#### ISRAEL CANTOT CONSIDER U.S. ZIONISTS AS REPRESENTATIVE OF U.S. JEWRY, BEN GURION SAYS

NEW YORK, May 30. (JTA) -- American Zionists cannot be considered by the Israel Government as the representatives of all of American Jowry, Israel's Premier David Ben Gurien said last night at a dinner tendered him by the American section of the Jowish American section of the Jowish American section of the Jowish American needs the financial and religious and of Jows in the United States who are not Zionists and who do not want the Zionist movement to stand "as a well between them and Israel."

Mr. Bon Gurion said that his current visit to the United States has convinced him that all elements of American Joury-with the exception of the American Council for Judaism and the Communists--are easer to support Israel. He advised American Zionial ledors to undertake the task of bringing all these elements together.

Doclaring that his allogiance to the Javish people comes before his allogiance to the State of Israel, the Israeli Premier said that the Jovish state has volunterfly yielded its severed must be the Jovish people by stipulating in its Constitution that very Jow wishing to immigrate to Israel must be admitted into the country. If peace provedle, he declared, the task to be accomplished within the next ten years must be the bringing of 1,000,000 more Jows to Israel. He estimated that more than \$7,000,000, -000 without the aid of American Jows.

Mr. Bon Gurion made it clear that he does not expect mass emigration of Jows from the United States to Israel. However, he wrond American Zienists to mobilize technological aid and skilled workers for Israel, declaring that the development of Israel depends to a considerable extent on American "know how." He also criticized American Zienist leaders for failing to develop the Chalutz movement in the United States.

The Israeli Premier also asked that at least ten percent of American Jovish college students come to the Hebrew University ir Jorusalem to take additional courses in Hebrew Lenguage and literature so as to become a living link between Israel and the American Jovish Community. He wroot that the American Zionist movement should also arrange mass tours of American Jovs to Israel.

Mr. Ben Gurion flatly refused to share Iswael's sovereignty with the world Zionist movement. Only a state can have severeignty, he pointed out. Some Zionists, he said, have not as yet recognized the State of Israel. It is high time they should, he added. He denied that there is a crisis in the Zionist movement. "There is a crisis in two Zionists, he declared, can advise and over criticis in some Zionists," he commented sereastically. American Zionists, he declared, can advise and over criticize Israel, but have no right to issue orders to it.

The Israeli Premier teld the 200 prominent American Zionists at the dinner that the Jowish state was not the fulfilment of Zionism and declared that since the establishment of the state the Zionist movement is needed acre than ever before. Unism, he explained, embraces L Jose overywhore, while the severeiment of the Josesh Skate is limited to its citizens within its border. He made a strong place to American Zionist movement to organd Edores education among children in this country.

Dr. Mahum Goldmann, who prosided, stressed the need for electsion on the future role of the Zionist movement in the light of Israel's achievement of statehood. Dr. Emenuel Moumenn made a passionate plea for recognition by the Israel Government of the Zionist movement as a movement representing world Joury vis-a-vis the Jewish State. He said that it was Israel's duty to strengthen the Zionist movement. Leaders of the Mizrachi, Revisionists and other Zionist groups also participated in the discussion.

In the afternoon, at a Zionist Youth Council reception in his honor, Premier David Bon Gurion said that his travels about this country had convinced him that although he could expect no mass immirration from the United States there was more than enough "raw material" for an effective Chalutz mecoment among American Jews. He assorted that Chalutzim are more needed now than ever before in Irrael because the establishment of the state has created opportunities that did not exist before.

In the morning, he attended a memorial meeting at the Israel Consulate in hence of the late David Remoz. In a speech in Hebrew he recalled that the life of his associate of many years was a mirror of the history of the Jowish community in Israel. Dr. Mahum Goldmann also joined in the tribute to the late Israeli Education Minister.

#### PRESIDENT TRUMAN SALUTES ISRAELI WARSHIPS; CROWDS IN WASHINGTON VISIT VESSELS

WASHIMSTON, May 30. (JTA) -- Capacity crowds turned out here today to visit the two Israeli warships--"Haranch" and "Misnay",--while Israel's naval commander Shlome Brel, accompanied by the captains of the two ships, haid a wreath on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington Matienal Comptery. A U.S. naval detachment was present and acted as hest to the Israeli officers.

Precident Truman posterday stood on the bridge of his yacht, the U.S.S. Williamsburg, and sakuted the Israeli werehips as they passed in the Potemac Rivra the entrance to Weshington harbor. The Presidential yacht was heading for the open waters of the Chesapeake Esy for the Momerial Day wook-and when the Israel ships were seen making their entrance into the harbor. The President stood on the bridge of the Williamsburg as the ships drow hear. He sakuted. The Israel crow came to attention and sakuted the President.

At a coromony after the ships arrived, the keys to the city of Washington were presented to the flottlla's commander, Shlome Brel. The Metropolitan Folice band played. District Commissioner Ponence said that "as an Irishman who belongs to a race which has fought a long time. I wish to congratulate Lurael. Having fought for freedom, I know Israel will fight to keep it."

#### SEVERE DROUGHT AFFECTS ISRAEL'S WINTER CROP; DAMAGE ESTIMATED AT \$11,200,000

TRL AVIV, May 30. (JTA) -- The severest drought in 30 years has caused damage to winter crops estimated at four million pounds (\$11,200,000), Y. Efrati, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, reported here today.

