

NAZIS ACTIVE IN ARGENTINA, AMERICAN JEWISH LEADER WARNS

NEW YORK, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- "The Nazi carriers of the racial typhus of Adolf Hitler have escaped to South America," Rabbi Joachim Prinz of Newark warned today upon his return from an extensive mission to the Jewish communities of Argentina, Brazil, Chile and Uruguay in behalf of the World Jewish Congress and the United Jewish Appeal.

The Newark rabbi who is a national vice-president of the American Jewish Congress and a member of the W.J.C. executive board, said that "the strength of this post-war beachhead of Nazism is a real threat to democracy as the well-organized international headquarters of a resurgent Hitler ideology."

Rabbi Prinz brought an emphatic appeal to American Jewry to fulfill the vital leadership needs of South American Jews whose rabbinate--young and old--has no replacements in view. "To our seminary graduates this Rosh Hashbanah eve I would say in paraphrase of Horace Greeley, 'Go South young man.' There lies a vitally challenging opportunity to our young rabbis and teachers who truly wish to dedicate themselves and their talents of learning and leadership to creative and purposeful Jewish survival."

CONVENTION OF AMERICAN ZIONIST LABORITE WOMEN CLOSSES IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- The national convention of the Pioneer Women, the women's Labor Zionist organization in the United States and Canada, concluded here last night with an address by James G. McDonald, former American Ambassador to Israel.

Mr. McDonald told the 1,000 delegates and members attending the closing session that Israel's shortage of food today is due to the determination of the Israeli people to keep the doors of their country open to Jewish immigrants. The absorption of the newcomers, he stated, is made possible partly through the generosity of Jewish communities throughout the world, but more so through the willingness of the Israelis to make great sacrifices in their standard of living.

NEW YORK JEWISH FEDERATION SETS \$20,000,000 GOAL FOR 1951

NEW YORK, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- The Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of New York will seek to raise \$5,500,000 more than it raised last year in its forthcoming campaign in support of 116 member hospitals and social service agencies, Milton Weill, president of the Federation, disclosed today. The goal of the 1951 campaign is \$20,000,000, the largest fund ever sought for the maintenance of a local health and welfare network. Last year, Federation raised \$14,500,000. The Campaign will officially open Wednesday, September 26.

A.D.L. FILM ON PREJUDICE TO BE SHOWN IN AUSTRALIA

SYDNEY, Australia, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- The film "Prejudice," produced in the United States under the auspices of the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League, has arrived in this country where it will be distributed by the Australian Religious Films Society. It will be shown throughout the Dominion by church societies and other non-Jewish groups.

## P.C.C. TO SUBMIT FIVE-POINT PROGRAM FOR MIDDLE EAST PEACE

PARIS, Sept. 16. (JTA) -- The United Nations Palestine Conciliation Commission will present a five-point program next week to Israel and Arab delegates attending the peace conference here, it was learned today. Formal meetings of the Commission-sponsored talks will be resumed tomorrow.

It has become clear here that the Commission supports the Israeli viewpoint that the conference here must seek a broad, overall peace settlement with the Arabs, rather than confine the talks to isolated issues like that of the Palestine Arab refugees.

## ISRAEL BECOMING ECONOMICALLY INDEPENDENT, BEN GURION SAYS

TEL AVIV, Sept. 16. (JTA) -- Asserting that Israel is slowly moving towards economic independence and gradually becoming the largest industrial center in the Middle East, Premier David Ben Gurion today officially opened the new Petach Tikvah plant of the General Tire Company of Akron, Ohio. Built through the joint efforts of the American firm and Israeli businessmen, the plant is expected to turn out 2,500 tons of rubber tires and tubes annually, making Israel self-sufficient in these commodities. The occasion marked the opening of Israeli Industrial Week.

The Premier noted that it was the second large-scale industrial enterprise in Israel made possible through the co-operation of U.S. industrialists. The first was the Kaiser-Frazer plant at Haifa.

The new plant will begin production around April or May of next year. In addition to providing Israel with all its tube and tire needs, 20 percent of its production will be exported. The subscribed capitalization of the plant, 1,000,000 Israel pounds (\$2,800,000), includes \$250,000 invested by three American groups; The General Tire and Rubber Company, the Palestine Economic Corporation and a group of Jewish investors known as the "Shalom Group."

