SECURITY COUNCIL MEETING ON ISRAEL COMPLAINT CALLED FOR TOMORROW

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Feb. 2, (JTA) -- President Leslie Knox Munro called tolay for a meeting of the Security Council on Thursday afternoon to hear Israel's complaint against Egypt for disregard of the Council's orders to halt the blockade of Israel-bound shipping and for violation of the Israeli-Egyptian armistice agreement.

Interest was aroused here by reports from Cairo of intense diplomatic activity to secure favorable consideration of the Egyptian case. Over the last few days, Dr. Milmoud Pawzi, the Foreign Minister, summoned the envoys of all states that are members of the Security Council, to give them private expositions of the Egyptian position.

Informed sources here expressed the view today that the Egyptians know they are is an impossible situation and can offer little real justification for their actions. It is believed here that they would like to drop their latest order adding foodstuffs to the list of "war potential" to be kept from Israel by blockade, if, by so doing, they could get Security Council action dropped. The issue, however, has gone too far

#### U. N. Circles See Egypt in Predicament

Official indications in Cairo that Egypt would not recognize an adverse Security Council decision were not well received here either by United Nations officials or by members of the Security Council. One delegate, commenting on the Cairo report of an Egyptian claim that "the Security Council can recommend, but it lacks power to enforce, " declared that the Egyptians simply did not know what they were talking about, General Assembly resolutions are "recommendations," he noted, but Security Council resolutions are "orders" and under the U. N. Charter, the Council has the power to enforce its orders

U.N. observers commented today that Egypt has, by overstepping the mark with her blockade, put herself in a really tough spot. She can hardly hope to obtain international support in her dispute with Britain over the Suez Canal if she persists in denying free access to the Canal and defies the Security Council on this. On the other hand, the Naouth recime cannot face the loss of prestige at home and in the Arab capitals that would result if it had to how to a Security Council order to halt its blockade practices.

#### BRAELIS WARN ARABS AGAINST WRECKING ARMISTICE AGREEMENTS

TEL AVIV, Feb. 2. (JTA) -- The armistice agreements between Israel and her ash seighbor and the entire United Nations armistice machinery could be wrecked by a new interpretation of clauses dealing with frontier controls, an authoritative military personality warned today.

# ENESSET GETS APPEAL TO AID DRUZE COMMUNITY IN SYRIA

JERUSALEM Feb. 2. (JTA) -- A motion calling for an urgent debate in the Israel Parliament of the Syrian Government's military suppression of the Bruse people of Mat country was yesterday referred to the Knesset Foreign Affairs Committee, with the consent of deputy Sheik Jaber el Moadi, leader of the Israel Druse community who offered the motion.

Premier Moshe Sharett expressed the sympathy of his government for the Druse in Syris and concern for their fate, (Reports from Damascus said that Syrian Army strillery had levelled three of 12 Druse villages.) He counselled caution in dealing with the problem in the Knesset.

Shetk el Moseli, speaking for the 20,000 Israeli Drum, webennestly condemned the military states on the villages of this kinsmen in the Arab state. He pointed out that the Druze community in Israel had strong religious ties with the community in Syria. He declared that Israel could not remain indifferent to the fact of the Syrian Druze under dictator Adib Shiehakiy and asked the Knesset to investigate the supression of the Syrian Druze community.

TEL AVIV. Feb. 2. (ITA) -- Drivate foreign capital for investment in large! has not been exhausted and would flow into the country if conditions were favorable. Istert Szold, president of the Palestine Economic Corporation, said here at a recention in his honor

The New York attorney and Zionist leader, here on a visit to inspect P. E. C. operations, said private capital should take a greater part in Israel's economy after public funds have done the pioneering work. There is still need for public funds, he said, but Israel should strive to be self-supporting. This would emance the country's grestige both economically and politically.

Dr. Emanuel Neumann, member of the Jewish Agency Executive and General Signist leader, everygased fears that the government decision to take over the Palestine Electric Corporation would have the effect of slowing the flow of private capital into Israel. He expressed satisfaction over the positive attitude toward the Zionist movement wised by Premier Moshe Sharett and said he hoped for a new era in the relations between the Government and the Zionist movement.