## ISPAREL FOREIGN MINISTER REPORTS TO BARLIAMENT ON BUIRE; IROMISES CO-OPERATION WITH U.M.

JERUSALIM, May 30. (JTA) -- Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett teld the Inesset today in winding up the debate on the Huleh situation that the Government of Israel was resty to most United Nations Chief of Steff Maj. Gen. William E. Riley at his earliest convenience for clarification of the "orcl misunderstanding" which Gen. Biley reported to the Security Council this wook.

Gon. Riloy had reported that owing to an "oral misunderstanding" of talks he had had with Israeli authorities on May 21, they had assumed he had acreed to Israel resumption of work in the non-disputed areas of the demilitarized zone after a 24-hour stoppass. Mr. Sharett told the Perliament that the minutes of the two motines with fon. Riloy clarifying the whole situation were not challenged by the U.N. truce chief. Badded that Israel would continue its policy of the closest cooperation with the United Nations for a clarification of the situation.

The government spokesman asked the members of the House to take the long view in dealines with the United Mations. Israel, he declared, will complete the humanitarian and colonization tack of draining the Huleh marshes since, even in Gen. Riley's riow, this was not a Syrian matter but a problem between the United Mations Chief of Staff and the Israel Covernment.

Representatives of all parties spoke in the debate. Peretz Bernstein, of the General Zionists, said Israel's voltical failure was the result of the state's economic vokenes. Mordecal Ben Toy, Mapam leader, argued that the Israel's set-back in the United Nations on the Huloh issue was the result of Premior Bartic Ben Gurionis "on-slating visit" to the United States. Spokesmen of the Relinious Bloc, which formorly superiod the Averament, criticized its handling of the Huloh question. No votes were taken by the Knosset this week on any issues discussed. This was at the request of the Mapam Party, a majority of whose members are attending a pro-election party conference at Raifa.

#### Calls Security Council Decision on Huloh "A Measure of Appeasement"

Opening the debate last night, Mr. Sharett told the Israel Farliament that the Structy Council resolution ordering Israel to coase work on the Enland reclamation projet was a measure of appeasement that would fail to bring peace to the Middle East. The local basis for the Security Council's order to coase the reclamation work was "shrouded in doubt and its moral officacy worthloss," he stated.

"The Security Council, standing in the way of progress and development, berring the way to a project aimed to provent waste of soil, water and health, cannot raise the Prestige of the highest United Nations organ," he declared, "especially when it acts under pressure of fire from the other side.

"Just as the international policy of appeasement failed to bring the desired results and did not provent a world war, so this small-scale appeasement in the Middle Rest vill not encourage the Arab states to seek peace with Israel. On the contrary, on the following day, the syrica Premier announced that there will never be negotiations for a peace treaty with Israel and the Israel Government has werned all the powers of the danger of such development and has undertaken all the necessary security measures."

The Israeli Minister varned that the "Security Council resolution has also encouraged the leaders of the Arab Leader to build the Leader on negative bases which will not assist pace but will widen the field of dispute." He declared that despite the unfavorable nature of the resolution, "as a freedom-leving nation, we are obliged to adhere even to an unjust decision of the Council."

### RICHLESS HERREN MANUSCAPT, LOOPED BY MAZIS, WILL BE RETURNED TO BARON ROTHSCHILD

MEM YORK, May 30. (JTA) -- A priceloss volume of 40 modioval Hebrow manuscripte belonging to Baron Jamos de Rothschild was recovered here and will be returned to its rightful owner, it was reported here yesterday by the Joulah Theological Seminary of America. The manuscripts are believed to have been looted by the Wazis.

The volume was offered to the library of the Seminary for the price of \$5,000 by agents reported to be representing an East German mobleman. It was recommized by Dr. Alexander Marx, Seminary librarian, as belonging to Baron Rothschild's collection. Officers of the Seminary communicated with Baron Rothschild and asked him to sue the Seminary for the return of his property. Accordingly, representatives of the Baron filed papers in a New York court which signed an order restoring the volume to its pre-war comor.

#### CONFERENCE OF CHRISTIANS AND JEWS INITIATES STUDY OF IMPROVING INTER-GROUP RELATIONS

NEW YORK, May 30. (JTA) -- An extensive study of the ways in which information can be used with more offect in improving attitudes and behavior in all group relations has been launched as the result of a great by the Mational Conference of Christians and Jows to the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues to finance the proparatory work. The study is expected to take three years for completion, costing upward of \$100,000.

Announcement of the project was made vesteredy in a joint statement by Dr. Byerott R. Clinchy, president of the Mational Conforence, and Professor Otto Klimbers of Columbia University, secretary of the Society. The initial grant of the Mational Conforence will make possible the first stage of the study, Dr. Clinchy said.

#### CALL FROM MYSTERIOUS "RABBI" CAUSES BOMB SCARE IN MEW YORK JEWISH NEWSPAPERS

MEN YORK, May 30. (JTA) -- Eighty police and firemen yesterday conducted searches in the buildings of the Jowish newspapers, the Jowish Daily Forward and The Day, following an anonymous warming received by the two newspapers over the telephone that the structure would be blown up.

The caller, who identified himself as "a rabbi," said that the buildings were mined and the bombs would emplode between 1:30 and 2 p.m. However, the search comeducted by the police and the firemen from collar to roof produced no evidence of any bomb or any explosive. About 1,000 persons were evacuated from the two buildings during the search.
