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NEW ANTI-JEWISH RIOT IN MOROCCO; 15 JEWS INJURED; STALLS WRECKED

CASABLANCA, Morocco, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- Fifteen Jews were injured, nine of them seriously, when Moslem mobs attacked Jewish stalls yesterday at the Tamelet country market, near Marrakesh. The nine were taken to a hospital.

The attacks were originally directed against two policemen who attempted to prevent two Moslems from collecting funds at the market for Nationalist propaganda purposes. When the policemen retreated to call for reinforcements, the mob turned in full fury against the Jewish merchants, stoning them and destroying their stalls.

The headquarters of the Joint Distribution Committee issued today a summary of reports by two of its staff members who visited Mazagan, Safi, Oued Zem and Quezzane--the four communities in which Jews were involved during the rioting of Moslem nationalists nearly three weeks ago. The two JDC men visited the communities on the heels of the rioting. Their reports established that since August 19, when the riots started, four Jews were killed, three of them in the town of Oued Zem and the fourth in the town of Boujad, 15 miles away. In addition, four Jews were seriously wounded and five injured slightly.

In Mazagan, where 2,700 Jews reside, about 2,000 lived in the Jewish quarter and 700 in the European section. When the rioting began, about 500 Jews were taken from the Jewish section and sheltered by Jews living in the European part of the town, while 1,500 moved into the municipal gymnasium. Twenty-six houses in the Jewish quarter were completely burnt and there was much pillaging. The JDC immediately sent five tons of food, as well as a large quantity of blankets. At the same time, the OSE, Jewish medical organization, sent a nursing staff and medical supplies. The government made an emergency grant of 1,100,000 francs.

In Safi, some 500 Jews were evacuated from the Jewish section. Moroccan Jewish communities sent a check for 200,000 francs and the JDC provided an additional 100,000 francs, plus a supply of milk, sugar, cheese and other commodities. Considerable damage was done to a number of Jewish homes and stores.

In Oued Zem, where Europeans, Jews and Arabs live next to each other, the Jewish population is only 450. In addition to the three killed, ten stores belonging to Jews were pillaged and seven homes burnt. The Council of Jewish Communities sent a check for 200,000 francs and the JDC made another 200,000 francs available for immediate relief. In addition, the civil authorities gave 915,000 francs to ten families whose possessions were entirely destroyed.

In the immediate vicinity of Oued Zem, one Jew was killed in Boujad and ten Jewish houses partially or completely destroyed. Also in the area is the town of Khouribga, where there is no Jewish community but where there were five Jewish families in business. Their shops were ransacked together with stores belonging to Europeans. In Quezzane seventy families, comprising 300 Jewish men, women and children who lived in the Arab quarter, were moved into the Jewish quarter for safety. Ten Jewish stores and 15 houses were burnt. The JDC immediately sent a check for 100,000 francs for emergency relief.

U. J. A. Starts Drive to Help Emigration of 10,000 Jews from Morocco

NEW YORK, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- The United Jewish Appeal today launched an emergency six-week drive to raise a minimum of \$10,000,000 in cash with which to finance an October-November movement to Israel of 10,000 Jews from strife-torn Morocco.

This action was taken at a meeting of the Appeal's top officers, who named Sol Luckman of Cincinnati, a national chairman of the UJA, to head the \$10,000,000 cash drive. At the same time, the officers set October 13 as the deadline for dollar remittances by affiliated local campaigns and created a "cash caravan" which in the next six weeks will visit more than 300 cities throughout the country to help in raising the emergency fund.

William Rosenwald, general chairman of the UJA, told the officers that more than \$300,000 had poured into the UJA's national headquarters in advance of the drive's formal opening. Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, UJA executive vice-chairman, who returned last Friday after a 40-day survey of North Africa, Europe and Israel, reported that "rising strife and bloodshed in North Africa had led more than 70,000 Jews to register for emigration to Israel."

U. N. SECURITY COUNCIL TO MEET TODAY ON EGYPTIAN-ISRAEL BORDER TENSION

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Sept. 7. (JTA) -- Acting on a joint American-British-French request, the United Nations Security Council will meet tomorrow morning to discuss cessation of hostilities on the Egyptian-Israel Gaza frontier.

