THOUSANDS ATTEND DR. GREENBERG'S FUNERAL; ISRAEL MINISTERS PRESENT

NEW YORK, March 16. (JTA) -- Several thousand persons crowded into B'nai Jeshurun Synagogue today to pay homage to Dr. Hayim Greenberg, outstanding Zionist philosopher and member of the Jewish Agency executive, who died last Saturday after a prolonged illness. Hundreds of others, who could not get into the synagogue, filled the block outside the building.

Although marked by simple rites, the funeral was one of the largest and most impressive in recent years. Services were conducted by Rabbi Robert Gordis, of the Jewish Theological Seminary. In accordance with the last wishes of Dr. Greenberg, no eulogies were delivered, but Psalms 103, 23 and 42 were read as were Job, chapter 28 and Isaiah chapter 1. Also in accordance with his last wishes, a song by the Russian poet Lermontov--"I Am Going Alone on the Road"--was sung in a Yiddish translation by the well-known baritone Sidor Belarsky.

The Israel Government was represented at the services by three members of the Cabinet: Golda Myerson, Dov Joseph and Dr. Peretz Bernstein. The Jewish Agency executive was represented by its American members, led by Mrs. Rose Halprin, acting chairman, in the absence of chairman Dr. Nahum Goldmann, who is now abroad. The Israel Consulate staff was headed by Minister Arthur Lourie. Dr. Greenberg was buried at Cedar Park Cemetery, New Jersey.

Pall bearers included Zvi Lurie, Benjamin G. Browdy and Gottlieb Hammer, representing the Jewish Agency, and Louis Segal, Meyer Brown, Benjamin Teller, Pinchas Cruso, Abe Balfour, Isaac Hamlin, Jacob Katzman and S. Bonchik, representing the Labor Zionist movement. Messages of condolence were received from Jewish and non-Jewish leaders, intellectuals, educational institutions and Jewish communities in Israel, Europe, Canada, Latin America and cities throughout the United States.

Israel Cabinet Mourns Greenberg's Death; Memorial Held

JERUSALEM, March 16. (JTA) -- The Israel Cabinet today decided to send its condolences on the death of Hayim Greenberg, American Labor Zionist leader, to the Jewish Agency executive in New York, of which he was a member, and to his family. It was learned that Premier David Ben Gurion has already sent a message to the widow.

Meanwhile, a memorial meeting was held here last night for Dr. Greenberg. Berl Locker, co-chairman of the executive, and Zalman Shazar, a member, eulogized him. They noted his contributions to Jewish culture and to the Zionist movement and stressed the combination in the late Dr. Greenberg of a "noble heart and a big brain."

SHARETT REPORTS TO ISRAEL CABINET ON WORLD POLITICAL SITUATION

JERUSALEM, March 16. (JTA) -- The Israel Cabinet last night discussed the world political situation following a report by Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett. The Cabinet decided to extend financial assistance to the city of Jerusalem, which is currently encountering financial difficulties.

The government-Jewish Agency immigration coordination board met yesterday, under the chairmanship of Premier David Ben Gurion, to consider immigration problems. It was decided to encourage the immigration of youth to Israel. Another meeting of the board will be held soon to conclude the discussion started yesterday and to consider ways to encourage immigration from the West.

AMERICAN GOVERNMENT URGED TO GRANT MILITARY AID TO ISRAEL

NEW YORK, March 16. (JTA) -- A resolution calling upon the U. S. Government to grant Israel's application for military assistance and to postpone contemplated arms shipments to Arab states "until they end their boycotts and blockades, renounce their war against Israel and undertake to enter peace negotiations," was adopted today at the Mid-Winter Conference of the Hadassah, attended by leaders of the organization from all parts of the country.

"We urge the Administration and Congress to reaffirm our country's traditional friendship for Israel by assisting her to resettle the refugees who are finding sanctuary there and to strengthen her industrial and agricultural capacity," the resolution added. It pointed out that Israel is especially entitled to American aid "in view of the known Communist pressure" against the Jewish state.

Mr. Samuel Halprin, Hadassah leader and member of the Jewish Agency executive, addressing the conference, said that "any attempt now to arm the Arab States would be an invitation to trouble." She expressed the hope that the United States Government would not permit itself to be used as a pawn by the Arabs "in their game of playing Washington off against the Kremlin," and urged President Eisenhower to insist on an Israel-Arab peace before giving additional consideration to Arab demands for economic and military aid.

