GERMAN COURT HANDS DOWN SEVERE SENTENCES IN JEWISH BANK CASE

FRANKFURT, Aug. 24. (JTA) -- After a trial which lasted about ten months, all principal defendants in the case of the former "Jewish Restitution Bank" here were sentenced today to terms that caused astonishment because of their severity.

Dr. Joseph Klibansky, generally considered Germany's best known Jewish atterney, was sentenced to eighteen menths jall in addition to a fine of \$4,500 for being an accessory to violation of foreign currency regulations and of certain provisions of the corporation law.

Withclm Marrien, originally technical advisor of the bank and later its manager, received 10 months imprisonment for infringement of the corporation law, for being accessory to violation of foreign currency regulations and for bribery.

Dr. Hans Erwin Wolf, who was appointed by the State as custodian of the bank, received six months imprisonment for corruption. Wolfgang Steege, a German banker from Hamburg, was fined \$600 for being accessory to violation of foreign currency regulations. Cashier Siefreid Froblich was let off with a fine of \$100.

Dr. Klibansky, was found guilty of having aided and abetted the transfer of blocked mark accounts to their Jewish owners abroad, a transaction which was illegal at the time, in 1950, but which was legalized a few months after the Jewish Restitution Bank was shut down. The violation of the corporation law refers to issue of receipts to cover up the withdrawal of blocked mark funds.

Dr. Kilibansky was also convicted of having, as a member of the bank's board of directors, contributed to its bankruptcy although the bank's assets exceed its debt seem today. The court found, however, that there was no evidence that Dr. Kilibansky had enriched himself, or had personally violated foreign currency

NEW REGULATIONS FOR IMMIGRANTS OF MILITARY AGE ISSUED IN ISRAEL

LORDON, Aug. 24. (JTA) -- The Israeli Defense Ministry, has issued a new regulations for draftees which will give immigrants to the Jewish State credit for the time they served in other armies. the Israel Embassy here announced today.

The new regulations, the announcement said, will give full credit for periods of service over 18 months, requiring only an additional three-month period of struce to familiarise the immigrant with the Israel armed services and to prepare

IEWISH GROUPS FORMULATE VIEWS ON INTERRELIGIOUS FIGHT AGAINST BIAS

- NEW YORK, Aug. 24. (JTA) -- A series of recommendations regarding the community relations values of inter-religious activities were made public here totay by the National Community Relations Advisory Council, coordinating body Iewish organizations engaged in fighting anti-Semitism in the United States.
- The recommendations were adopted at a three-day conference of the NCRAC Special Committee on Reassessment, dealing with the field of interfaith relationships. The parley was attended by 45 social scientists, rabbis, scholars of religion And Jewish community leaders.
- Comprising the Special Committee are representatives of the American Jewish Compress, Jewish Labor Committee, Jewish War Veterans, Union of American Hebrew Congregations, Union of Orthodox Congregations, United Synagogue of America and many of the 30 local Jewish community councils affiliated with the NCRAC. The principal recommendations provide:
- Particular emphasis should be placed on reaching directly local non-Jewish religious groups and their leaders. Also that there be continued use of interdenominational organizations as a common meeting ground, with full recognition of both their contralatities and their limitations.
- There should be great emphasis in future programming upon cooperation with non-Jewish religious groups for civic and social advancement, and there be a corresponding de-emphasis of programs, now on the decline, based upon exhortation towards good will.
- 3. Historical and critical research be conducted upon the relationship between religious doctrines and various forms of anti-Judalsm and of anti-Gemittsm in the United States today in the prespective of the distinctive features of American cultures and of the present world situation, in order to guide more closely the fundamental lines of planning inter-religious activity for community relations work today.
- 4. When differences arise between Jewish and non-Jewish groups on social issues, these should be faced frankly and forthrightly. Jewish groups should continue to express themselves as religious group with regard to civic issues on the basis of Jewish tradition, and to welcome action on civic issues by Christian groups have unon the Christian social.
- 5. The participation of Jewish religious bodies on the level of national policy for community relations work be increased; there should be a growing role for the synagone and more effective participation by rabbinical leadership nationally and on the community level.
- All rabbis and rabbinical students should receive training in community relations philosophy, techniques, and methods, just as all Jewish community relations workers should have a thorough grounding in Jewish tradition.

JEWISH HOSPITAL REPORTS NEW CONCEPT OF TREATING TUBERCULOSIS

DENVER, Aug. 24. (JTA) -- A concept of treating tuberculesis and restoring patients to useful, productive lives by getting them out of bed months ahead of current procedures while treating them with so-called "monder drugs" was described by a National Jewish Hospital team of physicians here tonight.

But in order for a "total job" to be done, patients must be reconciled to almost doubling the present period of hospitalisation under strictly controlled conditions. Dr. Sidney H. Dressler, medical director, and Dr. Carder Middlebrook, director of research and laboratories at the interfaith tuberculosis hospital, pointed out.

"The time has come to alter our cancept of tuberculous's treatment materially, to step merely helping people to live with the disease, and to center an all-out stack on the germ causing the malady, the tubercle bacillus itself," the doctors declared in advocating extension of pilot studies they made during the past year.

Their studies have indicated, they said, that prolonged bed rest -- once the

classic inducates a restment— does not said to the efficiency of treatment with satisfactors. Even those requiring suggry are taken off ambulatory routions for only a short period per-operatively and are returned to rehabilitation schedules in from three to four weeks following the operations.
