Z.O.A. CONVENTION OPENS TODAY IN ATLANTIC CITY; U.S. CABINET MEMBERS GREET PARLEY

ATIANTIC CITY, June 13. (JT.) -- Action on major issues affecting the future status of the Zienist movement and its relationship to the State of Israel will be taken at the 54th annual convention of the Zienist Organization of America which opens here temorrow. More than 1,500 delegates from all parts of the country are expected to attend the four day sessions.

The issues to be discussed will take on special significance in view of the fact that the convention mosts on the eye of the forthcoming World Zionist Congress. Among the major items on the agenda are: the future of the world Zionist movement's structure, the role of the Z.O.A. on the American scene, and increased aid of American Josep to Israel.

Raying tribute to the role of the Zionist Grammization of America in the creation of the State of Israel and in safeguereing its future existence, three members of Prosident Trummin's Cebinot-volear Chaptan, Secretary of the Interior, Charles F. The Socrotary of the Interior further voiced confidence that the Z.O.A.'s efforts will not diminish in the years to come. Israel's Achievements Leuted; Economic Promises Predicted

From Socrotary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannen came the message that the United States and other democratic nations of the world "Look with deep interest and sympathy upon the magnificant offerts the new State of Israel is making to solve not only the heavy problem inherent in the birth of a nation, but in addition, to provide a homeland for hundreds of thousands of Jowish rotuces from other countries." Secretary Brannan complesized the fact that "within recent months the United States and Israel governments have concluded a Point Four general agreement under which keptican exports will cooperate with Israel personnel in programs of economic development."

While listing Israel's occnomic accomplishments in the last three years, Secretary of Commorce Charles Sawyer, however, asserted that Israel is still confronted with difficult tasks before it can establish itself as a "productive occnomic member

in the family of froe nations." The Cabinet official said that "the new nation had progressed steadily from dependence on emergency relief to an interim program of large scale public works," and "in recent menths to a businesslike basis of conducting its occurrence affairs. "He velced doop conviction that Israel, "with the help of the Zionist Organization of America, will achieve whatever is needed for examine progress."

ISRAEL RATIFIES TEN-YEAR TREATY OF FRIENDSHIP WITH W.S. IN COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION

JERUSALEM, June 13. (JTA) -- The Israel Cabinet today ratified a ten-year treaty of friendship in commerce and mutantion with the United States. This is the first treaty between Israel and any other country. The Israel Ambassador in Washington was instructed to sign the treaty as seen as possible.

At today's Cabinot mooting Promior Devid Bon Gurion reported on his talks with high officials of the U.S. Government during his stay in Washington. Foreign Ministor Meshe Sharott reported at the mooting on the latest developments in commection with the drainage of the Hilch swamps as well as on the stand taken by U.N. Chief of Staff Gon. William E. Riley with regard to Enget's blockede of the Suoz Canal to Israel-bound shipping.

ISRAEL HOLDS ELECTIONS TO ZIONIST CONGRESS; 210 DELEGATES TO BE ELECTED

JERUSALEM, June 13. (JTA) -- Some 665,000 shokelin have been sold in Israel where the electors go to the pells today to name 210 delegates to the World Zienist Congress, Eliahu Dobkin, nomber of the Jowish Agency executive, today told a press conference.

Mr. Dobkin reported that countries outside of Israel have already elected 243 delegates of various parties. Es said that 470 to 480 delegates will finally be mand to the congress. Of the 243 delegates elected outside the Joyden state, 110 are General Zionists, Progressives or Hedassah representatives; 60 are Mapai delegates; 39 Mizrachi or Inhor Mizrachi; 12 Mapan; 16 Herut; and six ethers, including two of the Gressian Revisionist group.

The Agency official also reported that the Agency will submit a report to the World Zionist Congress listing its five rajor achievement of the past three years. They are: the transportation and resoltlement of 630,000 immigrants to Israel; the establishment of 262 new agricultural settlements; the immigration of 30,000 children and youths under the auspices of the Youth Aliyah movement; the establishment of 52 farm training centers; and the collection of \$255,000,000 by various Zionist drives.

The Mapai platform for today's Congress elections proposes that the World Zionist Organization support the state and government of Israel in all its activities, while the labor Party pleages to work in the Parliament to obtain a special local status for the organization in Israel. The program also suggests that all Zionist groups in each country outside Israel unito into one overall organization. Finally, the party pleages to fight for the emigration of Jows from countries which do not permit it, and the participation of private capital in constructive enterprises in Israel.

and commissioner in Germany heaffirms U.S. determination to sorce restitution law

FRANKFURT, June 13. (JTA) -- United States High Commissioner John J. McCley today made public the text of a directive sent by him yesterday to various German Ministers in the American zone of Germany reaffirming the determination of the U.S. Government to carry through the present restitution law unchanged and universities. The text of the determinat reads:

"During recent menths there has been brought to my attention letters and commonte appearing in the German press proposals circulated by organizations and statements attributed to Leonder government officials which appeared to encourage spaculation on the policy of the U.S. with respect to identifiable property under U.S. Military Government Law 59.

"In viow of the publicity given the criticism and suggestion relating to U.S. WE Law 79, I take this opportunity to reaffirm the policy of my government that persons and organizations deprived of their property as a result of National Socialist prescution should either have their property returned or be compensed theorefor. I can further advise you that there is no intention to depart from these principles as expressed in MF Law 59 and I do not anticipate in the future developments which will relieve the helder of property subject to restitution from the obligation imposed by this law.

