BIG THREE KIBYA RESOLUTION IS "DISCRIMINATORY," ISRAEL SAYS

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 19. (JTA) -- The Big Three resolution suggesting that the U. N. Security Council should censure Israel for the Kibya incident was termed today "one-sided and discriminatory" by the Israel delegation at the United Nations in an official statement issued to the press. Discussion on the resolution at the Security Council is expected tomorrow.

"The resolution can only prejudice the chance of a peaceful settlement of the dispute," the statement said. It pointed out that the language used in the censure of "an admittedly deplorable occurrence" was more "extreme and intemperate" than ever applied by the United Nations to aggressive wars in which there were thousands of casualties.

"The brutal slaughter of thousands of Israelis at the hands of aggressors before and since the Arab-Israel agreements," the statement said, has "elicited no word of sympathy or of disapproval in the resolution of the body to which this draft is now submitted."

The Israeli delegation asserted that the resolution came "close to condoning the armed incursions from Jordan." The statement went on to say that the resolution refuses to consider the causes of the regional tension and concentrates only on criticizing its results. "It turns away from the clear assertion of a need for a negotiated peace settlement, such as Britain, France and the United States have always upheld in the past," the Israeli delegation stressed.

"It even ignores completely the proposals for an immediate and specific discussion in the United Nations of border tension between the two parties," the Israel statement continued. "In short, this draft crystallizes and conserves all the causes of tension in our area and opposes any forward movement towards a peace settlement such as would eliminate the very incidents which have aroused the Security Council's concern. This refusal to deal with the basic causes of insecurity is bound to increase it. Its adoption would be a big step backward from peace."

ISRAEL AMBASSADOR DISCUSSES DEFENSE PROBLEMS IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- Israel Ambassador Abba Eban and Israel military attache Col. Chaim Herzog met at the Defense Department today with Frank Nash, Assistant Secretary of Defense in charge of international defense problems. The discussion involved a survey of current questions of mutual interest involving defense with particular reference to the Near Eastern area.

U.S. ZIONISTS CHARGE "BIG THREE" WITH EVASION OF RESPONSIBILITY

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- Zionist groups in the United States protested today against the "Big Three" resolution on Kibya which was circulated yesterday among members of the United Nations Security Council. Dissatisfaction with the resolution was also indicated today from the Arab side. Dr. Charles Malik, the only Arab member on the Security Council, said that he may introduce his own resolution.

At a press conference today, Louis Lipsky, chairman of the American Zionist Council, which speaks for all Zionist groups in this country, stated that the Big Three resolution "is a total evasion" of the American-British-French responsibility for the "tragic situation" that has arisen on the Israel-Jordan borders. A statement issued by Mr. Lipsky on behalf of the AZC, said:

"Never before has there been a resolution of the UN Security Council on the Palestine question that did not firmly and unequivocally call for the conclusion of permanent peace in the area. Now, by deliberate choice of terminology, the great powers have made it possible for the Arab states to continue their policy of refusing to negotiate peace with Israel. They have given the green light to Arab aggressors to continue their war against Israel by all means short of outright hostilities.

Britain Criticized for Not Restraining Jordan

"On May 25, 1950, the great powers expressed 'their deep interest and their desire to promote the establishment and maintenance of peace and stability in the area.' On numerous occasions since that date the United States has repeatedly expressed its hope for peace in the Middle East. But instead of peace, there has been a long calendar of robbery and murder committed by the regular and irregular forces of Jordan against Israel farmers and townsfolk without respect to age and sex, on Israel soil. Not once during this period has any of the powers publicly expressed concern or regret and, indeed, the restraining influence of Britain on the actions of its Jordan ally has been sadly lacking.

"Now the powers propose the 'strongest censure' of Israel for one isolated act of desperate reprisal carried out by the husbands, brothers and fathers of women and children murdered by Jordan bands. We do not condone the incident at Kibya, but we doubt whether Americans would have acted very differently in similar situations, as the whole history of our own frontier shows.