Stressing that the new enterprise will save Israel some \$3,000,000 in foreign currency annually, Premier Ben Gurion said that when the plant starts production it will render Israel not only independent of foreign tire purchases, but will also safeguard the country's road transportation in peacetime while feeding the Army's needs in wartime, thereby contributing immensely to Israel's security.

## VICE PRESIDENT BARKLEY CALLS FOR MAXIMUM AID TO U.J.A.

BOSTON, Sept. 16. (JTA) -- Vice President Alben W. Barkley told 1,000 New England leaders of the United Jewish Appeal here today that "Israel, a sister democracy of the United States, whose message of freedom rings out throughout the Middle East, is comforted today with a critical situation arising out of the tidal waves of immigration engulfing its shores."

In a plea for maximum support of the special \$35,000,000 drive launched by the U.J.A., the Vice President declared that the people of Israel "are tightening their belts to the danger point in order to keep the gates of their country open to scores of thousands of their uprooted co-religionists." He urged the American people "to advance the cause of democracy and strengthen the bulwark of freedom that is Israel by supporting with generosity, and even with sacrifice, the current campaign of the United Jewish Appeal."

Checks and commitments to the total of \$1,122,000 were presented to Mr. Barkley by the conference which adopted measures to speed local drives and pledged support of the extraordinary nation-wide campaign.

## J.D.C. OFFICIALS OPEN ANNUAL PLANNING SESSION IN PARIS

PARIS, Sept. 16. (JTA) -- Representatives of the Joint Distribution Committee from 22 countries began their fifth annual conference here today with a global review of J.D.C. activities. The conference will plan expansion of J.D.C. work for the aged, ill and handicapped in Israel, economic reconstruction for Jews in the Moslem world and child-care and feeding programs as well as stepped-up campaigns against TB, trachoma and other diseases.

Moses W. Beckelman, J.D.C. director-general for overseas operations, is presiding over the conference which will continue until Thursday. A delegation of American leaders including Edward M.M. Warburg, chairman of the J.D.C. and general chairman of the United Jewish Appeal from which the J.D.C. receives its funds, Moses A. Leavitt, executive vice-chairman; Brig. Gen. Morris Troper, of the J.D.C. administrative committee; Dr. Abram Abeloff, of the J.D.C. health committee, and Dr. Joseph J. Schwartz, executive vice chairman of the U.J.A., will participate in the planning of programs for relief, reconstruction and resettlement for the coming year.

J.D.C. appropriations for the first nine months of 1951 were \$16,400,000. The agency allocated \$12,000,000 in the past two years for its "Malben" program in Israel.

## FAWZI KAUKJI PRESIDENT PERON'S GUEST IN ARGENTINA

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 16. (JTA) -- Fawzi el Kaukji, commander of the Arab guerilla forces that fought against Israel in Northern Palestine in 1948, has arrived here as a guest of President Juan Peron, according to the newspaper La Razon.

## SHARETT OPENS FALL CAMPAIGN OF NEW YORK BOND DRIVE

NEW YORK, Sept. 16. (JTA) -- Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett formally opened the Fall drive of the Greater New York campaign for State of Israel bonds this afternoon when he addressed a rally of 10,000 in Straus Square on the lower East Side.

The Israeli leader promised that subscription to the bond drive would make Israel a "home for millions" and added: "The task we have undertaken is without precedent in history. Time and space were against us. We were separated from our country for 2,000 years and we were scattered all over the globe. Yet we regained possession of our ancient land and we are bringing back its exiles from near and far. Because we lost so much time in the past, because we let our fate drift for so many centuries, now, that we have been given the chance we must work fast.

"The time has now arrived when we must develop all our economic resources so that all the newcomers should become producers, able to stand on their own feet. Help us to achieve this goal. Ours will be the strength, yours the pride."

The Israeli Foreign Minister said that "the State of Israel has launched a bond issue in the United States to enable every single Jew in this great democracy to become a partner in our historic enterprise. Proceeds of the bond issue will be invested in sound economic development. Your subscriptions will be turned into means of livelihood for masses of Jews in need of a secure home--pipes for irrigation, agricultural machinery, industrial plants, buildings for factories, credits for housing, electric power, commercial ships and airplanes.

