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FIVE ISRAELIS KILLED IN EGYPTIAN FORAYS; ISRAEL LEADERS CONFER

TEL AVIV, Aug. 30. (JTA) -- Armed Egyptians who infiltrated far beyond the Israel-Egyptian border last night slew four Israel civilian workmen in one ambush near Ness Ziona and killed the father and wounded the mother and three children in a family ambush near Rehovoth.

In two other incidents during the night, four Israel soldiers were injured, two seriously, when their jeep hit a mine near Tel Rim, near the Gaza strip frontier. Another soldier was wounded when a patrol jeep was ambushed near Rehovoth.

(In Jerusalem, Premier Moshe Sharett called Defense Minister David Ben Gurion, Army Chief of Staff Gen. Moshe Dayan and several other Cabinet members to urgent consultations in the wake of the latest Egyptian attacks against Israel lives and property. This emergency meeting was called after reports of Egyptian attacks continuing into the sixth consecutive day.)

(In London, the Israel Embassy issued a statement describing the situation along the Israel-Egyptian border in the Gaza area as "most serious." The statement detailed Egyptian armistice violations since the breaking off of discussions between representatives of the two states and repeated the warning issued by the Israel Government that it will take all measures necessary to protect the lives and property of its citizens.)

The ambush of the four workmen took place some 25 miles north of the Gaza strip border. The attack on the family occurred several miles south of this point. The family was returning to its home at Kubeiba, lighting its way by lantern. When the father, mother, three children and one grandchild were within earshot of their home the Arabs opened fire. Another member of the family, in the house, heard the father call to the others to keep down. When rescuers arrived they found five of the six lying in pools of blood and a four-year-old child unharmed. The head of the family, Numa Jacob Hai, died later in the hospital. The others are still in the hospital, all in serious condition.

These incidents followed a day of marked military activity in the Gaza area. The military spokesman here announced that throughout the entire day, until late in the evening, Egyptian posts maintained a heavy fire on Israel outposts along the Gaza strip border.

Israel Informs UN Security Council of Further Egyptian Attacks

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Aug. 30. (JTA) -- For the second time in two days, the Government of Israel informed the United Nations Security Council today of Egyptian attacks on Israel lives and property within Israel territory.

In a letter supplementing his message of yesterday, Mordecai R. Kidron, deputy chief of the Israel delegation here, listed five more attacks by Egyptian marauders yesterday and today. He noted that these "outrages" had resulted in at least five civilians dead and a number of civilians and soldiers wounded and stressed that the latest attacks had occurred in heavily populated areas of Israel all of which were located at a "considerable distance" from the Gaza strip.

DULLES SAYS SOVIET UNION IS OFFERING ARMS TO ARAB STATES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30. (JTA) -- Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said today in response to questions that there are indications, with some signs of reliability, that the Soviet Union is offering to furnish military equipment to Arab League countries. In the questioning, only Egypt was specifically named.

The Secretary was asked at his press conference if the United States was aware that the Soviet Union had offered munitions to Egypt or other Arab states. He replied that there were indications in which he places some reliability that such offers may have been made. He indicated, however, that his information was not official.

Stating that he did not think the United States would be happy over the offer of arms by Russia to the Arabs, Mr. Dulles added, however, that the Arab States were free and independent governments with authority to do whatever they think best.

Mr. Dulles was asked if U.S. economic aid under Mutual Security arrangements precluded Arab military arrangements with the Soviet Union. He replied that he did not think the terms of American aid to the Arabs prevented them from receiving Russian arms. He thought the Arabs were now getting military aid principally from non-Soviet sources.

Confirms U. S. Intervention with Israel, Egypt to Halt Fighting

Asked if Russian arms arrangement with the Arab League states was in keeping with the professed Soviet desire to relax international tension, Mr. Dulles said it certainly would not contribute toward the relaxation of tension.

A spokesman for the Soviet Embassy declined to comment today on the reported Soviet offer of munitions to Egypt and other Arab League states. He said the Embassy had nothing to say on this matter.

The Secretary of State confirmed that the United States, within the last 48 hours, has made direct representations in Israel and Egypt, urging both parties to refrain from the use of force in the Gaza vicinity. He said the American view was made known through diplomatic channels in the Egyptian and Israel capitals.