The request for the meeting was made formally today by the Big Three who also made public the text of a resolution they intend to propose at tomorrow's session. The draft resolution would put the full powers of the Council behind the proposals made by Gen. E. L. M. Burns, United Nations truce chief, in his latest report, to erect "physical barriers" along the Israel-Egyptian demarcation line along the Gaza strip and for the creation of a 1,000-metre wide demilitarized zone. It also declares that "freedom of movement must be afforded to United Nations observers in the area to enable them to fulfill their functions."

Meanwhile, the UN Secretariat here made public today a report on the Israel-Egyptian clashes in the Gaza area sent by Gen. Burns to the Security Council. It is assumed that this report will form the basis for the Council's consideration of the entire issue. The report blames Israel for initiating the series of attacks and counterattacks in the Gaza strip, and provoked a protest on the part of the Israel delegation at the United Nations.

Israel Considers Part of Gen. Burns' Report a Distortion

Immediately upon publication of Gen. Burns' report, Israel notified UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld that it takes exception to parts of the Burns report and considers a distortion Gen. Burns' contention in the report that Israel was responsible for the latest series of Gaza incidents by having initiated the first of the battles which occurred on August 22.

It was expected here that some correction to the Burns report would be issued by the UN. Unofficially, UN circles expressed the opinion that Gen. Burns probably wrote today's report before yesterday's Mixed Armistice Commission resolutions came through, pointing out that Egypt, not Israel, had commenced the firing on August 22.

It was considered likely here that Israel's delegation head, Abba S. Eban, might voice his objection to Gen. Burns' interpretation of the Gaza events if no official correction is made before tomorrow's meeting. On the other hand, some UN circles were of the opinion that tomorrow's meeting will be very short and that an effort is being made in advance by the sponsors of the resolution to get pledges from both sides that they would not rake up "old sores," and would let the Security Council put the resolution through amicably.

The Burns report suggests that a "physical barrier" be erected along the Gaza demarcation line and proposes also a demilitarized zone 500 metres wide on each side of that line. "If by adopting these measures," Gen. Burns informed the Security Council, "it is possible to maintain tranquility along the demarcation line for some months, the other proposals under negotiation up to August 24 might again be brought forward for discussion." The proposals to which Gen. Burns refers are those under consideration by Israel and Egypt in the Gaza pacification talks under UN auspices which Egypt broke off on August 24.

Truce Chief Tells of Attempts to Secure Cease-Fire at Gaza

The UN truce chief reports of his several attempts to obtain cease-fire pledges from the Egyptians and the Israelis since August 22. He reveals that on August 31, just prior to Israel's attack on the Egyptian command post at Khan Yunis, Israel "detained" six UN military observers and three other members of the UN truce team. He informs the Council that he protested immediately to the Israel Foreign Ministry "against this interference," that some conflicting statements were given to him by the Israel side and that after several hours the UN observers were permitted by the Israelis to go to Jerusalem or Gaza "with escorts."

"It is to be regretted," Gen. Burns continues, "that in the negotiations carried on from June 28 until broken off on August 24, it was impossible to secure the final agreement of both parties to any of the measures suggested in my report on March 17, 1955, in regard to which the Security Council resolution of March 30 called upon the parties for cooperation." Thus, Gen. Burns is seen as asking the Council for action to bolster the March 30 resolution which is the basis for the Gaza talks broken off by Egypt.

JORDANIANS BLOW UP ISRAEL WATER INSTALLATIONS IN JORDAN VALLEY

JERUSALEM, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- With the Israel-Egyptian border enjoying its second successive day of quiet, Israel's frontier with Jordan erupted into violence again today. In the central Jordan valley, infiltrators from Jordan last night blew up several water installations, cut a telephone line, blasted a fish pond and partially destroyed a truck. All the damage was either at or between the Israel settlements of Tirat Zvi and Sdeh Eliyahu. The tracks of six men were traced back to the Jordan border by Israel police this morning.

THREE-DAY NATIONAL ISRAEL BOND PARLEY OPENS IN WASHINGTON TOMORROW

NEW YORK, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- A three-day session of approximately 1,000 Jewish leaders from the United States and Canada will open in Washington this Friday to inaugurate an intensive campaign to help Israel achieve economic independence. Abraham Feinberg, president of the State of Israel Bond Organization which is sponsoring the conference declared that the delegates will seek to achieve these two major objectives:

1. To enroll large numbers of Americans in a nationwide effort to furnish Israel with the financial means to provide economic opportunities for 40,000 Jews who must be brought out of distress areas in North Africa in the coming year.

