JERUSALEM, Dec. 30. (JTA) -- High officials in government offices today secided not to appear for work for three days beginning next Monday, if the government does not agree to increase their salaries. Exemptions will be made in cases where the interests of the state may suffer directly from the absence of the officials from their roots, it was indicated.

ISRAEL PARLIAMENT TO GET BILL AGAINST CARTELS; PASSAGE FORESEEN

JERUSALEM, Dec. 30, (JTA) -- A bill to fight cartels both of cooperatives and private enterprises will be submitted by Israel's Ministry of Industry to the Parliament within three months, it was announced here today.

The announcement said that the Israel Cabinet and the leaders of the various factions in the Parliament have agreed on the necessity of introducing anti-cartel legislation.

The Israel Parliament today voted to empower Finance Minister Levi Eshkol to register gold in the country whenever he finds such a measure necessary.

U.S. GOVERNMENT INTENDS TO SEND ARMS TO EGYPT; INFORMS BRITAIN

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30. (JTA) -- State Department press officer Henry Suydam

ISRAEL'S EARLY RESUMPTION OF JORDAN WATERS PROJECT SEEN IN U. N. UNITED NATIONS. N. Y. Dec. 30. (ITA) -- Cotimism was expressed in United Nations circles today over the possibility of the passage by the U. N. Security Council next month of the Big Three resolution under which, it is hoped, that Israel will

be able to resume its work on the hydroelectric project in the demilitarized zone of the Israel-Syrian border. Whether the Soviet delegation will veto the resolution, when adopted, was today a matter of speculation. Andrei Vishinsky, head of the Soviet delegation--who has been fighting the resolution ever since it was introduced on December 21--told the

U. N. Security Council last night that he will continue to fight it. in view of the fact that Moscow considers the resolution as an attempt on the part of the United States "to lay its hands on the ec. Lomy of the Middle East." He insisted that the resolution was "defective from A to Z."

The fact that Mr. Vishinsky disclosed that his opposition to the resolution is motivated by anti-American feelings rather than by pro-Arab inclinations came as a surprise to the French and British delegations which were beginning to yield slightly to the Arab demands for substantial revisions in the resolution, while the U.S. delegation stood firm on the proposed text. Today it was considered likely that the stand of the American delegation would be reaffirmed by the French and the British when the Security Council resumes debate on the resolution some time between January 7th and 15th.

The January session of the Security Council, although it will be conducted under the presidency of Dr. Charles Malik. the Lebanese delerate who speaks at the Council on behalf of all Arab countries, offers the Big Three a better opportunity for receiving the seven votes needed for the adoption of the resolution of the 11-member Council, Pakistan, Chile and Greece -- which have been known as opponents of the Big Three resolution in its present form and which is acceptable to Israel -- will be replaced in the Council in January by New Zealand, Brazil and Turkey, which are likely to vote in favor of the resolution.

The Arabs are seeking the introduction of modifications in the Big Three resolution to assure Syria the right to veto Israel's resumption of work on its hydroelectric project. The U.S. delegation, it was learned today, is of the opinion that while each country is entitled to its sovereign rights, it cannot impose its will on neighboring countries. The American Government takes the stand that the U. N. Truce Chief in Palestine, Gen. Vagn Bennike, is the only authority to decide on whether Israel should or should not continue the work on its project. The Big Three resolution directs Gen, Bennike to report to the Security Council within 90 days on the measures he has taken to give effect to the resolution.

JORDAN WILL NOT HOLD DIRECT TALKS WITH ISRAEL, PREMIER SAYS

LONDON, Dec. 30. (JTA) -- Prime Minister Fowziel Mulki of Jordan indicated yesterday that Jordan would reject Israel's request for direct talks on frontier issues as provided by the Armistice Agreement, the Times of London reports today from Beirut, Mr. Mulki made his statement following a meeting of the Arab League Political Committee in Beirst at which the subject was discussed,

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30, (JTA) -- The State Department made known today that the United States High Commissioner in Germany signed two laws, both effective January I, which will extend the jurisdiction of German courts over persons in Germany, including Jews, who are not United States personnel or dependents.

