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## DULLES AND EBAN DISCUSS U. S. MUNITIONS SHIPMENTS TO ARABS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- The question of United States munitions shipments to Arab League states was among a number of matters taken up today in an hour-long discussion of "the whole atmosphere of Israel-American relations" held at the State Department today with Israel Ambassador Abba Eban and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles as the principal participants.

Mr. Eban later said that the arms discussion was included in "a general survey" of issues which were discussed in "a friendly and constructive spirit."

When he returned recently from Israel, Mr. Eban talked with Secretary Dulles about the broader aspects of Israel-American affairs. A continuation of that discussion was originally slated for October 2 but was postponed until today owing to the illness last week of Henry A. Byroade, Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs. This was made known today by a spokesman for the Israel Embassy.

The meeting today, the Ambassador said, was a resumption of the review of questions begun in the first talk. He made it clear that the discussion of arms shipments to the Arabs did not constitute the principal part of the conversation. Both Mr. Dulles and the Israel Government thought the type of conversation held today would prove useful, Mr. Eban said.

Other participants in today's meeting included Reuven Shiloah, newly-arrived Israel Minister plenipotentiary, and Mr. Byroade.

## ISRAEL DELEGATION AT UNITED NATIONS CONDEMNS EGYPT'S TACTICS

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Oct. 8. (JTA) -- The Israel delegation at the United Nations today issued a statement condemning the anti-Israel propaganda campaign initiated by Egypt during the last few days and emphasizing that the events on which Egypt has built its campaign have never occurred.

The statement pointed out that on October 1, Ambassador Eban referred to false charges published by high Egyptian officials with respect to an alleged occupation of the demilitarized zone at El Auja by Israeli forces. Mr. Eban alluded to "hit and run" tactics by Arab Governments which propagate sensational charges for their short-term official effect, and then fail either to submit or to substantiate those charges in the appropriate United Nations organs.

"The conduct of Egypt in this propaganda adventure is a revealing example of this policy," the statement said. "On September 29, the Egyptian Minister of

National Guidance announced that Israeli troops had occupied an area in the demilitarized zone near El Ajua and had established fortifications there. This is a completely untrue statement. Egypt has discreetly refrained from submitting this highly publicized accusation to the Mixed Armistice Commission which has been in session to discuss complaints from both parties in recent days. Thus Egypt has implicitly confirmed the untruth of its own charges.

#### Discrepancies in Complaints Pointed Out

"On October 2," the statement continued, "Egypt presented a totally different and far less spectacular charge to the Mixed Armistice Commission, alleging that Israel had illegitimately established a civilian settlement in the Auja sector. This Egyptian charge was considered by the Armistice Commission. It received no support from the United Nations representatives and was accordingly not upheld. It is evident that this peaceful civilian activity in the Auja region is entirely in accordance with the Armistice Agreement, notwithstanding the Egyptian plea to the contrary. The only request of the Commission is that police or troops should not have been included in the establishment of the village in the demilitarized zone.

"A further complaint by Egypt concerning alleged attacks on Bedouins in the demilitarized zone was upheld by the Armistice Commission. It will be observed that this is a very different complaint from the far-reaching allegation that Israeli troops had occupied an area in the demilitarized zone. The fact is that the incident complained of arose out of indiscriminate attacks on civilians by lawless Bedouins in the area. In a number of cases these have come before and have elicited the condemnation of the Mixed Armistice Commission.

"These findings confirm the irresponsibility of the publicity campaign recently initiated by Egypt," the statement emphasized. "No events of the character described by Egypt occurred in the area concerned; the only incidents under consideration by the Mixed Armistice Commission are those which are part of its routine consideration, and on which no final verdict is yet available.

"On the other hand, complaints by Israel of penetration into Israel by Egyptian land and air forces in the first week of October have been submitted in a regular procedure to the Mixed Armistice Commission and are now under consideration," the statement concluded.

#### MEMBERS OF ISRAEL CABINET WITNESS MILITARY MANEUVERS

TEL AVIV, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- Members of the Israel Cabinet yesterday witnessed Israeli Air Force units participate in coordinated maneuvers with ground units and in separate air-to-air operations, it was announced here today.

