U.S. CAN NOW PROMOTE ARAB-ISRAEL PEACE, ISRAELIS BELIEVE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2. (JTA) -- The impending solution of the Anglo-Egyptian conflict over the Suez Canal affords Britain and the United States an unprecedented opportunity to lay the foundations for peace between the Arab states and leavel, officials of the Israel Embassy here declared today.

"Egypt's greatly enchanced prestige and strength now enable her to become a powerful force in the Middle East," the officials said, "Whether this potentially will be used for stability and peace, or for hostility and destruction, depends to a large extent on the immediate policies of the major Western nowers."

Analyzing how the new situation, precipitated by the Anglo-Egyptian pact, is affecting Israel and jeopardizing regional security in the Middle East, the Israel officials stressed the following facts:

KEY TO U.S. STAND TOWARD ISPAEL SEEN IN SUCCESSOR TO BYROADE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2. (JTA) -- The future American policy toward Israel and the Arab League will be indicated by the administration's choice of a successor to Heary A. Byroade as Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs, when and if Mr. Byroade becomes U.S. Ambassador to Egypt.

This was predicted today in an editorial in the Washington Post, one of the capital's most influential newspapers. The White House has not yet announced Mr. Byroade's appointment to Egypt although State Department sources mainule that such an announcement is shortly forthcoming.

U.S. - EGYPT TALKS ON MILITARY AID ADVANCE IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON. Aug. 2. (JTA) -- American negotiations with Egypt involving a grant of military aid to Egypt in the wake of the Suez Canal settlement were arvanced today in a lengthy meeting at the State Department between Egyptian Ambassador Ahmed Hussein and Henry A. Byroade, Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs.

Meanwhile. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has consented to receive Israel Ambassador Abba Eban at the State Department Wednesday afternoon to hear the Israel point of view on the new situation created in the Near East by the announcement of British withdrawal from the Suez area. It is thought that Mr. Eban will make known Israel's position on the pending American arms grant to Egypt.

U.S. URGED TO BRING ISBAEL INTO MID-EAST DEFENSE NETWORK TEL AVIV, Aug. 2. (JTA) -- Mortimer May, in his first public address

here as president of the Zionist Organization of America, tonight urged the United States to pursue a policy designed to bring Israel into a Middle East defense network. He spoke at a meeting arranged in his honor by the General Zitnist party of Israel. The meeting was attended by an audience of several thousand. "Our past experience has shown, " said Mr. May, "that we Americans fare

best with those who are our true friends, those who have interests that are mutually compatible with ours. That is the kind of friend Israel is. "

Referring to the Anglo-Egyptian agreement for evacuation of British troops from the Suez Canal area, Mr. May declared that the pact upsets the balance of power in the Middle East and imperils Israel's security. The Western powers were criticized by the American Zionist leader for turning over the Canal to Egypt without first providing safeguards for Israel's security.

The ZOA president warned that delivery of American arms to Egypt, as a result of Washington's interest in the Canal pact, "would place a great temptation in the hands of the Arabs who have refused to make peace with Israel and have even given indications of possible renewed warfare against

Israel. " Mr. May concluded his address by calling upon the United States to abandon its policy of appeasing the Arabs and asking the State Department, instead, to

work more closely with Israel "which is America's true friend, " Another of the principal speakers at the meeting was Dr. Emanuel Neumann, member of the Jewish Agency ececutive. Dr. Neumann also accused the Western

powers of committing "a great error" for not attaching a provision safeguarding livel to the Suez pact, "If serious consequences are to be averted, " said Dr. Neumann, "that error must be immediately corrected," DISMISSED UNEMPLOYED "CAPTURE" TEL AVIV MUNICIPAL OFFICES

I.T.A. NEWS ANTI-SEMITE NAMED DEPUTY PREMIER OF GERMANY'S WEALTHIEST STATE

DUSSELDORF, Aug. 2. (JTA) -- Dr. Friedrich Middelhauve, the first leader de nostwar German "legitimate" political pary to exploit anti-Semitism for political ends, was sworn in here as Deputy Minister President and Minister tir Economics in North Rhine Westphalia, the wealthiest and most populous of West Germany's constituent states.

Dr. Middelhauve, a publisher and printing shop owner in the small town of College, heads the Free Democratic Party in North Rhine Westphalia. stere it now replaces the Social Democrats as coalition partner of the Christian Democratic Union in the State Government, During his tenure of office as state dairman, the FDP party organization became a haven for Nazi zealots and professional Nazi Party functionaries.

Dr. Middelhauve's closest aide in party organizational work has been Dr. Volfrang Diewerge, a vicious Jew-batter who played a particularly infamous part as an anti-Semitic propagandist and pamphleteer in the test case against Net agitation brought by the Cairo Jewish Community in 1934. He also propacardized for the Nazis in two important prewar cases. One was the case of the trials that followed the shooting in Switzerland of the Nazi leader Wilhelm Gustloff by David Frankfurter. The other was the case of young Heral Grynspan who shot German Embassy Counsellor Ernst von Rath in Paris in 1938.