2. To enable Israel through expansion of her economic development to overcome the unceasing Arab boycott and economic blockade which have placed added obstacles in the path of Israel's economic progress during the past seven years.

Israel's Finance Minister, Levi Eshkol, arrived from Israel today to address the conference in Washington. He declared that he plans to appeal for a greatly stepped up campaign for the sale of Israel bonds in the United States and Canada to provide the economic base for the absorption of large numbers of immigrants from Morocco and other distress areas of North Africa. "The people of Israel are determined to proceed with the immigration of 50,000 Jews from North Africa during the coming year, but this humanitarian project could not be carried on without substantial economic aid from the United States," he said.

"We are grateful to the American people who have supported Israel bonds during the past four and a half years for giving Israel the economic strength to meet the desperate situation of the Jews of North Africa and to plan for their immigration to Israel. However, investment resources on a large scale will be needed to transform these immigrants into productive citizens," the Israel Minister stated. Mr. Eshkol was greeted at the airport by Dr. Joseph J. Schwartz, vice president of the Israel Bond Organization, and by representatives of the Israel Government in the United States.

HILLEL FOUNDATIONS DIRECTORS ASK FOR SURVEY ON JEWISH EDUCATION

STARLIGHT, Pa., Sept. 7. (JTA) -- A resolution calling for an intensive survey of trends in Jewish education in American universities was adopted here at the concluding session of a three-day conference of directors of Hillel Foundations at 203 colleges and universities in the United States and Canada. Rabbi Arthur Zuckerman was elected president of the National Association of Hillel Directors.

Rabbi Arthur J. Lelyveld, national director of the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundations, said that in the realm of the spiritual, Israel needs the help of American Jewry as much as American Jewry needs the help of Israel. "The inroad of secularism and over-concern with techniques which characterize the spiritual aridity in American life are equally present in the new state of Israel," he said. "What we must look for is an inter-action and cooperation between those forces in both countries which are combatting the advance of mediocrity and the loss of distinctiveness."

To close their intensive study of "Judaism for the Modern Age," student members of the Summer Institute have written a Service of Dedication which they are presenting tonight before they return to the campuses where they are leaders in Hillel activities. The 200 Institute members were chosen on the basis of leadership qualities they have shown in a B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation.

ANTI-JEWISH PLACARD PROVOKES FIGHT IN BOSTON; POLICE INTERVENE

BOSTON, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- Police here intervened yesterday to break up a scuffle which resulted from a placard message exhibited in Boston Common by followers of Rev. Leonard Feeney charging desecration at Brandeis University. The placard read: "Catholics of Boston, stop the Jews from dishonoring and desecrating the Blessed Sacrament at Brandeis University."

The scuffle occurred when some bystanders objected to the placard, carried by Rev. Feeney himself, and handbills which were being distributed by his followers. The handbills denounced a Brandeis University project to have Archbishop Richard J. Cushing, Roman Catholic prelate of this city, bless the new Catholic chapel at Brandeis. The University announced that Archbishop Cushing would celebrate the first mass and bless and dedicate the chapel tomorrow. Father Feeney was silenced by Archbishop Cushing three years ago for publicly supporting a charge that heresy was being taught at Boston College, a Jesuit institution.

Father Feeney contended that Boston College compromised official Church teaching when it suggested that salvation was possible outside the Roman Catholic Church. Later, Father Feeney was dismissed from the Jesuit order. He has set up his own center--St. Benedict's in Cambridge, Mass.,--where he and a group of young followers have continued their activities. Many of the St. Benedict Center publications have been labelled anti-Semitic in the past.

U.S. HEBREW TEACHERS OFFERED 11-MONTH ADVANCED TRAINING COURSE IN ISRAEL

NEW YORK, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- Practicing Hebrew teachers in the United States and other parts of the world, and recent graduates of Hebrew teachers seminaries, are being offered an 11-month term of advanced studies in Judaica and training in all aspects of education at the newly established Hayim Greenberg Teachers Institute opening in Jerusalem in November; it was announced here today by the Jewish Agency.