In operations designed to show the attack possibilities of all types of planes in the Air Force, "Red" squadrons "bombed" airbases of "Black" forces, while "Black" heavy bombers and medium fighters and bombers made mock attacks on defending cities and industrial centers, as well as communications lines.

#### U. N. COMMISSION TO HEAR REPORT ON ISRAEL PAYMENTS TO ARABS

JERUSALEM, Oct. 7. (JTA) -- John P. Gailard, Jerusalem representative of the Palestine Conciliation Commission, today left here for New York. When he arrives in New York he will report to the headquarters of the Commission progress on Israel's program of releasing blocked bank accounts of Palestine Arab refugees residing abroad.

## EISENHOWER NONCOMMITTAL ON EARLY REVISION OF IMMIGRATION LAW

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- President Eisenhower told his press conference today that he is at this time not ready to say positively if revision of the McCarran-Walter Immigration Act is on the "must list" for action in the next session of Congress.

The President indicated that he might seek correction if those administering the Act find imperfections. The President made these statements in reply to a question by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. The question was:

"Now that the Administration has successfully achieved the passage of your Emergency Refugee Bill, is the correction of what you described in your State of the Union message as the discrimination of the McCarran-Walter Immigration Act part of the program for the second session of the 83rd Congress?"

Mr. Eisenhower prefaced his answer by saying that he had not studied the immigration issue for some time.

## JEWS RESCUED BY DENMARK PAY STIRRING TRIBUTE TO DANISH PEOPLE

JERUSALEM, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- High in the Judean Hills some 200 Jews rescued by the Danish people ten years ago in a daring Dunkirk-like operation, yesterday gathered to pay honor to the small European nation at exercises opening the King Christian Tubercular Hospital at Deir Amar.

The ceremony also marked the evacuation of some 6,000 Danish Jews to Sweden by hundreds of Danish fishermen and boatmen who snatched the Jews from certain death at the hands of the Nazis, who then occupied Denmark. It was the late King Christian X, who led his people in protesting the Nazi treatment of Jews by wearing a cloak with a yellow Star of David on it whenever he appeared in public. This was in defiance of a Nazi order which forced all Jews to wear such identifying marks in an attempt to isolate them from the remainder of the population.

Berl Locker, Jewish Agency co-chairman, recounting the Danish exploit during the High Holy Days in October, 1943, told the audience of Israeli Government leaders, Danish and Swedish diplomats and Israelis from all walks of life, that this operation "will ever be remembered in the annals of the Jewish people. What they did then," he continued, "saved not only their own honor but also that of Europe, Christianity and of all mankind." He also stressed that the Jews would not forget the aid given their people by the Swedish nation.

Education Minister Ben Zion Dinur, another speaker at the exercises, revealed that as part of the memorial to the 6,000,000 European Jews murdered by the Nazis, the Israel Government had decided that the first volume in the history of the Jewish sufferings in Nazi Europe would be concerned with the story of the "pious among the Gentiles" and that the Danish action would be the first recounted. The first page of that volume, he added, would bear a dedication to the late King Christian.

Among the guests at the exercises was Danish Maj. Gen. Vagn Bennike, chief of the United Nations truce organization in Palestine, who expressed his thanks at all the "kind words" spoken of his people and country. He related his experiences with the rescue operation.

Individual Jews who had been saved by the Danish operation today sent flowers to Christian friends in Denmark by a special plane. President Ben Zvi sent a Bible as a gift to the current Danish King, Frederick IX, with Dr. Abraham Nissim, Israel Ambassador to the Scandinavian countries, who is returning to his post after a visit to Israel.

## JEWISH COMMUNITY IN ESSEN REGAINS ITS PRE-NAZI STATUS

DUSSELDORF, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- The Jewish community of Essen, in the Ruhr, has regained its pre-Nazi status as a corporation under public law. This status, which is enjoyed by the churches of all major denominations, confers certain fiscal advantages and makes it possible to levy church taxes.