The new laws had been under study for several months and "are the latest in a series of steps taken since 1951 with the aim of eventually inactivating the HIGOG courts." the announcement said.

NEO-NAZI PUBLICATION DEMANDS LAW PROHIBITING INTERMARRIAGE

MUNICH. Dec. 30. (JTA) -- "We propose that the German Bundestag introduce a law which would henceforth prohibit all marital union between Christians and Jews who were born in the Jewish faith, whether they still adhere to it or were later baptized, " says the "Deutschland-Brief" in its current issue.

This neo-Nazi periodical, which appears in its fourth year, is published at Berchtesgaden, the site of Hitler's mountain retreat and a hotbed of unreconstructed Nazism. For a time the masthead listed Barcelona, Spain, as location of the editorial offices, presumably in an effort to forestall a possible ban by the German authorities, but it appears that such a subterfuge is no longer considered necessary

because a Berchtesgaden address is again given. EX-OFFICER OF RED ARMY TESTIFIES ON BIRO-BIDJAN IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30, (JTA) -- Hershel Weinrauch, a former Jewish officer in the Soviet armed forces who escaped from the Soviet Union and is considered the only person now in the United States who has an intimate knowledge of life in Biro-Bidjan -- the section of the USSR which was designated by the Soviet authorities before World War II to become a Jewish region -- appeared here as a government witness in a case concerning the objection of the Internal Revenue Department to income tax reduction of contributions made in this country for work in Biro-Bidjan, Following Mr. Weinrauch's testimony, the defendants have been given 75 days in which to-

The case concerns Joseph Morgenstern of Cleveland, and his three children, who from 1945 to 1949 made substantial contributions to Biro-Bidjan which they deducted from their income tax as philanthropy. The family, which is engaged in the electric alarm manufacturing business, allegedly reported to have sent \$220,000 to Birobidjan, much of it in heavy machinery and contributed \$80,000 to Yikni; a Jewish cultural farbend in New York.

Internal Revenue purported to show through their questioning of Mr. Weinrauch that Birobidian was a political entity, not a philanthropic one. Mr. Weinrauch's testimony indicated that much of the machinery sent probably never got beyond Moscow and its environs; the area was not Jewish in character and actually Jews were compelled and ordered to leave, he amongst them.

PHOENIX RESIDENTS ORGANIZE TO BAN HATE-MONGERING MOVEMENT

PHOENIX, Aria., Dec. 30. (1TA) -- The "Freedom of Choice" movement - an organisation devoted to combatting anti-discrimination legislation to restore "freedom of choice" to American citizens - has selected Arisons as "the test site for a married campaign to pread a program described by opposeds as "hate-mosquer to the companies" exceeding to an expose published in the Arisons Republic and the Phoenix Casestry.

The movement, also known as "America Plus," is run by Aldrich Blake, of Laguas Beach, California. It has made four unsuccessful attempts to secure legislation in California which would permit racial and religious discrimination.

Gideons Organization to Appeal to U.S. Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30, (JTA) -- Gideons International Organization made known here today that it will appeal to the United States Supreme Court to set aside the recent New Jersey Supreme Court ruling banning free distribution of the King James version Bibles to school, children

A statement issued by Cideons headquarters said the organization believed in the constitutional principle of separation of Church and State but felt the New Jersey court incorrectly interpreted the constitution by barring school children from receiving Bibles "with consent of sparents."

It was said that a 1950 ruling later affirmed by the New Jersey Supreme Coart beld that New Testament Bibles could not be considered sectarian books. The 1955 ruling maintains that a New Testament Bible as secturian book. Jewish organizations and other groups concerned with separation of Church and State halted the New Jersey decision as a re-affirmation of traditional civil liberties.