The Hayim Greenberg Institute was founded last year by the Jewish Agency's Department of Education and Culture in the name of the late Dr. Hayim Greenberg, American member of the Jewish Agency executive and an outstanding Zionist writer, lecturer and philosopher. Its purpose is to give young Hebrew teachers a thorough grounding in Jewish studies and to make Israel's social, cultural and educational life a part of their daily learning experience.

Applicants accepted by the Institute will receive a complete scholarship covering room, board and tuition in Israel. They must be graduates of accredited Hebrew teachers colleges intending to make teaching their career or licensed Hebrew teachers who wish to broaden their knowledge of the Hebrew language and of Israel. Other applicants may be accepted on the basis of personal interviews. Applications may be obtained from the headquarters of the Jewish Agency in New York.

Meanwhile, sixty members of American and Canadian Zionist and other youth groups left for Israel last week for a year's leadership training and study at the Jewish Agency's Leadership Institute in Jerusalem. Upon their return, they will assume leadership posts in their respective organizations. The group included 35 girls and 35 boys in their late teens and early twenties. They come from 12 states and 6 Canadian cities.

In Israel, the trainees will be given courses in Hebrew language and literature, the history and customs of the Jewish people, the history, geography, and problems of modern Israel, and the methods and practices of youth leadership. The curriculum includes five months of work and study at various agricultural settlements. The Leadership Institute, now in its 17th year, is sponsored by the Youth Department of the Jewish Agency.

WALTER REUTHER LEAVES ISRAEL; IMPRESSED WITH HISTADRUT ACHIEVEMENTS

TEL AVIV, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- Walter Reuther, president of the Congress of Industrial Organizations, left Israel late yesterday after a week's tour as head of a CIO delegation which came to Israel at the invitation of the Histadrut. Before departing, Mr. Reuther said that the achievements of Israel and of the Histadrut were "indescribable" and that he hoped the CIO delegation's visit would strengthen American-Israel friendship. He also expressed the opinion that Israel would be able to defend itself in the future as well as it had done in the past.

Earlier, Mr. Reuther had participated in a ceremony dedicating Philip Murray House, a cultural and community center built with funds from the CIO's Philip Murray Foundation and the Histadrut, at Eilath, in Southern Israel. The foundation contributed \$100,000 toward the center and the Histadrut matched it with a like contribution.

At that ceremony, Mr. Reuther expressed his faith that the port of Eilath, located at the head of the Gulf of Akaba, would continue its growth and soon become Israel's southern gateway and port of entry for trade from Africa and the Far East. He assured the Israel people of the full support of American labor. Gov. Theodore McKeldin of Maryland, another American visitor in Israel, and United States Ambassador Edward B. Lawson, were among the other speakers at the ceremony.

REMAINS OF DR. MAGNES RE-INTERRED IN JERUSALEM; ARABS ATTEND SERVICES

JERUSALEM, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- The remains of Dr. Judah L. Magnes, rabbi, educator and one-time president of the Hebrew University, who died in New York in 1948, were re-interred in the Sanhedria Cemetery here yesterday.

Thousands of friends and former associates of the widely respected educator attended the services, including a long list of notables headed by Chief Rabbi Isaac Herzog and Supreme Court Justice Gad Frumkin. Representatives of every political party in Israel from the far right of the Herut to the Communists, came to pay their last respects, as did Arabs from nearby villages, members of the Knesset and the entire academic staff of the Hebrew University.

DR. BAROU CREMATED IN LONDON; DR. GOLDMANN TO ADDRESS MEMORIAL

LONDON, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- The remains of Dr. Noah Barou, late chairman of the European executive of the World Jewish Congress who died here Monday at the age of 66, were cremated today after funeral services attended by an Israel diplomatic delegation headed by Ambassador Eliahu Elath, World Jewish Congress leaders and representatives of many British Zionist and Jewish communal organizations. The eulogy was delivered by Dr. Maurice L. Perlzweig, WJC leader.

World Jewish Congress headquarters here were closed today in respect to Dr. Barou. Meanwhile, hundreds of messages of condolence have been arriving at WJC headquarters from all parts of the world. Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the Congress, will address a memorial meeting here Sept. 15.