## ANTI-SEMITES SENTENCED TO JAIL IN BERLIN FOR MOLESTING JEWS

BERLIN, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- For assaulting a Jewish couple on the street, and subjecting them to anti-Semitic indignities, a Berlin ruffian named Motzkeit was sent to jail for three months by a local German court of appeal.

The chairman of the Berlin Community, Heinz Galinski, had filed a protest with Senator Dr. Kiehlenger, the head of the Berlin administration of justice, when the defendant got off with only a fine in an earlier trial, and the prosecutor also appealed. Now Dr. Kiehlenger has informed Mr. Galinski that the new verdict "may be considered to satisfy the concept of adequate retribution, which you rightly referred to."

Seven neo-Nazi agitators in the Herford and Detmold area of the British zone were given jail terms ranging from seven to ten months by a Dortmund court for having engaged in subversive activities and for reviving the "Socialist Reich Party" (SRP), which was outlawed last summer as a successor organization of the Nazi Party.

## JEWISH AGENCY MOVES PURCHASING OFFICES FROM GENEVA TO GERMANY

COLOGNE, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- The Jewish Agency's European Purchasing Department, presently located in Geneva, and its German Purchasing Section, currently located at Munich, are moving to Cologne, it was announced here today. All European purchasing activities will be centralized in its new offices.

The Agency offices are moving into quarters in the Jewish community building in Cologne occupied until today by the Israel Purchasing Mission. The Israeli group, which needs more space, is moving into a bank building in Cologne.

## ZIONISTS, NON-ZIONISTS IN PARIS TO MEET ON AID TO ISRAEL

PARIS, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- France will be the scene of the first of a series of national conferences throughout the free world designed to introduce new vigor into the Zionist movement, it was revealed here by Zalman Shazar, of the Jewish Agency executive.

The conference will probably be called some time in November and will be part of an intensive effort to bring together all Jews interested in helping Israel, whether they are Zionists or not. The general aim of the worldwide program, Mr. Shazar said, is to create a "vast, dynamic movement encompassing all Jews interested in Israel into the World Zionist Organization."

To inject new life into the Zionist movement, Mr. Shazar said, it is "necessary to broaden the structure of the W. Z. O." A resolution modifying the entire composition of the Zionist organization will be introduced at the next Zionist Congress, he stated. It is to prepare the ground for this resolution, that this series of conferences will be called in various countries of the free world, at which all pro-Israel elements--Zionists or not--will participate, he declared.

U. J. A. NATIONAL CONFERENCE OPENS TOMORROW IN CLEVELAND

CLEVELAND, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- A two-day national conference of the United Jewish Appeal will open here Saturday evening to map new fund-raising measures to assure urgent aid to projects in Israel and needy Jews in other parts of the world. About 750 Jewish leaders from all parts of the United States are expected to attend the parley.

The conference will also mark the high point of a first-phase effort this fall to attain \$25,000,000 to fund the emergency settlement, welfare and rehabilitation activities of the UJA's three constituent agencies, the United Israel Appeal, Joint Distribution Committee and United Service for New Americans. The final conference session on Sunday will witness the action of local leaders in presenting community checks toward this initial dollar goal.

Chief among those who will address the conference are Trygve Lie, former UN Secretary General; Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver of Cleveland; Dr. Nahum Goldmann, chairman of the Jewish Agency; Edward M. Warburg, general chairman of the UJA; Harold J. Goldenberg, chairman of the Investment Center in Israel; and Avraham Harmon, Israel Consul General in the United States.

HADASSAH TO ATTEMPT CONTROL OF RHEUMATIC FEVER IN ISRAEL

NEW YORK, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- The first large-scale attempt to control rheumatic fever in Israel will be inaugurated by the Hadassah Medical Organization with the return next week to Jerusalem of an American-trained Israeli physician who spent 12 months in the United States preparing for this mission, it was announced today.

The Israeli physician, now enroute to Jerusalem following advanced studies at Mt. Sinai Hospital and Cornell Medical College in New York City, is Dr. Ernst Nahum Ehrenfeld. He was brought to this country by Hadassah under a Magnes-Warburg Fellowship, named in honor of Dr. Judah Magnes, first president of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem.