"It is suggested that you make known to the officials of your government encand in the administration of the restitution lay that U.S. policy remains unchanged in this respect. To allay any doubts which may have arisen in the minds of the general public, I am taking the liberty of releasing this letter to the press."

Jovish Groups Setisfied with Firm Stand Taken by U.S. On Restitution

NEW YORK, Juno 13. (JTA) -- Satisfaction wish High Commissioner McCloy's statement was expressed in New York today by Dr. Israel Geléstoin, president of the Jowish Restitution Successor Organization, a New York membership corporation, which is the official successor body designated under the restitution law by the American Military Government to claim all heirloss and unclaimed property of which the Jows in Garmany have been deprived. The operating agents of the J.R.S.O. are the Jowish America and the Joint Distribution Committee.

Dr. Goldstoin pointed out that the tempo of attacks by Gorman officials, nownpapers and organizations against the restitution law has been greatly stepped up recent months. "It is clear," said Dr. Goldstoin, "that growing numbers of Gormans now are unwilling to accept even the minimum responsibility of returning Joyish Property. They now appear to regard restitution as a problem created by the Jows rather than the Gormans. It is to be heped that today's just and strong statement by Mr. McCloy may serve to check a tendency which can only outrose the civilized world."

GERMANY ADMITTED INTO MEMBERSHIP IN INTERNATIONAL LABOR ORGANIZATION; ISRAEL PROTESTS

GENEVA, June 13. (JTA) -- Despite the vigorous objections of an Israeli delomate, the International Labor Organization yesterday voted to accept West Germany as a member of the U.N. affiliate.

Opposing the admission of Germany, Zvi Boronson, director-monoral of the Israeli Ministry of Isbor and Israel's delemate at the current I.L.O. session, declared: "We believe it is contrary to the spirit of reconstruction of the of the I.L.O. to distribute after such a short period of time the herrible crimes against humanity which Germany committed before and during World War II. We have not discorned sizes that prove that the Germans have entered upon the path of real and sincere repentance."

2,0.A. ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE CRITICIZED FOR SUPPORTING GENERAL ZIONISTS IN ISRAEL

NEW YORK, June 13. (JTA) -- Criticism examinst the administrative committee of the Zienist Organization of America for giving "all-out support" to the General Zienists in Israel was voiced at a press conference here today by Jacob M. Alkow, newly-elected president of the Southern Pacific Region of the Z.O.A. He said that Israel needs a Zienist Organization "that will serve as an objective, friendly and semathetic emmisary" for the entire Jewish state and its people and not for any part of it.

The General Zionists of Israel have a political program that is based on economic consideration that the vest majority of Amorican Zionists noither support nor understand, Mr. Alkow said. "I regard the resime of a 'war chest' to cust the Ben Gurion Government with the presumeble 'knowledge and support' of our official American Zionist Leadorship as most representable. This is something that the Z.O.A. convention in Atlantic City must rectify," he added.

ISRABLIS GET THREE MORE WARBURG FELLOWSHIRS TO STUDY MEDICAL RESEARCH IN THE U.S.

NEW YORK, June 13. (JTA) -- Three more followships in medical research memorializing the late Dr. Judah L. Magmes, president of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, were announced last minth by the New York Community Trust. The followships are in the amount of \$3,000 each and are made from a fund of \$100,000 eet up by Mrs. Frieds Schiff Warburg, widow of Folix M. Warburg.

Four awards were made last year and about 23 more grants will be made at the rate of three each year. The recipients are students and dectors in Israel who are expected to return to teaching or practice there at the end of their studies in the United States. The new winners are Dr. David Bernbaum, specialists in gastronterology and infectious diseases, Dr. K. Guggenholm, in charge of the nutrition department, Hebrew University-Hadassah Modical School, and Dr. M. Welman, practitioner in pathological anatomy relating to degenerative diseases.

U.S. ARCHITECTS SEND DRAWINGS TO ISHAEL FOR A HERZL MEMORIAL PARK IN JERUSALEM

NEW YORK, June 13. (JTA) An EI Al Israel Airlines Constellation left New York today carrying with it more than a score of drawings submitted by leading American architects for a Momorial Park in Israel to honor Theodore Horzl, father of the world Zionist movement. The project, to be built on Mt. Herzl, overlooking Jerusalem, will be the largest of its kind so far attempted by the State of Israel.

The plans were submitted in an international centest spensored by the Jowish Agency with the technical assistance in the United States of the American Technical Society. They will be judged in Israel by an international jury which will include as its American representative Percival Goodman, preminent New York architect and member of the faculty of Columbia University's School of Architecture.

JEMISH EDUCATION STRESSES NEED OF "WHOLESOME FROGRAM" OF JEMISH EDUCATION IN U.S.

CHICAGO, June 13. (JTA) -- Dr. Seruel M. Blumonfield, momber of the Chicago Board of Jewish Education, today said here that in addressing the convention of the National Council for Joyleh Education, which took place last wook in Claveland, he did not urgo that communal education should take precedence over congregational.

"Indeed I stressed the need for Jovish educators to pay closer and greater attention to the congregational school than they have done hitherto," he said attention to the need for a wholesome program of Jovish education rather than indectrination in inntitutional denominationalist.