"In your hands lies the capacity to make Israel prosper and triumph over all odds. If each Jew in New York and in the whole of the United States does what he can, the total result will ensure Israel's future. It is up to you all to vindicate your faith and sympathy by action. Let each one of you respond to the urgent call of Israel."

### Israel Example to World, Mayor Says

Mr. Sharett handed Mayor Vincent R. Impellitteri a personal invitation from Premier David Ben Gurion to visit Israel. Voicing thanks for the invitation, the Mayor said that "the State of Israel, judged by human standards; by political standards or by economic standards, has achieved a record that can bolster any man's faith. The courage, labor and self-sacrifice that have been poured into the soil and industrial machinery of that little country will always stand as an example to the world."

The Mayor, who is to leave Tuesday for Italy and Israel, hailed the people of Israel as "pioneers in democratic government in precisely the same way as the founders of our own United States. They are not building a nation the easy way--they are unshakably insistent on doing it the right way. Israel Bond dollars will help create a decent standard of living necessary to any secure, healthy state," the Mayor added. "Israel Bonds sold in this country will establish the firm underpinning of a free nation - food and clothing for the people, production adequate for domestic consumption and for export to the rest of the world, the economic plenty in which a courageous democratic nation must live."

General Sessions Judge Jonah J. Goldstein presided at the rally which was sponsored jointly by the Greater New York Committee for State of Israel Bonds and the Yiddish newspapers, The Day, the Forward and the Jewish Morning Journal.

## U.N. COUNCIL VOTES TO STUDY CONTINUED ANTI-DISCRIMINATION PROGRAM

GENEVA, Sept. 16, (JTA) -- The Co-ordination committee of the U.N. Social and Economic Council had moved today to assure continuation of activities to prevent discrimination and protect minorities following the discontinuation of the Council's sub-commission on prevention of discrimination and protection of minorities.

It adopted a resolution jointly proposed by Uruguay and India directing the Secretary General to make an inquiry among member states on items dealing with these issues which should be placed on forthcoming Council agendas and to report in 1952 on the results of this inquiry, his own suggestions and those of the sub-commission on the measures to be taken by the Council to prevent discrimination and protect minorities.

The preamble to the resolution stressed that the Council was "conscious of the responsibilities entrusted to it" in this field, was "desirous of pursuing its efforts to abolish all forms of discrimination and protect minorities" and was "desirous of taking the necessary positive steps to continue the work of the sub-commission on the prevention of discrimination and protection of minorities after the discontinuance of the commission."

The plenary Economic and Social Council voted to postpone action on a resolution for establishment of a Middle East Economic Commission after the Arab states declared that the situation had changed since this was first proposed in 1947 and that postponement was necessary.

Dr. M. Kahany, the Israeli observer, said his country favored such a commission but only on condition that all Middle East states participated on an equal footing and that the commission's headquarters were set up in a country guaranteeing freedom of access to representatives from all states in the area. He referred to the economic war being waged against Israel by the Arab states and declared the Middle East situation called imperatively for a regional organ of the United Nations.

## I.R.O. TERMINATION TO SPELL HARDSHIP FOR DP'S, ROSENWALD WARNS

PARIS, Sept. 16, (JTA) -- The scheduled liquidation of the International Refugee Organization operations will bring untold hardships to tens of thousands of displaced persons, William Rosenwald, a national chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, said here prior to his departure for New York. He warned that creation of a successor organization would leave many problems unsolved and cause new ones "whose significance cannot be exaggerated."

The problem of European Jewish refugees remains a pressing one, Mr. Rosenwald declared. He expressed the conviction that almost every Jewish displaced person in Germany desperately hopes to emigrate to a free nation where he can start life anew. The "hard-core" cases, he said, were in a desperate position.

## W.J.C. CRITICIZES AUSTRIAN RESTITUTION POLICY

GENEVA, Sept. 16, (JTA) -- A resolution calling on the Allied Powers to use their good offices with the Austrian Government to secure settlement of Jewish claims was adopted here by the plenary session of the executive of the World Jewish Congress. The resolution called on the Austrian Parliament not to modify restitution laws to the detriment of claimants of heirless property and warned world opinion of growing anti-Semitism and the dangers of neo-Nazism in Austria.