The rheumatic fever project will be conducted among 250 children of school and pre-school age in Jerusalem who were found by Hadassah doctors to have suffered from rheumatic fever, which if left unchecked, frequently leads to heart disease.

Under Dr. Ehrenfeld's plan, Bicillin tablets, a new antibiotic drug of the penicillin family, will be given daily for long periods to the young patients. A shipment of 15,000 tablets of Bicillin made available without cost to Hadassah by Wyeth International Limited, Inc., a Philadelphia pharmaceutical concern, has been dispatched to Jerusalem for the project. Hadassah doctors in Israel are hopeful that regular usage of Bicillin may prevent recurrent rheumatic fever attacks and subsequent heart damage.

The condition of the children involved in the Jerusalem project will be checked regularly and compared with that of rheumatic fever patients in Israel treated by other means. At least one year's time would be required before conclusive results could be expected. If the Jerusalem controlled experiment proves successful, this method of treatment will be utilized in all Hadassah medical institutions in Israel.

**BOSTON JEWISH COUNCIL INVESTIGATES RENEWED ANTI-JEWISH ACTS**

BOSTON, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- The Administrative Committee of the Jewish Community Council of Boston has decided to continue its investigation of a series of new anti-Semitic disturbances in nearby Roxbury and Dorchester last week. Reports on the incidents have been submitted by the Anti-Defamation League.

Findings will be turned over to the Mayor's Committee on Civic Improvement and to the Greater Boston Council for Youth. Last year there were a number of anti-Semitic outbreaks, mostly by teen-age thugs against Jewish youths.

**CATHOLIC ORGAN CRITICIZED FOR ATTACKING THE LATE RABBI WISE**

NEW YORK, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- Rabbi Israel Goldstein, president of the American Jewish Congress, sharply criticized the Tablet last night, a diocesan weekly published in Brooklyn, for its attack on the late Rabbi Stephen S. Wise.

The Tablet had recently upheld the charges made by Benjamin Gitlow before the House Committee on Un-American Activities that Dr. Wise, the late Rabbi Judah L. Magnes, John Holmes and other Protestant clergymen had collaborated with the Communists "in the early 1920's."

**DR. SARA FEDER RE-ELECTED NATIONAL PRESIDENT OF PIONEER WOMEN**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- Dr. Sara Feder was today re-elected for an additional two-year term as Pioneer Women's national president at the organization's convention here. She has taken a leading role in the Pioneer Women's organization for 25 years. The five-day convention is closing tonight.

**REFORM RABBIS TO COMMEMORATE 750TH ANNIVERSARY OF MAIMONIDES**

NEW YORK, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- The 750th anniversary of the death of Moses Maimonides, the most outstanding Jewish philosopher of all times, will be commemorated at this summer's annual convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, it was decided today at a meeting of the organization's national executive board held in New York. The rabbinical convention will take place from June 22 to 27 at the Lake Tarleton Club, Pike, N. H.

Dr. Joseph L. Fink, Buffalo rabbi who is president of the Conference, which includes the nation's Reform rabbis, said that several addresses and symposia would be devoted to the ideas of the medieval philosopher credited with harmonizing the teaching of the Scriptures with those of Aristotle. Dr. Fink pointed out that Maimonides, known also as Rambam, who died in Egypt in 1203, had molded Jewish thinking more than any other figure since the days of the Scriptural prophets.

**DR. EINHORN BEQUEATHS LARGE SUMS TO JEWISH AND NON-JEWISH GROUPS**

NEW YORK, Oct. 8. (JTA) -- The New York Federation of Jewish Philanthropies will receive a bequest of \$200,000 under the terms of the will of the late Dr. Max Einhorn, noted gastroenterologist, who died here two weeks ago.

Other bequests to Jewish groups include: \$100,000 each to the Joint Distribution Committee and Montefiore Hospital of New York; \$50,000 each to the Home for Aged and Infirm Hebrews and the New York Guild for the Jewish Blind; \$30,000 each to the Young Men's and Young Women's Hebrew Associations; and \$25,000 each to the B'nai B'rith and the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. A number of Catholic, Protestant and non-sectarian organizations also share in a total estate of some \$2,000,000.

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