Mrs. Halprin, who just returned from Israel, reported "greater uneasiness" among the Israeli population as a result of the heightened Arab propaganda war against Israel and the increased "incidents" on the Israel borders. "The people of Israel firmly believe that the Arab requests for arms from the United States are motivated, not by a desire to defend democracy, but by a desire to launch another attack on Israel."

Dr. Dov Joseph, Minister without portfolio in the Israel Government, told the meeting that "Israel hopes one day to become a model state for other nations to follow." He called upon the Hadassah leaders to continue and to expand their present comprehensive medical and social welfare programs in Israel. The need for continued Hadassah aid to Israel was stressed also by Avraham Harman, Counsellor of the Israel Delegation to the United Nations.

Peretz Bernstein, Israel Minister of Trade and Industry, emphasized that the actual difficulties of Israel's economy are the result of a big gap between production and consumption. "This gap must be ultimately narrowed and closed primarily by our increase of production and productivity," he said. The steps recently taken to restore competitive economy have already resulted in an improved supply situation and increased consumer goods. They will also help to bring nearer such balance of production and consumption as reflects the standard of living strictly in accordance with the production and genuine earning capacity of the country, he added.

GERMAN-ISRAEL REPARATIONS PACT DUE FOR RATIFICATION TOMORROW

BONN, March 16. (JTA) -- The West German-Israel reparations pact is expected to come to the floor of the Lower House of the Bonn Parliament for its final reading this Wednesday. The Parliamentary Foreign Affairs Committee this week-end approved the pact unanimously, it was learned today.

Dr. M. Kirschberg, a Jewish opponent of the Israel reparations treaty, who claims to head an organization of 77 local branches dedicated to obtaining a settlement for individual Jews rather than Israel, was reported here today to be in contact with a Dr. Hamui, press attache of the Syrian embassy in Bonn. Investigation proved that the organization headed by Dr. Kirschberg, the "Jewish Association for the Protection of Restitution Claimants," is unknown either in West Germany or Switzerland, where he says he now resides.

It is reported that Dr. Kirschberg, who lobbied against the Israel settlement, has been staying in Dr. Hamui's home. Of the impressive membership he claimed, only Dr. Kirschberg and a non-Jewish attorney named Dahms could be located. Until recently Dr. Kirschberg was effective in his fight against the reparations pact, reaching many Germans who were impressed by his being Jewish, yet opposing the Israel settlement. Even the Frankfurt Allgemeine, Germany's most influential daily, gave a sympathetic account of his plan for restitution on its front page under the heading--"A Jewish Proposal."

YUGOSLAV GROUPS HOLD PROTEST MEETING AGAINST SOVIET ANTI-SEMITISM

LONDON, March 16. (JTA) -- A huge protest meeting was held in Belgrade to protest "anti-Semitic action in countries of the Soviet bloc," it was reported here today from the Yugoslav capital. The report said 117 Yugoslav organizations and associations, including representatives of such groups as the Federation of Trade Unions, Federation of Fighters of the Peoples Liberation War and the Anti-Fascist Front of Women, took part.

The meeting adopted a resolution stating: "It is a historical fact that anti-Semitism is a classical weapon of reactionary regimes, always used to make an unprotected minority a scapegoat for their own faults and thereby deflect public attention from the real causes of crises and failures."

POLISH SECURITY POLICE ESTABLISHES OFFICE TO DEAL WITH JEWS

STOCKHOLM, March 16. (JTA) -- A special section to deal with Jews has been established in the Polish Security Police, it was reported here today.

The department, known officially as the Special Bureau for the Registration of the Population of Jewish Origin, has headquarters in Bialystok and is headed by a Russian Col. Morozov, the report added. It said that Morozov's orders from the Soviet secret police were to compile a list of "unreliable" Jews, who would be interned in new labor camps being built in the Bialystok region.

The report stated that a number of Jewish officers in the Polish Army, who were stationed along Poland's border or in the coastal region, have been transferred to minor posts in the Bialystok area. These, it predicted, would be the most likely to be included in the first groups to be interned when the camps were completed.

Jewish Members of Polish-Legation Ordered Back to Warsaw

STOCKHOLM, March 16. (JTA) -- Four Jewish members of the Polish legation in Sweden have been ordered to return to Warsaw with their families, it was reported here today. Two other Jewish members of the legation have not been recalled.