He said that as yet he had heard nothing from either side regarding the peace suggestions he outlined in a speech last Friday. No government has so far asked clarification, he said. He urged that his speech be considered a policy statement rather than a peace proposal. He said he was awaiting, Arab and Israel reactions.

Mr. Dulles declined to elaborate and explain a statement in his speech that President Eisenhower had authorized him to say "that given a solution of the other related problems, he would recommend that the United States join in formal treaty engagements to prevent or thwart any effort by either side to alter by force the boundaries between Israel and its Arab neighbors." He explained that he did not think it appropriate to add anything of substance until reactions are received. The wording of speech, he indicated, was carefully considered and he only put into it what he deemed proper.

Mr. Dulles was asked if Vice President Richard M. Nixon, in his forthcoming trip to the Near East, would follow up the Dulles policy statement. He replied that Mr. Nixon was not going for that purpose but as an individual messenger of goodwill not charged with diplomatic responsibility. He said the trip and the policy statement developed independently and expressed belief that Mr. Nixon would not pursue the matter.

Lebanese Ambassador Discusses Dulles Proposal with State Dept.

The Dulles policy declaration and the current Gaza area situation were discussed at the State Department today by Dr. Charles Malik, the Lebanese Ambassador, with George V. Allen, Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs. Dr. Malik declined to discuss the Lebanese Government's reaction to the Dulles declaration. He made known that he is leaving his post in Washington after 10 years of service.

A violent attack on the Dulles declaration by a member of Egypt's ruling Revolutionary Council was reported here today. Cairo broadcasts said that Minister of State Anwar Sadat had condemned the policy statement as "impracticable" and serving Israel's interests. The Egyptian said that Mr. Dulles had spoken only from the "Israel viewpoint."

Interest was aroused here in a Jerusalem dispatch to the Christian Science Monitor which detailed the major points on which official Israelis feel further elucidation is necessary before Israel can give its reaction to the proposals.

In connection with the reference to boundaries, the Israelis ask if the Secretary of State has in mind minor mutual adjustment or major territorial concessions. They also ask, the paper reported, in what way the proposed United Nations-sponsored "security guarantee" would be more effective than the existing tripartite agreement.

The question is also raised, the paper reported, as to what assurances there would be that Israel's compensation money to Arab refugees would be used for resettlement in view of the persistent opposition of Arab leadership to any substantial rehabilitation measures. The final major point raised by the Israelis, the newspaper added, was whether the proposed United Nations review of the Jerusalem situation was designed to repeal or revive the internationalization resolution.

French Government Sympathetic to Spirit of Dulles Proposals

PARIS, Aug. 30. (JTA) -- The Government of France is in sympathy with the spirit of the Middle East peace proposals made by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles last Friday and hopes that the "perspective" opened by these proposals will receive the approval of the interested nations. This statement was made in an official communique issued by the Foreign Office last night.

The communique said that the proposals were of a "nature which can cool off the atmosphere, prevent renewal of bloody incidents and permit the Near East states to concentrate their activities and resources on peaceful productive enterprises." The French Government will study the proposals which refer to "complex questions and which have been for France herself the subject of constant preoccupation for many years," it added. Finally, the Foreign Ministry pointed out that the goals of the Dulles plan are the same to which France is pledged, "notably that which concerns the reinforcement of guarantees offered by the Tripartite Declaration."

FRENCH JEWISH GROUP SEES FUTURE FOR JEWS IN MOROCCO

PARIS, Aug. 30. (JTA) -- A plea for peace in Morocco that will permit the Jews in that country "in cooperation with Moslems and Europeans, to find again the road to progress in mutual accord and confidence" was issued here today by the Alliance Israelite Universelle, French Jewish organization that maintains a network of schools and social institutions throughout French North Africa.

The Alliance expressed "solidarity and sorrow in their affliction" with the Jewish communities of Morocco, particularly those in the Casablanca region which have been subjected to Arab nationalist excesses.