Diewerge, in recent years entrusted by Dr. Middelhauve with the political indestrination of North Rhine Westphalia's Free Democrats, formerly held the rick of SS Colonel. Before he was placed in charge of the radio department of Goebbels' Propaganda Ministry, he served as regional Nazi Party propaganda thief for Danzig and West Prussia.

In early 1951, Dr. Middelhauve's paper attacked Jewish-born Ludwig Rosenberg, of the German Trade Union Federation, as an "emigrant intent upon carrying out the Morgenthau Plan, who should go back where he came from," To comprehend the prejudicial seriousness of the statements, one must know that, in present-day German political jargon, such statements are generally meant to refer to Jews. In response to a sharply-worded trade union protest, Dr. Middelbauve not only refused to retract or apologize, but instead posed some eastic counter-questions replete with further anti-Semitic innuendo,

LIQUIDATED JEWISH BANK IN FRANKFURT SETTLES ALL CLAIMS

FRANKFURT, Aug. 2, (JTA) -- All domestic claims against the former "Jewish Bank" here have been settled in full, and most of the recognized fireign depositors and creditors will be satisfied within the next few weeks, it was learned here today when a local judge approved a two-year-old proposal of the creditors' conference to terminate and rescind the pending bankruptcy proceedings.

These proceedings were compulsorily instituted almost four years ago not by the bank itself or by the creditors, as is customary, but by the State of Hesse, It was done to the accompaniment of an officially inspired flurry of publicity, with newspapers throughout Germany announcing in front-page banner headlines that the owners had fled to Switzerland, with millions of marks of the bank's assets in their pockets.

Now that the bankruptcy proceedings have been abandoned, however, the amouncement is buried in a few lines on the financial page, or omitted altogether, Most Germans will, therefore, continue to believe that huge restitution finds were embezzled by the officers of the bank,

The "Jewish Restitution Bank," as it was originally called, was closed in 1950 on charges that it had violated German banking laws and foreign currency

These "Aryanizers" have formed their own "Protective Organization of Those Obligated for Restitution," After submitting a memorandum to the government, they were advised to register all "Arvanizers," so that the government might have a clear view of the extent of their potential "losses, " The organization is now publishing advertisements in local newspapers calling upon "Arvaniners" to register.

"RETURNEES" TO BUMANIA FORCED TO CAMPAIGN AGAINST ISRAEL

STANBUL. Aug. 2. (JTA) -- The Jews who have returned to Rumania from brael are being forced by the government there to propagandize against the lewish State, according to reports reaching here. The Bucharest press and radio have publicized statements allegedly made by returnees, criticizing conditions in Israel. The letters in the press are all written in the same style-obviously having been prepared by professional propagandists.

The campaign is believed here to be Rumania's answer to attacks in the free world against persecution of Jews by the Bucharest government. While brael is being attacked, a glowing report on the "excellent" treatment being accorded Jews in Rumania has been broadcast by Radio Bucharest. The report was said to have been written by Mihail Sadoveanu, a writer who holds the "Stalin Prize for International Peace, "

ZURICH, Aug. 2. (JTA) -- Pressing problems affecting Jewish rights throughout the world, and the situation of the Jews in countries behind the Iron Curtain, will be evaluated here at a meeting of the coordinating committee of the World Jewish Congress convening Wednesday.

That report will be made by Dr. Nahum Goldmann, chairman of the Jewish Claims Committee and president of the WJC. Among those scheduled to attend the committee sessions are Dr. Israel

II.N. EXPERT RETURNS FROM ISRAEL; LAUDS AGRICULTURAL PLANS UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Aug. 2. (JTA) -- Israel, which imports 90

percent of its wheat at an annual cost of \$24,000,000 to \$25,000,000, has undertaken a long-range actientific plan that should enable it to reduce its wheat imports and, at the same time, improve the distary quality of all the cereals consumed in the country.

That was the optimistic prognosis made here today by Dr. Max Milner, propose of the Department of Flour and Freed Milling Industries at Kansas State College, Dr. Milner returned today from a six-month mission to Israel san expert representing the United Nations Food and Apricultural Organization. Within his sk-month tenure in Israel, Dr. Milner said, Israel authorities

Within his six-month tenure in Israel, Dr., Milner said, Israel authorities histened to adopt nearly all of his expert recommendations, and some of thesedesigned to increase quantity and quality, and decrease costs of Israeli breadare already in effect.

One of Dr. Milner's recommendations was the establishment of a laboratory fir the analysis of imported wheats, and for experimentation intended to improve both milling and baking practices in Insreal. That laboratory is now at work in flating, he said. It was established immediately, being expanded from a "mucless lab" already in existence, at a cost of \$18,000.

Another recommendation was that Israel help the FAO choose a "fellow" is study abroad some of the newer methods of improving wheat and other cereals, Israel has chosen Yeshial Pomerants, Polish-born young scientist, who has already left for England where he will 60 his studies at the St. Albans Cereal Experimental Station conducted by the British Association of Flour Millers, FAO is saving the costs of Mr., Pomerants' studies.