YESHIVA UNIVERSITY NAMES ITS MEDICAL COLLEGE FOR PROF. EINSTEIN

NEW YORK, March 16. (JTA) -- America's first medical college under Jewish auspices, part of Yeshiva University here, was today named the Albert Einstein College of Medicine.

Dr. Samuel Belkin, president of Yeshiva University, formally notified Prof. Einstein of the University's decision to name the medical college for him at a luncheon yesterday at the Princeton Inn which also marked Dr. Einstein's 74th birthday. One hundred community leaders from 20 different cities in the United States and Canada were present to witness the naming of the College and the presentation to Dr. Einstein of a model of the projected medical college building with its facade bearing the name Albert Einstein College of Medicine.

The model was presented by New York State Attorney General Nathaniel L. Goldstein, who is serving as national chairman of the Medical College Campaign. Mr. Goldstein announced that over \$3,000,000 in cash and pledges had been raised of the \$10,000,000 needed to construct and equip the College. An additional \$520,000 was raised at the birthday celebration yesterday in honor of Dr. Einstein.

Responding to the notification and presentation, Dr. Einstein welcomed the new College as a contribution of real significance to the general welfare affording wider opportunities for young people to pursue medical careers. Expressing appreciation for the honor offered him, Dr. Einstein said:

"I am grateful that Yeshiva University has honored me by using my name in connection with the new College of Medicine. There is a shortage of physicians in this country and there are many young people, able and eager to study medicine, who - under present circumstances - are deprived of the opportunity to do so."

Reminiscing on the influences that led to his choice of a scientific career, Dr. Einstein recalled how impressed he was as a child of five by his first sight of a compass and his introduction to plane geometry at the age of 12. "To me it appears as if those outside stimuli have had a considerable influence on my development. Man, however, has had very little insight into what is going on within himself. Seeing a compass for the first time may not have a similar effect on every child."

Speaking of young men about to embark on scientific careers, Dr. Einstein said: "He who has the urge to do creative scientific work will find his own way. It is not advice, but stimulating example that matters."

TRUMAN NAMED TO RECEIVE 1952 STEPHEN WISE AWARD

NEW YORK, March 16. (JTA) -- Former President Harry S. Truman has been named to receive the 1952 Stephen Wise Award for outstanding leadership in the extension of civil rights in the United States, it was announced today by Dr. Israel Goldstein, president of the American Jewish Congress, which makes the annual awards.

Josef Sprinzak, Speaker of the Israel Knesset, and Dr. Hayim Greenberg, member of the Jewish Agency executive, who died last Saturday, are the other two winners of the 1952 awards, each of which carries a cash value of \$1,000. The award to Dr. Greenberg will be made posthumously.

EISENHOWER LAUDS WORK OF NATIONAL COUNCIL OF JEWISH WOMEN

CLEVELAND, March 16. (JTA) -- President Eisenhower today hailed the efforts of the National Council of Jewish Women which, he said, "underscores the aspirations for peace which guide free men everywhere." His statement was made in a message read to the 800 delegates from all parts of the country who are attending the Council's 20th triennial convention here.

The President praised the organization's "forward-looking program of education, social action and service," and called its activities "testimonies to enlightened and dedicated citizenship." He also noted the fitness for these times of the convention's theme, "Human Welfare Grows with Freedom."

RABBIS CRITICIZE CONGRESSIONAL INVESTIGATIONS AS "UNDEMOCRATIC"

ATLANTIC CITY, March 16. (JTA) -- The Commission of Justice and Peace of the Central Conference of American Rabbis concluded a three-day meeting here last night with the adoption of a statement criticizing the "undemocratic methods" of Congressional investigators, the Smith Act which makes it a crime to teach or advocate the overthrow of the government, the McCarran Internal Security Act, the removal of wage and price controls and the imposition of loyalty oaths on teachers.

The meeting, which was attended by 150 rabbis representing 500 congregations, stated: "We believe that the national security of our country is rooted in the individual freedom of its citizens. We reject the concept that there is any incompatibility between freedom and security, and that individual freedom must be curtailed in the interest of national security."

On the subject of education, the statement said: "We are opposed to the imposition of loyalty oaths on teachers. While we recognize that Communists are not fit teachers for our children, we are convinced that the danger to our democratic freedom of uninhibited witch hunts and spurious investigations is even greater than that of a few Communist teachers. All freedom involves risks."

