED FORCES

CINCINNATI, Jan. 17. (JTA) -- Ways and means of providing spiritual leaders to congregations as replacements for rabbis who are entering the armod forces as chaplains stands high on the agenda at meetings of all religious bodies, Lester A. Jaffe, chairman of the board of governors of the Rebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, declared here today.

The procurement of replacements to serve in American congressions will be one of the subjects to be discussed at the next meeting of the Board of the College-Institute in Cincimnati, Mr. Jaffe said. The Board will also hear the report of Dr. Welson Glueck, president of the rebbinical school of Liberal Judales, on process and perspectives for the coming wear.

RENTINE EDUCATION MINISTRY PERIORS TO GUARANTER JEWISH CHITEREN PRESION OF WORSHIP

BURNOS AIRES, Jan. 17. (JTA) -- The Argentine Ministry of Education has prosed the DATA, central representative body of Argentine Jows, that all efforts will be made in the future to guarantee Jowish children in the state schools full "freedom of conscience."

The pledge was made in response to a number of complaints from the DAIA that Jevish children had been forced to remain in classrooms during Catholic instruction hours, Legally required in the Argentine school system. The DAIA had suggested that Jevish children be released from Catholic instruction classes and be taught athics instead during that time.

The Ministry asserted that an investigation had disclosed that Jewish children remained in the classrooms during Catholic instruction at their own request, but that in the future all measures would be taken to prevent limitations of the Treedom of conscience recognized by the law.

PIAN TO ESTABLISH AMERICAN VILLAGE IN ISPARL PRESENTED AT PARKEY OF U.S. JEWISH PARKERS

VIMEIAND, N.J., Jan. 17. (JTA) -- More than 30 applicants have registered for the first American village which will be established in Israel near the settlement of Godera, according to a plan presented at a conference of Jewish farmers here by Itzhak Korn, secretary of Tenuat Esmoshavim, which is chazged in the settlement of middle class families in Igrael.

The plan provides for the settlement of 100 families in the American village. Each family is to receive 35 dumans of land for farming and the raising of livestock. Each colonist will have to contribute \$10,000 toward the cost of constructing the village and setting up its economy. Half of this sum he will be able to secure as a loan from the Jovish Asenov.

EX-AMBASSADOR MCDONALD NAMED CHAIRMAN OF ADVISORY COUNCIL FOR ISRAEL BOND ISSUE

NEW YORK, Jan. 17. (JTA) -- James G. McDonald, who recently resigned after having served as the first U.S. Ambassador to Israel, has accepted the chairmanship of the Advisory Council for the \$500,000,000 bond issue to be floated in the United States by the Government of Israel, it was announced today.

Mr. McDonald declared that he had accepted the post of chairman of the Advisory Council for the Israel bond issue because "the secondaic development of Israel is a natter of direct concern to all Americans who are interested in strengthening the cause of democracy in the Middle Bast and other parts of the world." The Advisory Council will consist of leading Americans who are interested in extending moral support to the Israel bond issue.

IIVO JUBILEE CONFERENCE CONCLIDES WITH ADOPTION OF \$450,000 BUDGET FOR 1951

NEW YORK, Jan. 17. (JTA) -- The 25th Jubilia Conference of the Tiddish Scientific Institute -- TIVO -- concluded today with the adoption of a budget of \$450,000 for 1951.

The convention presented two awards of \$200 each for studies on American Jovieh life, one award was made to I. Gans, of Chicago, for a study on Jovieh community life, and the other was made to Joseph Rappaport for his work The Attitude of the Jovieh Press in America Source World Mar I.
