TEL AVIV, April 8. (JTA) — Quiet prevailed today on the Syrian-Israeli border the treclamation work in the Huleh area—which precipitated the aread comflict t week between the two states—proceeded undisturbed. An Israeli military spokes said he is unable to specify whether Syrian troops were still in the Israel part the demilitarized zone near Hamms. However, he exphasized that Syrian forces actuly dominate this strip of land from their positions adjoining the boundary.

Acting on instructions from the State Department in Washington, U.S. Ambassar Monett Davis today called at the Foreign Ministry to ask for information on the

at the houses had been used as snippers' hideouts exainst Iereali police and United
tions observers. The French Minister in Iereal similarly called at the Foreign Mintry here for information on the Iereali-Syrian border situation.

Political circles here believe that the Israeli-Syrian conflict is now being affed from the military to the diplomatic field. All indications point to the fact hat there is determination to utilize the three-day calm on the border to restore be Syrian-Israeli contacts through the United Nations. An Israeli military spokessan said today that Israel is prepared to resume alls with Syris through the Mired Amsistics Commission. So revealed that the Ismeli authorities have approached Col. Informal talks between Israeli and Syrian oflicials—the first since the outbreak of the conflict hast week—may start tomorrow in the presence of a United Mations observer at Roch Pinah, an Israeli settlement on the Syrian frontier.

The spokesman said that the bombing last week by Israeli planes of Syrian military position does not signify that Israel proposes to declare war. "He were forced to show the Syrians the limits of our patience," he stated, adding that it was imbossible for Israel to remain inactive after the Syrian attack at Hamma and the killing there by Syrian troops of seven Israeli civilian policemen. A similar statement was made during the week-end by Frender David Ben Gurion, who added that Israel will not permit the Syrians to block the marsh-fraining work in the demilitarized some in the Balleh area.

Syris's appressiveness is the "outcome of the intolerable situation emerging from the armistice exceedent and the fruits of the Israel Government's persistent appearament policy formulas every deliberate, appressive act committed by the Syrian authorities in the last two years," the national occupantion of the Herat party resulted today.

ARL SUBMITS THREE CHARGES AGAINST SYRIA TO UNITED NATIONS SECURITY CONNCIL.

UNITED EATURES, N.Y., April 8. (JTA) -- Counteracting the Syrian request to United Rations that the Security Council be convened to act on the clash between seal and Syria in the demilitarized zone of the Hulch area, Israeli Ambassador Abba in last night asked that three accusations against Syria be placed on the Council ands.

METARLI PRINCIER TESTIFIES IN COURT IN LIBEL SUIT AGAINST COMMUNIST WENSPARER

TEL AVIV, April 8. (JTA) - David Ben Gurion, Premier of Israel, appeared in a district court in Tel Aviv today in a case involving libel charges exainst the Communist newspaper Eol Beam. In the course of the day, the court ruled that the Premier and to reply to questions by commel for the newspaper concerning questions of strategy during the war of liberation, but upheld him in his refusal to divulse filitary or state secrets.

The charges against the newspaper grow out of its calling the Premier a "traitor to the nation and to the working class." The case began 18 months ago. The Premier, who rejected a chair in the witness stand because he did not want any "spacial privileges," refused to take an oath "on religious grounds."

MAI B'RITH WOMEN RAISED \$1,000,000 DURING 1950; GAINED 25,000 NEW MEMBERS

WASHINGTON, April 8. (JTA) -- More than \$1,000,000 was raised during last year, the 600 Chapters of the B'nai B'rith women organization in this country for phinthropic, educational and other activities, it was announced last night the organization of the four-day annual meeting of the B'nai B'rith Women's Supreme Countl. About 200 delegates, representing 125,000 members of the organization, are atsending the conference.

Included in the total amount raised was most of a quota of \$100,000 which the examination pledged to raise over a three-year period for construction of a B'nai 'rith children's home in Israel. The building is to replace a children's shelter massed by bombing during the Arab-Israeli war. Another \$400,000 has been allocated to American youth services. The women also raised funds for direct aid to Israel and omestic philanthropic grants to the American Bed Gross, canter and infantile paralysis drives and other projects. The organization gained 25,000 new embers during the year. It was reported at the parley.

INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF JEWISH WOMEN OPENS FIVE-DAY CONFERENCE IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, April 8. (JTA) -- Problems concerning Jows in various countries will be discussed at a five-day conference of the International Council of Jewish Women which opened here tonight. Delegates from six countries are attending the parley.

Addressing the opening session, Mrs. Joseph M. Welth, of Detroit, president of the organisation, said that "America and Israel had become reservoirs of hope and strength for the survival of Judaism." She pointed cut that the Jews are today facing a two-fold task of providing material help to those in need and insuring the cultural continuation of Judaism.

HEN YORK ASSOCIATION FOR HEN AMERICANS SPENT \$16,526,267 TO AID JENISH INCIDENTS

NEW YORK, April 8. (JTA) -- A total of \$16,526,267 was spent during the last two years in providing assistance for 38,000 Jewish immigrants who settled in New York, it was reported during the week-end by Arnold S. Askin, president of the New York Association for New Americans, a beneficiary of the United Jewish Appeal. He stressed that 31,000 of the immigrants who received temporary assistance "have been wholly absorbed into the economy of our society."

Speaking at the second annual meeting of the Association, at which he was reelected president, Mr. Askin suphasized that an additional \$4,168,000 will be required to help 7,000 Javish immigrants who recently settled here, plus the 5,750 who have expected before the end of the year.