"While the great powers censure Israel they merely 'request the Government of Jordan to continue and strengthen the measures which they are already taking to prevent such crossing' of the armistice lines. The fact is the Government of Jordan and its armed forces, generated and officered by British professional soldiers, has completely failed to hold its nationals in check and indeed there is every ground for stating that these depredations have been carried out as a matter of policy. But while Israel is strongly rebuked, Jordan's guilt is condoned and whitewashed."

Similar statements have been issued by Rabbi Irving Miller, president of the Zionist Organization of America; Rabbi Mordecai Kirshblum, president of the Mizrahi Organization of America; Harry T. Madison, national commander of the Jewish War Veterans of the United States; Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, and others.

ARAB-ISRAEL SITUATION TO BE DISCUSSED AT BIG POWERS PARLEY

LONDON, Nov. 19 (JTA) -- Highly-placed Foreign Office sources said today that a discussion of the Arab-Israel situation and Western defense plans in the Middle Eastern area will be part of the agenda requested by Britain for the forthcoming Big Three conference at Bermuda, which is scheduled to open on Dec. 4.

These sources pictured the British Government as determined to achieve a joint approach among the Western Powers on Middle East problems--an approach which it had believed near three weeks ago but which now seems as distant as ever to the Foreign Office. These second thoughts are due to what the Foreign Office Office considers American "wavering" on Israel.

BRITAIN CHARGED WITH CONDUCTING ANTI-ISRAEL PROPAGANDA

TEL AVIV, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- Davar, Tel Aviv's labor newspaper, took the British Government to task today for the continued anti-Israel propaganda being loosed on the air waves by the Near East Radio, a British controlled radio station based on Cyprus.

Davar pointed out that the station kept on reminding its Arab listeners of the "Israeli barbaric attack on Kibya" and urged its Egyptian listeners to pay some attention to the Palestine situation rather than concentrate all their efforts on the Anglo-Egyptian dispute over the Suez Canal.

SOCIALIST INTERNATIONAL LAUDS BEN GURION'S ACHIEVEMENTS

LONDON, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- The Bureau of the Socialist International, meeting here today, has dispatched a message of admiration to Premier David Ben Gurion, on the occasion of his resignation as head of the Israel Government.

The message, which expressed the gratitude of the Socialist leaders for his contributions to the Socialist movement, declared: "As Prime Minister of Israel you managed to achieve a feat which evoked the astonishment of the world, namely, the gathering in of hundreds of thousands of your people from all corners of the globe and their integration into the economic and cultural life of your country."

SEN. GILLETTE GOES TO MIDDLE EAST TO STUDY ARAB REFUGEE PROBLEM

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- Sen. Guy Gillette, of Iowa, today made known that he plans an early tour of the Near Eastern countries to investigate prospects of rehabilitation of Arab refugees now supported by the United Nations.

He will make the trip on behalf of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee's Subcommittee on Near Eastern Problems which reported "Congress would not be justified in continuing aid for this program." Sen. Gillette has not yet set a definite departure date.

C.I.O. CONVENTION PLEDGES SUPPORT TO ISRAEL AND HISTADRUT

CLEVELAND, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- A resolution pledging support of Israel and the Histadrut, the Israel general federation of labor, was adopted here today at the 15th annual convention of the CIO. Moshe Bitan, representative of the Histadrut in the U.S., addressed the convention.

RESTITUTION WORK HAMPERED IN BAVARIA BY LACK OF REGULATIONS

MUNICH, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- Lack of implementation regulations for the Federal indemnification law which officially went into effect October 1, is delaying the work of the Bavarian Restitution Office, Max Troberg, its director stated today.

Although the present indemnification legislation has a number of drawbacks and obvious disadvantages, he pointed out, at least it is a beginning to a "final, just and adequate settlement" of indemnification claims.