"With nearly a hundred years experience in Morocco," the organization declared, "the Alliance knows well the fundamental qualities of Moroccan Moslems and despite the tragic consequences of the excesses by certain elements of the population, the Alliance continues its trust in them. The Alliance expresses the wish that peace will return to Morocco permitting the Jews in that country, in cooperation with Moslems and the Europeans, to find again the road to progress in mutual accord and confidence.

"Founded in order to assure justice to Jews everywhere they suffer discrimination, the Alliance cannot conceive of Jewish well-being without that of their fellow-citizens freely, equally and fraternally united. The Alliance eagerly joins its voice with all those who desire for the divided Morocco of today to prepare a future where man may effectively enjoy the rights which the world recognizes as just and lawful," the statement concluded.

UJA to Start Cash Campaign to Finance No. African Immigration

JERUSALEM, Aug. 30. (JTA) -- The United Jewish Appeal will start an immediate emergency cash campaign to raise by mid-October \$10,000,000 to finance the immigration of North African Jews to Israel, Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, executive vice-chairman of the National UJA, revealed here last night prior to departing for Paris and New York.

The UJA executive head, who deplored exaggerations of the plight of the North African Jews, said that the Jews had not been primary targets in the pogroms in several Moroccan cities in the past few weeks, but that the mobs had turned on the Jews in frustration. He said that the UJA plans to make North African immigration the top priority of its 1956 drive.

The Jewish Agency, Rabbi Friedman reported, plans to bring 45,000 North African Jews to Israel in the next twelve months but this figure is subject to change depending on conditions in that area, he said. If relative calm is restored, the number may be reduced to 20,000; but if the violence grows migration will be increased to as much as 100,000. The cost of transportation and initial absorption of each North African immigrant is \$1,000, Rabbi Friedman said.

Arab Radio Stations "Warn" No. African Jews against Israel Immigration

LONDON, Aug. 30. (JTA) -- Arab radio stations in the Middle East, in broadcasts directed to the Jews of North Africa, are urging them not to emigrate to Israel "unless you wish to be like slaves and servants."

The Cairo radio warned the North African Jews that "Zionism knows no mercy and only knows ruthlessness and slavery for Oriental Jews." It referred to a recent demonstration in Jerusalem by North African immigrants demanding increased immigration from North Africa as a "revolt against racial discrimination."

The Damascus Radio advised North African Jews that "the Jews of America and Europe look down on you Jews of the East. Jews who arrive from Arab countries like Morocco are brought to work and serve in the Army. The Jews from America and Europe get the top jobs and the big money. You'll be treated like slaves and servants."

SOUTH AFRICAN PUBLIC LIFE FREE OF JEWISH ISSUES, REPORT SAYS

JOHANNESBURG, Aug. 30. (JTA) -- Despite the changed political atmosphere which has existed in the Union of South Africa during the last few years, the country's public life has been substantially free of any Jewish issues, according to the annual report of the executive council of the South African Jewish Board of Deputies. The report was published today in connection with the opening on Friday of the Board's twentieth congress in which some 400 delegates of South African Jewish communities will participate.

The report noted that Jews continued to play a part in political and civic matters and commented that "it is a satisfactory feature of the position that, for the most part, there is a realization that they act in these spheres as individual citizens, not in any sense as spokesmen of the Jewish community."

The report added that "generally there has been an understanding of the relationship of the Jewish community to the State of Israel and of the interest displayed by South African Jewry in the welfare of the Jewish State. This has been in line with the government policy which has shown a practical sympathy for Israel in many concrete forms."

Referring to the fact that "overseas newspapers of some standing published articles charging the present government with pursuing policies unfriendly to the Jewish community," the report said that "we deem it our duty to controvert these false reports."

SWEDISH JEWS MARK 10TH ANNIVERSARY OF RESCUE FROM NAZI CAMPS

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 30. (JTA) -- The tenth anniversary of the rescue of Jewish refugees from the German concentration camps was marked here by the Jewish organizations of Stockholm. They placed wreathes on the graves of King Gustav V, Count Folke Bernadotte and Premier Hansson. Chief Rabbi Wilhelm conducted memorial services in the Jewish cemetery.

