NEW YORK, Aug. 25, (17A) -- There will be no lasting peace in the Middle Last to long as the Western Powers, including the United States, fall to make insistence on an Arab-Saxeal peace the connections "for any program or policy" in this part of the world, Gov. Theodore R. McKeldin of Maryland tonight declared here at the closing session of the 40th annual convention of Hedessia.

Governor McKeldin warned that Communism will make political capital by fishing in the "troubled waters" of the Middle East "as long as these countries remain at war, whether it be a declared war or a tolerated series of outbrakes in violation of struct."

TEL AVIV, Aug. 25. (JTA) -- The first phase of Israel's military summer manuvers, in the Judean hills, was ended today after three days of war games during which an "enemy" force of "Greens" fought against agricultural settlers, hetery workers, office personnel and students defending the outskirts of a well-

BIALYSTOK JEWS CELEBRATE 100 YEARS OF SETTLEMENT IN UNITED STATES

(JTA) -- A national convention of the Bishystok Jews in Marrica, which will mark the hundredth anniversary of the first Bishystok Jew in tills country, as well as the 38th anniversary of the Bishystoker Center and Home for the Aped in this city, will take place in New Tork next month, it was announced today by David Sohn, executive director of the institution

There are 50,000 Jews from Bialystok in the United States, Mr. Sohn said. A special pageant is being prepared tracing the life of the Bialystok Jews in this country, and their contribution to America, from the arrival of the first immigrant from that city, Simcha Stass, to the arrival of refugees from World War II.
