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ISRAEL ANNOUNCES OBJECTION TO ACTION OF NEW U.N. TRUCE CHIEF

JERUSALEM, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- The first official announcement of Israel's objection to the arrangement by Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns, United Nations truce supervisor, to have UN truce observers patrol certain points along the demarcation lines in the Jerusalem and Latrun areas without prior arrangements with Israel or Jordan authorities, was made here tonight.

An Israel Army spokesman revealed that Israel Army Chief of Staff Maj. Gen. Moshe Dayan had met with Gen. Burns on September 14 and had expressed Israel's opposition to such patrols without prior Israel agreement, on the grounds that this was a violation of Israel sovereignty. In Israel's opinion, the statement pointed out, UN tasks with respect to these demilitarized areas could only be carried out in the manner defined in the armistice agreement.

After the recent shooting by Arab Legionnaires in the Mt. Zion section of the Jerusalem demarcation line, the Israel General Staff proposed the erection of direct telephone communications between local commanders on both sides of the line--and a similar arrangement along the Gaza strip border held by Egypt--so that in the event of any incident immediate intervention by the commanders would be possible, the spokesman revealed.

Armistice Commission Scores Egypt; New Border Incidents

Meanwhile, at a meeting of the Israel-Egyptian Mixed Armistice Commission today, Egypt was condemned for four incidents involving civilians crossing the border into Israel. In one instance, the Arabs illegally harvested about ten percent of a crop planted by Kibbutz Kissufim.

One Israeli was wounded and considerable property was damaged as a result of three incursions in the last 48 hours by infiltrating Arabs in the Egyptian and Lebanese border regions. In the Gaza area a Jewish tractor operator was shot and wounded near the Gangivati settlement and a house in the Hatzev settlement was blasted but without injury to its occupants.

ISRAEL REPORTED FAVORING ADMISSION OF COMMUNIST CHINA TO U. N.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Sept. 23. (JTA) -- Although the Israel delegation voted this week for the American motion at the United Nations General Assembly that there should be no change in the Chinese representation at the UN "during the current year"--which precludes the admission of Communist China during the Assembly's session--Israel is not opposed to the seating of Communist China in the UN.

Well-informed sources today indicated that Israel will be among the nations voting for the admission of Communist China to UN membership if and when the issue is taken to a vote in the Assembly. In this respect Israel will follow the British stand, which is at odds with the position of United States opposing the admission of Red China to the world organization.

FUNCTIONS OF ZIONIST MOVEMENT IN U.S. DEFINED BY DR. GOLDMANN

NEW YORK, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- The functions of the Zionist movement in the United States were defined here last night by Dr. Nahum Goldmann, chairman of the Jewish Agency, addressing a gathering of the American Zionist Council at the Hotel Astor.

Dr. Goldmann expressed dissatisfaction with "the nature of the public debate within the Zionist movement and press regarding the functions of the Zionist movement, and the ideological differences between Zionist leaders in Israel and America about the nature of Zionism in the United States and Israel's need for immigrants from America."

The manner in which this debate is being conducted "does not help solve the problem and only creates bitterness and antagonism," he said. Undoubtedly, Zionists throughout the world must undergo "a searching of hearts and conscience, and this is something that affects Zionism in Western Europe and South America no less than in the United States, and is not limited to the question of providing Israel, with pioneering manpower from the West."

"What is actually involved in this discussion is how each individual Zionist can most intensely participate in the process of upbuilding and securing the new Israel society. There can be no *raison d'être* for a Zionist movement whose membership restricts itself to supporting Israel politically and economically, which is something all friends of Israel do, in large or small measure. Conversely, to say that to be a Zionist means that one must emigrate to Israel, as some leaders in Israel claim, is to narrow the problem and to be unrealistic."

Urges Zionists to Take Lead in Local Communal Efforts

"Zionism implies a many-fold direct, personal relationship with Israel--through investment in its industries and agriculture--attendance at its institutions of learning, through lending one's professional skills to Israel for a limited period, whatever sacrifice this might involve. This kind of diverse relationship must become the cornerstone and the touchstone of the individual Zionist and the Zionist movement and will culminate, for many, in their resettlement in Israel."

Dr. Goldmann pointed out, however, that Zionism is not "a one way street. It is concerned with the overall survival of the Jewish people, and it is its obligation to secure a reciprocal relationship between the Jewish communities throughout the world and Israel."

"This obligates the Zionist movement to participate in all Jewish communal efforts everywhere, and to take the lead, especially in the field of Jewish education," he said. "The fact is that the survival of Jews as Jews outside Israel, especially in the smaller countries, is far more uncertain than most of us realize, and we may well lose for our faith and people, large portions of the future generations of Jews in Western Europe, in South America, and in other parts of the world."

"This process of intramural dissipation which Jews have resisted for 2,000 years can and must be arrested, and it is the primary duty of the Zionist movement to see this responsibility through. To achieve these aims the movement must, in the future, exercise more unity than in the past. We must develop organizational forms and activities that will diminish party differences which, in most cases, have no basis in reality, and will force all Zionist groups to work united towards common ends."

GOLDA MYERSON DUE IN U.S. TODAY; TO REMAIN SEVERAL WEEKS

NEW YORK, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- Mrs. Golda Myerson, Israel Minister of Labor, is scheduled to arrive here early tomorrow to participate in the State of Israel Development Bond drive. She will remain in the U.S. for several weeks.

ANTI-ISRAEL DELEGATION OF ARABS FINDS NO SUPPORT IN TURKEY

ISTANBUL, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- A three-member delegation from the "Association for the Liberation of Palestine from the Jews" which recently came to this country to open a branch office and enlist Turkish support for their aims is having a difficult time of it.

Although the three delegates have conferred with Minister of Religion Sabri Hayrioglu and a number of Parliamentary deputies, they have been coldly informed that Turkish officials will lend no support to their campaign. Some sections of the press have attacked their mission as one which is aimed at provoking further trouble in the Middle East.

A.F.L. OPPOSES SENDING OF ARMS BY U.S. TO ARAB COUNTRIES

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- President George Meany of the American Federation of Labor has appealed to the United States Government to take action to bring about peace between Israel and the Arab states, representatives of 10,000,000 organized workers at the AFL national convention were told today. In a report of the AFL executive council, the delegates were also informed that the organization had written to Secretary of State John Foster Dulles opposing the granting of American arms to Iraq and Saudi Arabia.

Moshe Bitan, representative of the Histadrut, Israel's federation of labor, addressing the convention, said that Israel was a great social and economic experiment and expressed labor's pride in its democracy. Mr. Bitan, who was introduced by Mr. Meany, declared that the defense of the free world in the Middle East requires peace in the region and a solution of its social and economic backwardness, not an arms "hand-out" to the Arab states.

Eighty-five percent of all Israeli workers are organized into trade unions, the American representative of the Israeli Federation of Labor said here yesterday. Mr. Bitan reported that Israeli's union workers total 500,000, and constitute a bulwark against Communist infiltration. "Because these democratic Israeli unions are achieving social and economic justice for all," he said, "Communism is not now and never will be a threat." He appealed to AFL delegates to support Israel's claims that "a permanent peace must be established in this troubled region before arming Israel's neighbors."

ISRAEL MILITARY ATTACHE HONORED IN WASHINGTON; RETURNS TO ISRAEL

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- Col. Chaim Herzog, Israel military, air, and naval attache has been honored here by top military authorities and diplomatic officials of the United States and other nations on the eve of his departure for Israel.

Farewell affairs have been tendered in Col. Herzog's honor by the U.S. Army General Staff, the Air Force, the Naval Staff, and a number of foreign embassies representing European and Asiatic nations. Other functions were tendered him by Gen. William Riley, deputy director of the Foreign Operations Administration, who formerly headed the United Nations truce machinery in Israel, and by others including Ambassador Abba Eban. These functions have been attended by high ranking officers.

COUNCIL FOR JUDAISM SAYS LILIENTHAL IS NO LEADER OF GROUP

NEW YORK, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- The American Council for Judaism said today that Alfred M. Lilienthal who visited King Saud of Saudi Arabia, is not a leader of the organization. "Membership in our organization is open to any American of Jewish faith who subscribes to our principles," the Council said. "Mr. Lilienthal qualifies only as a member because presumably he subscribes to our principles."

(An interview granted by King Saud to Mr. Lilienthal has been quoted by the "Voice of the Arabs" broadcast over the Cairo Radio. The broadcast reported that "the King thanked Lilienthal" and pointed out that "Palestine is Arab and any future understanding should rest upon this fact.")

CONGRESSIONAL BODY HEARS TESTIMONY ON SOVIET JEWISH PERSECUTIONS

NEW YORK, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- Leaders of major Jewish organizations continued their testimony here before the House Committee on Communist Aggression today emphasizing that Jewish culture is being wiped out in the Soviet Union while Zionism is banned in all Communist countries.

Dr. Israel Goldstein, president of the American Jewish Congress, appearing before the Committee, charged that "the shadow of doom lies over the spiritual survival of 2,500,000 Jews in Soviet lands." Yiddish newspapers, he testified, ceased publication, Yiddish writers disappeared and other Yiddish institutions were shut down.

"Sympathy for Zionism not only remained a crime, as it had been for many years, but the accusation of Zionism directed sometimes against persons who had been bitter opponents of it, became an important weapon in the armory with which the masters of the moment struck down potential rivals," Dr. Goldstein declared, adding that the false indictment of the Jewish doctors was later admitted by the Soviet leaders to be part of a plan to stir up racial animosity.

He pointed out that while the USSR supported the establishment of Israel at the United Nations, Zionism continued to be banned and suspected Zionists continued to be jailed and sent to forced labor camps. The answer to this "glaring contradiction," he said, was political expediency, but more important, the "fundamental and irreconcilable conflict between the Jewish conception of life and humanity and that which is embodied in the dogma on which the Soviet Government professes to be based."

Jewish Labor Committee, War Veterans Also Testify

Jewish Labor Committee vice-chairman Jacob Zukerman told the House Committee that "the Kremlin, while it piously pronounces peaceful co-existence between itself and other nations, has, in effect, declared a war of destruction against the remaining vestiges of the Jewish communities under their geographical domination." He cited several examples of cultural genocide against the Jews, their institutions, in the Soviet Union and satellite nations.

Mr. Zukerman called for a United Nations investigation into charges made earlier by the Jewish Labor Committee that the Soviet Union had failed to answer requests made by the organization demanding to know the fate of some half million Jewish refugees whose whereabouts have never been accounted for by the Soviets. Mr. Zukerman said that over 200 Jewish writers had similarly vanished in the Soviet Union.

Benjamin Kaufman, testifying on behalf of the Jewish War Veterans of the United States of America, of which he is national executive director, pointed out that the JWV was "never fooled by the Communist propagandist who glibly extolled the tolerance of Communism with respect to races and religions." He told the committee of some of the positive programs undertaken by the JWV to educate its members and all Americans as to the "dangers and pitfalls of Communism."

Herschel Weinrauch, former Red Army officer and editor of an official Yiddish newspaper in Birobidjan during the 1930's, testified yesterday that the settlement of Birobidjan by Jews was used by the Communists to mulct millions of dollars from Americans in cash, equipment and machinery meant for the Jewish region. He also declared that of some 600,000 Jews sent from Poland to Siberia in 1939 only 150,000 have been accounted for and the remaining 450,000 "just vanished" by the war's end in 1945.

DEMOCRATS URGE REVISION OF IMMIGRATION LAW, FAIR DEAL TO ISRAEL

NEW YORK, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- The New York State Democratic Party called last night for revision of the McCarran-Walter Immigration Act as discriminatory in a party platform adopted at the state convention in Albany, which also called upon the United States Government to expand its economic and technical aid to the Middle East states rather than arming them.

The Democrats demanded "elimination of all discrimination in our immigration and naturalization laws based upon race, religion or place of birth." They also asked "elimination of discriminatory nationality provisions which make second class citizens of naturalized aliens, a denial of the traditional concept of equal protection for all under the laws. The rights of all citizens, native-born and naturalized, must be the same," the platform said.

On the Middle East, the Democratic platform said: "We believe that the furnishing of arms to either side is unwise until the Arab states have accepted the existence of Israel and until specific steps are taken, on both sides, toward a normal and stable relationship. We believe that the cause of peace, stability and strength--which is America's prime concern--would best be served by expanded programs of economic aid and technical assistance to the peoples and countries of the area, to aid in the development of its natural wealth.

"If the Administration nevertheless feels it is necessary to furnish arms to Arab states prior to concrete moves toward the achievement of a real peace and stability in the area, we urge and demand that our government should at least offer similar arrangements and arms to Israel, so that the delicate balance of power in this area remain undisturbed."

The Republican State convention--now being held in Syracuse--adopted a platform which generally limits itself to local and state issues and takes no stand on national and international issues. It has no planks on immigration or the Middle East. On the question of discrimination, it points to the record of the Republican state administrations of the past under whose direction New York became the first state to put into operation a program of anti-discriminatory legislation in various fields.

U.S. JEWS NEED STRONG CIVIC DEFENSE ORGANIZATIONS, KLUTZNICK SAYS

CHICAGO, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- Much of the difficulties involved in stimulating the raising of funds for civic defense work is due to the "failure to bring the hard realities of the world in which we live to the attention of American Jewry," Philip M. Klutznick, B'nai B'rith president, told an audience of community leaders here attending the opening meeting of the Joint Defense Appeal drive.

Mr. Klutznick warned that there were signs on the horizon indicating that the need for "a fighting organization" capable of defending Jews against false and malicious charges was "as great today as in any modern time." He cited several examples in recent weeks to illustrate the situation. Taking up the recent probe at Fort Monmouth, he declared that 41 out of the 45 originally suspended as security risks were Jews, and that accidentally or otherwise, many of them had been falsely accused and have since been reinstated.

The B'nai B'rith president took issue with those who "believe that the only way to stamp out anti-Semitism is to broaden the base of democracy." He pointed out, for example, that many Southern Jews were now being subjected to both "economic and social pressures" because of the part that Jewish organizations had played in ending school segregation in the South. Commenting that "it is one thing to talk about it within the comfortable walls of his club and another thing to come face to face with the effects of it in a small town in Mississippi," he warned that every defense of civil rights required boldness and courage.

PHILADELPHIA YOUTHS PUT ON PROBATION FOR ASSAULTING JEWS

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- Three teen-age youths have been put on indefinite probation by Municipal Court Judge Herbert E. Millen for invading Congregation Shari Zedek of this city and assaulting three elderly members of the congregation last July. Earlier Judge Millen had discharged the three and a fourth member of the gang who has since returned to his Army unit, but later changed his mind and re-opened the case.

JEWS DOCTOR DISCOVERS METHOD TO HELP THE PARTIALLY BLIND

NEW YORK, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- Discovery of a new method of bridging blind spots through optics will restore vision to about half of the estimated 150,000 partially blind persons in the United States, it was announced tonight by Dr. William Feinbloom, optometrical consultant in the rehabilitation of the blind to the New York State Department of Welfare.

An outstanding authority on subnormal vision, Dr. Feinbloom reported that his new method mobilizes the remaining, enlarged seeing areas of a diseased or defective eye into a single, unified image by bridging the blind spots.

JEWS TERCENTENARY CELEBRATIONS START IN SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- The opening celebration of the American Jewish Tercentenary in this city was attended by an enthusiastic crowd which overflowed the theatre in which the affair was held. Leading civic and religious figures participated in the meeting.

Gov. Goodwin J. Knight referred to the Tercentenary as "a re-dedication of the people of the Jewish faith to continue to work with all Americans in the never-ending search for and the never-ending effort to preserve the democratic way of life." San Francisco Mayor Elmer E. Robinson, another speaker, also paid tribute to American Jewry.

HEBREW COLLEGE CONFERS DEGREE UPON ISRAEL MINISTER

NEW YORK, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- The Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion today conferred an honorary degree upon Dr. Ben Zion Dinur, Israel Minister of Education and Culture, who is now visiting the United States.

Dr. Dinur returned to New York from a visit to Washington where he conferred with government leaders on various phases of educational and cultural activities of mutual interest. Last Sunday the Jewish Theological Seminary conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Hebrew Letters upon him.

TURKOW NAMED JEWISH CONGRESS REPRESENTATIVE IN ARGENTINA

NEW YORK, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- Mark Turkow, noted editor, has been appointed the World Jewish Congress representative in Argentina, it was announced by Abraham S. Hyman, administrative director of the WJC. In addition to representing the Congress, he will edit a quarterly in Spanish for the WJC for distribution in Latin America.

Mr. Turkow will coordinate his activities with the DAIA, representative body of Argentine Jewry, which is affiliated with the World Jewish Congress. He formerly served as the HIAS representative in Argentina and is the editor of a Buenos Aires publishing firm.

LEAVITT HONORED IN BUENOS AIRES; LEAVES FOR URUGUAY AND BRAZIL

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- The Jewish community of Buenos Aires last night honored Moses A. Leavitt, executive vice-chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, at a banquet attended by many leaders of Argentine Jewish organizations. Mr. Moses who is proceeding to Uruguay and Brazil on a JDC mission, thanked the community for its cooperation and courtesy to him during his stay here.