FORMER NAZI MAYOR RE-ADMITTED TO THE BAR IN FRANKFURT

FRANKFURT, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- The Hesse Bar Association has re-admitted to legal practice Dr. Friedrich Krebs, Nazi Mayor of Frankfurt during whose administration 35,000 Jews were hounded out of the city. The bar's decision overruled an earlier action refusing Krebs permission to practice in this city.

Dr. Hans Windgassen, one-time Nazi Mayor of Osnabrueck, is drawing a monthly pension of 1,000 marks, about three times the average income in West Germany, it was revealed during the course of a court action brought by Windgassen to force the payment of full salary for the mayor's post for the years between 1945 and 1950. His suit was turned down, however, by a court which ruled that he was never qualified to serve as Mayor and only received the post as an award for his loyalty to the Nazi regime.

CBS PRESIDENT RESIGNS FROM FRATERNITY OVER BAR ON JEWS

OXFORD, Ohio, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- Frank Stanton, president of the Columbia Broadcasting System, has quit his college fraternity after 25 years because of the fraternity's bar of Jews, it was reported here.

His resignation from Phi Delta Theta was disclosed this week in letters received by fraternity headquarters and to his college newspaper, the Ohio Wesleyan Transcript, at Delaware. The century-old social group's constitution limits membership to those of the Aryan race.

Chapters at Williams College, Williamstown, Mass., and Amherst have been suspended by the national group because they had pledged Jews. In his letter Stanton said he wanted to be embarrassed no longer by membership in a fraternity with discriminatory characteristics.

A. D. L. CONVENTION OPENS TODAY; EISENHOWER TO BE GUEST OF HONOR

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- Problems of anti-Semitism, race relations and civil liberties in the United States will be discussed at the four-day national convention of the Anti-Defamation League of the B'nai B'rith which opens here tomorrow. President Eisenhower will be the guest of honor at a dinner Monday which will mark the conclusion of the gathering. It will be his first public appearance at a national Jewish conference since his election.

The convention will commemorate 40 years of the ADL service as an educational and civil rights agency. President Eisenhower will be presented with the League's America's Democratic Legacy Award at the dinner at which there will be a televised dramatization of American progress in civil liberties during the past 40 years.

CJFWF ASSEMBLY OPENS TODAY; WILL DISCUSS JEWISH COMMUNITY PROBLEMS

CLEVELAND, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- More than 750 Jewish community leaders from every part of the United States and Canada will participate in the 22nd General Assembly of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, which opens here today at the Statler Hotel.

The delegates will analyze the major problems facing American Jewish communities in 1954. These include appraisal of domestic, overseas and Israel philanthropic needs, planning and budgeting for local services in the light of changing conditions, recruiting and developing leadership, strengthening community organization, building more successful fund raising campaigns, problems of caring for the chronic sick and aged, and community responsibility for planning Jewish education.

Speakers at the Assembly include Julian Freeman of Indianapolis, CJFWF president; Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver; Judge Simon E. Sobeloff, Chief Judge of the Maryland Court of Appeals; Professor Gardner Patterson, director of the International Finance Section of Princeton University; Miss Dorothy C. Kahn, chief of the Social Service Section of the United Nations; Mrs. Zena Harman, advisor on social affairs to the Israel delegation to the United Nations.

Starts with Discussion on Israel and Overseas Needs

The Assembly will open tomorrow with a roundtable discussion of Israel and overseas needs and current developments in national-local relations. Professor Patterson, who has made two on-the-spot surveys of Israel's economic condition recently for the United States Government, will report on his findings. Miss Kahn, who has studied conditions in Israel, will give a first-hand report on various aspects of social welfare programs in which American Jewish philanthropy has played a role. Mrs. Harman will act as consultant.

Herbert R. Abeles of Newark, chairman of the CJFWF National-Local Relations Committee, will report on the work of his committee in 1953 in coordinating programs of national and overseas agencies. Michael A. Stavitsky, chairman of the Council's Advisory Committee on Overseas Studies, will preside over the general discussion which will follow the presentations.