## ISRAEL TO SELL GERMANY ORANGES: FIRST TRANSACTION IN 15 YEARS

COLOGNE, Feb. 2. (ITA) -- Israel will sell 300,000 cases of Jaffa granges to Vest Germany during the current season in the first straight business transaction between the two countries in 15 years,

An agreement signed in Bonn by the German Ministry of Economics and the Israel Purchasing Mission for the shipment of 12,500 tons of fruit by the Israel Marketing Board provides that payment will be half in specified Geman goods and half in Germany's foreign exchange surpluses with member nations of the European Payments Union

Not since 1939 have goods from Jewish Palestine gone to Germany in commercial quantities, but in the ten years preceding World War II, Germany purchased more than 500,000 cases of Jaffa oranges yearly and from 1925 to 1935, Germany was Palestine's number two customer. In 1933, a peak season, 1, 200, 000 cases of fruit were consigned to Germany.

#### FRENCH ZIONISTS SET UP UNITED TERRITORIAL OR GANIZATION

PARIS, Feb. 2. (JTA) -- A national conference of the French Zionist Federation, called to work out structural changes designed to unite both members of Zionist political parties and non-party Jews involved in adding Israel, today adopted a program and constitution designed to attract the widest membership among French Jews.

One provision of the new charter sets aside 40 percent of the membership of the governing body of the organization for representation of non-party members. The conference concluded after adopting the program, which is chiefly aimed at reaching the youth and pressing cultural and educational sctivities.

#### FRENCH, MOROCCAN LEADERS TO PROTECT JEWS, WJC AIDE REPORTS

NEW YORK, Peb. 2, (TA) - Dr. Maurice L. #### - 5 -MRMER HITLER GENERAL ASSAILED FOR PLEA TO DROP SWASTIKA

FRANKFURT, Feb. 2, (JTA) -- A former Nazi General who recently surgested her holders of German military decorations be permitted to wear them if the Nazi Synstikas are removed, told a lecture audience at nearby Alsfeld that he had rereived more than 1,000 "abusive letters," The General, Hasso von Manteuffel, said he favored removal of the swastikas

because he believed that reintroduction of swastika decorations would give rise to "risinderstandings" abroad. A similar proposal for legalizing the wearing of World War II decorations "cleansed" of the Nazi symbol has been recommended by a Bonn Government advisory board.

#### STAELI "WHITE BOOK" ON ARAB REFUGEES ISSUED IN GERMANY

COLOGNE, Feb 2. (JTA) -- The Israel purchasing mission here, which in many respects serves as a diplomatic mission, has issued a 36-page German-language condensation of the Israel Government's White Book on the Palestine Arab refugees. Publication of the pamphlet was seen as an attempt to correct a distorted picture of the refugee situation presented by anti-Israeli elements in this country, TURKISH ASSEMBLY TO INVESTIGATE "VARLIK" TAX ON MINORITIES

STANBUL, Feb. 2. (JTA) -- The Turkish National Assembly was expected today to act favorably on recommendations submitted to it by a parliamentary commission that it undertake a full-scale investigation of the so-called "Taranto Case" which grew out of the "Varlik," the confiscatory tax imposed in 1942 by the Turkish Government against Jews and members of other racial and religious minorities in

the country. In this particular case, Leon Taranto, a well-known Istanbul Jewish industrialist, was assessed a tax of 2,000,000 Turkish pounds (about \$700,000) under the "Varlik," To realize that amount of cash before the deadline, he was forced to sell a factory valued at 1,500,000 pounds to a Moslem associate for only 450,000 pounds.

#### PRIEST ASKS PRO-ISRAEL POLICY AS "REPARATIONS" TO JEWS

BRUSSELS. Feb. 2. (JTA) -- The murder of 6,000,000 Jews in Europe during World War II demands reparations to the Jewish people in the form of "pro-Israel policies" by the European powers, Father Riquet of the Cathedral of Notre Dame of Paris told a public meeting here today.

Speaking at a meeting sponsored by the Belgian Friends of the Hebrew University, Father Riquet, who recently returned from a tour of Israel, gave his audience a detailed account of his favorable impressions of the Jewish State, describing the country's industrial and agricultural development and dwelling at length on the communal aspects of kibbutz life. The audience included members of the Belgian Government, Parliament and of the diplomatic corps.