At a City Hall ceremony, addressed by Government officials and the Mayor of Stockholm, Dr. M. Nurock, a member of the Israel Knesset, addressed thanks to the Swedish Government for its aid to the Jewish victims of Nazism.

NATURE OF U. S. SECURITY PROGRAM PERMITS ANTI-SEMITISM, MASLOW SAYS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30. (JTA) -- A Senate subcommittee investigating the Federal employes security program was told by a spokesman for the American Jewish Congress today that the arbitrary nature of the security program made it possible for security officers with an anti-Semitic bias to pin security risk labels on innocent Jews.

The witness was Will Maslow. In reply to a committee member's question of whether anti-Semitism was a factor in the security program, Mr. Maslow said evidence of anti-Semitic prejudice was found in the Fort Monmouth cases where many Jewish employes were fired. Some were later reinstated after Jewish groups had pointed out the disproportionately large number of Jews branded as "risks." A Fort Monmouth security officer charged with anti-Jewish bias was removed from his job after Jewish groups demanded a government review of events at the station.

Mr. Maslow told the committee that Jewish organizations had urged the Secretary of the Army to probe the handling of the Fort Monmouth incidents. He noted that the Army refused.

The committee was to have heard two witnesses involved in the firing of Wolf Ladejinsky, but the witnesses failed to appear. They were Milan D. Smith, executive assistant to the Secretary of Agriculture, and J. Glen Cassity, the security officer of the Department of Agriculture. A subcommittee spokesman said they would be called again. If they refuse to respond a second time, subpoenas may be issued.

Mr. Ladejinsky was fired as a security risk by the Agriculture Department after he was cleared by the State Department. The Agriculture Department subsequently withdrew its charges. Ladejinsky is now employed by the Foreign Operations Administration which is now under the State Department.

B'NAI B'RITH HITS ARAB STATES' DISCRIMINATION AGAINST U. S. JEWS

STARLIGHT, Pa., Aug. 30. (JTA) -- A protest against the discrimination practiced by Arab countries in refusing to admit American soldiers and citizens of the Jewish faith was unanimously voted here by the administrative committee of the B'nai B'rith.

A resolution called upon President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles to demand from these states a prompt end to such "intolerable discrimination." The resolution noted that the Air Force manual and recent statements by Secretary for Air Harold E. Talbott admitted that the Air Force had accepted the ban imposed by Jordan and Saudi Arabia against American personnel of the Jewish faith.

HISTADRUT PRESENTS CEMENT TO HELP REBUILD FLOOD-HIT CONN. HOMES

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Aug. 30. (JTA) -- One thousand bags of Israel cement were presented tonight by Histadrut, the Israel labor federation, to the people of Connecticut toward the reconstruction of flood-devastated homes. The presentation was made at a dinner reception in honor of Captain Werner Solomon of the MS Tamar, first Israel freighter to dock at Bridgeport, at the Congregation Rodeph Shalom, under the auspices of the Jewish Community Council. The presentation was made by Dr. Dov Biegun, general secretary of the National Committee for Labor Israel, to Mayor Jasper McLevy.

The MS Tamar arrived here with a cargo of 3,500 tons of Nesher Portland Cement consigned to the City Lumber Company.

JAMES RICE JOINS UNITED HIAS; SERVED WITH J. D. C. FOR TEN YEARS

PARIS, Aug. 30. (JTA) -- James Rice, Joint Distribution Committee director for Germany who has served with the JDC for more than ten years, will join the United HIAS Service, it was announced here. He will be replaced temporarily by M. Diegellaub, of New York, director of the community relations department of the Frankfurt Office of the JDC, until a permanent replacement is named.

REMAINS OF JUDAH MAGNES TO BE TRANSFERRED TO ISRAEL TOMORROW

NEW YORK, Aug. 30. (JTA) -- The remains of the late Dr. Judah L. Magnes, American educator and rabbi, who served as the first president of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, will be transferred to Israel for reinterment on Thursday, it was disclosed today by Daniel G. Ross, president of the American Friends of the Hebrew University. The organization will sponsor a memorial meeting here in tribute to the American leader on Wednesday afternoon. Dr. Magnes died in New York City on Oct. 27, 1948, at the age of 71.