In other major sessions, the Assembly will relate the overseas picture to planning and budgeting for changing domestic needs, development of leadership, plans to reverse the declining trend of fund raising; planning for the chronically sick and aged, and community responsibility and planning for Jewish education. The annual awards for "Best in Community Interpretation" materials will be made. National and departmental advisory committees will hold their meetings at the Assembly.

JEWISH CHAPLAINS HOLD THREE-DAY CONFERENCE IN ST. LOUIS

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- Practical problems of chaplaincy in the United States and abroad were discussed at a three-day conference of 65 Jewish chaplains which concluded here last night. All the 65 chaplains are on active duty at Army, Navy and Air Force installations in this country. Another 35 Jewish chaplains are serving in Korea, Japan, Alaska, Europe, Panama, North Africa, Okinawa, Hawaii, Philippines and Guam.

The conference discussed morale problems arising from the truce in Korea, religious education for military personnel and their dependents, the chaplain's relation to the military, planning and organizing Torah convocations for military personnel, specialized problems of overseas chaplains, and religious literature and supplies for the contemporary GI are among the subjects on the conference agenda.

PLAN FOR JEWISH MARTYR MEMORIAL IN PARIS BACKED IN U. S.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- American Jewish support for the plan to erect a world memorial in Paris to the 6,000,000 Jewish victims of Nazi persecution was urged here last night at a meeting by Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt; Brig. Gen. Telford Taylor, who served as American prosecutor at the Nuremberg trials of the Nazi war criminals; Dr. Israel Goldstein, president of the American Jewish Congress; Isidore Lipschutz, noted Jewish industrialist; French Consul General Jean de Lagarde; and Isaac Schneersohn, president of the world executive committee for the World Memorial for the Unknown Jewish Martyr.

Mrs. Roosevelt who presided at the meeting, which took place at the Harmonie Club, emphasized the need to perpetuate the memory of the Jews annihilated by the Nazis. The memorial, for which the cornerstone was laid in Paris last May, will consist of a four-story marble building which will house the world's most extensive collection of documentary material on Hitler's persecution of Jews, largely assembled by the Jewish underground during the Nazi occupation of Europe.

The building will cost \$1,000,000, of which \$400,000 is to be raised in the United States, it was reported at the meeting last night. The world sponsors of the memorial include Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill, former President Herbert Hoover, President Vincent Auriol of France, Prime Minister David Ben Gurion of Israel, Queen Elizabeth of Belgium, Princess Wilhelmina of Holland, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt and President Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia.

AMERICAN RED MOGEN DOVID SENDS FIVE AMBULANCES TO ISRAEL

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- The American Red Mogen Dovid for Israel yesterday shipped five fully equipped ambulances to Israel where they will be put into operation by the Red Mogen Dovid, Israel's equivalent of the Red Cross, the organization announced today. The ambulances were sent in response to urgent requests from the mayors of five Israeli towns.

HEBREW UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT RECEIVES DEGREE FROM H. U. C. - J. I. R.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- Prof. Benjamin Mazar, president and rector of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, received an honorary degree of Doctor of Hebrew Letters from the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion at a special convocation here tonight. The degree was conferred by Dr. Nelson Glueck, president of HUC-JIR.

400 TOMBSTONES DESECRATED IN TWO JEWISH, TWO NON-JEWISH CEMETERIES

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- Four hundred headstones were overturned in four different cemeteries in Brooklyn this week, cemetery officials revealed yesterday. Two of the cemeteries were Jewish, one was Protestant and one was non-sectarian. Total damage is estimated at \$25,000.

ZIONIST FEDERATION OF MEXICO REORGANIZED; NEW PRESIDENT ELECTED

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 19. (JTA) -- After prolonged negotiations, the Zionist Federation of Mexico, with which all Zionist groups in the country are affiliated, has been reorganized. For all practical purposes the Federation has not functioned during the past year.

The new president of the Federation is Leon Dultzin, president of the General Zionists; the chairman of the organization's council is Teviah Pushkar of the Poale Zion, the general secretary is Isaias Austriak of the Mapam.
