ISRAEL'S FIRST INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITION OPENED IN JERUSALEM

JERUSALEM, Sept. 22. (JTA) -- Israel's first international exhibition, the "Conquest of the Desert," was formally opened late this afternoon by President Ben Zvi and Acting Premier Moshe Sharett The exposition, which 2,000,000 persons are expected to visit before it closes on Oct. 14, is located in the heart of this city.

More than 2,000,000 pounds has been invested by 500 private firms, public and semi-public institutions from 23 nations and intergovernmental bodies in the various boths, pavilions and exhibits. The exhibits and films will show how man can best beat back the desert and provide more food and living space for the world's rapidly growing population.

More than 600 people were employed to set up the exhibition. The Conquest of the Desert Company spent 840,000 pounds while local firms spent 700,000 pounds in preparing for the exposition. It is expected that the fair's deficit will be no more than 300,000 pounds and that most of the investment will be recovered from rental fees for exhibition space and admission charges.

Three scientific conferences will be held concurrently with the fair. A symposium on "Negev Development" will be presented by engineers and architects next Sunday, a Congress of the Society for the Advancement of Science will convene next Tuesday and a Congress of Jewish Agronomists will be held Oct. 4. Each week-day night concerts or theatrical productions will be presented in the open-air auditorium.

U. S. Explains its Boycott of Exhibition Opening

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22. (JTA) -- The United States Government regards Israel's "Conquest of the Desert" exhibition which opened today in Jerusalem as an "official function" and will not attend because this government does not recognize the legality of the location of the Israel Foreign Ministry in Jerusalem. A State Department pokesman made this known today.

The spokesman said American Embassy officials may attend the exhibition after today but were purposely avoiding the political implications they feel would be attached to appearing at Jerusalem today in an official capacity.

DR. GOLDMANN REPORTS ON HIS REPARATIONS TALKS IN VIENNA

NEW YORK, Sept. 22. (JTA) -- Details on his talks with the Austria ment on Jewish claims against Austria were given today by Dr. Nahum G chairman of the Jewish Agency, following his return from Vienna where Ausfrian Chancellor Dr. Julius Raab.

Addressing a press conference, Dr. Goldmann said that four major c against Austria for material losses suffered by Jews under Nazi rule are studied by the Austrian Cabinet. The claims, presented by the Committe Claims on Austria, of which Dr. Goldmann is president and which repre major Jewish organizations of the Western world, are:
