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BURNS SENDS REPORTS ON ISRAEL-EGYPTIAN SITUATION TO U. N.

JERUSALEM, April 10, (JTA)--Gen. E. L. M. Burns, Chief of Staff of the United Nations Truce Supervision Organization in Palestine, forwarded to the UN Security Council today his first report since his return to Palestine on the situation along the Israel-Egyptian border in the Gaza strip area, together with the decision yesterday of the Israel-Egyptian Mixed Armistice Commission on the 90 minute border battle near Nachal Oz last Sunday, which started with the Egyptians mining an Israel patrol car and then bombarding Nachal Oz.

Dispatch of these reports is expected to clear the way for Security Council consideration of Israel's most recent charges of armistice violation and aggression in the border area against the Egyptian Government. Israel's urgent request for a Council session was granted last Wednesday, on the eve of Passover, and the Security Council, after hearing the Israel delegate, adjourned until it had received a report from the MAC on the Nachal Oz incident about which Israel had complained.

The MAC decision yesterday, coming after a 12-hour session, condemned Egypt for the attack and then voted "technical censure" of Israel because the Israel troops under fire in the incident had replied with small arms and mortars. Earlier this weekend, the MAC handed down a similar double condemnation in an incident on March 30 beginning with an Egyptian attack on an Israel patrol.

Burns to Open High Level Talks on Easing Tension

Even as Gen. Burns is expected hourly to open high level talks with Israel and Egypt to ease the tension in the Gaza border region, the press here reported that Gen. Burns had demanded that Israel remove from the Gaza border area mortars and half-tracks to prevent such Israel counter-action as last Sunday when, coming to the aid of Israel troops pinned down by Egyptian cross fire, Israel reinforcements overran an Egyptian machine gun nest with an armored half-track and responded to shelling with mortars.

Explaining the presence of mortars and half-tracks in the border zone, a military spokesman said that these weapons had been called for by the Israel patrol which had come under attack and could not extricate its wounded. The weapons were returned to their base outside the zone as soon as their task was completed.

The MAC, meanwhile, has scheduled a meeting for tomorrow to hear Israel's charges that another Israel patrol car was mined yesterday in the Gaza area near Nirim--the eighth such incident in five weeks. An hour later an Israel military vehicle was fired on by Egyptian fire. This attack brought answering Israel artillery fire. The landmine blast killed two Israel soldiers and wounded two more, bringing total Israel casualties since March 12 to eight dead and 58 wounded.

ISRAEL WILL NOT SURRENDER TERRITORY FOR "SETTLEMENT" WITH ARABS

JERUSALEM, April 10. (JTA)--An Israel Foreign Ministry spokesman warned this weekend against any construction of the reference by Sir Anthony Eden in the House of Commons last week to "settlement of frontiers" between Israel and its neighbors that would imply any readiness by Israel to cede any territory.

The spokesman expressed the hope that Sir Anthony's reference, made during the Commons debate on British adherence to the Turkish-Iraqi pact, would not arouse Arab appetites for Israel territory.

Israel, the spokesman declared, has constantly signified its readiness for peace on the basis of its present boundaries. Israel does not claim territory from any of its neighbors and rejects any territorial claims on their part, he said. "Any allusion to the possibility of a change in the frontiers would place a perfectly gratuitous obstacle on the road to peace," the spokesman declared.

Major General E. L. M. Burns, head of the United Nations truce supervision Organization, flew to the Gaza area Thursday and met the heads of the Israel and Egyptian delegations in the Mixed Armistice Commission. He commenced negotiations with them immediately on measures to preserve peace in the area in line with the resolution taken by the Security Council.

He proposed direct communications between the Israel and Egyptian local commanders, construction of barriers clearly marking the boundary lines and joint Israel-Egyptian-United Nations patrols along the "sensitive" sections of the demarcation line.

QUANTITY OF ARMS LEFT FROM MANDATE FOUND IN JERUSALEM

JERUSALEM, April 10. (JTA)--A store of arms which may have been amassed by underground opponents of the British regime during the Mandate, was found this weekend in cellars and basements in the Mea Shearim and Beit Israel quarters, stronghold of the Naturei Karta, fanatical Orthodox sect which refuses to recognize the authority of the State of Israel.

The arms cache is said to comprise four machine guns, five Sten guns, 40 rifles of British and Czech manufacture, more than 10,000 rounds of ammunition, hand grenades, detonators and armorers' equipment. The arms were in good condition.

Police are investigating the possibility that the arms hoard may belong to a zealot underground organization.

BRITISH SYNAGOGUES TO MARK ISRAEL INDEPENDENCE WITH SERVICES

LONDON, April 10. (JTA)--Chief Rabbi Israel Brodie, in a communication to ministers of synagogues throughout Great Britain, said that it would be appropriate to celebrate Israel's Independence Day, and at the same time, to take note of those who fell in the battle for independence and the victims of Nazi brutality.

Rabbi Brodie's communication said "representations have been made to me from many quarters in recent years, that it would be appropriate for us to be associated in a fitting manner with a religious celebration of Independence Day in Israel. I am satisfied that this is the general view of Anglo-Jewry and I have accordingly decided that the anniversary of Israel's independence should be an occasion for rejoicing and thanksgiving to the Almighty for all his mercies to the remnant of Israel. At the same time, it is but fitting on that day to recall the memory of those who fell in the battle for independence, as well as the victims of Nazi brutality who were denied the blessing of witnessing the 'beginning of redemption.'"

The Chief Rabbi then went on to request that special psalms and prayers be recited on the Sabbath preceding Independence Day, and that "Adon Olam" be sung to the tune of "Hatikvah." He also asked that special services be held by synagogues on Independence Day eve and that in communities where there is more than one congregation joint services be arranged.

BRITISH CHIEF RABBI WARNS AGAINST ANTI-SCHECHITA BILL

LONDON, April 10. (JTA) -- British Chief Rabbi Israel Brodie has made it clear that stunning of any kind prior to the traditional process of ritual slaughter will render the meat non-kosher, in a statement issued here in connection with a bill to be introduced in the House of Commons April 29. R. F. Crouch, Conservative M. P. will introduce a private bill, the text of which has just been made public, designed to prevent the traditional Jewish method of killing animals unless they are stunned previously.

The statement of the Chief Rabbinate, released on the eve of Passover, said "the Chief Rabbi wishes to make it clear that stunning of any kind prior to the Jewish ritual method of slaughter would, in accordance with Jewish law, render the meat unfit for Jewish consumption. The declaration of Jewish ecclesiastical authorities in this country is identical with similar declarations made by the Chief Rabbinate of Israel, the supreme religious authority of that country, and of Orthodox rabbis throughout the world. Further, the Chief Rabbi wishes to emphasize again the humaneness of the Jewish method of slaughter, to which scientists of the highest eminence and objectivity have given testimony."

In Manchester, Dr. A. Altmann, communal rabbi of that city, said in a sermon delivered yesterday, that it was a grave injustice to accuse the Jewish religion of cruelty and advocate introduction, by way of a private member's bill, of compulsory stunning before ritual slaughter. He said that both rabbinic and Biblical legislation had given the world a lead in combatting all forms of cruelty to animals.

FRENCH VICTIMS OF NAZIS TO MARK BUCHENWALD LIBERATION

PARIS, April 10. (JTA)--More than four hundred former French deportees and relatives of persons who never returned from the Nazi concentration camp at Buchenwald left here this week-end in a special train for Germany where they will attend ceremonies tomorrow marking the tenth anniversary of the liberation of the camp.

Still another group of about the same number left Strasbourg for Buchenwald this week-end. All in all, several thousand persons are expected to attend the Buchenwald memorial ceremony.

COMMEMORATE 150th ANNIVERSARY OF JEWISH SCHOOL IN DENMARK

COPENHAGEN, April 10. (JTA)--Julius Bomholt, Danish Minister of Education, and other representatives of Danish cultural and educational life were present at a ceremony here commemorating the 150th anniversary of the only Jewish day school in Denmark--the Caroline School here. Guests, among whom were Israel Charge d' Affaires Harry Beilein and Professor Harald Isenstein, Jewish sculptor, gathered in a tent erected in the school grounds for the ceremony.

Otto Levysohw, president of the school's board of directors, told the guests that the school worked for understanding between Jews and non-Jews in Denmark. Minister Bomholt said that he was happy that a branch of the Jewish people had settled in Denmark and given that country so many prominent citizens. He presented the school with a check for 6,000 Danish crowns for the erection of a school library and kitchen.

JEWISH MUSEUM CLOSED BY NAZIS TO BE OPENED IN AMSTERDAM

AMSTERDAM, April 10. (JTA)--The Jewish Historical Museum in this city, which was closed down by the Germans during their occupation of the Netherlands, will re-open next month in the same building with an exhibition of Jewish life in Amsterdam in past ages.

DISMISSAL OF CORSI AS IMMIGRATION ACT AIDE HIT FROM ALL SIDES

WASHINGTON, April 10. (JTA)--Dismissal of Edward J. Corsi from his State Department post as Refugee Relief Act trouble-shooter continued receiving harsh criticism from political leaders of both major parties this weekend. Corsi, a liberal Republican who has held various important jobs, including that of U.S. Commissioner of Immigration, has been a consistent critic of the McCarran-Walter Immigration Act, and a foe of the national origins quota system.

Appointed three months ago by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles to expedite immigrant entry under the Refugee Relief Act of 1953, Mr. Corsi had recommended that administration of the Refugee Relief program be taken out of the hands of Scott McLeod, State Department security chief. One of Mr. Corsi's chief opponents has been Rep. Francis E. Walter, of Pennsylvania, co-author of the McCarran-Walter measure.

Senator Herbert H. Lehman today called the firing of Mr. Corsi "a shameless surrender to the opponents of reform of immigration and citizenship law. It is a capitulation to the apologists for the racial and national discrimination built into the McCarran-Walter Act."

Rep. Emanuel E. Celler, chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, accused Mr. Dulles of "buckling up" to pressure from "the McCarthy group," and said that McLeod himself "is the real villain in this piece."

New York State Attorney General Jacob K. Javits telegraphed to Mr. Dulles requesting reconsideration of Mr. Corsi's dismissal "in our highest national interest" He told the Secretary of State he thought the McCarran-Walter Act should be re-written, and praised Mr. Corsi highly for his record of public service, especially in immigration.

Nathan Chanin, chairman of the executive committee of the Jewish Labor Committee, issued a statement supporting Mr. Corsi and calling for "censure and repudiation" of Rep. Walter. Mr. Chanin termed the Corsi dismissal "reprehensible" and said it came "under the pressure of hysteria."

REP. CELLER CHALLENGES PASSPORT OFFICIAL'S APPOINTMENT

WASHINGTON, April 10. (JTA)--The appointment of Miss Frances G. Knight as new head of the State Department's Passport Division has been challenged by Congressman Emanuel Celler, chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, because of charges, published in the Washington Post and Times-Herald, that she was "very interested" in the Nazi puppet regime of Father Tiso in Slovakia.

In a second letter to Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, Rep. Celler this weekend again questioned the appointment. His first letter, dated March 3, 1955, was sent to Mr. Dulles immediately after publication of the charges. The Secretary has since pleaded ignorance of the charges against Miss Knight in a letter to Rep. Celler and at a press conference last week.

ADL HITS DISCRIMINATORY POLICIES OF ADIRONDACK RESORT

NEW YORK, April 10. (JTA)--Backing came today from the Anti-Defamation League for educators and others refusing to participate in an educators' meeting scheduled to be held at the Lake Placid Club, in Lake Placid. According to Arnold Forster, civil rights director of the ADL, the Lake Placid Club maintains a "restrictive membership and guest policy" discriminating against Jews, but drops that policy during "off-season" months to attract convention business.

The ADL statement was issued after Dr. Alice V. Kelliher, Professor of Education at New York University, and New York State Attorney General Jacob K. Javits had withdrawn as scheduled speakers before next month's convention of the New York State Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development. The choice of the club as the place for the convention was also questioned by Charles Cogen, president of Local 2 of the Teachers Guild, AFL.

5,000 GUESTS ATTEND "THIRD SEDER" GIVEN BY HISTADRUT CAMPAIGN

NEW YORK, April 10. (JTA)--The State of Israel, and its Ambassador in the United States, drew high praise and pledges of firm support tonight at the annual "Third Seder" sponsored by the National Committee for Labor Israel, attended by 5,000 guests crowding the ballrooms of two large hotels.

Israel's Ambassador Abba S. Eban, who also represents his country at the United Nations, was guest of honor at the Histadrut event. A tribute to him as a man "whose eloquent exposition of Israel's cause has made him a spokesman not only for Israel but for all small nations" was voiced by the chairman of the \$5,000,000 Histadrut campaign, Judge Samuel S. Leibowitz.

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WASHINGTON, April 10. (JTA)--Various events connected with the observance of Passover in the United States have been and will be carried to the peoples of the world by the U. S. Information Agency in a series of special programs and commentaries utilizing press, radio, television and photo facilities.

JEWISH SOCIALIST BUND HOLDS THIRD WORLD PARLEY IN MONTREAL

MONTREAL, April 10. (JTA)--The Jewish Socialist Bund still has much work to do in alliance with Social Democracy throughout the world, and can be particularly useful in the area of Jewish culture, 600 delegates attending the Bund's third world conference here were told this weekend by a number of prominent speakers.

Delegates in attendance came from Israel, France, Australia, and Uruguay in addition to the United States, Canada and Mexico. Greetings were received by the conference from the Canadian Socialist Party, the British Labor Party, the Second International and the International Ladies Garment Workers Union. Among the speakers were Prof. L. Hersh of Geneva; I Artusky of Tel Aviv; Sarah Shweber, formerly of Warsaw; B. Takachinsky and Emanuel Sherer.

OFFICIALS OF CONSERVATIVE JEWISH RELIGIOUS SCHOOLS MEET

MONTICELLO, N. Y., April 10. (JTA)--Problems of proper supervision and staffing of Conservative religious schools were discussed here this weekend at the Educators Assembly of America, an annual meeting attended by top Jewish educators who work in religious education programs in Conservative synagogues. The Assembly elected Harry Malin, of Bridgeport, Conn., as president.

ISRAEL BOND ORGANIZATION TO HONOR CARMINE DE SAPIO

NEW YORK, April 10. (JTA)--Carmine G. De Sapio, New York State Secretary of State, will be given a testimonial dinner on behalf of the Israel Bond campaign, it was announced here today by a special Israel Bond committee headed by Leon Finley. At the dinner, April 25, Mr. De Sapio will be given a Distinguished Leadership Award.

JOSEPH MARGOSHES, DEAN OF YIDDISH JOURNALISTS IN U. S., DIES AT 89

NEW YORK, April 10. (JTA)--Joseph Margoshes, dean of Yiddish journalists in the United States, died today at his home here, aged 89. He had worked at his writing for the Day-Morning Journal until the very end.

Born in Galicia in 1866, Mr. Margoshes first came to the United States in 1898. He returned to Europe but came back here again in 1903 and became a correspondent for various Yiddish newspapers. Later he was associated with the Bureau of Jewish Education and the Jewish Communal Register. He joined the staff of the Morning Journal in 1921. He is survived by two sons well known in Yiddish journalism, Dr. Samuel Margoshes and Herman Morgenstern.