COURT HEARS OBJECTION TO DISTRIBUTION OF NEW TESTAMENTS IN SCHOOLS

NEW YORK, March 16. (JTA) -- A challenge to the constitutionality of a decision by the board of education of Rutherford, New Jersey, to permit the distribution of the King James version of the Bible in the public schools of that town was scheduled to be heard today in the Superior Court of New Jersey, at Hackensack.

The question was raised by a Jewish parent, Bernard Tudor, and a Catholic parent, Mrs. Walter Natniak, both of Rutherford, after the school authorities granted permission to the Gideon Society to distribute copies of the New Testament to school children. Attorneys for the plaintiff include Leo Pfeffer, assistant general counsel to the American Jewish Congress, and Philip Baum of the Congress' legal staff.

VATICAN MAY AGREE TO COMPROMISE ON ABDUCTED JEWISH YOUTHS

ROME, March 16. (JTA) -- Andre Zaoui, Reform Chief Rabbi of France, said today following a 40-minute talk with the Vatican's Undersecretary of State, Msgr. Dellacqua, that Vatican officials might seek to resolve the case of the two Finaly boys by placing them in a "neutral" institution - that is, one that is neither Jewish nor Catholic.

\$5,000,000 RAISED AT MID-WESTERN UJA CONFERENCE IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, March 16. (JTA) -- More than \$5,000,000 was raised here yesterday at a United Jewish Appeal conference of 300 leaders of Jewish communities in the Middle West at which the situation of the Jews in countries behind the Iron Curtain was analyzed by Max Lerner, noted author, who just returned from Europe, and Moses W. Beckelman, European director of the Joint Distribution Committee.

The conference was also addressed by David Hacohen, member of the Israel Parliament. He branded the Soviet break in diplomatic relations with Israel a "carefully calculated move in a deliberate program of infamy against the Jewish people." He added that "what we have been through in the early days has strengthened us. With your help we will continue to build and prepare ourselves to welcome any Jew who needs aid and sanctuary."

LOUIS BENNETT NAMED ASSISTANT EXECUTIVE VICE-CHAIRMAN OF UJA

NEW YORK, March 16. (JTA) -- Louis L. Bennett of New York, well known government manpower and housing consultant and until recently executive director of the New York Association for New Americans, has been named assistant executive vice-chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, it was announced today by Dr. Joseph J. Schwartz, UJA executive vice-chairman.

Mr. Bennett, former New York Regional Housing Expediter and Consultant to the Federal Administrator of the National Housing Agency, will assist Dr. Schwartz in executive leadership of the UJA's nationwide campaign.

MIZRACHI YOUTH OF AMERICA TO SEND 50 MEMBERS TO ISRAEL FOR STUDY

NEW YORK, March 16. (JTA) -- The Mizrachi Youth of America will send 50 of its members to Israel this summer to participate in a special program of work and study, it was announced here last night at a national meeting of the organization, which was attended by some 500 college students representing 8,000 members in over 100 chapters throughout the United States.

Herman Wouk, author of the best selling "The Caine Mutiny," was presented with the first Annual Mizrachi Youth Award "in recognition of his distinguished contributions to the furtherance of traditional Judaism and of the inspiration which his personal living has afforded American Jewish youth."

DR. HERMAN BARUCH, FORMER U.S. AMBASSADOR, DIES; WAS 80 YEARS OLD

NEW YORK, March 16. (JTA) -- Dr. Herman B. Baruch, former American Ambassador to the Netherlands and Portugal, died last night at his home in nearby Wyandanch, Long Island. He was 80.

Dr. Baruch, a physician, also entered the field of finance, as did his brother Bernard. He entered the field of diplomacy in 1943 as chief of an economic warfare mission in Brazil. After his retirement from the foreign service field in 1949, Dr. Baruch devoted himself principally to the Simon Baruch Foundation which worked on infantile paralysis research.

SAMUEL LEVY, FORMER BOROUGH PRESIDENT OF MANHATTAN, DEAD

NEW YORK, March 16. (JTA) -- Samuel Levy, one-time Borough President of Manhattan, died here yesterday at the age of 76. An attorney, real estate operator and philanthropist, Mr. Levy was once a member of the New York Board of Education and was chairman of the board of trustees of Yeshiva University. He was active also in other Jewish institutions.
